Quarterly Activities Report – End December 2025

Highlights

- ***Corporate/Oil Production/ Development – Naccowlah Block and Surat Basins, Queensland***
 - Oil business revenue during the Half Year ended 31 December 2025 \$495,000.
 - Bounty group producing and contingent oil reserves and resources (2P + 2C) in Queensland increased in 2025 to 413,000 bbls with Surat Basin acquisitions and Watkins North and other NFE projects exploiting the additional 2023 Cooper Basin discoveries.
 - Oil development in Cooper Basin is progressing with commencement of access to proved Westbourne Formation reserves around Jackson Field.

- ***Corporate - Board and Management Changes***
 - Subsequent to the quarter a number of planned changes were made to the Company's Management and Board of Directors.
 - CEO Philip Kelso has retired as CEO and Mr Kane Marshall was appointed as an Independent Non-Executive Director and Chairman of the Board and Mr Robin Armstrong appointed as an Independent Non-Executive Director.
 - Mr Sachin Saraf will remain as Executive Director.
 - These changes have strengthened Bounty's position as an ASX listed oil producer/explorer as the Company continues to work on a strategy to develop its oil and gas assets in Australia and expand its portfolio through material new ventures.

▪ **Surat Basin – Queensland (PL 2 Projects)**

- Continued field operations to bring 100% owned Surat Basin fields back into production in 2026 and studies continued to drill for deeper oil condensate oil at Alton Field proved from earlier well results.

▪ **PEP 11 Offshore Sydney Basin NSW**

- The Originating Application for a Judicial Review of the Joint Authority’s decision to refuse the PEP 11 extension applications for variation is now scheduled to be heard by Justice Jackson on 20 and 23 February 2025 at the Federal Court of Australia, Sydney.

Oil Business – Production/Revenue

Oil revenue for the half-year from Naccowlah Block; in SW Queensland was \$0.50 million.

Australia confronts the challenge of finding more domestic oil and gas and producing those reserves. Bounty increased its oil reserves and resources in 2025 and at the end of the quarter Bounty group producing and contingent oil reserves in Queensland are now 413,000 bbls with Surat Basin acquisitions and Watkins North and other NFE projects exploiting the additional Cooper Basin 2023 discoveries.

Oil Business – Production and Oil Developments

SW Queensland

ATP 1189P Naccowlah Block and Associated PL's - Bounty 2%; Watkins North 10%

Location: Surrounding Jackson, Naccowlah and Watson Oilfields

Background – Summary

The Naccowlah Block comprises 1,804 km² approximately 6% of which is covered by ATP 1189 (N) and 1 Potential Commercial Area (PCA) application and the remainder in 23 petroleum production leases (PL's).

Activities during the Quarter

Principal activities during the quarter were continued oil production with a slight raise in production at a steady 20 21 bopd net to Bounty due to Westbourne Formation Oil Reserves being bought on line.

The operator has identified at least 9 sites for additional appraisal and NFE wells in the Jackson and Watson/Watkins areas of the Block which will be subject to future drilling campaigns.

Significant Activities Next Quarter

Currently Bounty anticipates 4 NFE and appraisal wells for Naccowlah Block in 2026. This will be a positive development expected to add to Bounty sales volumes and reserves.

In addition, the operator will optimise oil production from the tied in Watkins North discoveries and commence program to extend production in the Jackson Field by continuing completing as yet undeveloped reserves in the Westbourne Formation


Oil Business – Development

Southern Surat Basin Onshore Queensland

PL 2 Alton Oilfield and PL 1182 (PL46) Fairymount Oilfield Bounty - 100%;

Location: 70 km northeast of St. George and 440 km west of Brisbane, SE Queensland.

Background



The location of Bounty group Southern Surat Basin interests is shown in the adjacent map. Alton has had historical production of over 2 million barrels from the early Jurassic age Evergreen Formation and Fairymount 1.17 million barrels from the Showgrounds Formation.

Bounty's oil resources in the Southern Surat Basin are light oils (high API) derived from Permian coals (Cooper Basin equivalent). There are 154,000 bbls of 2P and 2C (Contingent) reserves within proven pools for development and potentially another 100,000 bbls in immediate proved closures in the Evergreen Formation.

Activities during the Quarter and Next Quarter

Much of the work this quarter was in finalizing compliance matters. A replacement tenure application allocated as PL 1152 to replace PL 46 Fairymount is pending and is anticipated to be issued in due course. Emphasis was on Well Integrity, environmental monitoring and upgrading Environmental

Management Systems. Bounty’s Southern Surat Basin projects are 100% owned and operated by Bounty with planning for new production in 2026.

2025/2026 Alton Area Plans


Bounty will continue field work to bring 2 wells at Alton back into production starting with Alton 3 well; while it generates a full field development plan. Initial production of 100 bopd is expected from the Alton Area Fields to generate additional gross revenue for Bounty in 2026 of ~\$2 million pa.

Bounty also continued technical work in the quarter to:

- Assess the economics of drilling and producing into a potentially large, proved resource in the PL 2 Showgrounds Formation below the Evergreen Reservoirs. These potential new targets were identified with sophisticated seismic technology which indicated a deeper potential gas/condensate anomaly in the Precipice Formation.
- Plan to drill an oil/condensate play at Eluanbrook Updip located in the NW section of PL 2.

PEP 11 - Offshore Sydney Basin, New South Wales – Bounty 15%

Background

PEP 11 covers 4,576 sq. km immediately adjacent to the largest gas market in Australia and is a high impact exploration project. PEP 11 remains one of the most significant untested gas plays in Australia.

Activities during the Quarter

On 17 January 2025 the operator BPH Energy Limited (ASX: BPH) announced that it had been given notice by NOPTA that the Joint Authority had refused the Joint Venture’s Applications for extensions and variations made on 23 January 2020 and 17 March 2021 (“the Decision”). The PEP 11 permit nonetheless continued in force from 17 January 2025 pending renewal.

PEP-11 continues in force and the Joint Venture is in compliance with the contractual terms of PEP 11 with respect to such matters as reporting,

payment of rents and the various provisions of the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act 2006 (Cth).

The Joint Venture's Application for Judicial Review of the of the Joint Authority's decision to refuse the PEP 11 extensions is now scheduled to be heard by Justice Jackson on 20 and 23 February 2025 at the Federal Court of Australia, Sydney. The Application seeks:

1. An order quashing or setting aside the Decision;
2. A declaration that the Decision is void and of no effect; and
3. An order again remitting the Joint Venture's Applications to the Joint Authority for reconsideration according to law.

There were no further technical developments during the quarter.

This matter continues in circumstances of very serious East Australia gas supply shortfalls with threats of closure at the Tomago Smelter, Newcastle due to power shortfalls and a recent extension of operations at the coal fired Eraring Power Station until 2029.

Jacobson Project Offshore Carnarvon Basin WA – Bounty right to earn 25% with options to earn up to 50%

Location: 70 km. East of Barrow Island WA

Titles: EP 490 and 491 and TP 27 totalling 3,197 km² - Bounty right to earn 25% - 50%

Main Points: The operator Coastal Oil & Gas (Coastal) is through its agent, was continuing renewal and extension applications and has filed submissions and reports to DEMIRs for the remaining three Permits following lapse of EP 475. Bounty has assisted this process. Potential funding options for drilling were explored.

Activities Next Quarter

Drill timing is dependent on progress by Coastal to obtain extensions of the term of the 3 extant Permits. Further extensions will likely depend on drill funding. The remaining Permits extend beyond 2025. Bounty will monitor progress.

Rough Range Project Onshore Carnarvon Basin – WA

L 16 – Bounty 100%

Location: Exmouth Gulf – WA

Background: The principal undrilled prospect is the 3 million bbls potential Bee Eater prospect in the southern section of L 16.

Activities during the Quarter and next Quarter

Seismic re-processing for L 16 is planned for 2026.

During the quarter Bounty was updating resource and environmental compliance documentation.

Corporate

Payments to Related Parties during the quarter (as disclosed in Para 6 of Appendix 5B)

Director's fees and statutory sums paid to directors as remuneration and super contributions totalled \$40,000 for the quarter. Entities related to the former CEO received management fees, cost reimbursement and office rent (rounded ex-gst) totalling \$66,000 for the quarter.

Tenements

No petroleum permits or licence were acquired, farmed-out/in, relinquished or expired during the quarter.

Issued Capital

During the quarter 129,127 listed options (ASX: BUYO) were exercised at \$0.025 expiring on 30 November 2025. Current issued capital is 1,561,600,981 equity shares on 31 December 2025.

Current Assets

At the end of the quarter cash and marketable investments were \$ 0.60 million.
