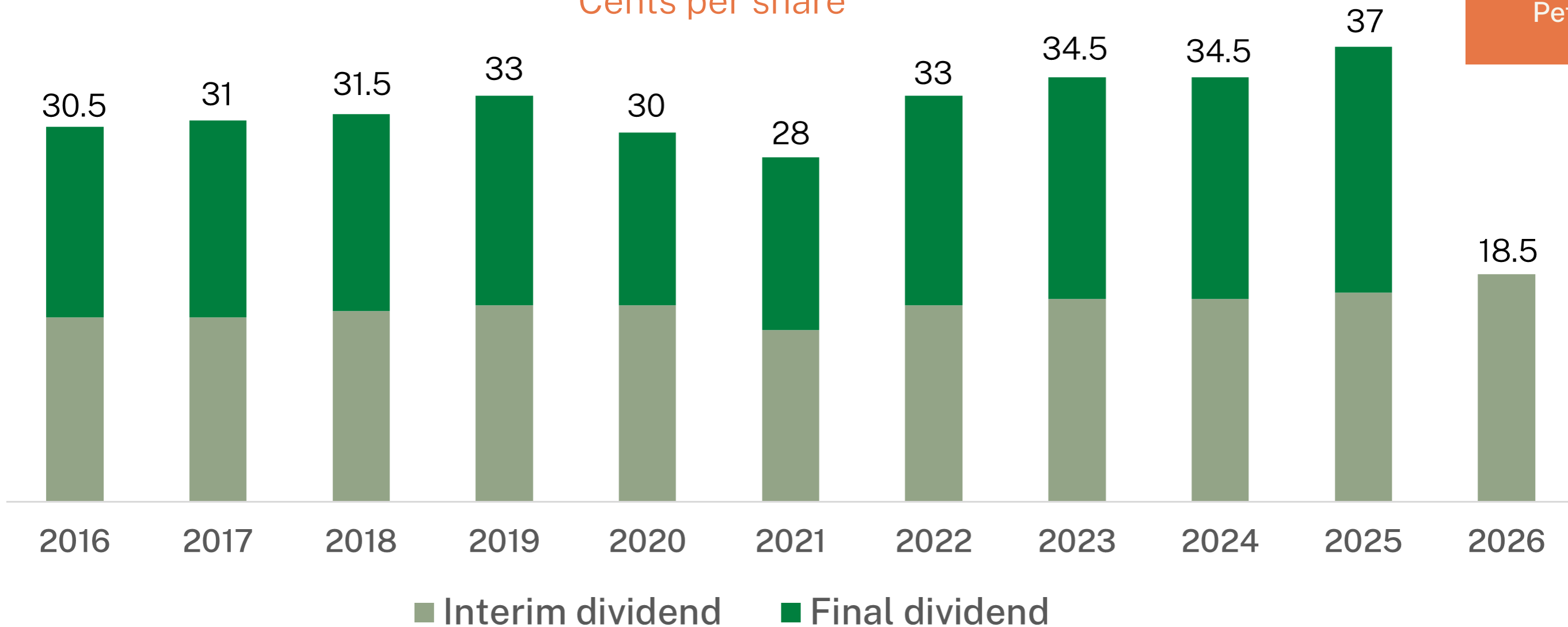

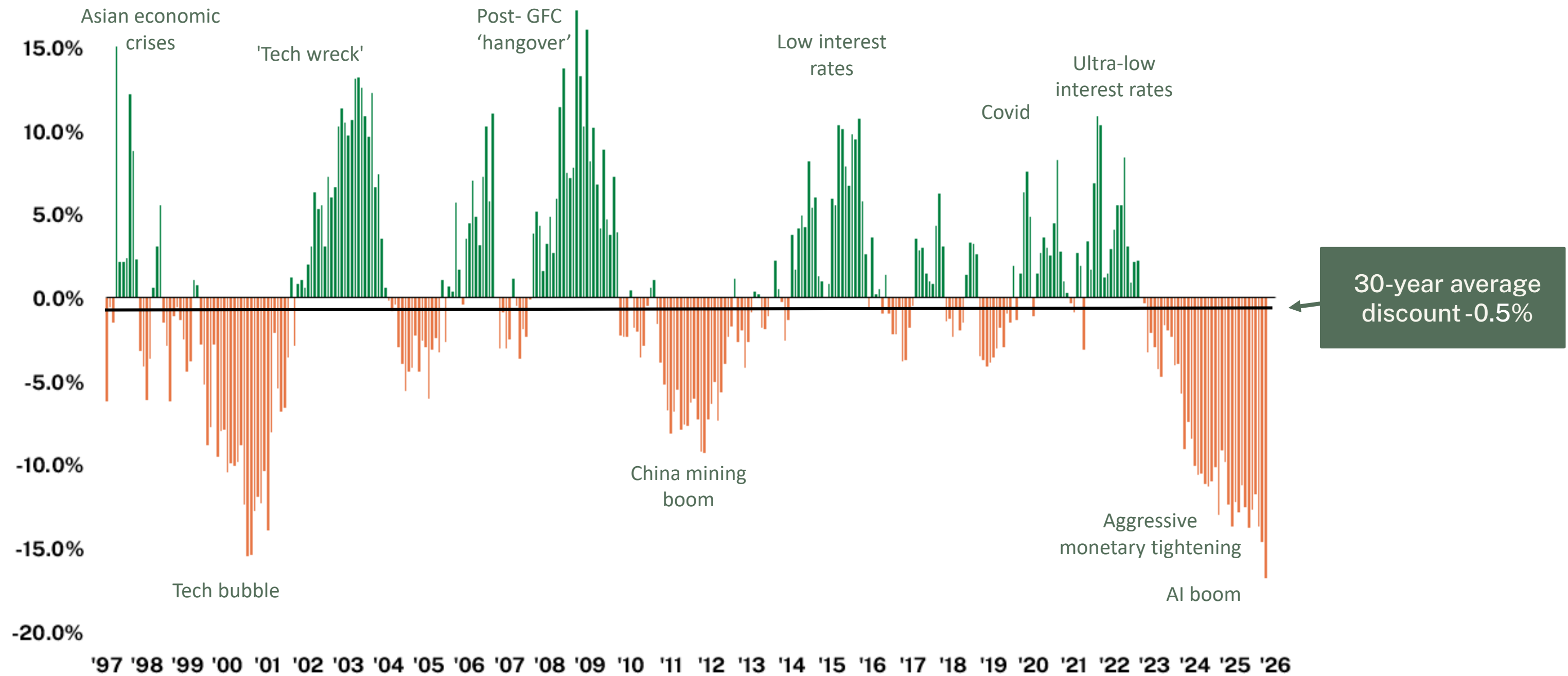

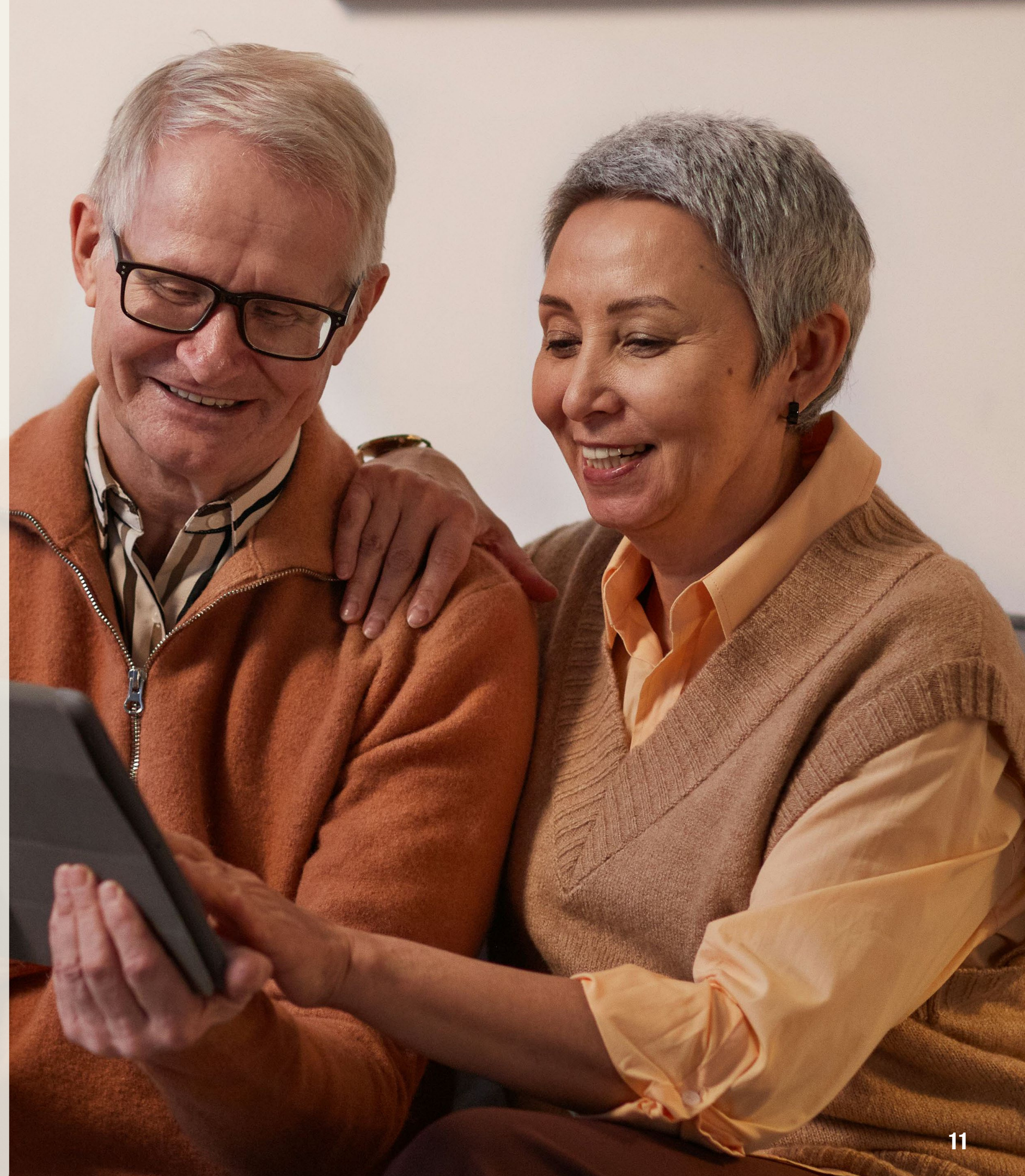

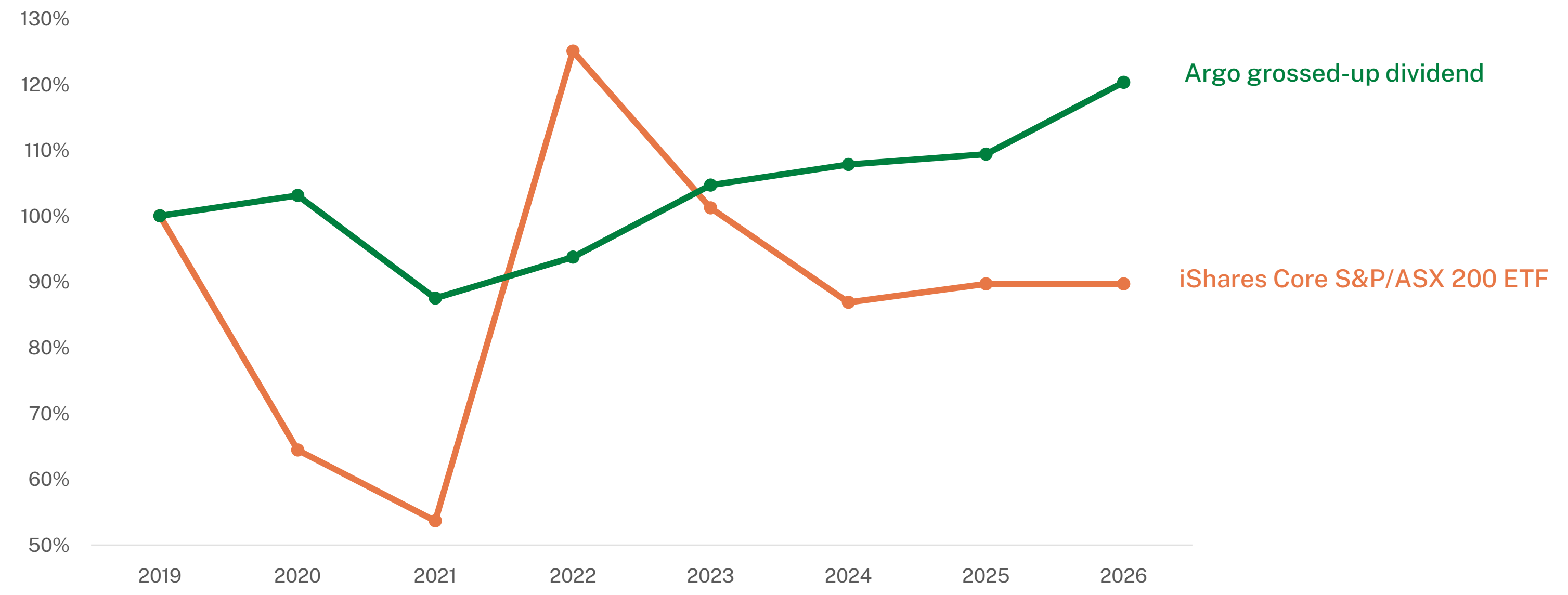

LICs vs INDEX-TRACKING ETFs

Listed Investment Companies

- ✓ **Actively managed portfolio**
To prioritise stocks based on valuation and dividend profile, can manage concentration risk
- ✓ **More consistent income across market cycles**
The ability to effectively smooth dividend income over the cycle
- ✓ **Fully franked dividends**
Through active portfolio management and generating franking credits through corporate tax paid
- ✓ **Simple, tax-effective income**
Straightforward, fully franked dividend. Shareholders recognise capital gains only when they choose to sell

Index-Tracking ETF

- ✗ **Passively managed portfolio**
ETFs blindly track the index, increasing concentration risk. Cannot prioritise franked dividends
- ✗ **Volatile dividends**
Rising and falling with the market
- ✗ **Variable tax implications**
Tax liabilities, including capital gains tax, passed through to investor each year
- ✗ **Missed opportunities**
ETFs cannot participate in new company IPOs, until a company enters the relevant index

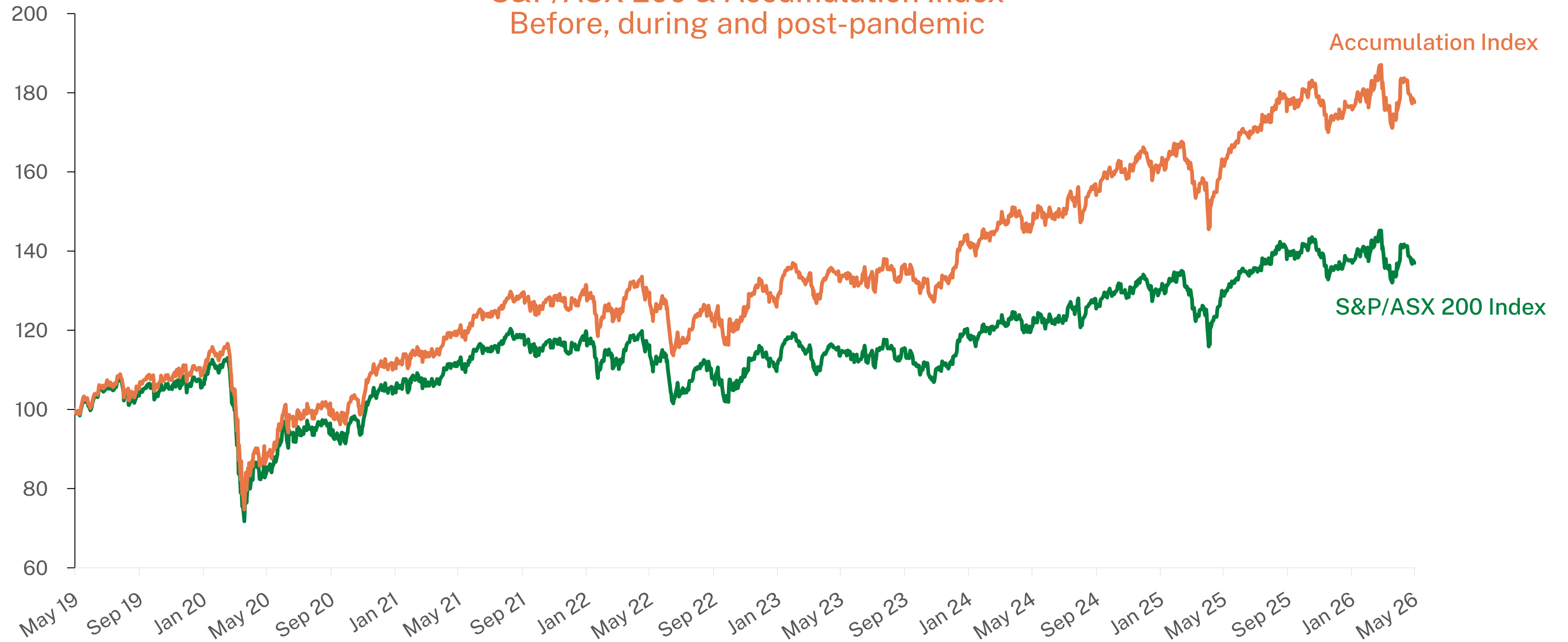

SHARE MARKET RESILIENCE

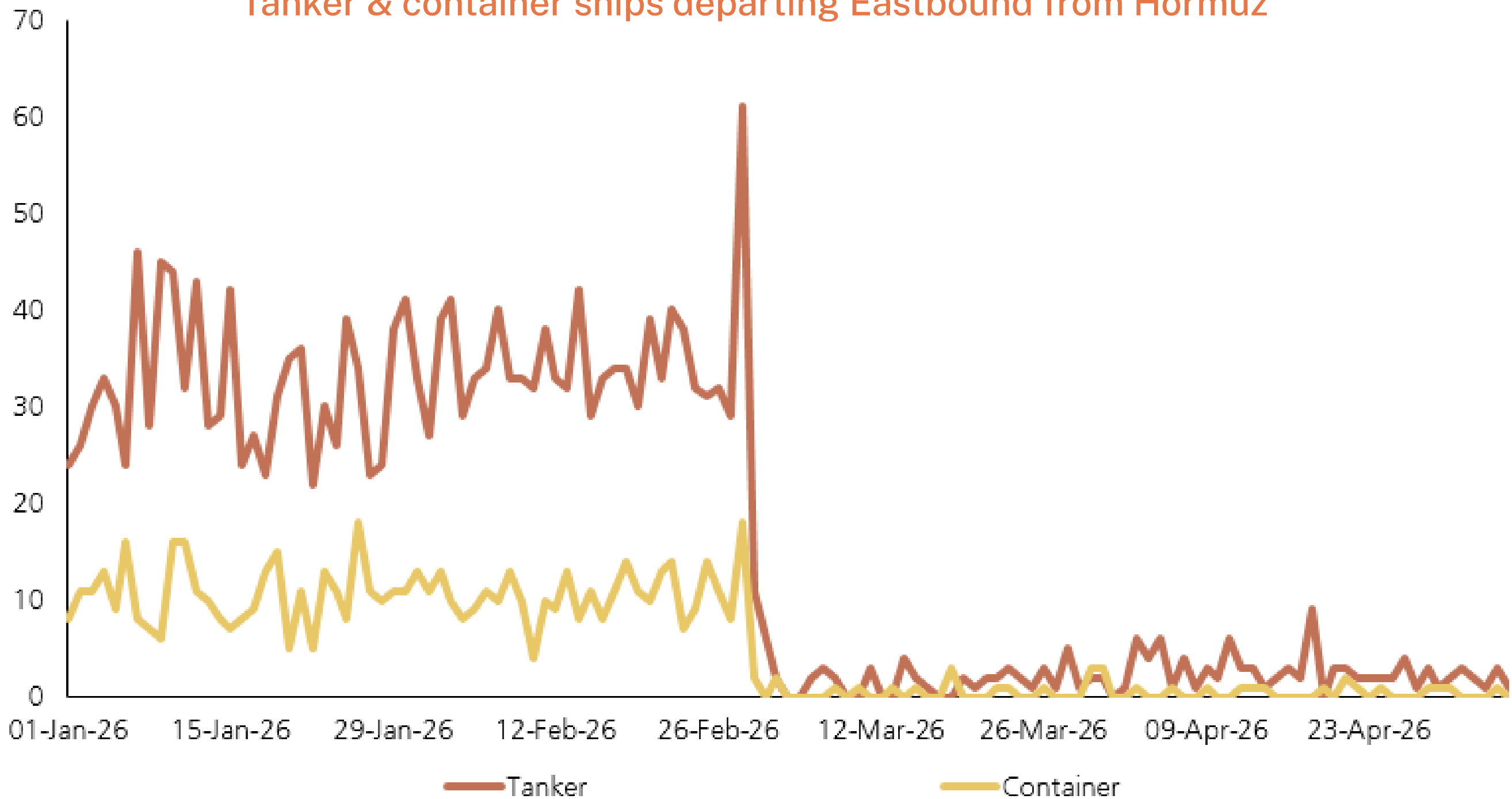
S&P/ASX 200 & Accumulation Index

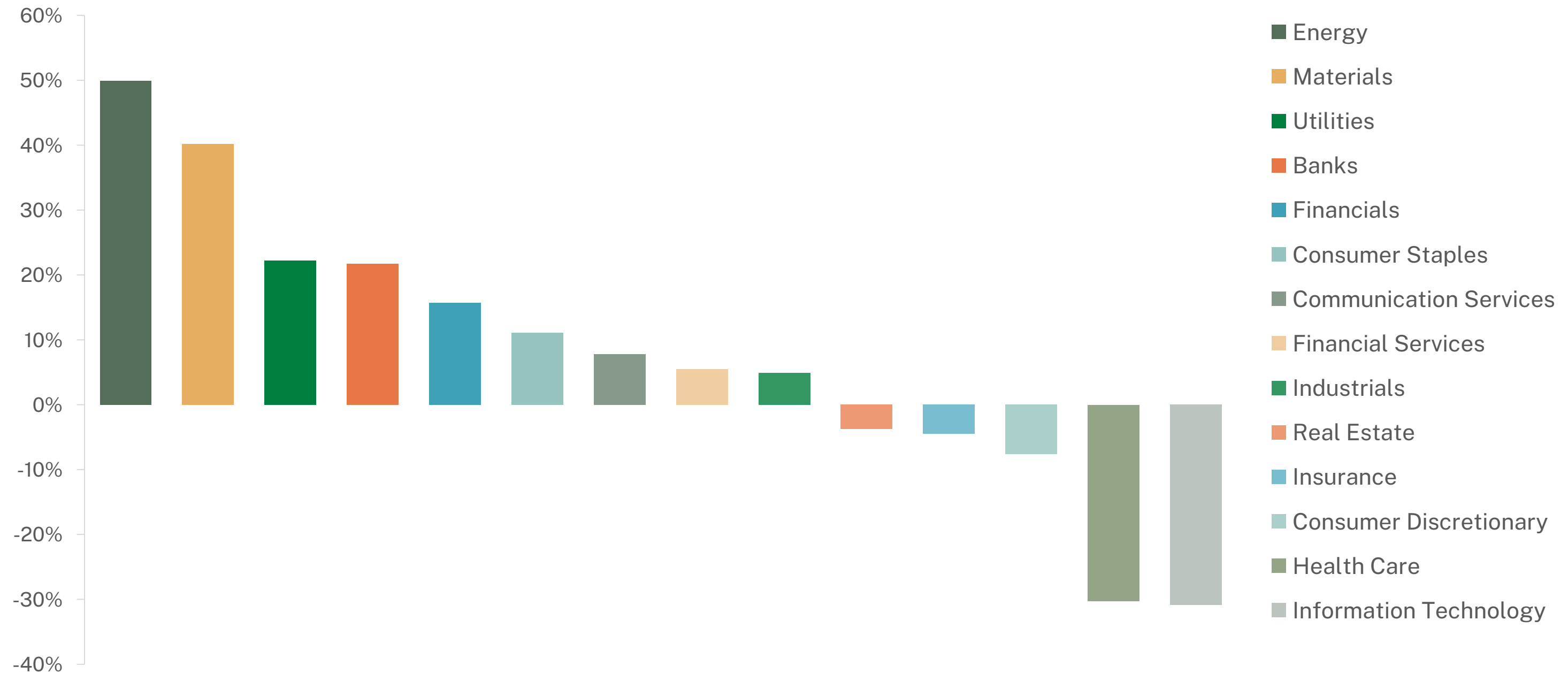

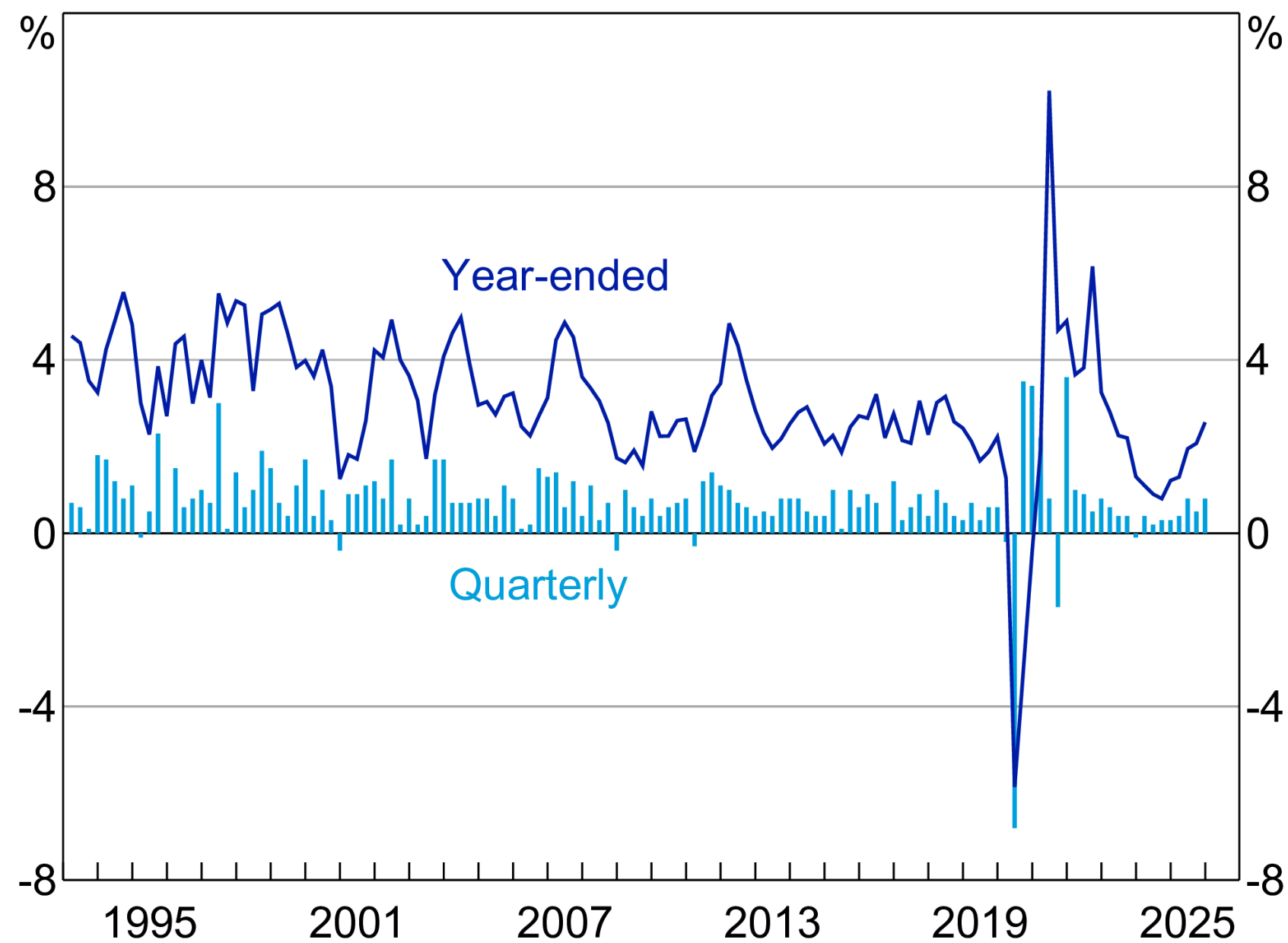
ASX Tech Sector Valuation Premium vs Broader Market

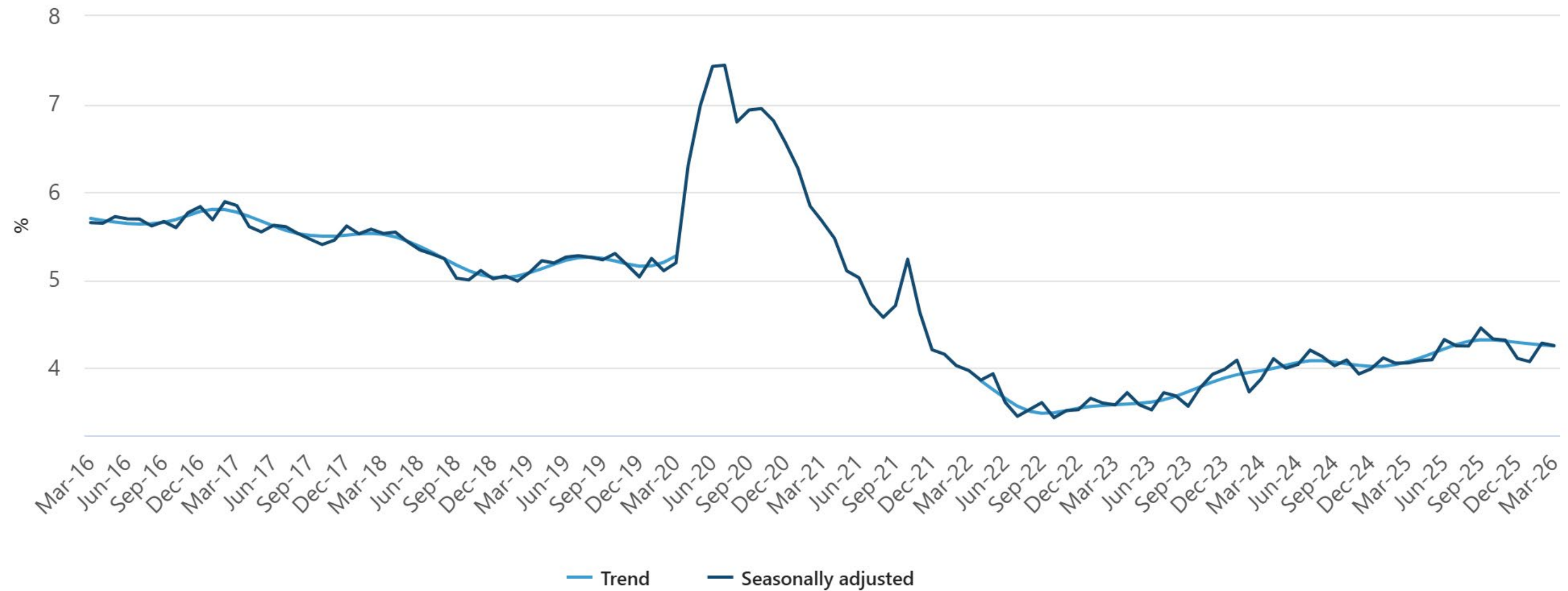

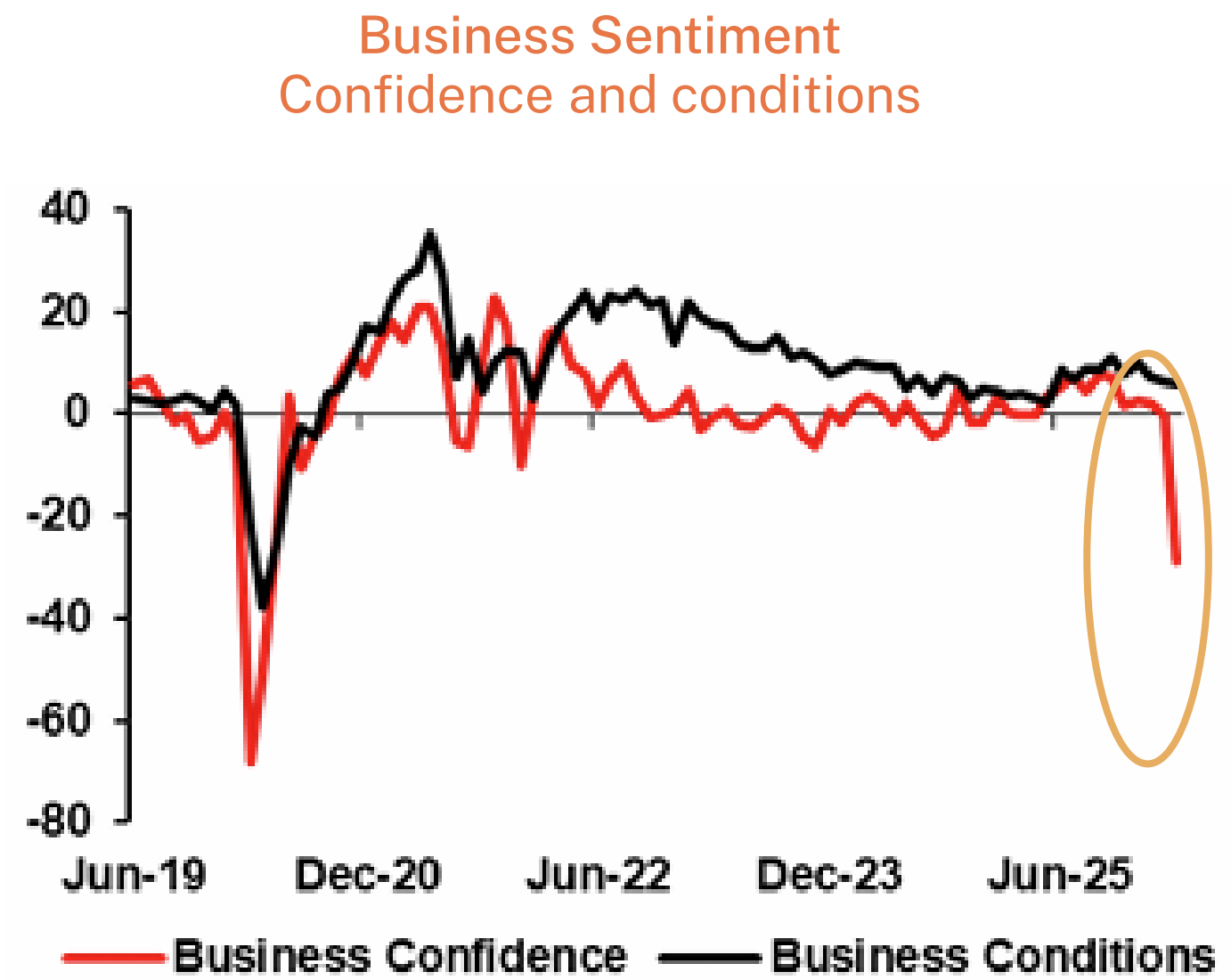
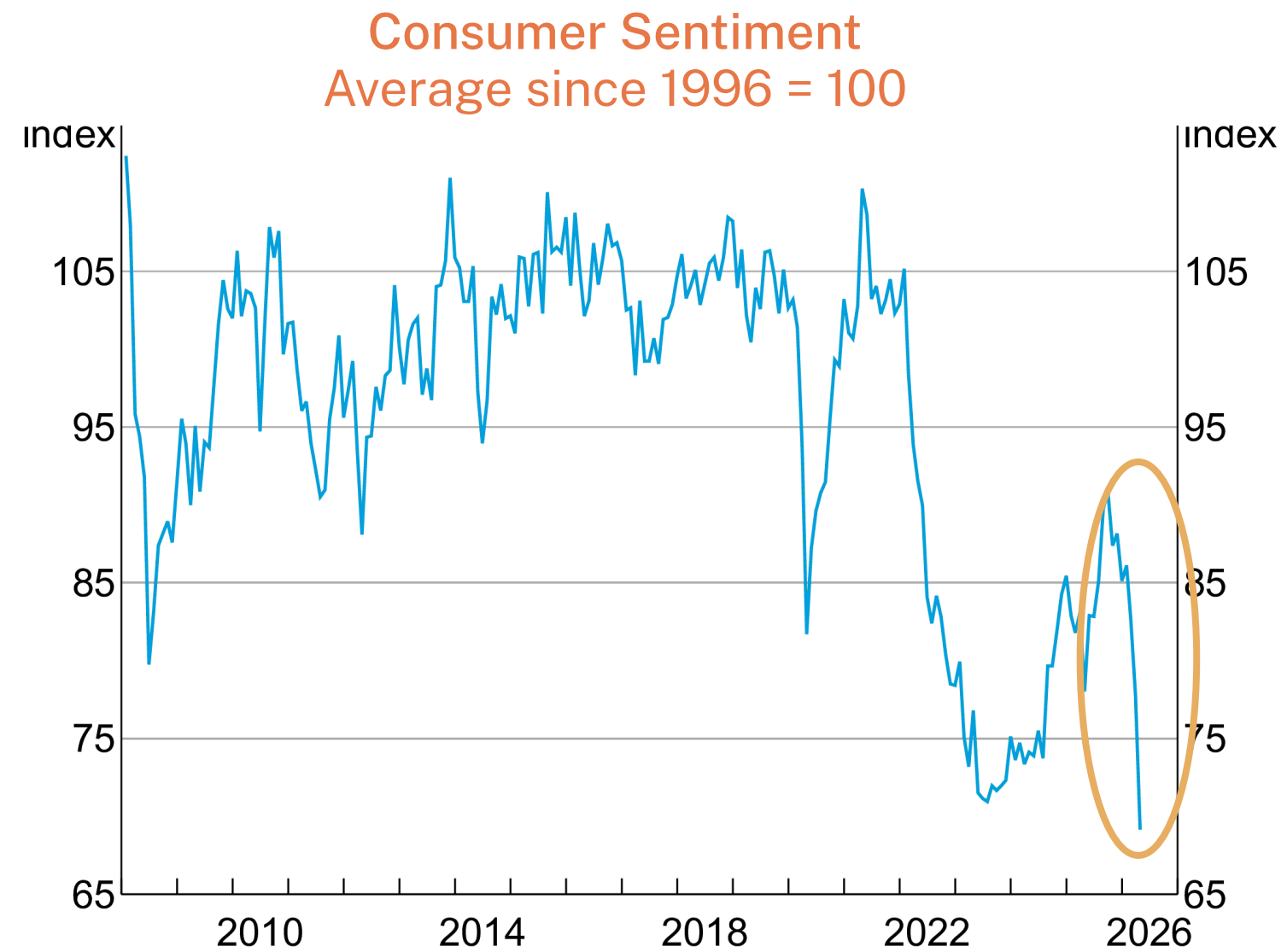

Australian unemployment rate

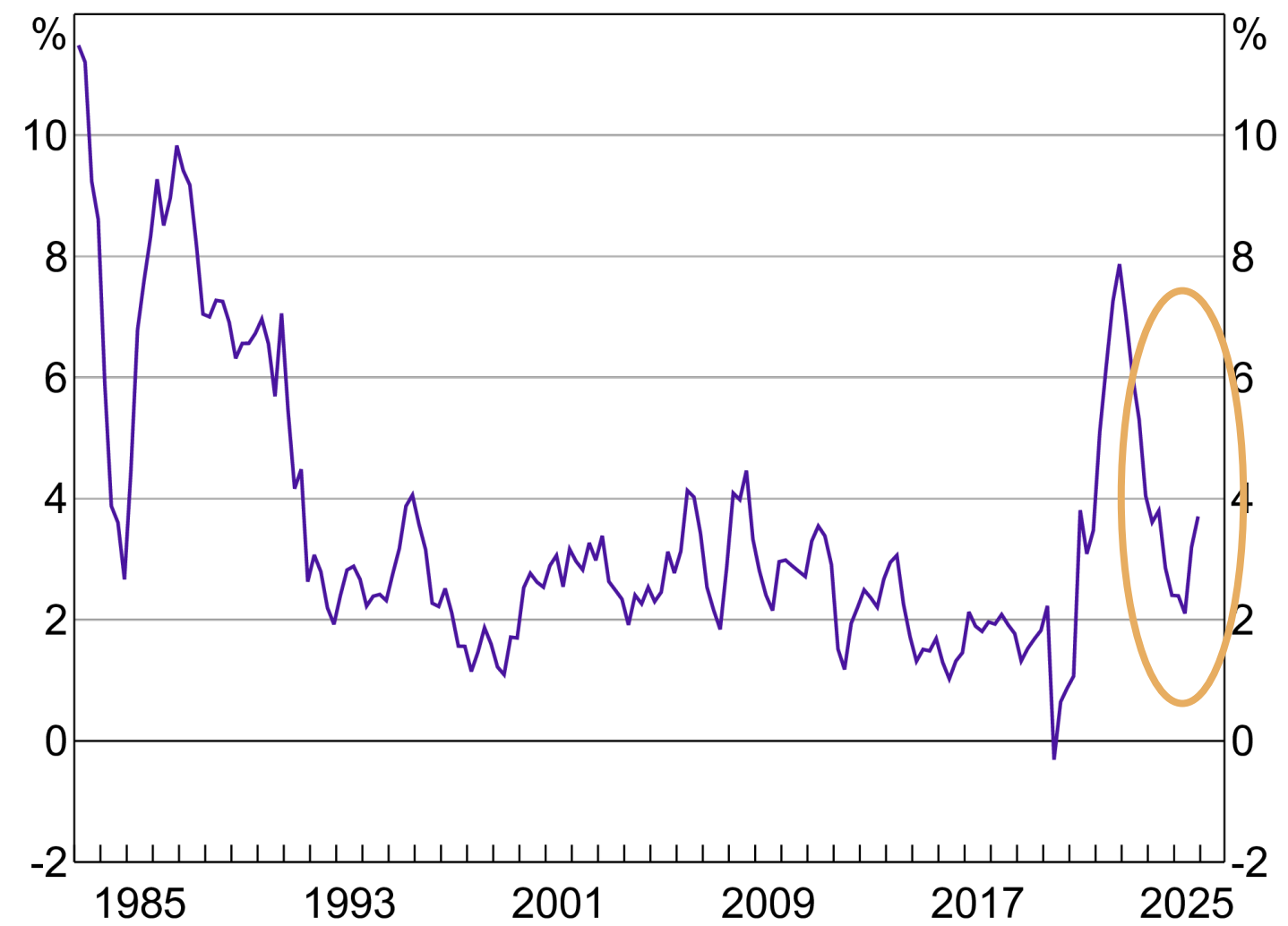

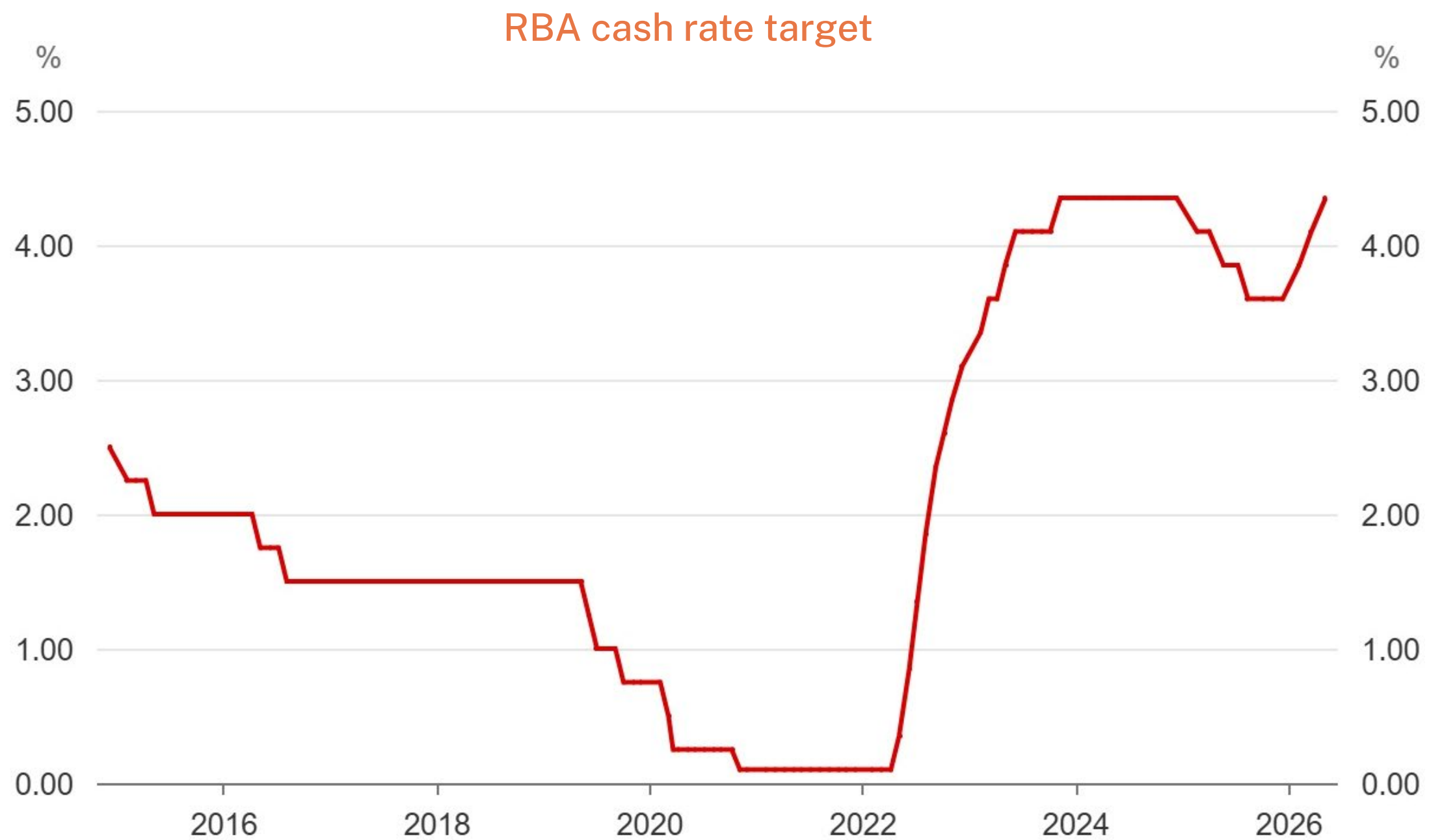
INFLATION HAS RE-EMERGED

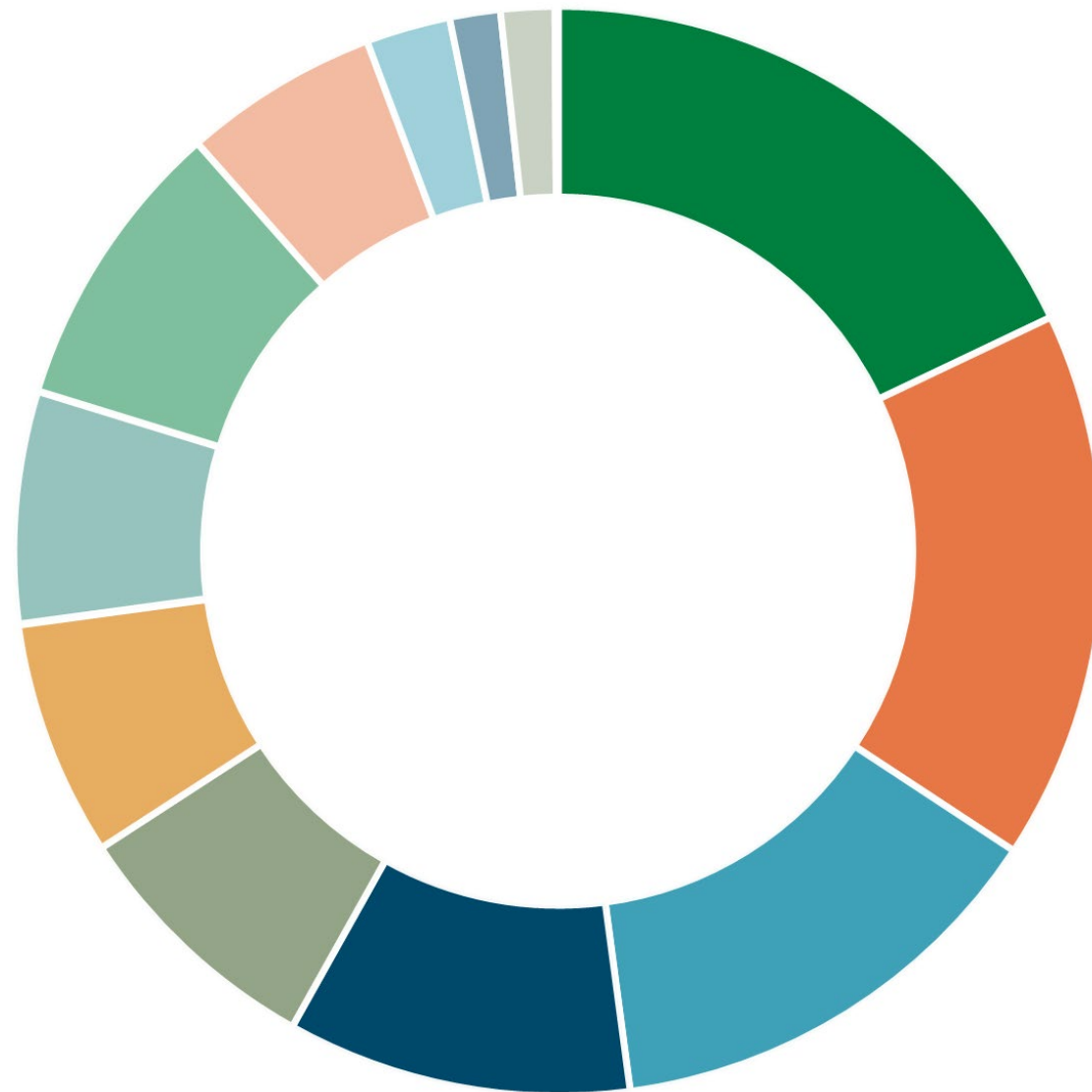

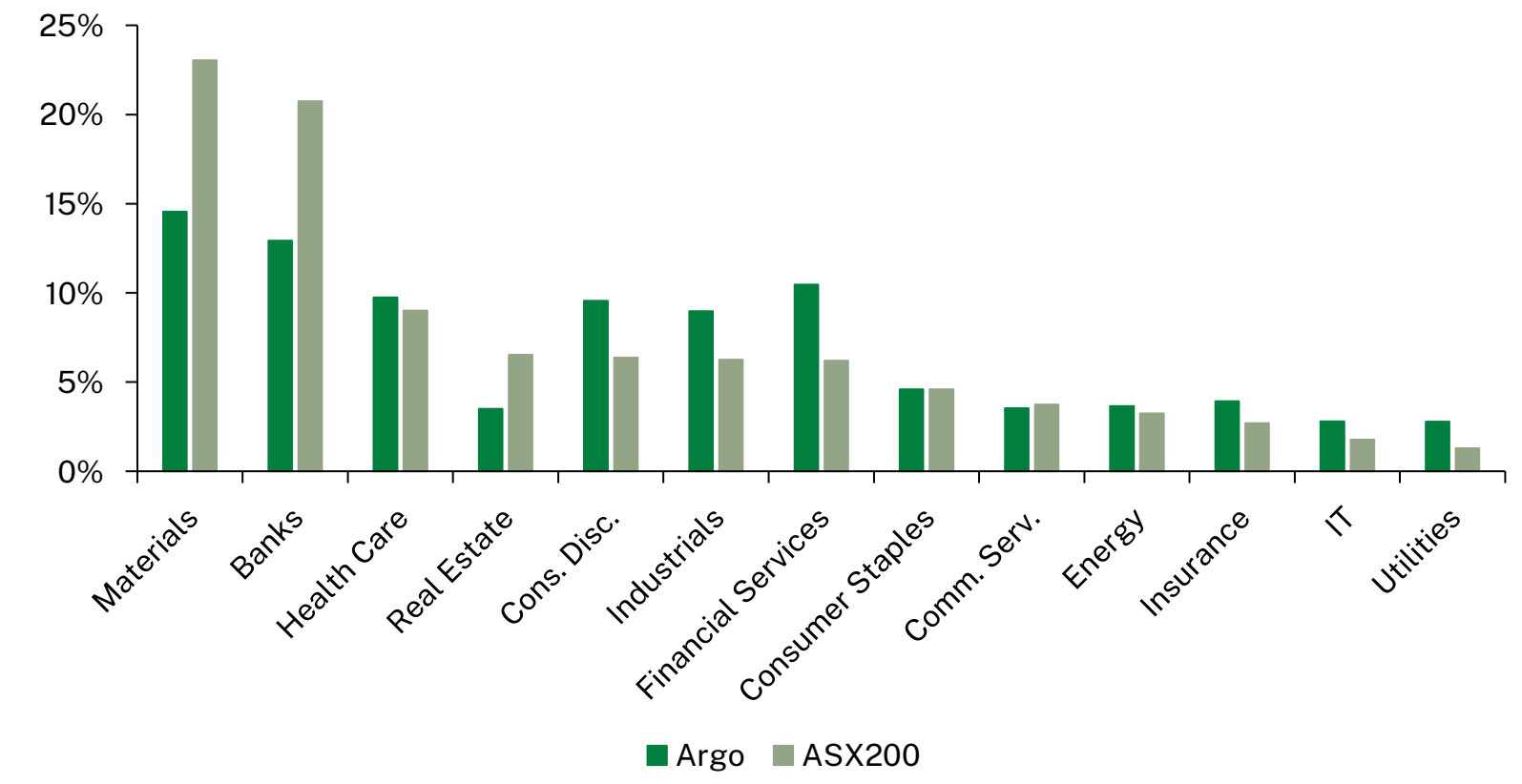

Return consistency

- Infrastructure provides **predictable, inflation-linked** cash flows offering **resilient returns** and **defensive characteristics**
- **Attractive return potential**: estimated 7–10% (3–4% yield + 4–6% growth)⁽¹⁾

Diversification

- Favorable **downside capture**
- **Higher inflation sensitivity** than stocks or bonds
- Relatively **low equity beta** and **lower volatility** than equities

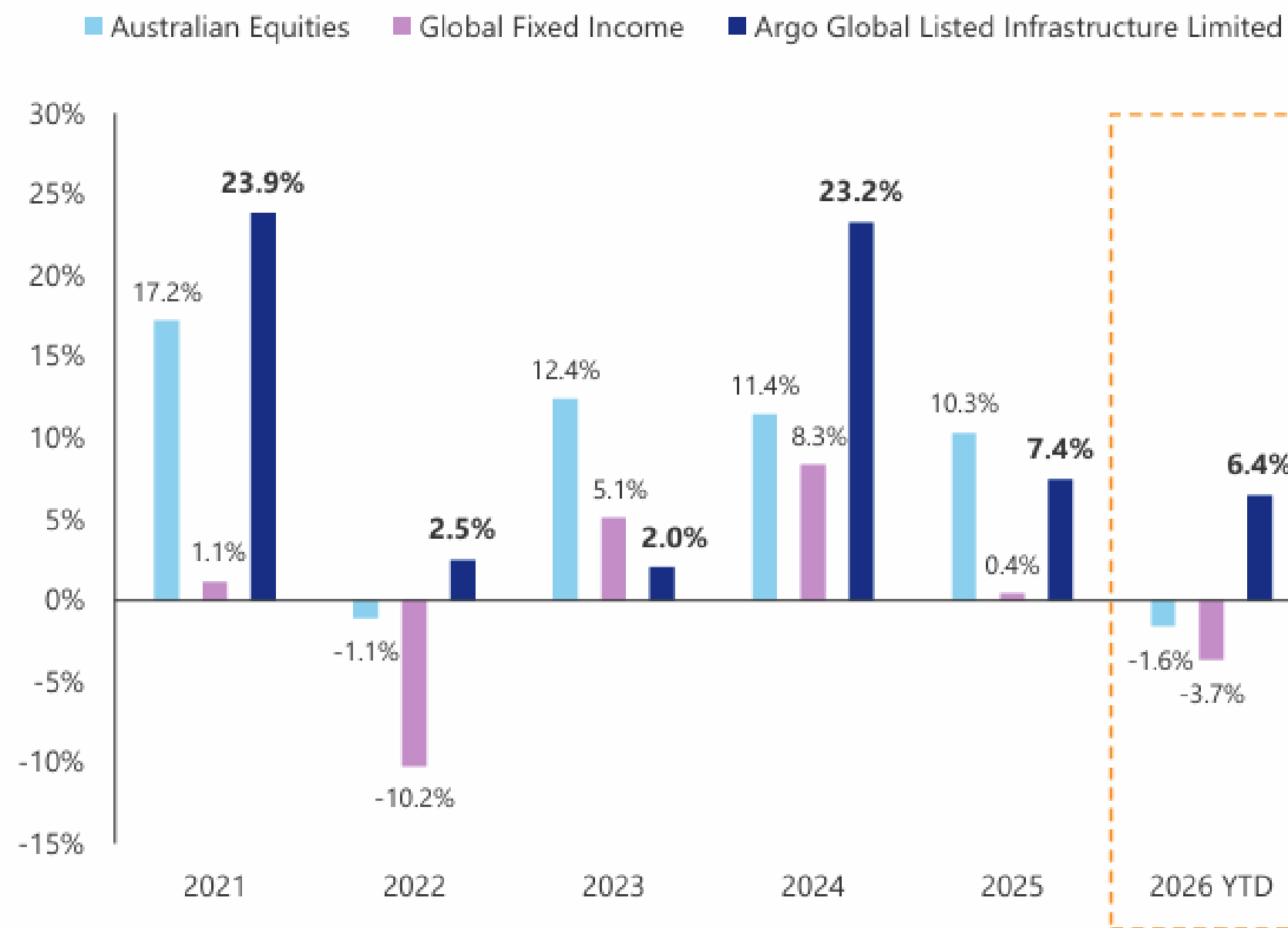

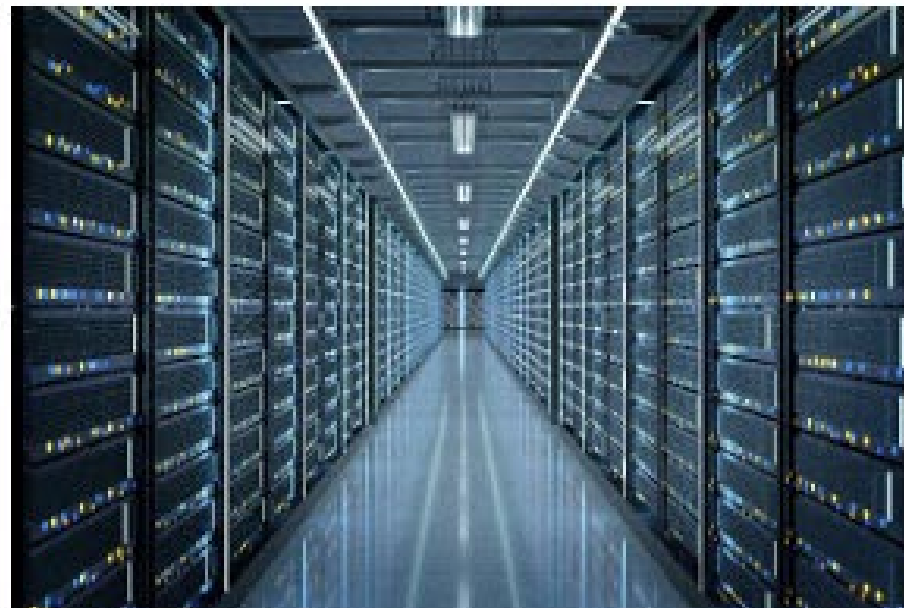

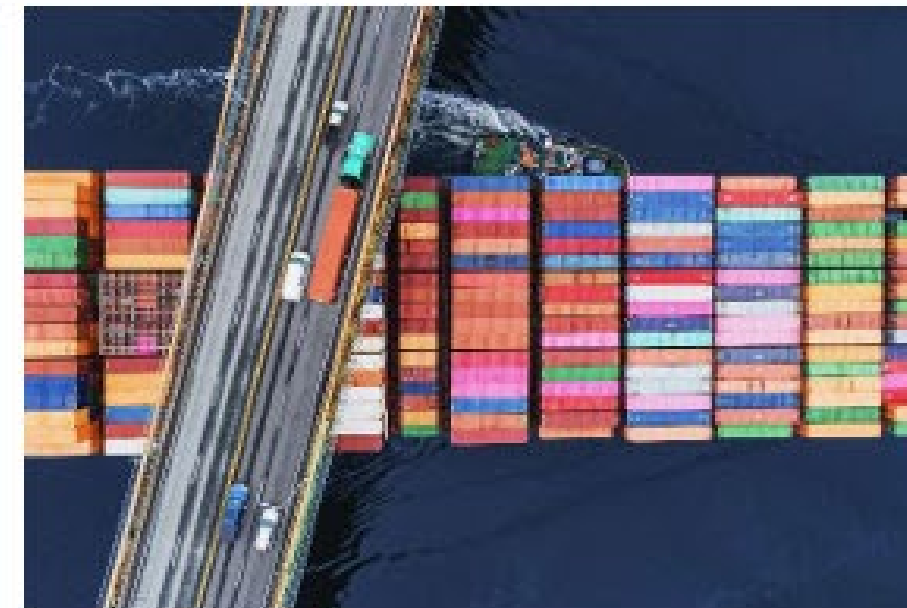

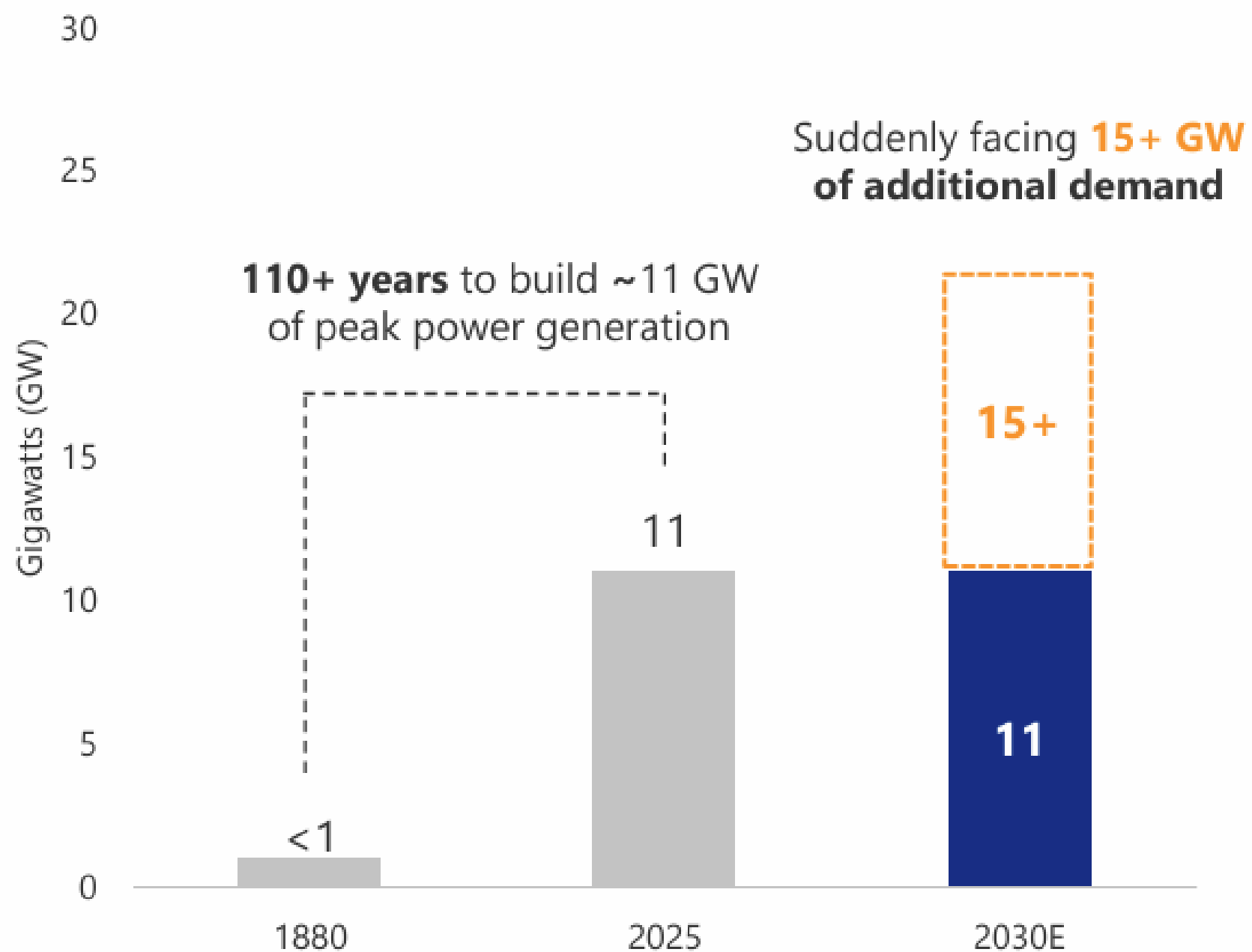

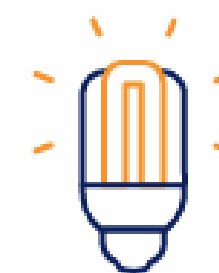

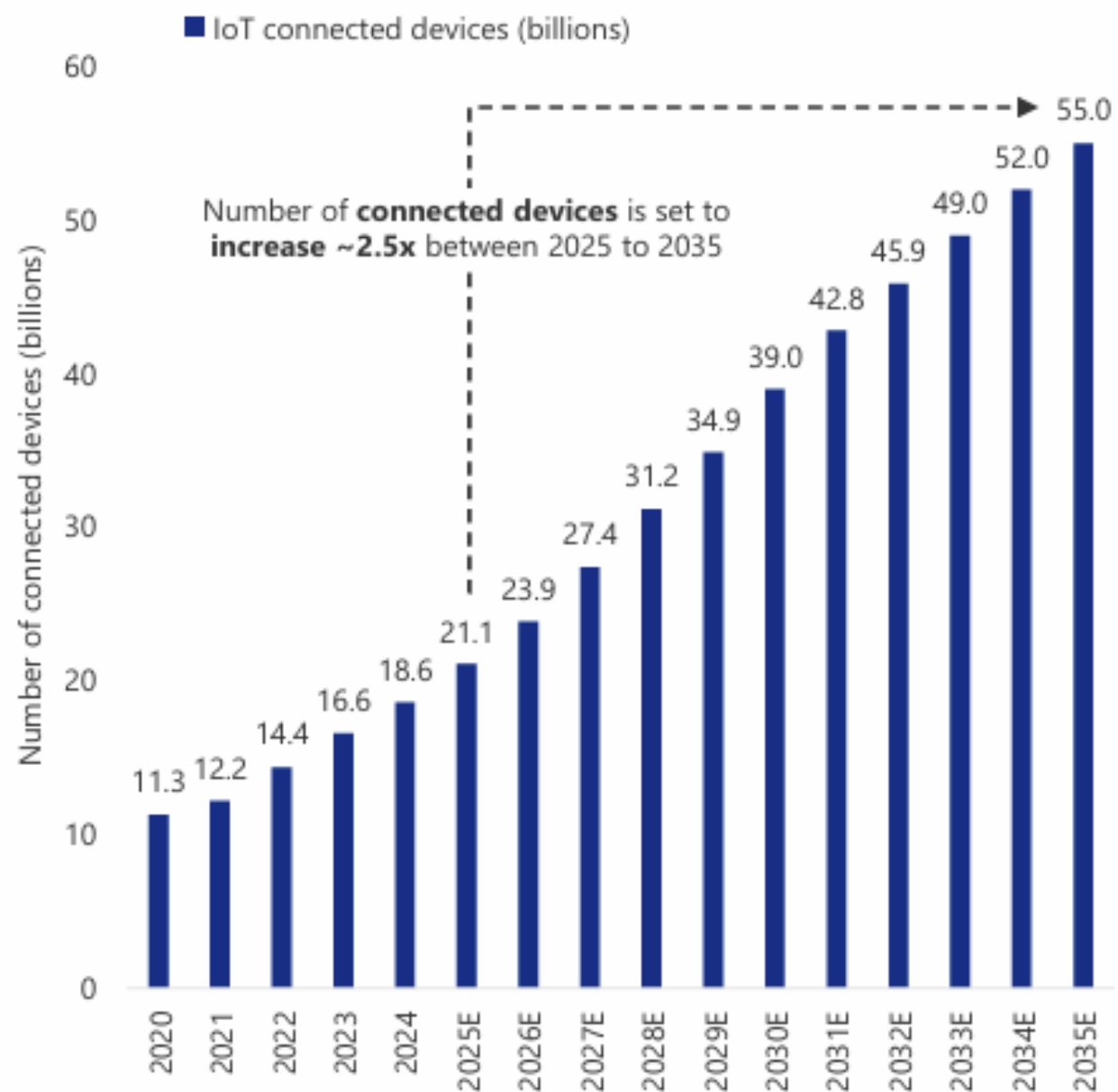

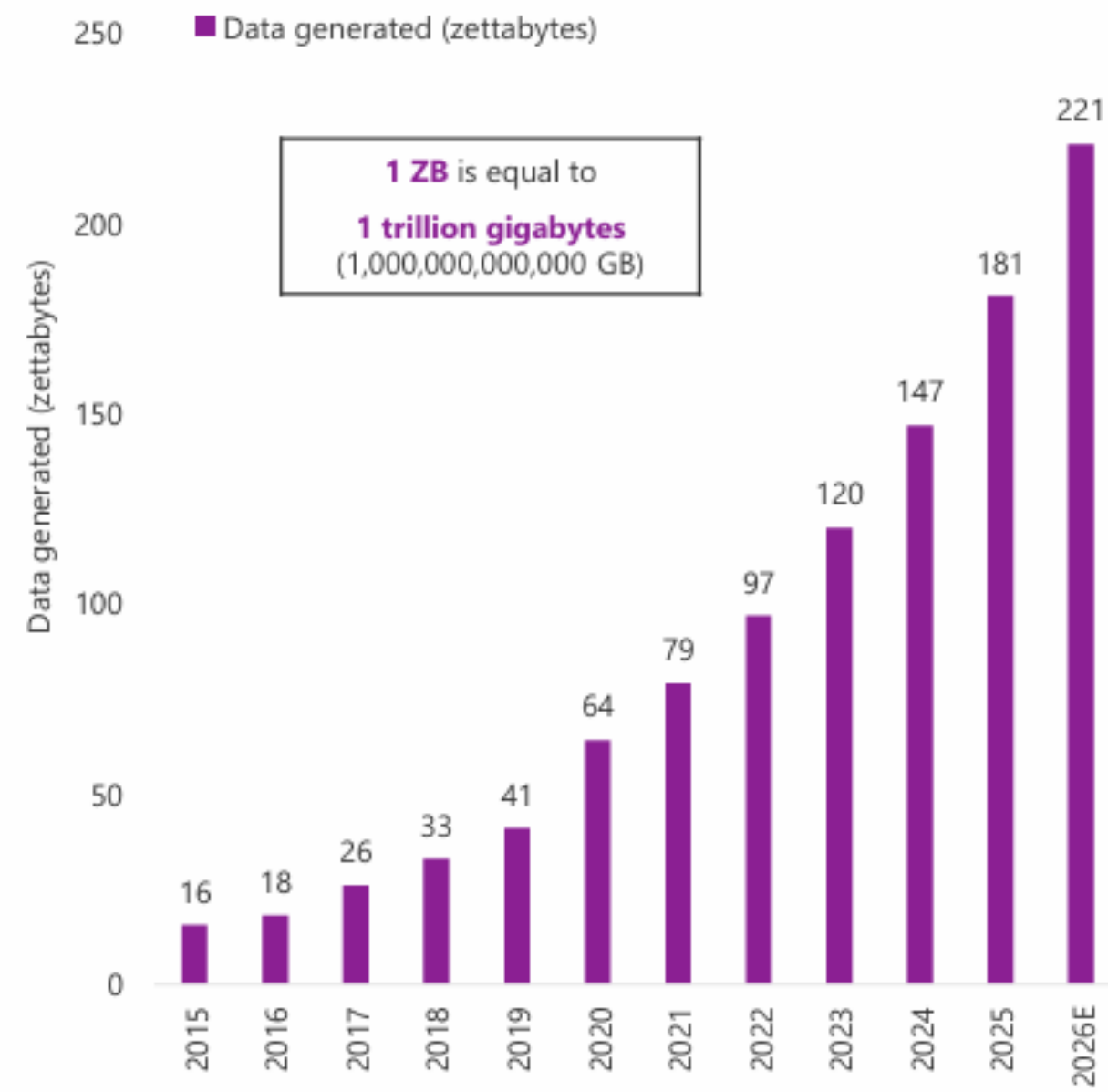

Number of global active IoT connections



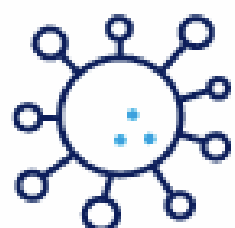

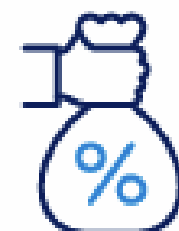

WAR IN IRAN

What happened?

- Intensifying conflict involving Iran has disrupted regional energy production and global supply chains.
- Attacks on energy infrastructure and rising security threats have constrained tanker traffic through the Strait of Hormuz, a critical artery for global oil, liquefied natural gas (LNG), fertilizer, and other petrochemical flows.



WAR IN IRAN (CONT.)

VOLATILE ENERGY PRICES CREATE UNCERTAINTY, BUT REAL ASSETS SHOULD BE RESILIENT

What is our outlook?

- **Higher inflation** in the short-run is highly probable
- We still expect **solid growth** in 2026, but **greater downside risks** outside of the U.S.
- Barring sustained damage to production capacity or prolonged route closures, we expect prices to stabilize as supply responses emerge and demand adjusts.
- **Energy prices** likely **structurally higher** than before the conflict

What does this mean for infrastructure?

- Asset class tends to **perform well** in periods of uncertainty and rising inflation.
- Exporting economies (particularly US) well positioned; LNG exports continue to ramp.
- Concerns on diesel and jet fuel supplies may hinder transportation (airports, toll roads) in Australia, Europe and other markets

MIDSTREAM SUBSECTOR



The Williams Companies Inc. (WMB) Midstream

Overview

- Integrated provider natural gas pipelines that produces, gathers, processes and transports natural gas and natural gas liquids; broad exposure across the U.S. and Canada
- Owns ~33,000 miles of natural gas pipelines and handles fully 1/3 of U.S. natural gas. Storage footprint of ~423Bcf and is the largest storage operator in the U.S. Gulf Coast

Union Pacific Corporation (UNP) Freight Rails

Overview

- Class I railroad that transports agricultural products, automobiles, and chemicals
- Operates over 32,000 route miles and serves 23 U.S. states west of Chicago and New Orleans
- In July 2025, announced plans to acquire Norfolk Southern Railway in a deal worth ~\$85 billion, thus creating a transcontinental railroad. The combined network would encompass more than 50,000 route miles across 43 states

Crown Castle International Corp. (CCI) Cell Towers

Overview

- Largest U.S. wireless tower company with nearly 40,000 towers. The core business for CCI is leasing space on its wireless towers primarily to wireless carriers, government agencies and broadband data providers.
- Strong demand for telecom towers globally, driven by rapid growth in data usage
- Incumbent advantage and substantial barriers to entry
- Owns towers, fiber and small cells, positioning CCI for non-traditional users

Overview

- An integrated electric utility company primarily focused on electric power production and retail electric distribution operations.

- Entergy, owns power plants that have a combined generating capacity of ~23,900 MW, including ~5,200 MW of nuclear power.
