This Corporate Governance Statement of Percheron Therapeutics Limited (the “Company”) is prepared in accordance with ASX Listing Rule 4.10.3. This statement outlines the main Corporate Governance Practices adopted and approved by the Board of Directors as of 19 August 2026.

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Introduction

The Board and Management of the Company are committed to maintaining high standards of ethics, integrity and statutory compliance in all Company dealings.

The Corporate Governance Statement describes the Company’s Corporate Governance Framework in accordance with the ASX Corporate Governance Council’s Corporate Governance Principles and Recommendations (4th Edition) published on 27 February 2019 (“the ASX Principles and Recommendations”), by reference to each of the stated principles. The Corporate Governance Statement identifies where certain recommendations were not followed for the entire reporting period.

The Corporate Governance Statement complements, and should be read in conjunction with, information contained in the Company’s Annual Report and governance documents, which are available on the Company’s website at www.percherontx.com.

Principle 1: Lay solid foundations for management and oversight

Recommendation 1.1

A listed entity should have and disclose a board charter setting out:

- (a) the respective roles and responsibilities of its board and management; and
- (b) those matters expressly reserved to the Board and those delegated to management.

The Company has adopted a Board Charter that can be found on the Company’s website.

The Board is responsible for the overall governance, management and strategic direction of the Company. Management is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Company, which it undertakes within a framework of specific delegated authority and approval limits.

The Board's primary role is to represent and protect the interests of the Company's stakeholders. To fulfil this role the Board is responsible for the overall governance of the Company including its strategic direction, establishing goals for management and monitoring the achievement of these goals.

The Board is responsible for, amongst other things:

- the development, implementation and alteration of the strategic direction of the Company, including future expansion of business activities;
- risk management, assessment and monitoring. The risk management framework of the Company is reviewed at least once during each Reporting Period, and it is to be disclosed if such review has taken place as part of the periodic reporting obligations of the Company;
- ensuring appropriate external reporting to shareholders, the ASX, ASIC and other stakeholders;
- encouraging ethical behaviour, including compliance with the Company's governing laws and procedures and compliance with corporate governance standards; and
- establishing targets and goals for Senior Management to achieve and monitoring the performance of Senior Management.

Recommendation 1.2

A listed entity should:

- (a) undertake appropriate checks before appointing a person, or putting forward to security holders a candidate for election, as a Director; and
- (b) provide security holders with all material information relevant to a decision on whether or not to elect or re-elect a Director.

The Company aims to recruit staff at all levels from as diverse a pool of qualified candidates as reasonably possible based on their skills, qualifications and experience.

The Board has not set measurable objectives with regard to gender diversity as the Board is currently satisfied with the level of diversity within the Company, noting the very small number of personnel in the organisation.

The Chair of the committee is considered to be independent.

The Board understands the benefits in having a diversity of Directors with a mix of skills, knowledge and independence to enable the Board to discharge its duties and responsibilities effectively. The Board will seek external advice where necessary in connection with the recruitment and appointment of additional Directors.

The Board devotes time as required to discuss Board succession issues. All members of the Board are involved in the Company's nomination process, to the maximum extent permitted under the Corporations Act and ASX Listing Rules.

The Board updates the Company's Board Skills Matrix annually to assess the appropriate balance of skills, experience, independence and knowledge of the entity.

Details of members and meeting attendance of the Nomination Committee are set out in the Directors' Report contained in the Annual Report on the Company's website.

A copy of the Nomination Committee Charter can be found on the Company's website.

Recommendation 2.2

A listed entity should have and disclose a board skills matrix setting the mix of skills that the Board currently has or is looking to achieve in its membership.

Recommendation 2.3

A listed entity should disclose:

- (a) the names of Directors considered by the Board to be independent directors;

In defining the characteristics of an independent director, the Board uses the Principles and Recommendations, together with its own consideration of the Company's operations and appropriate materiality thresholds in any relationship that could materially interfere or be perceived as interfering with the exercise of an unfettered independent judgement in relation to matters concerning the Company. The Board has determined that all Non-executive Directors as at the date of this statement are independent Directors and that none of the interests or relationships that they hold in the Company would compromise that independence.

The Board Charter requires Directors to disclose their interest, positions, associations and relationships and requires that the independence of Directors is regularly assessed by the Board in light of the interests disclosed by Directors. Details of the Directors' interests, positions, associations and relationships are provided in the Annual Report.

The Board Charter provides for the determination of the Directors' terms and requires the length of service of each Director to be disclosed. The length of service of each Director is provided in the Annual Report as provided on the Company's website.

Recommendation 2.4

A majority of the Board of a listed entity should independent directors.

The Board Charter contains independence measures including ensuring the Board comprises a number of independent Non-executive Directors determined by the Board as appropriate. For further details please refer to the Board Charter which is located on the Company's website.

Recommendation 2.5

The Chair of the Board of a listed entity should be an independent Director and, in particular, should not be the same person as the CEO of the entity.

The Board Charter provides that the Chair of the Board will be a Non-executive Director. The Chair is a Non-executive Director and is defined to be independent. The Chair is not the CEO of the entity.

Recommendation 2.6

Subject to prior consultation with the Chair, Directors may seek independent advice, at the Company's expense, on any issue of particular concern from a suitably qualified adviser.

Principle 3: Instil a culture of acting lawfully, ethically and responsibly.

Recommendation 3.1

Directors and employees of the Company are required to act lawfully, ethically and responsibly in accordance with the highest standards of honesty and integrity in such a way as to safeguard and protect the performance and reputation of the Company.

The Company's values are communicated to Directors and employees. These values are referenced throughout all parts of the Company, and form an important part of the recruitment, induction and ongoing performance review of all employees.

The Company has an Audit and Risk Committee which was established by the Board to give additional assurance regarding the quality and reliability of financial information used by the Board and financial information provided by the Company pursuant to its statutory reporting requirements.

The Audit and Risk Committee is authorised by the Board to investigate any activity within its charter. The Audit and Risk Committee will have access to management and auditors and has rights to seek explanations and additional information.

Due to the size and nature of the existing Board and the magnitude of the Company's operations the committee is currently composed of two (2) Non-executive Directors who are both considered to be independent.

The Audit and Risk Committee is chaired by an independent Director who is not the Chair of the Board. The Company believes that the members of the committee have between them sufficient accounting and financial knowledge and industry understanding to effectively discharge the Audit and Risk Committee's responsibilities. The CEO and Managing Director and other senior management may be invited to attend committee meetings. Details of meeting attendance for members of the Audit and Risk Committee are set out in the Directors' Report contained in the Annual Report.

The role of the Audit and Risk Committee is to assist and advise the Board on matters relating to:

- financial reporting
- risk management
- evaluation of the effectiveness of the financial control environment
- review of the external audit function.

The Board is responsible for the appointment of the external auditor, as recommended by the Audit and Risk Committee. The Audit and Risk Committee reviews the performance of the external auditor on an annual basis and makes any recommendations arising from the review to the Board.

The Company's external auditor attends each Annual General Meeting and is available to answer any questions with regard to the conduct of the audit of the financial statements and their report.

Prior approval of the Board must be gained for non-audit work to be performed by the external auditor. There are qualitative limits on this non-audit work to ensure that the independence of the auditor is maintained. A copy of the Audit and Risk Charter can be found on the Company's website.

Recommendation 4.2

The Board of a listed entity should, before it approves the entity's financial statements for a financial period, receive from its CEO and CFO a declaration that the financial records of the entity have been properly maintained and that the financial statements comply with the appropriate accounting standards and give a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the entity and that the opinion has been formed on the basis of a sound system of risk management and internal control which is operating effectively.

Prior to approving the financial statements for the period, the Board receives from the CEO and CFO a declaration that, in their opinion, the financial records of the entity have been properly maintained and that the financial statements comply with the appropriate accounting standards giving a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the entity and that the opinion has been formed on the basis of a sound system of risk management and internal control which is operating effectively.

Recommendation 4.3

A listed entity should disclose its process to verify the integrity of any periodic corporate report it releases to the market that is not audited or reviewed by an external auditor.

The Company has established practices to ensure that Company announcements (including the Quarterly Activities Report) are accurate, balanced and understandable and provide investors with appropriate information to make informed investment decisions. Management coordinates the form of disclosure and verifies the accuracy of the information contained in announcements. Where necessary and possible, the Chair of the Board and Directors available at that time are consulted on announcements.

Periodic financial reports in a financial reporting period that are not audited or reviewed by the external auditor are to be peer-reviewed internally and signed-off on by the CFO and the Board prior to release (including as an announcement to the ASX).

Principle 5: Make timely and balanced disclosure

Recommendation 5.1

The Company seeks to provide relevant up-to-date information to its shareholders and the market in accordance with the continuous disclosure requirements of the ASX Listing Rules and Corporations Act 2001 (Cth). Principle 6: Respect the rights of security holders

Recommendation 6.1

A listed entity should provide information about itself and its governance to investors via its website.

One of the Company's key communication tools is its website where the Company maintains information about itself and its governance framework. Important information about the Company and its governance is available within the Corporate Governance section of the Company's website. All ASX announcements made by the Company can also be found within the Announcements section. Further information about how the Company communicates with its shareholders is set out in the Communication and Disclosure Policy, which is available on the Company's website.

Recommendation 6.2

A listed entity should have an investor relations program that facilitates effective two-way communication with investors.

The Company has adopted an investor communications strategy which aims to promote and facilitate effective two-way communication with investors. During the year the Company through its CEO and CFO, regularly engages with institutional and private investors, analysts and financial media. The Company releases announcements and presentation materials containing new or market sensitive material to the ASX prior to the time of the corresponding presentation to analysts, investors or conference.

The Company informs shareholders and the market regularly via by the publication of periodic reports, public announcements and posting ASX releases on the Company website promptly after their disclosure on the ASX. Shareholders can elect to receive email notification of the Company's announcements.

Further information about how the Company communicates with its shareholders is set out in the Communication and Disclosure Policy, which is available on the Company's website.

Recommendation 6.3

A listed entity should disclose how it facilitates and encourages participation at meetings of security holders.

Shareholders are encouraged to attend the Annual General Meeting and any other meetings of shareholders to use the opportunity to ask questions and personally vote on shareholder resolutions.

Included within the Notice of Meeting, the Company provides explanatory notes on the proposed resolutions.

The Board encourages shareholders to contact the Company at any time with questions or queries. Contact details are published on most ASX announcements, periodic reports and on the Company's website.

Recommendation 6.4

A listed entity should ensure that all substantive resolutions at a meeting of security holders are decided by a poll rather than by a show of hands.

All resolutions at general meetings of shareholders are decided by poll.

Recommendation 6.5

A listed entity should give security holders the option to receive communications from, and send communications to, the entity and its security registry electronically.

Shareholders can register with the Company to receive email notifications when an announcement is made by the Company to the ASX. Further information about how the Company communicates with its shareholders is set out in the Communication and Disclosure Policy, which is available on the Company's website.

Principle 7: Recognise and manage risk

Recommendation 7.1

The Board of a listed entity should:

- (a) have a committee or committees to oversee risk, each of which:
 - (1) has at least three members, a majority of whom are independent directors; and
 - (2) is chaired by an independent director, and disclose:
 - (3) the charter of the committee;
 - (4) the members of the committee; and
 - (5) as at each reporting period, the number of times the committee met throughout the period and the individual attendances of the members at those meetings; or
- (b) if it does not have a risk committee or committees that satisfy (a) above, disclose that fact and the process it employs for overseeing the entity's risk management framework.

The Company manages ongoing risk through the Audit and Risk Committee. The Audit and Risk Committee is tasked with the oversight of risk management and internal control processes. The roles and responsibilities of the Audit and Risk Committee are outlined in Recommendation 4.1 of this Corporate Governance Statement. The Committee consists of Non-executive independent Directors and membership is specified in the Annual Report of the Company.

Due to the size and nature of the existing Board and the magnitude of the Company's operations the committee is currently composed of two (2) Non-executive Directors who are both considered to be independent. The Audit and Risk Committee is chaired by an independent director who is not the Chair of the Board.

Details of meeting attendance for members of the Audit and Risk Committee are set out in the Directors' Report contained in the Annual Report.

A copy of the Audit and Risk Charter can be found on the Company's website.

Recommendation 7.2

The Board or a committee of the Board should:

- (a) review the entity's risk management framework at least annually to satisfy itself that it continues to be sound and that the entity is operating with due regard to the risk appetite set by the Board; and
- (b) disclose, in relation to each reporting period, whether such a review has taken place.

The Board has overall responsibility for the oversight and management of risk, including determining the Company's risk appetite and the approval of the risk management policy.

Risk management is an essential element of good corporate governance and fundamental in achieving the Company's strategic and operational objectives.

The roles and responsibilities of the Audit and Risk Committee are outlined in Recommendation 4.1 of this Corporate Governance Statement.

The Audit and Risk Committee review the entity's risk management framework bi-annually to satisfy itself that it continues to be sound, and that the entity is operating with due regard to the risk appetite set by the Board. The risk management framework was most recently reviewed by the Audit and Risk Committee during the reporting period.

Recommendation 7.3

A listed entity should disclose:

- (a) if it has an internal audit function, how the function is structured and what role it performs; or
- (b) if it does not have an internal audit function, that fact and the processes it employs for evaluating and continually improving the effectiveness of its governance, risk management and internal control processes.

Due to the size and magnitude of the Company's operations, the Company does not currently have an internal audit function. The Board reviews management accounts and reports, including cashflow forecasts, monthly and reviews and amends internal controls processes as appropriate. The Company's external auditors also provide recommendations to the Board where internal control weaknesses have been identified.

The Board does not consider an internal audit function appropriate or necessary at this stage in the Company's development and will continue to review periodically whether circumstances have changed sufficient to warrant the establishment of an internal audit function.

Recommendation 7.4

A listed entity should disclose whether it has any material exposure to environmental or social risks and, if it does, how it manages or intends to manage those risks.

A summary of material business risks faced by the Company that may have an impact on the operating and financial prospects of the Company, including economic, environmental and social sustainability risks, is included in the Directors' Report, which is included in the Annual Report and available on the Company's website.

The Company is involved in pharmaceutical research and development, much of which is contracted out to third parties, and it is the Director's understanding that these activities do not create any significant/material environmental impact. To the best of the Company's knowledge, the scientific research activities undertaken by, or on behalf of, the Company are in full compliance with all prescribed environmental regulations.

Principle 8: Remunerate fairly and responsibly

Recommendation 8.1

The Board of a listed entity should:

- (a) have a remuneration committee which:
 - (1) has at least three members, a majority of whom are independent directors; and
 - (2) is chaired by an independent director,and disclose:

-
- (3) the charter of the committee;
 - (4) the members of the committee; and
 - (5) as at each reporting period, the number of times the committee met throughout the period and the individual attendances of the members at those meetings; or
- (b) if it does not have a remuneration committee, disclose that fact and the processes it employs for setting the level and composition of remuneration for directors and senior executives and ensuring such remuneration is appropriate and not excessive.

The Remuneration Committee provides recommendations to the Board on the remuneration of the Managing Director/CEO, other Senior Executives and Non- executive Directors. The Committee also reviews and approves all remuneration consultancy contracts for key management personnel remuneration and receives any remuneration recommendations.

Due to the size and nature of the existing Board and the magnitude of the Company's operations the committee is currently composed of two (2) Non-executive Directors who are both considered to be independent.

The Remuneration Committee is chaired by an independent director who is not the Chair of the Board.

Details of meeting attendance for members of the Remuneration Committee are set out in the Directors' Report contained in the Annual Report. A copy of the Remuneration Committee Charter can be found on the Company's website.

Recommendation 8.2

A listed entity should separately disclose its policies and practices regarding the remuneration of Non-executive Directors and the remuneration of Executive Directors and other Senior Executives.

Details of executive and non-executive remuneration, including the Company's policy on remuneration, is contained in the Remuneration Report which forms part of the Directors' Report located in the Company's Annual Report. A copy of the Annual Report can be found on the Company's website.

Non-executive Remuneration

Non-executive Directors are remunerated at a fixed fee for their time, commitment and responsibilities. Remuneration for Non-executive Directors is not linked to individual performance, consistent with their independence and impartiality. There are no termination or retirement benefits for Non-executive Directors (other than superannuation).

Executive Remuneration

Remuneration for Executive Directors and Senior Executives consists of a base salary and may include short and long-term performance incentives. Long-term performance incentives may include rights, options and/or shares granted at the discretion of the Board and subject to obtaining the relevant approvals. Executives are offered a competitive remuneration package consistent with market practice which is reviewed annually to ensure continued competitiveness.

Participants in an equity-based remuneration scheme are prohibited from entering into any transaction that would have the effect of hedging or otherwise transferring the risk of any fluctuation in the value of any unvested entitlement in the Company's securities to any other person.

Consultancy Services

No current or former Director, Executive or their related party is engaged for the provision of consultancy or similar services (in addition to their role as a Director or Executive). No consultancy or similar services would be entered into with a current or former Director, Executive or their related party without appropriate independent advice or full disclosure of material terms.

Recommendation 8.3

A listed entity which has an equity-based remuneration scheme should:

- (a) have a policy on whether participants are permitted to enter into transactions (whether through the use of derivatives or otherwise) which limit the economic risk of participating in the scheme; and:
- (b) disclose that policy or a summary of it.

Participants in the Company's equity-based remuneration scheme are prohibited from entering into any transaction that would have the effect of hedging or otherwise transferring the risk of any fluctuation in the value of any unvested entitlement in the Company's securities to any other person. A copy of the Company's Security Trading Policy can be found on the Company's website.
