Quarterly Report Q1 FY26

HIGHLIGHTS

- *Univar Solutions China progressed from planning to commercial rollout, advancing market development for WOA's lupin protein across beverage and nutrition sectors.*
- *Released the Lupin Sustainability Study, confirming lupin's exceptionally low carbon footprint and its role in supporting climate-positive agriculture.*
- *Continued focus on cost reduction and cash preservation, with production moderated after building sufficient inventory to meet near-term customer demand.*
- *Commenced Pre-Feasibility Study for a 10,000-tonne-per-annum Western Australian manufacturing facility to support large-scale production.*
- *Appointed Claudia Kwan as Non-Executive Director, strengthening governance and ESG capability as WOA moves toward commercial scale.*
- *Ended the quarter with \$2.0 million in cash, with lower burn expected next quarter following reduced production levels and anticipated R&D rebate receipts.*

Wide Open Agriculture Ltd (ASX: WOA, "Wide Open Agriculture" or the "Company") is pleased to present its Activities Report for the three-month period ending 30 September 2025.

Reaffirming Our Mission: Building a Better Protein

Before outlining what has been another positive quarter, the Company would like to reaffirm its broader mission — and the role we aim to play in reshaping the future of food.

WOA transitioned into the ingredients sector with a clear but ambitious goal: to reinvent how the world produces and consumes protein. Today's dominant proteins — whether animal or plant — place unsustainable pressure on land, water and health systems. Our vision is to provide a genuine alternative: a high-performance, low-impact protein that can feed a growing global population while improving human health and reducing environmental harm.

During the quarter, sales of our lupin protein continued to demonstrate encouraging initial market demand. This can be seen in the higher cash outflow for the period, which reflects increased lupin protein production undertaken to meet anticipated demand and build inventory for any upcoming future orders. With sufficient product now on hand to service existing customers and new opportunities, production has been reduced to preserve cash while the Company focuses on improving unit economics and overall production efficiency.

Encouraging progress has also been made in developing whole-seed economic solutions, including developing lupin oil and ongoing work to unlock value from lupin fibre, which is currently a waste stream. R&D rebates from prior-year expenditure are expected in the near term and, together with reduced production spend, are anticipated to improve cash flow. In parallel, WOA continues to advance strategic partnerships in processing, offtake and distribution to support efficient scale-up and sustained commercial growth. The company remains adequately funded in the near term.

WOA's Chairperson Yaxi Zhan said, "The past quarter reflects encouraging initial demand for our lupin protein and our commitment to managing growth responsibly. We increased production to meet future demand and now have sufficient inventory to support customers while reducing near-term cash burn. As production moderates and cost-reduction initiatives take effect, we expect a lower burn rate in the next quarter — positioning the Company to advance toward scale with greater efficiency and financial discipline."

China Market Strategy Moves into Execution

WOA's expansion in China advanced during the quarter, as Univar Solutions China transitioned from planning to execution. The partnership's focus is now on commercial rollout across two major consumer markets — tea and coffee beverages, and nutrition and functional foods — representing high-growth opportunities for our lupin protein.

In less than a year since signing the distribution and offtake agreement, the two companies have moved from foundation to readiness. Regulatory and technical milestones have been achieved, customer trials completed, and a first purchase order confirmed. With Univar's established network and WOA's technical expertise, both companies are aligned on strategy, timing and execution.

Univar's market data highlights a combined opportunity exceeding RMB 999 billion (A\$210 billion)¹ across the targeted segments. WOA's neutral-tasting, high-foaming protein isolate delivers functionality and nutrition ideally suited to these markets, while its strong sustainability profile supports China's "Healthy China 2030" objectives.

Implementation is now underway. Univar will lead local engagement and product introduction while WOA provides manufacturing and technical support.

Manufacturing Scale and Technical Progress

During the quarter, WOA commenced a Pre-Feasibility Study (PFS) for a 10,000 tonne-per-annum lupin protein facility in Western Australia. The study, conducted in collaboration with Process Partners and reviewed by MO Consultants, will define the technical design, operating model and capital framework for large commercial-scale manufacturing.

The PFS will provide the validated technical and financial data required to engage potential partners, government stakeholders and investors as the Company advances toward scale-up. WOA's focus remains on refining its production processes and securing a scalable, capital-efficient manufacturing model that supports global market expansion while maintaining strong unit economics.

Product Portfolio and Co-Product Development

WOA continues to progress a “whole-seed” commercialisation strategy designed to maximise value from every part of the lupin. Alongside our protein sales, the Company advanced development of lupin oil, a high-value co-product with strong potential in the cosmetics sector.

The Company’s integrated approach — linking protein, fibre and oil — enhances both its commercial potential and sustainability credentials, ensuring minimal waste and diversified income streams as production scales.

Sustainability and Industry Leadership

In September, WOA released its first Lupin Sustainability Study, supporting the Federal Government’s Net Zero Plan for the agriculture sector. The report confirmed lupin’s exceptionally low carbon footprint — just 0.15 kg CO₂e per kilogram of seed, compared with 0.62 kg for canola — and its ability to fix nitrogen naturally into the soil, reducing reliance on synthetic fertilisers.

The study also provides valuable data for food manufacturers seeking to lower the carbon intensity of their supply chains. WOA will continue to expand this research as it builds the environmental and commercial case for lupin protein adoption globally.

Corporate and Governance

WOA strengthened its governance and capital-markets capability with the appointment of Ms Claudia Kwan as Non-Executive Director strengthening governance and ESG capability as WOA moves toward commercial scale. Ms Kwan, Managing Partner at NorthStar Impact, brings extensive experience in sustainable investment and capital allocation. Her appointment supports the Company’s strategy to attract mission-aligned investors as it transitions toward scale.

Mr Brett Tucker resigned as Non-Executive Director and continues as Company Secretary, ensuring continuity in compliance and governance oversight.

Quarterly Cashflow Report Commentary

The Company successfully completed the Share Purchase Plan (SPP) and Tranche 2 Placement, with total receipts of approximately \$195k net of costs.

As announced on 19 August, the Company commenced the Pre-Feasibility Study (PFS) and commissioned a series of trials to support the study. Total expenditure of approximately \$450k was incurred across feed material preparation, third-party test work programs, full-seed utilisation at both lab and semi-industrial scales test work programs to support the PFS.

Within Wide Open Agriculture Germany (WOAG), it completed its annual maintenance (~\$60k) and the 2025–2026 IFS Food Manufacturing License certification audit. The audit was successfully completed.

WOAG’s higher operational cost was also driven by interim ramp up of production in preparation of supporting existing customer and product rolling out in different jurisdictions, and as well as China market rolling out.

At 30 September 2025, WOA held \$2.0 million in cash. Net operating cash outflow for the quarter was \$1.5 million, reflecting higher production activity, R&D investment and staffing associated with expanded operations.

Disclosure of Related Party Payments within Quarterly Cashflow Report

Payments to related parties and their associates totalled \$72k, covering directors' fees, salaries, and superannuation.

Outlook

WOA entered the first quarter of FY26 with strong momentum across commercial, operational and strategic fronts. The September quarter marked a decisive shift from preparation to execution, as partnerships, customer programs and production improvements aligned to create a clear path to future scale.

This combination of encouraging initial demand, verified production process improvements and strong partner alignment positions WOA to enter FY26 with clear visibility of growth opportunities. The Company's focus remains on disciplined execution — converting pilot programs into ongoing sales, advancing the Pre-Feasibility Study for its potential Western Australian facility, and broadening the commercial potential of its lupin protein and co-products.

Following the completion of early market groundwork, WOA and Univar are now rolling out a coordinated launch across the beverage and nutrition sectors. As part of this program, WOA has been selected to join the Australian delegation to the 2025 China International Import Expo in Shanghai from 5–10 November 2025. The invitation highlights WOA's innovation and the potential for lupin protein to become a leading Australian export. Univar will lead marketing and promotional activity, supported by WOA through an export-market grant to accelerate early entry.

In parallel, WOA continues to investigate the potential to extract value from non-core assets associated with its purchase of the German facility

Chairperson Yaxi Zhan said, "Every key pillar of our strategy — technology, customers and partnerships — is now converging. The past quarter has been about moving from promise to performance. With momentum building across all fronts, we enter the next stage of WOA's journey with confidence and a clear path toward scale."
