CORPORATE GOVERNANCE STATEMENT 2026

This Corporate Governance Statement is current as of 18 August 2026 and has been approved by the Board of the Company on that date.

This Corporate Governance Statement discloses the extent to which the Company has followed the recommendations set by the ASX Corporate Governance Council in its publication Corporate Governance Principles and Recommendations – 4th Edition (**Recommendations**). The Recommendations are not mandatory, however the Recommendations that have not been followed for any part of the reporting period have been identified and reasons provided for not following them along with what (if any) alternative governance practices were adopted in lieu of the recommendation during that period.

Due to the current size and nature of the existing Board and the magnitude of the Company's operations, the Board did not consider that the Company would gain any benefit from individual Board committees during the 2026 financial year and that its resources would be better utilised in other areas. During FY2026, under the Company's Board Charter, the duties that would ordinarily be assigned to individual committees were carried out by the full Board under the written terms of reference for those committees. It is the Board's intention to revisit the establishment of appropriate sub-committees as the group expands.
