Review of Operations

Yalgoo

Tempest's flagship project is the Company's holding in the Yalgoo region of Western Australia. It totals more than 1,000 km² and is located near high-profile neighbours across multiple commodities, including Base Metals (29 Metals Ltd—ASX:29M; Tungsten Mining NL —ASX:TGN), Gold (Spartan Resources Ltd—ASX:SPR; Vault Minerals Ltd—ASX:VAU; Capricorn Metals Ltd—ASX:CMM), and Iron (Fenix Resources Ltd—ASX:FEX; Karara Mining Limited and Sinosteel Midwest Group).

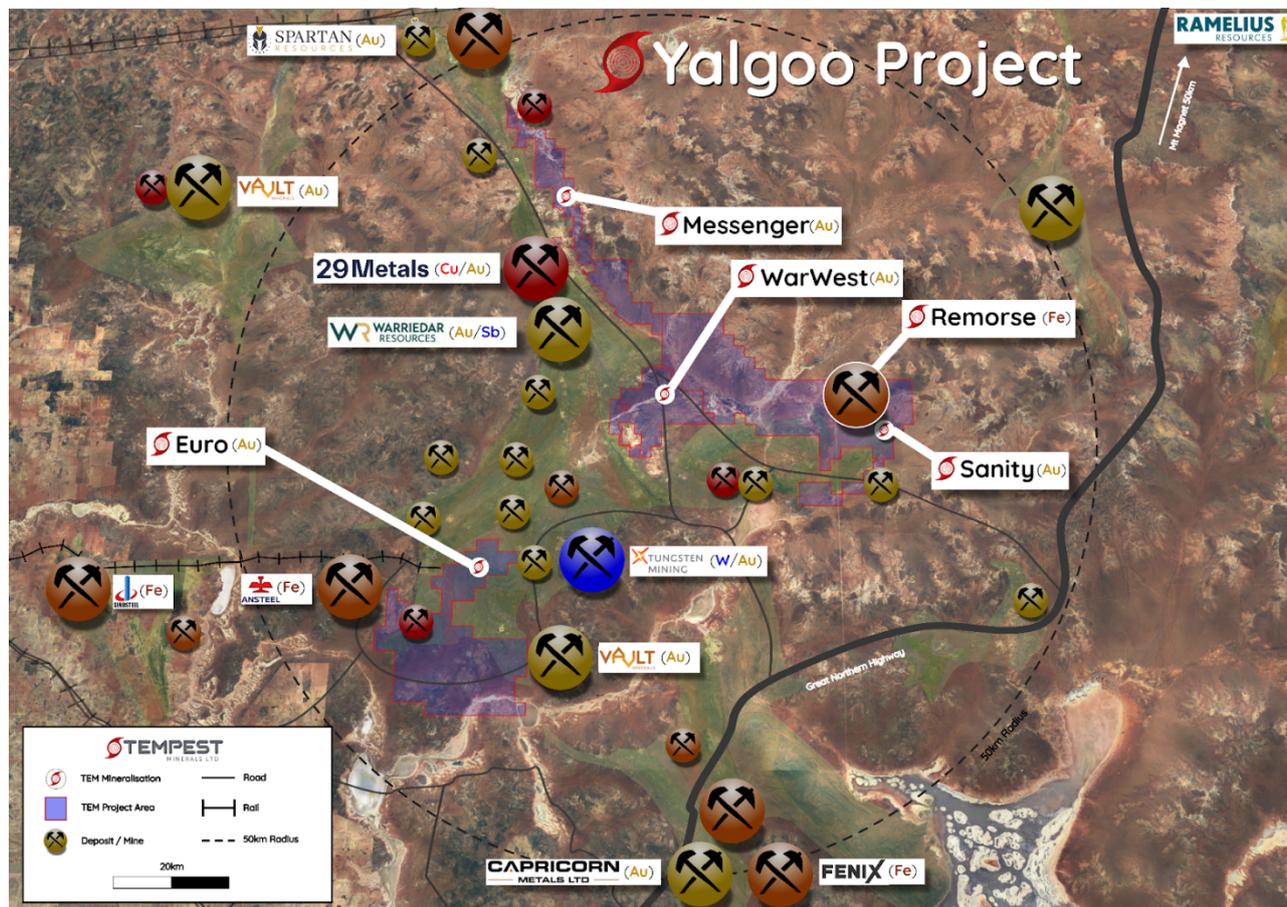


Figure 01: Yalgoo Projects Overview

Tempest has used data-driven processes to identify poorly or unexplored areas of highly prospective geology. This approach has had considerable success and includes the discovery of multiple instances of new mineralisation including the substantial Remorse magnetite deposit in 2024.

The project contains a number of different geological domains, though much of these have considerable overlap. Within these domains, exploration targets continue to be identified through ongoing exploration and data analysis and are being explored systematically according to prioritisation based on geological and other criteria.

Remorse Iron Deposit

Drilling

In August 2024, after weather related delays, Tempest commenced earthworks at the Remorse target followed by the first round of exploration drilling at Remorse in September. Work was completed in November for a total of 4,005m of RC (reverse circulation) drilling. The drilling was targeted at the substantial base metal prospect previously outlined, however, early drilling also encountered multiple thick zones of magnetite iron including maximum sample grades of in excess of 39% Iron.

Review of Operations

Discovery

Upon completion of drilling, it was established that the concentration of magnetite iron is substantial and multiple drillholes reported potentially economic intercepts.

Geologically, it also became evident that there are numerous layers of iron concentration over approximately a 5km strike length with widely spaced drilling showing consistent mineralisation over more than 2 kilometres.

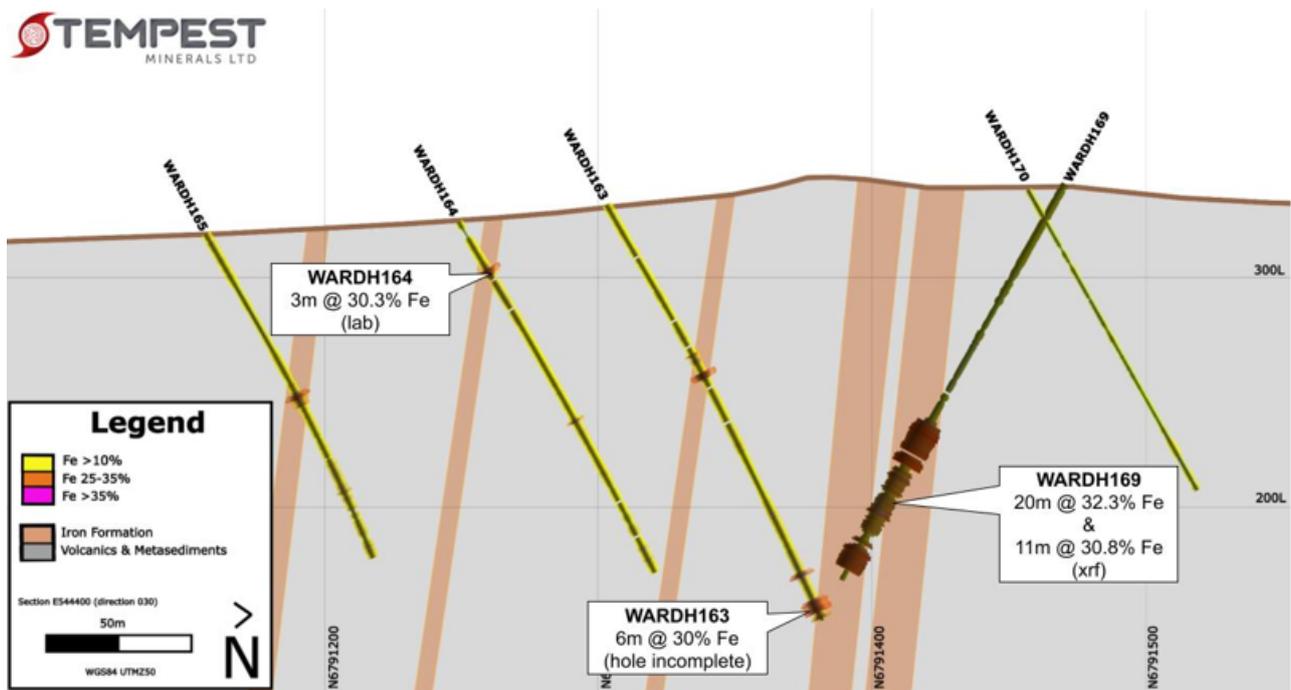


Figure 02: Section through iron mineralisation WARDH00169 and WARDH00163-165

Exploration Target

Following on from the multiple magnetite units (up to 6 mapped at the surface) being intersected with up to 27m true thickness and composite grades in excess of 30% Iron with maximum grades of up to 39% Iron, Tempest released an exploration target indicating the potential deposit size.

Due to:

- a) the consistency of results encountered during drilling in terms of geometry, thickness and grade;
 - b) the very strong correlation of the modelling present prior to drilling;
 - c) the extensive outcrop on site which the drilling and model match exceptionally well and is definable over multiple kilometres;
- the confidence in the deposit is already above that often considered for an 'Exploration Target' and, as such, considered conservative.

Note: The potential quantity and grade of the Exploration Target is conceptual in nature and as such there has been insufficient exploration drilling conducted to estimate a mineral resource. At this stage, it is not guaranteed further exploration will result in the estimation of a mineral resource. The Exploration Target has been prepared in accordance with the JORC Code (2012) and the Valmin Code (2015).

Resource Estimate

In May 2025, Tempest completed an inaugural mineral resource estimate for the Remorse Deposit. The estimate comprises an Inferred category total of 63.5 Mt @ 30.6% Fe (JORC 2012) at a 28% Fe cutoff.

The estimate matches well with the previously released initial Exploration Target for Remorse which was based on the entire known outcropping area of the deposit whereas the resource estimate was constrained by areas drilled and conservative estimate parameters. Further drilling and different cutoff grades provide substantial upside and will likely result in a substantial increase in the total resource estimate for the deposit.

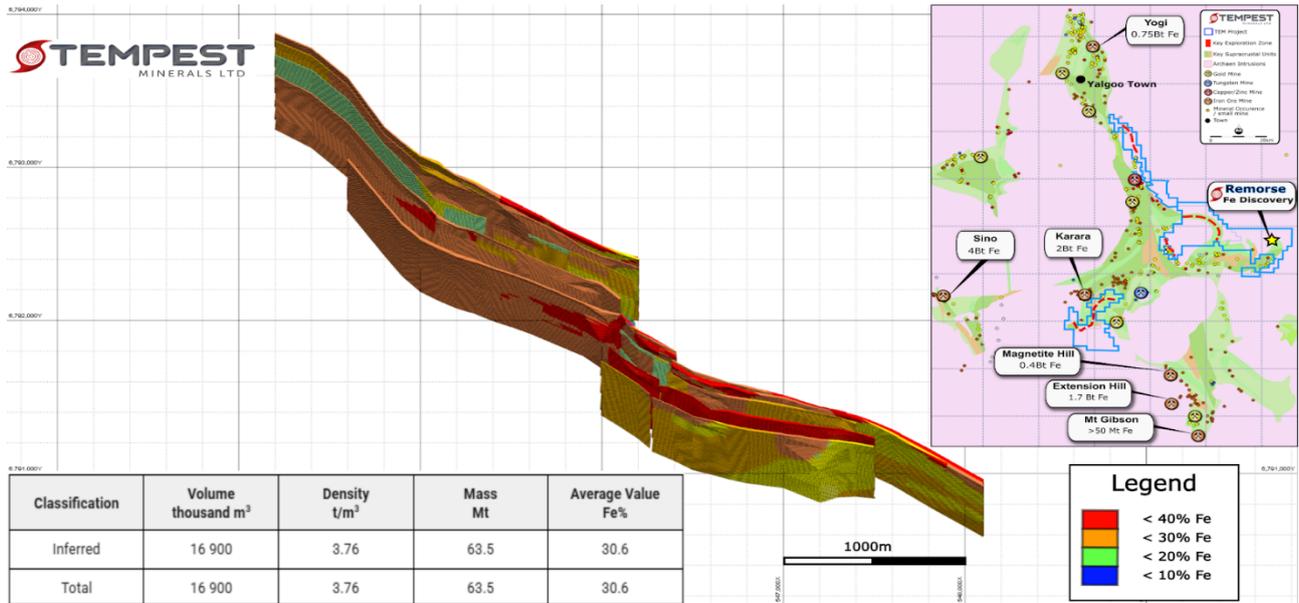


Figure 03: Remorse location, resource model and estimate.

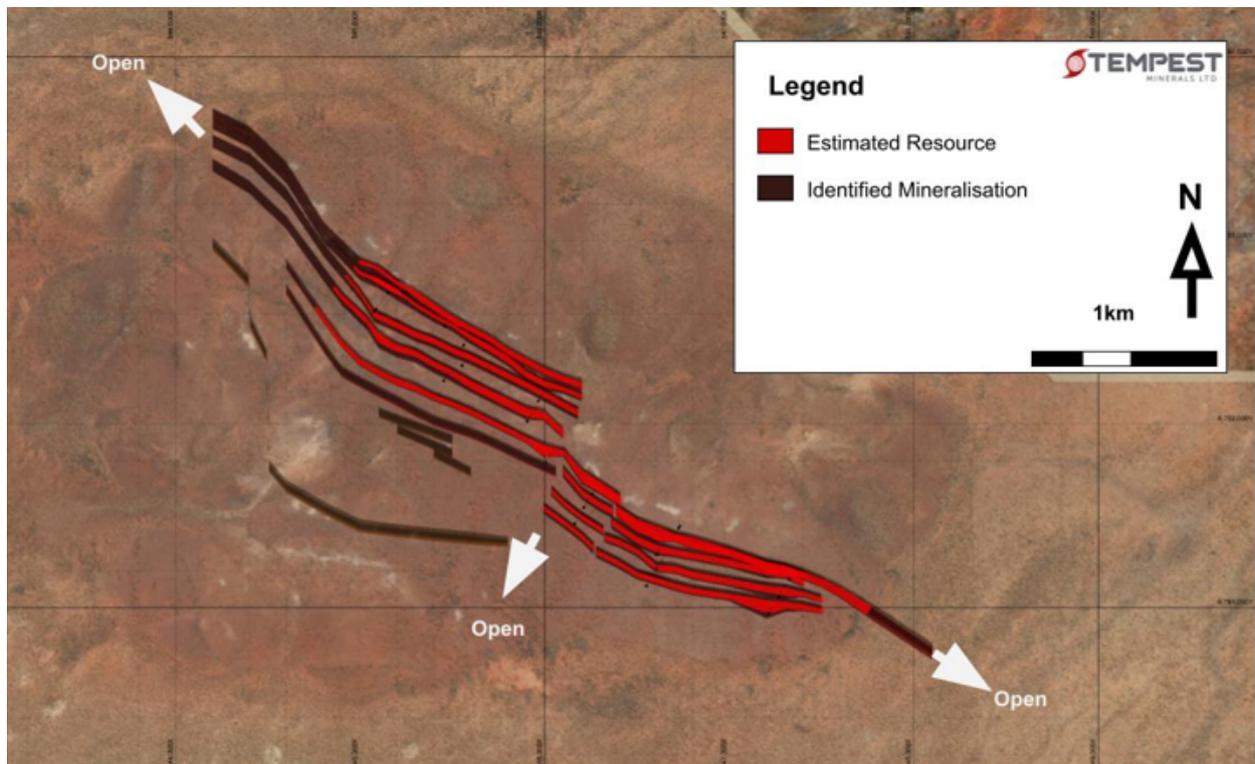


Figure 04: Remorse Resource Estimation vs outcropping and identified mineralisation.

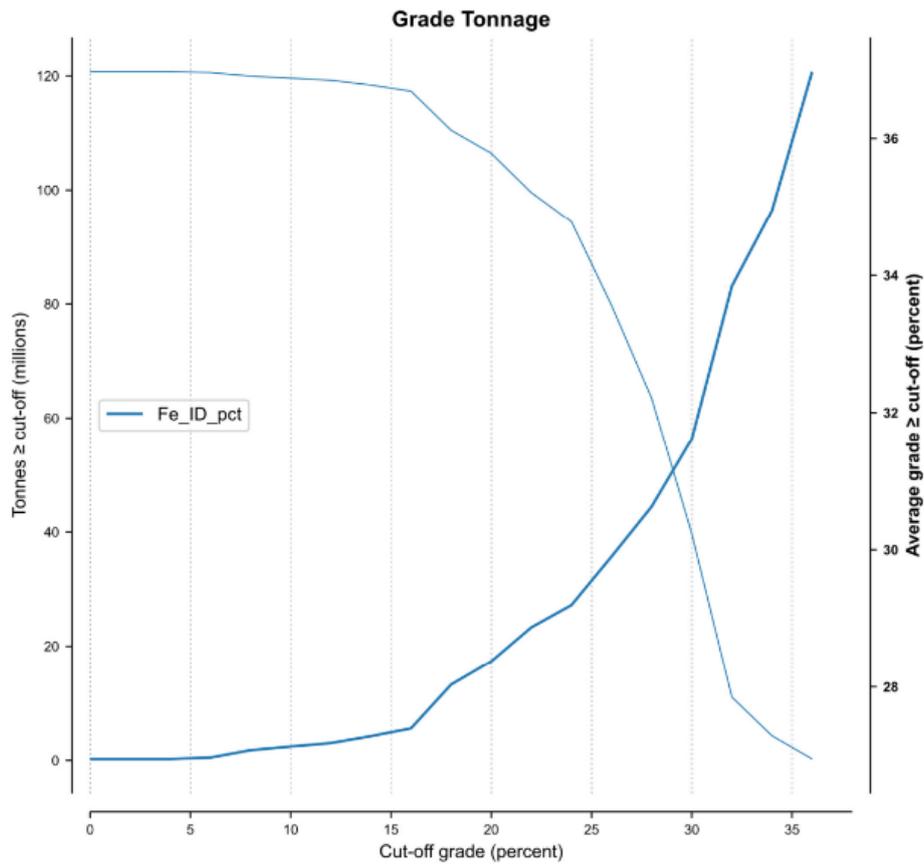


Figure 05: Remorse Resource Estimation Grade tonnage curve

Metallurgy

In February 2025, Tempest announced the commencement of metallurgical testing for the magnetite mineralisation at the Remorse Deposit. Over 5 tonnes of sample were collected, and a total of 9 composite samples were generated and submitted for a variety of metallurgical laboratory tests.

Review of Operations

Final data was received and announced in June 2025 with outstanding results including a Davis Tube Recovery of 70.1% Fe.

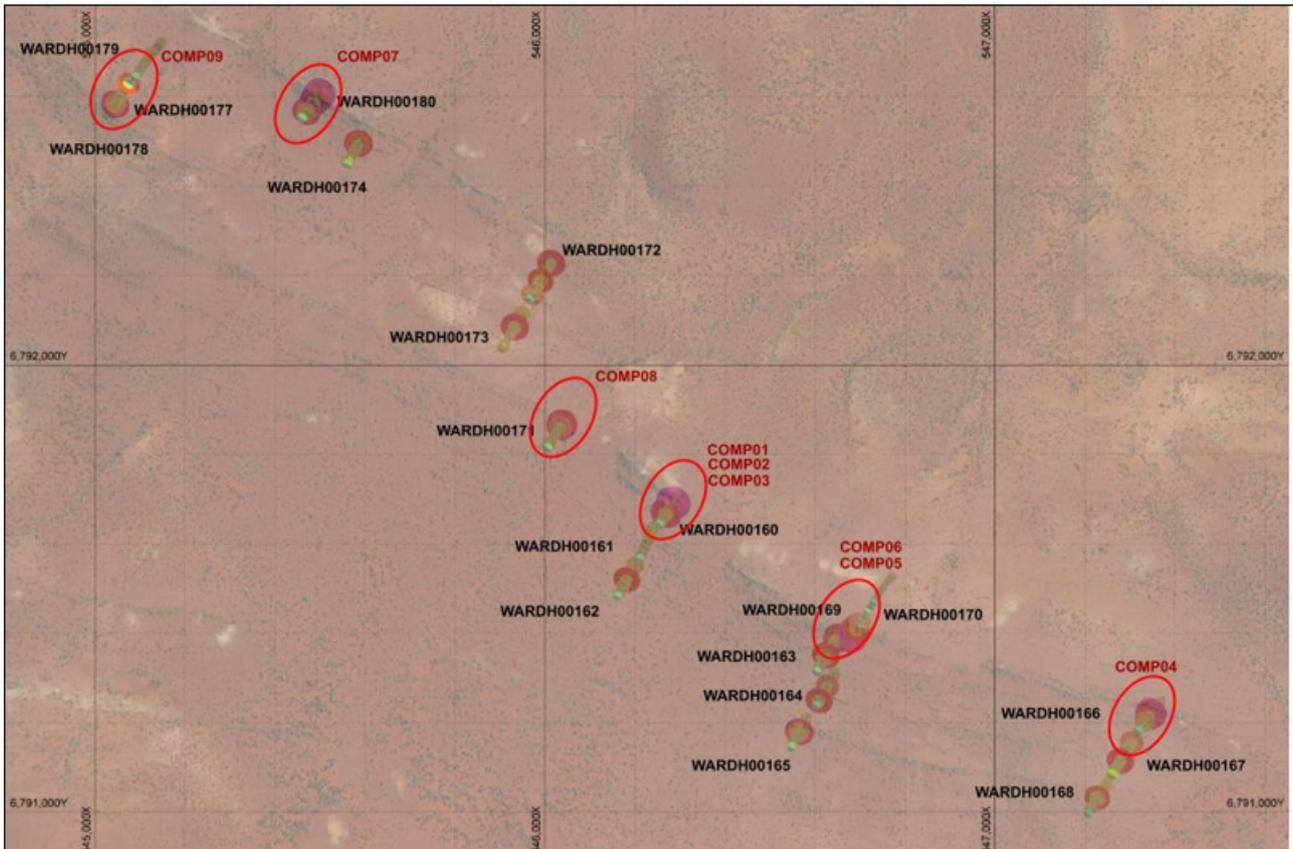


Figure 06: Plan view of Remorse Deposit with drill intercepts and metallurgical sampling locations

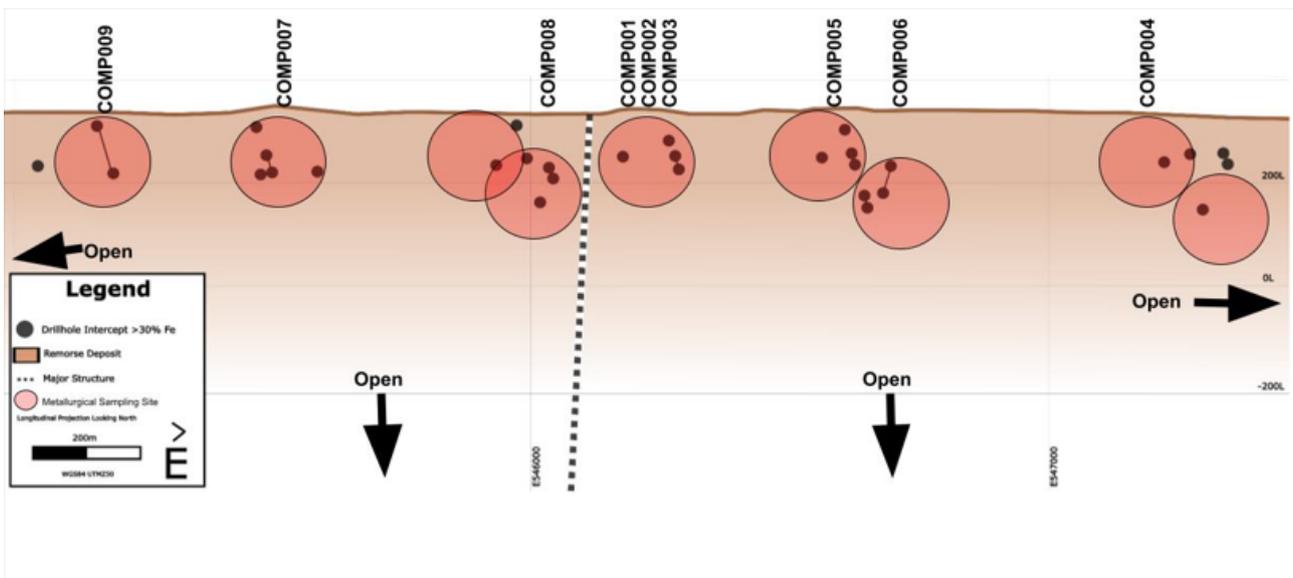
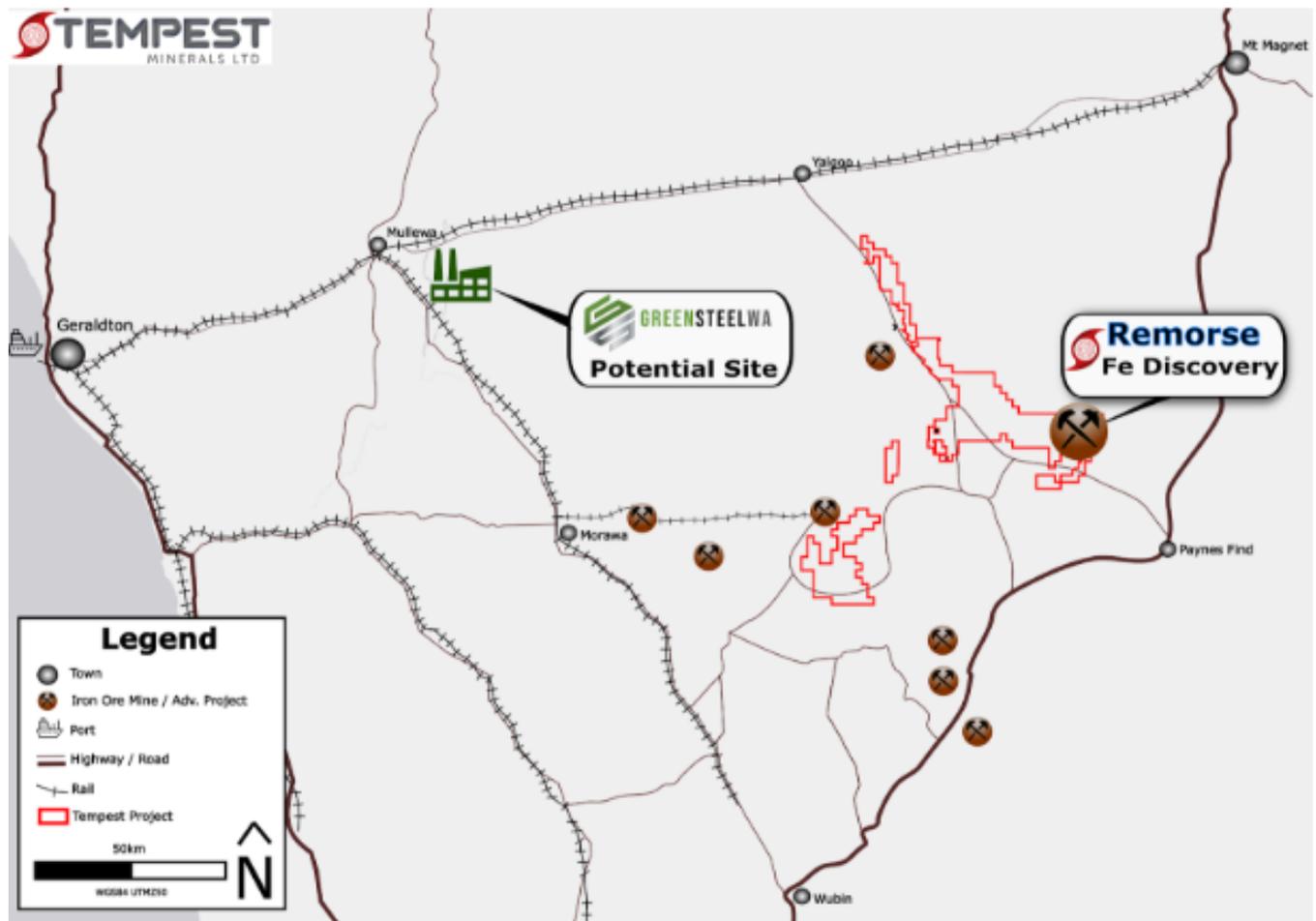


Figure 07: Long section of Remorse Deposit with drill intercepts and metallurgical sampling locations

Steel Developer MOU

In February 2025, Tempest signed a binding MOU with steel developer Green Steel and Iron Pty Ltd. This established a collaboration framework between Tempest and Green Steel to explore potential development opportunities and natural synergies for the Remorse deposit, with a focus on producing high-grade magnetite concentrate for use in green steelmaking processes.

Development Potential

The outstanding geology, exploration target, resource estimate, metallurgy and commercial agreement with a nascent steel developer in the region confirms the Company's belief that the Remorse Deposit has high potential to be rapidly developed into a low-cost, from surface, open pit operation with major infrastructure including rail to port as well as multiple processing options available within short haulage distance.

Remorse Base Metal Potential

Remorse sits nearby a number of historical gold, iron and base metal occurrences. Previous sampling at the target (which defined the target) indicated a particularly coherent core of copper-zinc. Notably, the copper and zinc anomalism appears as 'layered' with a predominance of copper to the NorthEast and increased and a more dispersed zinc halo to the SouthWest.

The target also exhibits nickel, rare earth zones which are sometimes found within peripheral alteration halos in some other large VMS systems.

This type of zonation is typically seen within VMS deposits and is related to the preferential crystallisation of mineralisation relative to the proximity of a local heat source and the metal concentration source.

Prior to the 2024 drilling, the Company completed an additional extension geochemical survey that further enlarged and defined the target.

Surface geochemical sampling was also combined with advanced multi sensor array analysis which showed matching geological features including alteration halos and a likely matching proxy for temperature gradient of the mineralising system.

Review of Operations

Although first-pass exploration drilling discovered a substantial iron deposit at Remorse has rightly taken much of the focus in FY24-25, Tempest considers much of the base metal potential at the project to be largely untested.

Additionally, (while highly anomalous copper was intercepted in several drillholes) the drilling results received overall to date do not adequately explain the accumulated evidence of VMS-style base metal geology - particularly the tenor of copper and zinc in the surface geochemistry.

Tempest will continue to assess the base metal potential in tandem with the development of the Remorse Iron Deposit.

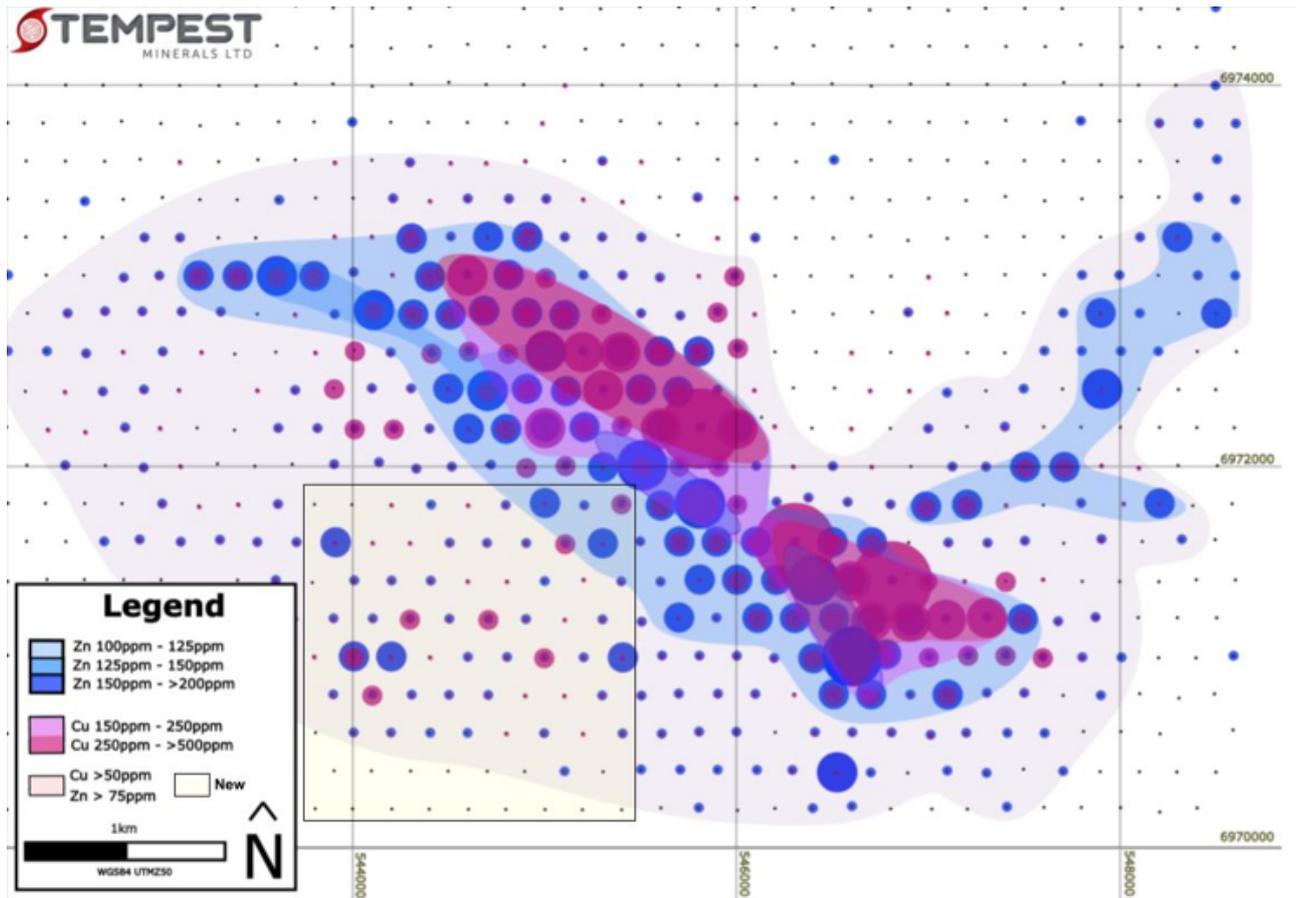


Figure 08: Remorse Copper/Zinc Anomaly

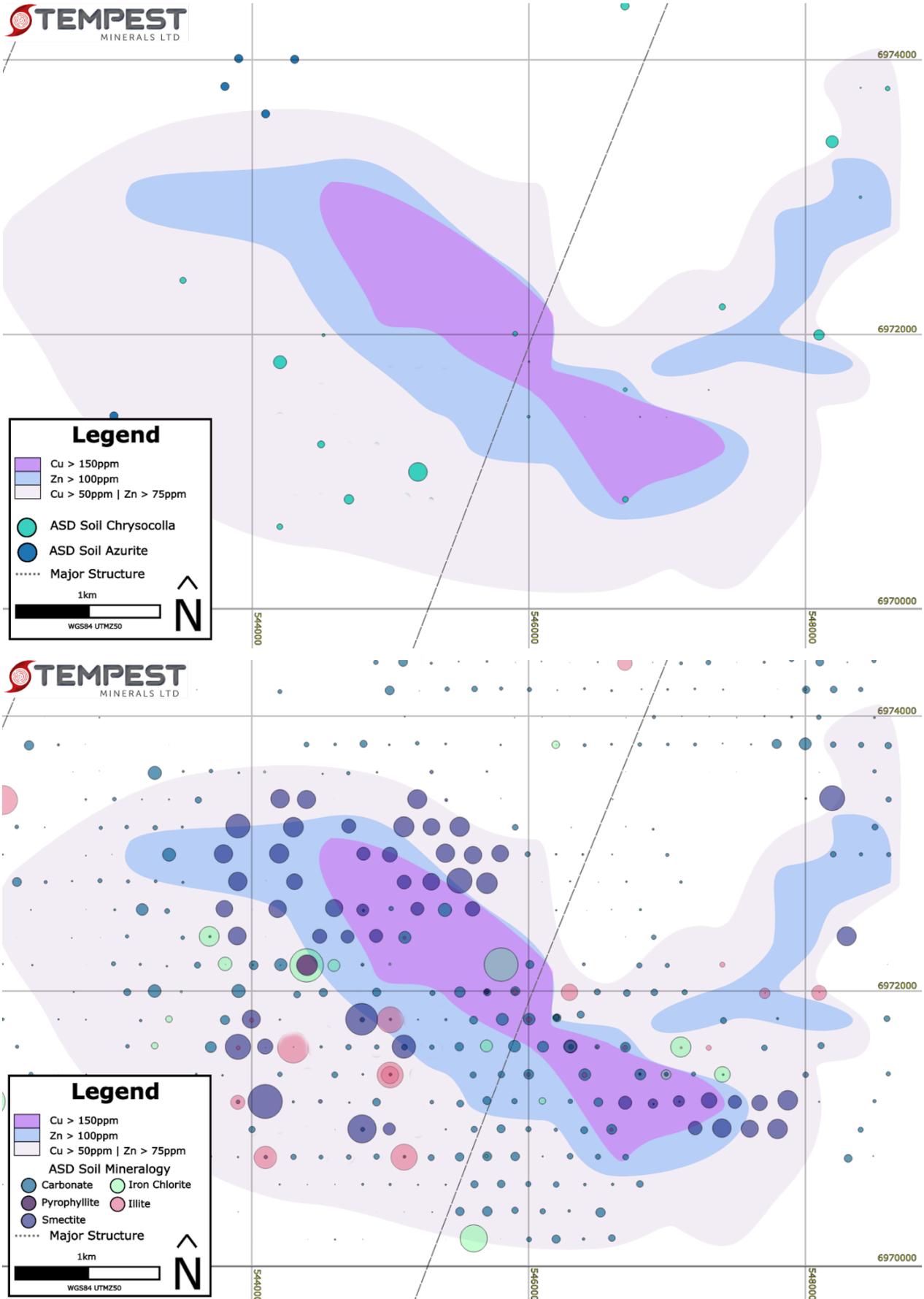


Figure 09: Remorse ASD Data (Copper Minerals - Top) (Alteration Minerals - Bottom)

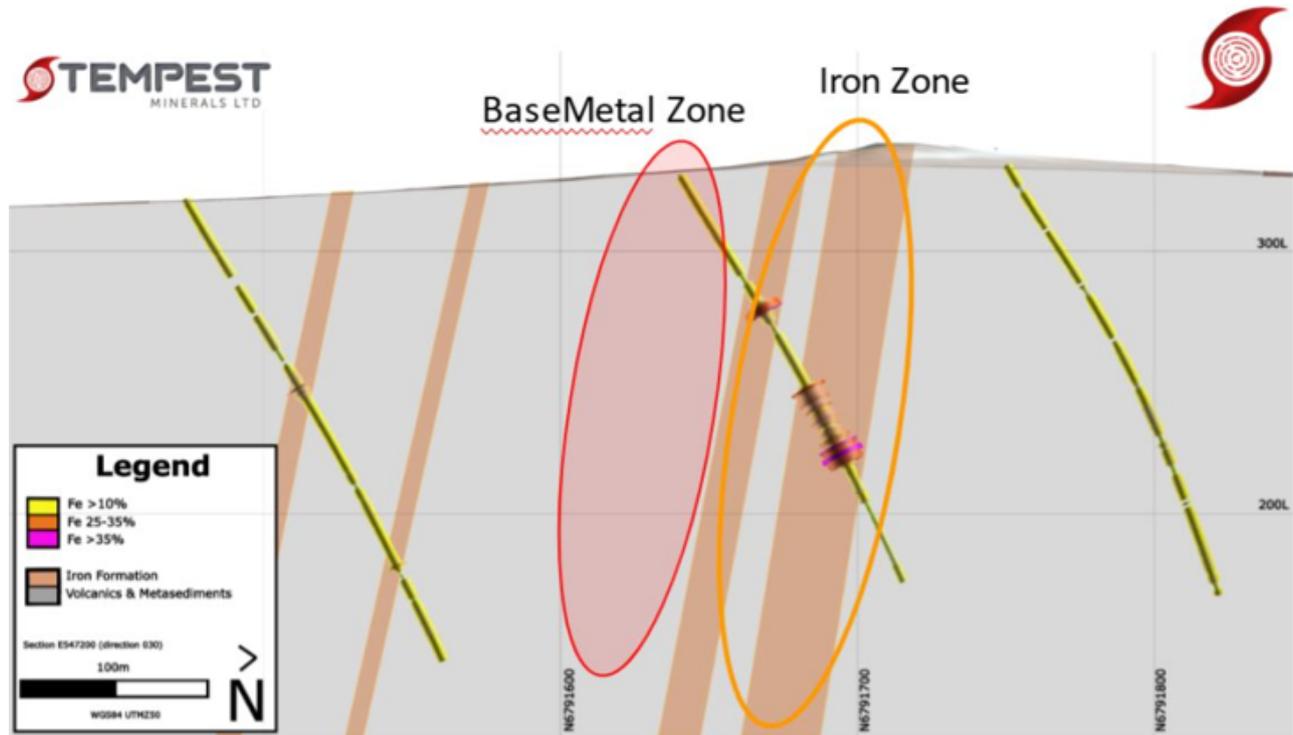


Figure 10: Cross-Section through initial iron mineralisation WARDH160-162

Sanity

At the Sanity Prospect, Tempest undertook further geochemical sampling. The goal of the work was to provide further enhanced definition of the previously identified gold anomaly to assist potential drill designs. The sampling density was increased from 200m x 200m to 100m x 100m, significantly improving the resolution of the geochemical data and highlighting a more coherent and continuous gold anomaly and increase the confidence of a potential for a large-scale mineralised system.

Gold peaks of up to 294ppb further confirm the robustness of the anomaly where individual rock chips from nearby mine workings (shafts) within the same geology trends have returned results of up to 7g/t gold and 0.2% copper and >60% Iron as well as elevated nickel and other elements above standard crustal levels.

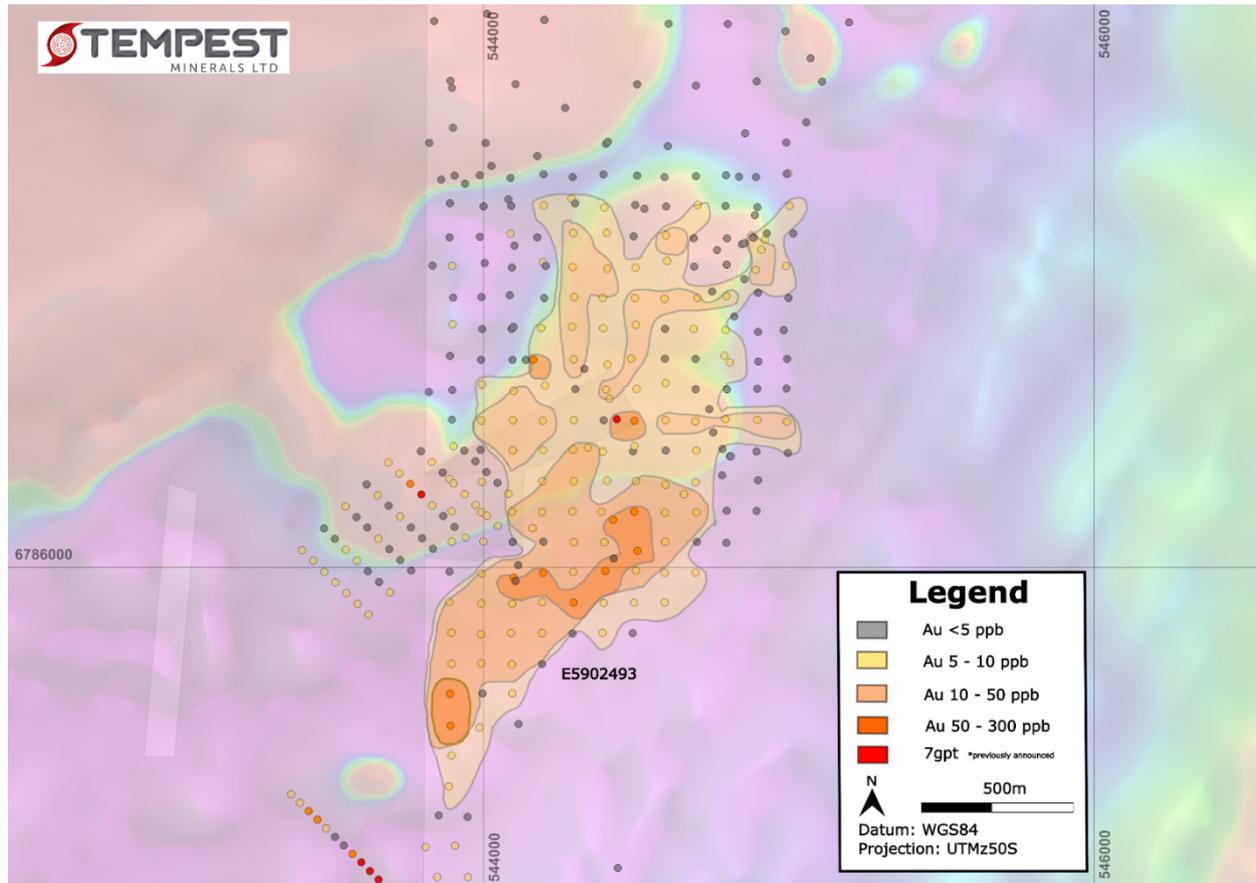


Figure 11: Sanjity Target, magnetics and surface sampling results - Gold

Mt Magnet

Mt Magnet Region

Mt Magnet is a premier multi-million-ounce gold mining centre with numerous large-scale, long-life open pit and underground mines currently in operation. The region hosts major resources companies such as Ramelius Resources Ltd and Westgold Ltd as well as considerable current exploration success by companies such as Ordell Minerals Ltd.

Historically, like much of Western Australia, exploration in the Mt Magnet field has focussed primarily on a narrow mineralisation model.

More recent geological understandings show the presence of other mineralisation types in the region with examples such as the Quasar, the significant Eridanus and the developing Barimaia deposits.

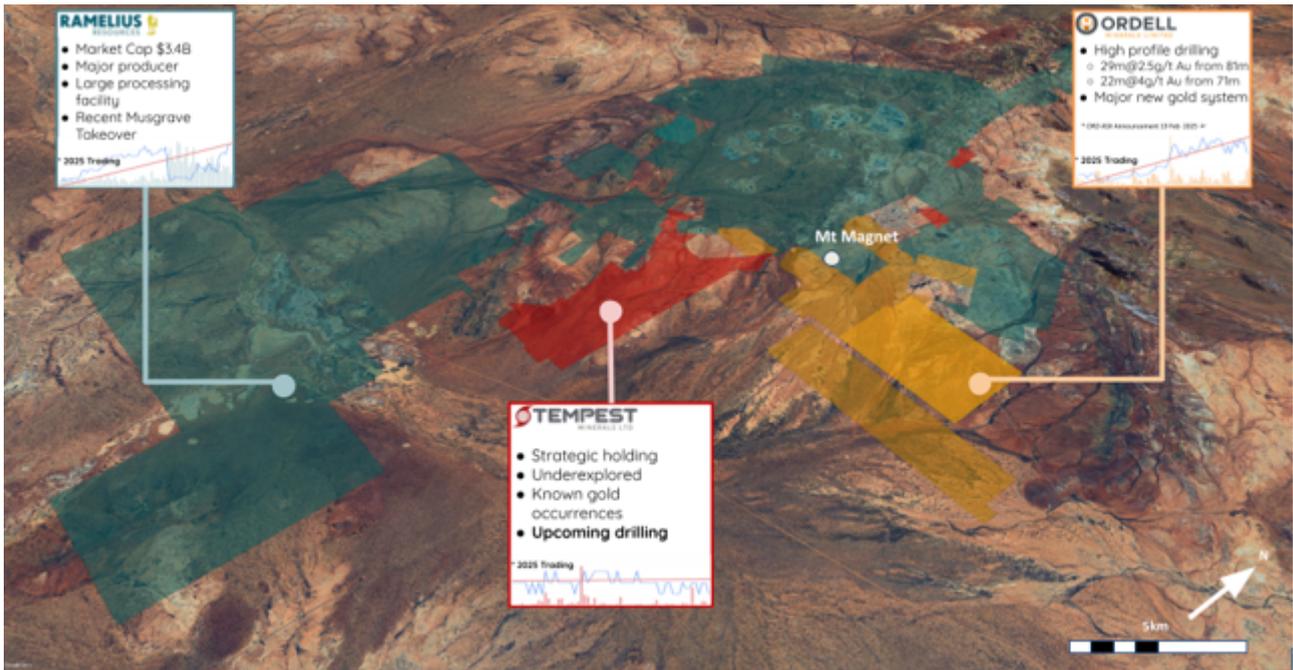


Figure 12: Overview of Mt Magnet major tenement holdings

Range Project

Located in the heart of the Mount Magnet mineral field and 5km along strike of the prolific +6Moz Mount Magnet Operations, the Range Project consists of 17 tenements covering 20km².

Tempest has been exploring the Range project for some time, including analysing historical data, leading to a number of exploration prospects being generated. Tempest previously discovered gold and tourmaline-bearing felsic volcanics along strike from the adjacent Britannia Open Pit known as the Wrangler Target.

Tempest anticipates drill testing Wrangler and other more recently identified high-priority drill targets within calendar Q3 2025.

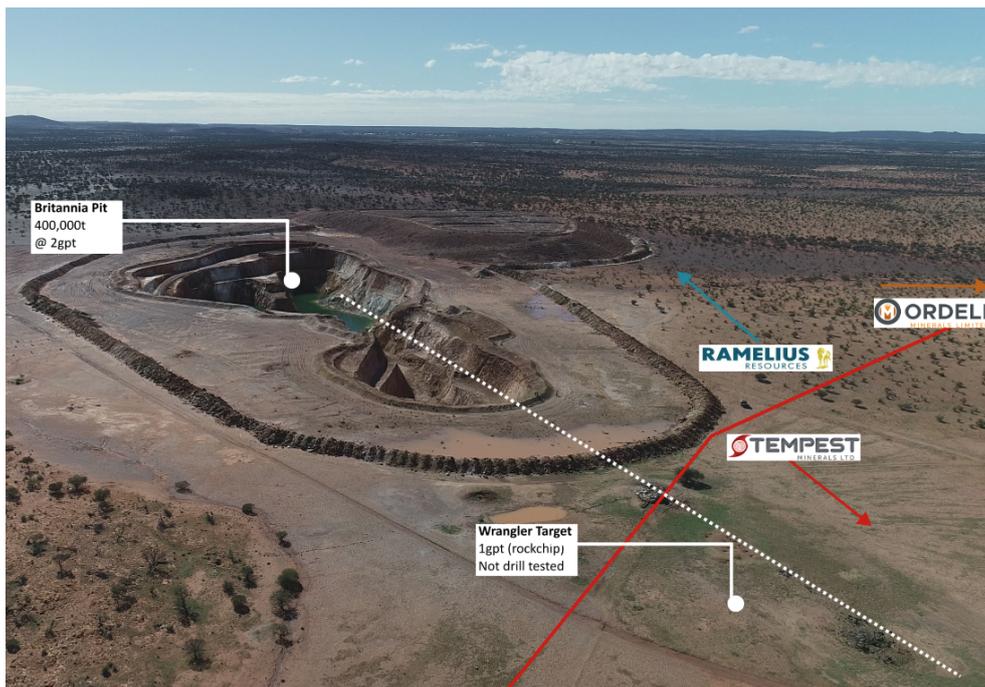


Figure 13: Wrangler Target relative to existing Open Pit (Tempest tenure in red)

Review of Operations

Five Wheels

The Five Wheels Project is 266km² of granted tenure in the Earraheedy region of Western Australia proximal to the high-profile world-class Rumble Resources Ltd (ASX:RTR) discoveries. The project remains largely under-explored (or unexplored for base metals) and shares similar geology to both the nearby Rumble Resources Chinook deposit and the emerging Strickland Metals Ltd (ASX:STR) zinc-lead-copper discoveries.

The Project is located in the Earraheedy Basin, where a major geological unconformity surrounding the edge of the basin hosts the initial Rumble Resources discoveries. More recent exploration implies that multiple key geological sequences are or have the potential to be mineralised, and the prospectivity is more widespread than originally considered.

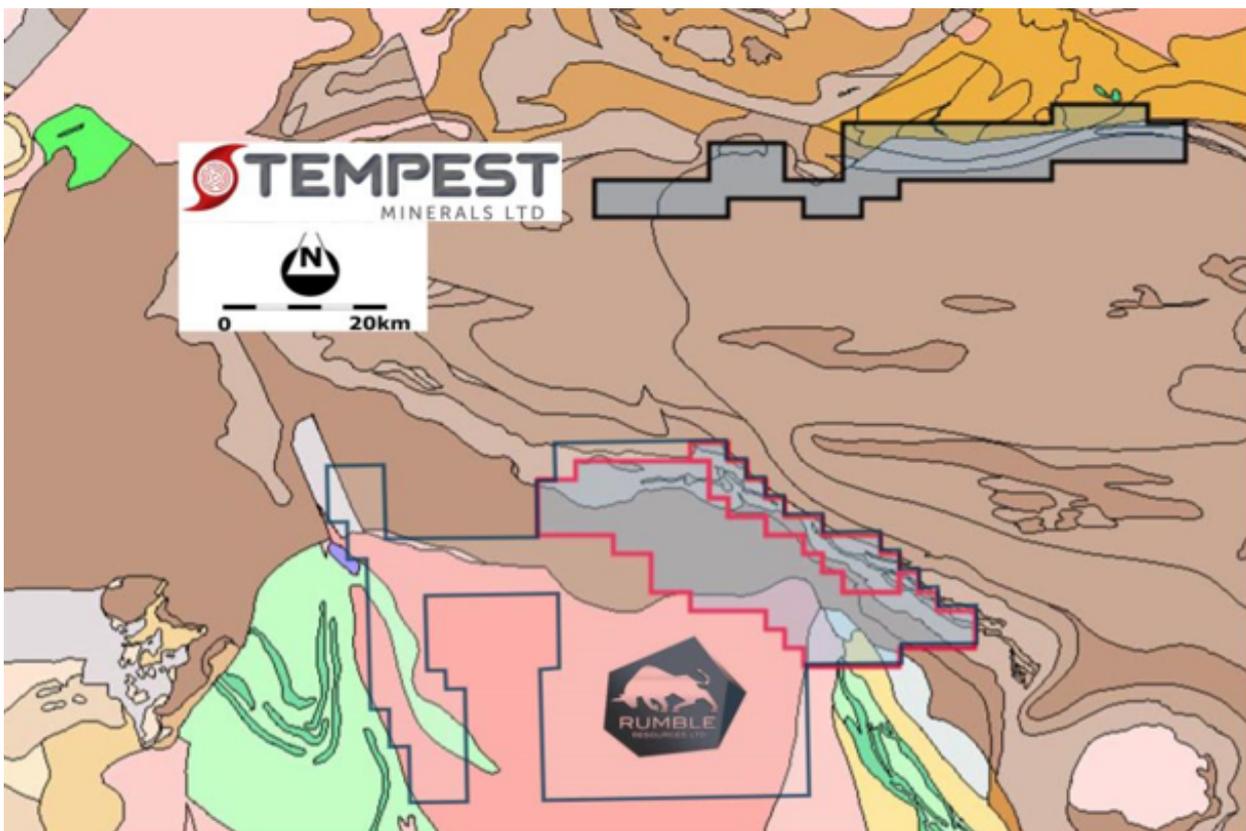


Figure 14: Five Wheels Project Overview

During FY 2024-25, Tempest completed reconnaissance geological mapping, surface geochemistry sampling and worked closely with the various regional heritage partners.

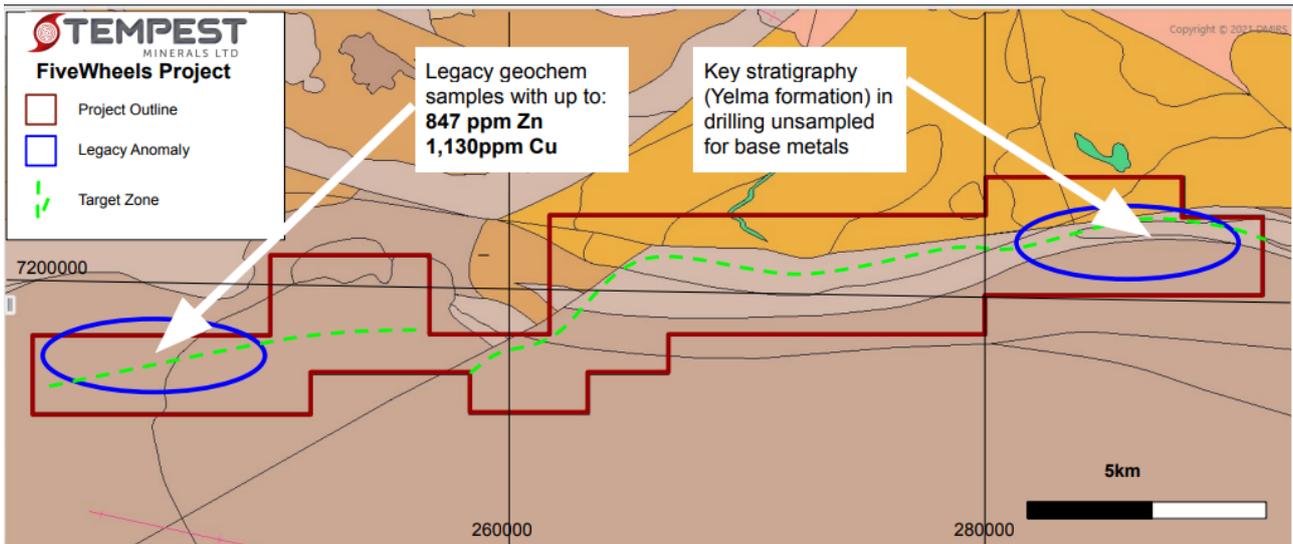


Figure 15: Five Wheels Project historic target areas

Elephant

The Elephant Project comprises 194km² (135km² granted - 59km² application) of highly prospective exploration leases. The location on the edge of a geological block with (the suture between the Yilgarn and Albany-Fraser) is a favourable location for major discoveries as evidenced by the presence of multiple world class deposits in similar environments along this trend.

The project was pegged primarily due to a strong geophysical anomaly and coincident geochemical data from nearby previous exploration. The large scale and nature of the anomaly bear similarities to other world class deposits in the regions such as Tropicana of which Tropicana peak soil was 31ppb with 0-15m cover while the Elephant Target is 5-10ppb with 100-150m of cover.

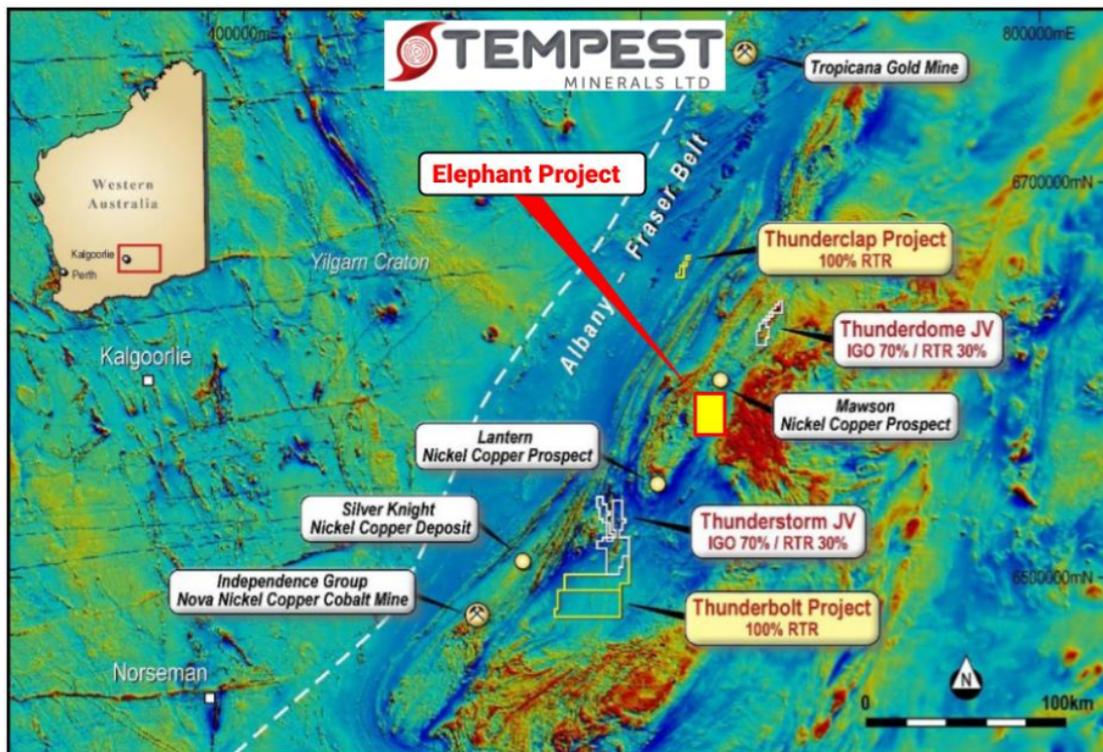


Figure 16: Elephant Project with geophysics and historic gold bearing drillhole

Review of Operations

Tolu Investment (PNG)

Tolu Minerals Ltd (Tolu) successfully completed their Initial Public Offering (IPO) on the ASX on 9 November 2023. Tolu highlight assets are the Tolukuma Gold Mine and Mt Penck Projects in Papua New Guinea.

Tempest previously subscribed for 2,702,703 Shares at an issue price of A\$0.37 for a total investment of A\$1 million which assisted in the final stage of acquisition of the Tolukuma Gold mine and brought exciting exposure to high grade pre-production projects into Tempest's portfolio.

During the period Tempest sold the balance of its Tolu shares for proceeds amounting to \$639,108. The sale of the profitable investment in Tolu provided further working capital to progress exploration works at the Company's existing projects including initial focus on the Remorse copper target in Yalgoo.

Australian Lithium

During the period, Tempest relinquished all West Australian granted and pending lithium targeted tenure applications as other projects have been prioritised for exploration and development.

African Lithium

Tempest previously entered into a sale agreement with African focussed multi-commodity explorer Premier African Minerals Limited (AIM listed under the ticker PREM) to purchase the African projects. Tempest retains exposure to the projects and Premier through this equity holding of 25,000,000 shares.

USA Lithium

The Company sold its 80% interest in the Tonopah Lithium Project in Nevada, United States of America, to ASX listed Argosy Minerals Ltd (ASX: AGY) in 2020. Tempest retains exposure to the project through an agreed milestone payment of \$250,000 payable upon Argosy announcing a JORC compliant reserve at the project of at least one million tonnes of lithium carbonate equivalent product or the commencement of commercial production of lithium product at the Tonopah Lithium Project.

Corporate

Capital Raising

On 31 May 2024, the Company announced a non-renounceable entitlement offer to eligible shareholders of one new fully paid ordinary share for every five shares held at an issue price of \$0.008 per share, to raise approximately \$830,602 (before costs). On 10 July 2024, after the close of the entitlement offer and achieving a 23.36% take-up rate, the Company issued a total of 24,251,886 shares to raise a total of \$194,015 (before costs). On 7 August 2024, the Company announced it completed the placement of the Shortfall arising from the non-renounceable entitlement offer and issued 79,573,471 shares raising a further \$636,587. For managing the Shortfall, the facilitator as part of its compensation, subscribed for 9,946,684 options exercisable at \$0.016, expiring on or before 6 August 2026 at an issue price of \$0.00001.

In May 2025, Tempest announced it had raised \$400,000 (before costs) via a placement of 100 million fully paid ordinary shares at an issue price of A\$0.004 per share together with 25 million free attaching options with an exercise price of \$0.01 and expiry date of 31 May 2027.

In May 2025, Tempest announced a non-renounceable rights issue to Eligible Shareholders of one (1) New Share for every two (2) Shares held at an issue price of \$0.004 per New Share (together with free-attaching options exercisable at \$0.01 on or before 31 May 2027 to be issued on the basis of one (1) option for every four (4) New Shares issued) to raise approximately \$1,469,061 (before costs) (**Entitlement Offer**).

The Entitlement Offer was made by way of a prospectus prepared in accordance with section 713 of the *Corporations Act 2001* (Cth) lodged with ASIC and ASX on 9 May 2025.

In June 2025, Tempest advised it accepted applications for a total of 143,273,067 New Shares and 35,818,318 New Options, amounting to \$573,093. The resulting shortfall from the Entitlement Offer was 223,992,131 New Shares and 55,998,035 New Options (**Shortfall**), which was successfully placed later in June 2025 raising a further \$895,968 (before costs).

Operating Results

The Group's operating loss for the financial year was \$1,566,079 (2024: \$875,297). Exploration and evaluation expenditure incurred during the year totalled \$2,145,698 (2024: \$1,232,557).

Capital Structure

As at 30 June 2024 the Company had on issue 519,124,432 ordinary shares, and 15,000,000 unlisted options (exercise price \$0.14, expiry 30 June 2025).

Subsequent Events

In July 2025, the Company received a research and development (R&D) tax refund of \$97,012 (including interest) for the 2024 financial year, under the Australian Government's R&D Tax incentive program.

Other than the matters noted above, there are no material matters or circumstances that have arisen since the end of the year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the Group, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Group in future financial years.

Directors' Report

Risks

The prospects of the Group in progressing their exploration projects may be affected by a number of factors. These factors are similar to most exploration companies moving through exploration phase and attempting to progress projects into development. Some of these factors include:

- Exploration – the results of the exploration activities may be such that the estimated resources are insufficient to justify the financial viability of the projects. The Group undertakes extensive exploration and product quality testing prior to establishing JORC compliant resource estimates and to (ultimately) support mining feasibility studies. The Group engages external experts to assist with the evaluation of exploration results where required and utilises third party competent persons to prepare JORC resource statements or suitably qualified senior management of the Group. Economic feasibility modelling of projects will be conducted in conjunction with third party experts and the results of which will usually be subject to independent third-party peer review.
- Regulatory and Sovereign – the Group currently operates only in Australia and deals with local regulatory authorities in relation to the exploration of its properties. The Group may not achieve the required local regulatory approvals to continue exploration or properly assess development prospects. The Group takes appropriate legal and technical advice to ensure it manages its compliance obligations appropriately.
- Social Licence to Operate – the ability of the Group to secure and undertake exploration and development activities within prospective areas is also reliant upon satisfactory resolution of native title and (potentially) overlapping tenure. To address this risk, the Group develops strong, long term effective relationships with landholders with a focus on developing mutually acceptable access arrangements. The Group takes appropriate legal and technical advice to ensure it manages its compliance obligations appropriately.
- Environmental – All phases of mining and exploration present environmental risks and hazards. The Group's operations are subject to environmental regulations pursuant to a variety of state and municipal laws and regulations. Environmental legislation provides for, among other things, restrictions and prohibitions on spills, releases or emissions of various substances produced in association with mining operations. Compliance with such legislation can require significant expenditures and a breach may result in the imposition of fines and penalties, some of which may be material. Environmental legislation is evolving in a manner expected to result in stricter standards and enforcement, larger fines and liability and potentially increased capital expenditures and operating costs. Environmental assessments of proposed projects carry a heightened degree of responsibility for companies and directors, officers and employees. The Group assesses each of its projects very carefully with respect to potential environmental issues, in conjunction with specific environmental regulations applicable to each project, prior to commencing field exploration. Periodic reviews are undertaken once field exploration commences.
- Safety – Safety is of critical importance in the planning, organisation and execution of the Group's exploration and development activities. The Group is committed to providing and maintaining a working environment in which its employees are not exposed to hazards that will jeopardise an employee's health, safety or the health and safety of others associated with our business. The Group recognises that safety is both an individual and shared responsibility of all employees, contractors and other persons involved with the operation of the organisation. The Group has a Safety and Health Management system which is designed to minimise the risk of an uncontrolled safety and health event and to continuously improving safety culture within the organisation.

- Funding – the Group will require additional funding to continue exploration and potentially move from the exploration phase to the development phases of its projects. There is no certainty that the Group will have access to available financial resources sufficient to fund its exploration, feasibility or development costs at those times.
- Market – there are numerous factors involved with exploration and early-stage development of its projects, including variance in commodity price and labour costs which can result in projects being uneconomical.

Environmental Issues

The Group is subject to significant environmental regulations under the (Federal, State and local) laws in which the Group operates, which currently includes Australia.

The directors monitor the Group's compliance with environmental obligations. The directors are not aware of any compliance breach arising during the year and up to the date of this report.

Native Title

Mining tenements that the Group currently holds, may be subject to Native Title claims. The Group has a policy that is respectful of the Native Title rights and will, as required, negotiate with relevant indigenous bodies.

Likely Developments

The Company will continue its mineral exploration activities with the objective of finding mineralised resources. The Company will also consider the acquisition of further prospective exploration interests and where appropriate secure joint venture partners to assist in financing exploration activities.

The Group's remuneration policy seeks to align director and executive objectives with those of shareholders and the business, while at the same time, recognising the early development stage of the Group and the criticality of funds being utilised to achieve development objectives. The board believes the current policy has been appropriate and effective in achieving a balance of these objectives.

The Group's remuneration policy provides for long-term incentives to be offered through a director and employee share option plan and also through a performance rights plan. Options may be granted under these plans to align directors', executives', employees' and shareholders' interests. Two methods may be used to achieve this aim, the first being performance rights and options that vest upon reaching or exceeding specific predetermined objectives, and the second being options granted with higher exercise prices (than the share price at issue) rewarding share price growth.

The board of directors is responsible for determining and reviewing the Group's remuneration policy, remuneration levels and performance of both executive and non-executive directors. Independent external advice will be sought when required. No independent external advice was sought during the current year.

Performance-Based Remuneration

Performance-based remuneration includes both short-term and long-term incentives and is designed to reward key management personnel for reaching or exceeding specific objectives or as recognition for strong individual performance. Short-term incentives are available to eligible staff of the Group and may be comprised of cash bonuses, determined on a discretionary basis by the board. No short-term incentives were made available during the year.

Long-term incentives are comprised of share options and performance rights, which are granted from time-to-time to encourage sustained strong performance in the realisation of strategic outcomes and growth in shareholder value.

The exercise price of the options is determined after taking into account the underlying share price performance in the period leading up to the date of grant and if applicable, performance conditions attached to the share options. Subject to specific vesting conditions, each option is convertible into one ordinary share.

The Group's policy for determining the nature and amount of remuneration of board members and key executives is set out below.

Directors

Board policy is to remunerate non-executive directors at market rates for comparable companies for time, commitment and responsibilities. The maximum aggregate amount of fees that can be paid to non-executive directors is subject to approval by shareholders at the Annual General Meeting and is not linked to the performance of the Group. The maximum aggregate amount of fees that can be paid to non-executive directors approved by shareholders is currently \$300,000. 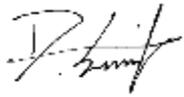

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are for the Group consisting of Tempest Minerals Limited and its Controlled Entities. Tempest Minerals Limited is a listed public company, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The principal activity of the Group during the year was mineral exploration.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Corporations Act 2001, Australian Accounting Standards, and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. Tempest Minerals Limited is a for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars.

Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical cost, except for assets that are fair valued. The financial report for the year ended 30 June 2025 was authorised for issue on 26 September 2025 by the directors of the Company.

Separate financial statements for Tempest Minerals Limited as an individual entity are no longer presented following a change to the Corporations Act 2001. However, financial information required for Tempest Minerals Limited as an individual entity is included in Note 25.

Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below. They have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which contemplates the continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and discharge of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

For the year ended 30 June 2025 the Group generated a consolidated loss of \$1,566,079 and incurred operating cash outflows of \$868,884. As at 30 June 2025 the Group has cash and cash equivalents of \$1,782,549 and net assets of \$11,451,603.

The Group's ability to continue as a going concern will depend upon the Group being able to manage its liquidity requirement and by taking some or all of the following actions:

1. raising additional capital;
2. disposal of investments and listed shares held;
3. successful exploration and subsequent exploitation of the Group's tenements;
4. reducing its working capital expenditure; and
5. disposing of non-core projects.

After taking into account the current financial position of the Group the directors have a reasonable expectation that the Group will have adequate resources to fund its future operational requirements and for these reasons, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial report.

Should the Group be unable to raise the funds required via any of the above means, there exists a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt on the Group's ability to continue as a going concern, in which case it may be required to realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities other than in the ordinary course of business, and at amounts that differ from those stated in the financial statements. This financial report does not include any adjustments relating to the recoverability and classification of recorded asset amounts or the amounts or classification of liabilities and appropriate disclosures that may be necessary should the Group be unable to continue as a going concern.

Principles of Consolidation

Subsidiaries

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of all subsidiaries of Tempest Minerals Limited ("Company" or "parent entity") as at 30 June 2025, and the results of all subsidiaries for the period then ended. Tempest Minerals Limited and its subsidiaries together are referred to in these financial statements as the Group.

The names of the subsidiaries are contained in Note 23. All subsidiaries in Australia have a 30 June financial year end and are accounted for by the parent entity at cost.

Subsidiaries are all entities over which the Group has control. The Group has control over an entity when the Group is exposed to, or has a right to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity, and has the ability to use its power to affect those returns. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group. They are de-consolidated from the date that control ceases.

Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between Group companies are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of the impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of controlled entities have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the Group.

Non-controlling Interests

Equity interests in a subsidiary not attributable, directly or indirectly, to the Group are presented as "non-controlling interests". The Group initially recognises non-controlling interests that are present ownership interests in subsidiaries and are entitled to a proportionate share of the subsidiary's net assets on liquidation at either fair value or at the non-controlling interests' proportionate share of the subsidiary's net assets. Subsequent to initial recognition, non-controlling interests are attributed their share of profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income. Non-controlling interests are shown separately within the equity section of the statement of financial position and statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Changes in ownership interests

When the Group ceases to have control, joint control or significant influence, any retained interest in the entity is remeasured to its fair value, with the change in the carrying amount recognised in profit or loss.

The fair value is the initial carrying amount for the purposes of subsequently accounting for the retained interest as an associate, joint venture or financial asset. In addition, any amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in respect of that entity are accounted for as if the Group had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities. This may mean that amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss.

Segment Reporting

Operating segments are identified on the basis of internal reports that are regularly reviewed by the chief operating decision maker ('CODM') in assessing performance and determining the allocation of resources. Due to the nature and size of the Group, the Board as a whole has been determined to be the CODM.

Exploration and Evaluation Assets

Exploration and evaluation expenditure incurred is accumulated in respect of each identifiable area of interest. Such expenditures comprise net direct costs and an appropriate portion of related overhead expenditure but do not include overheads or administration expenditure not having a specific nexus with a particular area of interest. These costs are only carried forward to the extent that they are expected to be recouped through the successful development of the area or where activities in the area have not yet reached a stage which permits reasonable assessment of the existence of economically recoverable reserves and active or significant operations in relation to the area are continuing.

A regular review will be undertaken on each area of interest to determine the appropriateness of continuing to carry forward costs in relation to that area of interest. An impairment is raised against exploration and evaluation assets where the directors are of the opinion that the carried forward net cost may not be recoverable or the right of tenure in the area lapses. The increase in the provision is charged against the results for the year. Accumulated costs in relation to an abandoned area are written off in full against profit or loss in the year in which the decision to abandon the area is made.

When production commences, the accumulated costs for the relevant area of interest are amortised over the life of the area according to the rate of depletion of the economically recoverable reserves.

Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

At each reporting date, the Group reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to profit or loss.

Other Receivables

Due to the short-term nature of these receivables, their carrying value is assumed to approximate fair value. The maximum exposure to credit risk is the carrying value of receivables. Collateral is not held as security, and the receivables are not exposed to foreign exchange risk.

The Group has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash, and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

Issued Capital

Ordinary shares are classified as equity. Transaction costs (net of tax where the deduction can be utilised) arising on the issue of ordinary shares are recognised in equity as a reduction of the share proceeds received.

Trade and Other Payables

These amounts represent financial liabilities for goods and services provided to the Group prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid.

Financial liabilities are carried at amortised cost and are initially measured at fair value including transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Trade payables are non-interest bearing and are generally on 30-60 days terms. Due to their short-term nature trade and other payables are not discounted.

Share Based Payments

The Group makes equity-settled share based payments to directors, employees and other parties for services provided or the acquisition of exploration assets. Where applicable, the fair value of the equity is measured at grant date and recognised as an expense over the vesting period, with a corresponding increase to an equity account. The fair value of shares is ascertained as the market bid price. The fair value of options is ascertained using the Black and Scholes option valuation pricing model which incorporates all market vesting conditions. Where applicable, the number of shares and options expected to vest is reviewed and adjusted at each reporting date such that the amount recognised for services received as consideration for the equity instruments granted shall be based on the number of equity instruments that eventually vest.

Where the fair value of services rendered by other parties can be reliably determined, this is used to measure the equity-settled payment.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value on trade date, which includes transaction costs, when the related contractual rights or obligation exist. Subsequent to initial recognition these instruments are measured as follows:

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets are valued at 'fair value through profit or loss' when they are either held for trading for the purpose of short term profit taking or when they are designated as such to avoid an accounting mismatch or to enable performance evaluation where a group of financial assets is managed by key management personnel on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying value bring included in the profit or loss.

Adoption of new and revised Accounting Standards

For the year ended 30 June 2025, the Board has reviewed all new and revised standards and interpretations issued by the AASB, that are applicable for the current financial year.

The Board has also reviewed all new Standard and Interpretations that have been issued but not yet mandatory for the year ended 30 June 2025.

As a result of these reviews, the Board has determined that there is no impact, material or otherwise, of the new and revised Standards and Interpretations on its business and, therefore, no change necessary to accounting policies.

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the Group.

Key Judgements:

Exploration and Evaluation Assets

The Group performs regular reviews on each area of interest to determine the appropriateness of continuing to carry forward costs in relation to that area of interest. These reviews are based on detailed surveys and analysis of exploration and drilling results performed to reporting date. The carrying value of exploration and evaluation assets at 30 June 2025 was \$9,915,371 (2024: \$8,801,510).

NOTE 3b: IMPAIRMENT OF LOANS PROVIDED

In November 2022, Tempest advised it had entered into an agreement with Lithium of Nevada Pty Ltd (LON) which had entered into a binding agreement with TSX-V listed Iconic Minerals Ltd for the rights to acquire up to 50% of the Smiths Creek Nevada lithium project. In February 2022, Tempest loaned LON USD \$150k to allow LON to make payment to Iconic Minerals Ltd in order to comply with the terms of the binding agreement with Iconic Minerals Ltd. The loan agreement had a repayment date of 31 March 2023 and also contemplated interest due of 10% per annum. As of balance date, no funds have been repaid.

Tempest is continuing to negotiate with LON and remains hopeful of receiving repayment of the loan funds, including interest, but as LON has not yet repaid, the directors have taken the view that it should continue to impair the amount loaned to LON. Tempest has recorded interest owing from LON during the current period of \$21,413 (2024: \$30,283) but has impaired that amount due to the non-payment of the principal. At balance date, the amount owing from LON is \$277,545, which is fully impaired.

Financial Risks

The Group's activities are funded from equity and where required and available debt and/or project finance.

Credit Risk

Credit risk arises from exposures to deposits with financial institutions and sundry receivables.

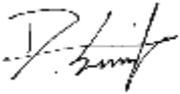

Tempest reviews and reports its Mineral Resources at least annually. The date of reporting is 30 June each year, to coincide with the Company's end of financial year balance date. If there are any material changes to the Mineral Resource estimates for our projects over the course of the year we are required to report these changes.

Remorse Magnetite Iron Deposit, Western Australia.

Tempest released a maiden JORC (2012) Mineral Resource Estimate (MRE) for the Remorse Iron Deposit on 1 May 2025 (amended 7 May 2025) "Yalgoo - Remorse Positioned for Rapid Development with Inaugural Resource". No reserves have been calculated for the Remorse Iron Deposit.

The inaugural resource estimate for the Remorse Magnetite Iron Deposit is 63.5 million tonnes at 30.6% iron (Fe). The resource estimate was independently completed by respected resource estimation consultancy Measured Group Pty Ltd and the work completed adheres to industry best practices and JORC (2012) guidelines.

A summary of the MRE, reported by classification, is shown (Table 1) – a 28% cut-off grade was used.
