CORPORATE GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE

The Board of INOVIQ Limited (INOVIQ or the Company) is responsible for the corporate governance of the Group and guides and monitors the business on behalf of its shareholders. The Board has strived to reach a balance between industry best practice and appropriate policies for INOVIQ in terms of its size, stage of development and role in the biotechnology industry. INOVIQ performed a review of its Board policies and governance practices with reference to the eight Principles of Good Corporate Governance (Principles) and the Best Practice Recommendations (Recommendations) established by the ASX Corporate Governance Council. The Recommendations are not mandatory and cannot, in themselves, prevent corporate failure or poor corporate decision-making. They are intended to provide a reference point for companies regarding their corporate governance structures and practices.

The Directors have considered each of the core Principles and Recommendations applicable for the year ended 30 June 2026. There are instances where INOVIQ would not benefit from compliance with the Recommendations, and in some instances INOVIQ has not had the resources to comply. The Recommendations that were not adopted are discussed in the Corporate Governance Statement located on the Company's website.

INOVIQ's Corporate Governance Statement, which summarises the Group's corporate governance practices and incorporates the disclosures required by the ASX Principles, can be viewed on the Company's website at www.inoviq.com/site/investors/corporate-governance.

PRINCIPLE 1: LAY SOLID FOUNDATIONS FOR MANAGEMENT AND OVERSIGHT

ASX Recommendation 1.1: A listed entity should establish the functions reserved to the board and those delegated to senior executives and disclose those functions.

The role of the Board is to represent the interests of shareholders by providing good governance and strategic direction. INOVIQ has adopted a Board Charter setting out the matters reserved to it, including its function and responsibilities and those delegated to management. The Board delegates the responsibility for the administration and operations of the Company to its Senior Executives.

ASX Recommendation 1.2: A listed entity should undertake appropriate checks before appointing a person, or putting forward to security holders a candidate for election as a director and provide security holders with all material information relevant to a decision on whether or not to elect or re-elect a director.

INOVIQ considers the character, industry and other relevant experience, education and skill set, as well as interests and associations of candidates for appointment to the Board and conducts appropriate checks to verify the suitability of the candidate, prior to their election.

INOVIQ ensures that all information in relation to Director(s) seeking reappointment is set out in the Director's report and Notice of Annual General Meeting.

ASX Recommendation 1.3: A listed entity should have a written agreement with each Director and senior executive setting out the terms of their appointment.

The roles and responsibilities of Directors are set out in a Letter of Appointment which Directors commit to on their appointment to INOVIQ. The Letter of Appointment sets out the major provisions such as time commitment, expectations in relation to committee work or any other special duties attaching to the Director position, reporting lines, disclosure obligations in relation to personal interests, confidentiality obligations, insurance and indemnity entitlements and details of the Company's governance policies.

Each Senior Executive enters into an Executive Employment Agreement that sets out the material terms of employment, including a description of position and duties, reporting lines, remuneration arrangements and termination rights and entitlements. Contract details of those Senior Executives who are designated as key management personnel (KMP) are summarised in the Remuneration Report section of the Annual Report.

ASX Recommendation 1.4: The Company Secretary of a listed company should be accountable directly to the board, through the Chair, on all matters to do with the proper functioning of the board.

The Board Charter provides for the Company Secretary to be accountable directly to the board through the Chair. The Company Secretary is accountable to the Board for ensuring the Company's corporate governance processes are adequate. The appointment or removal of the Company Secretary is a matter for the Board.

ASX Recommendation 1.5: A listed entity should:

- have a diversity policy which includes the requirement for the board to set measurable objectives for achieving gender diversity and assess annually the objectives and the entity's progress to achieving them;
- disclose the policy or a summary of it;
- disclose the measurable objectives and progress towards achieving them; and
- disclose the respective proportions of men and women on the board and at each level of management and the company as a whole.

The Company has adopted a Diversity Policy which is available in the corporate governance section of the Company's website.

The Board considers that, due to the small size and nature of the Company, setting measurable objectives for a Diversity Policy at this time is not practical. The Board is conscious of the benefits diversity can bring and will consider setting measurable objectives as the Company increases in size and complexity.

The Company currently has 23 employees (including Directors) of which 13 are women. The Board is currently made up of four male directors and 1 female director. The Company has four senior executives, being the Chief Executive Officer, Founding Scientist & Advisor, Chief Scientific Officer, and Chief Financial Officer & Company Secretary. The CEO and CSO are female and the Founding Scientist/Advisor and CFO/Company Secretary are male.

INOVIQ is an Equal Opportunity Employer and encourages diversity in the workplace.

ASX Recommendation 1.6: A listed entity should disclose the process for evaluating the performance of the board, its committees, and individual directors and whether a performance evaluation was carried out during the reporting period in accordance with that process.

The Board of INOVIQ is responsible for reviewing its own performance to ensure effective structure, strategic oversight, governance, and risk management.

ASX Recommendation 1.7: A listed entity should have and disclose a process for periodically evaluating the performance of its senior executives and disclose in relation to each reporting period where a performance evaluation was undertaken in accordance with a process.

The Company has four senior executives including the Chief Executive Officer, Founding Scientist & Advisor, Chief Scientific Officer, and Chief Financial Officer/Company Secretary. An annual performance review of the senior executives was undertaken during the 2026 financial year in accordance with the Company policy.

PRINCIPLE 2: STRUCTURE THE BOARD TO ADD VALUE

ASX Recommendation 2.1: The board of a listed entity should establish a nomination committee:

- with at least three members the majority of which are independent Directors;
- chaired by an independent Director; and
- disclose the charter of the committee, the members of the committee and the number of times the committee met throughout the period and member attendance at those meetings.

The tasks typically undertaken by a Nomination Committee are the responsibility of the Remuneration Committee. Please refer to Principle 8 – Remunerate Fairly and Responsibly.

ASX Recommendation 2.2; 2.3 and 2.4:

The Directors have a combination of commercial acumen and experience in the biotechnology industry and capital markets, and the Board is looking to further enhance the skillset within the Board via new appointments on an ongoing basis. The relevant qualifications and background of each Director are set out in the Directors' Report section of the Company's Annual Report.

The Board has adopted the Council's recommendation for assessing Director Independence. To be assessed as independent a director must fulfil a number of criteria as outlined in the ASX Corporate Governance Principles. As at the date of this report all Directors are considered independent.

ASX Recommendation 2.5: The Chair of a listed entity should be an independent director.

The Chairman of INOVIQ, Mr Peter Gunzburg, is considered independent.

The role of Chairman and the Chief Executive Officer are not performed by the same person.

ASX Recommendation 2.6: A listed entity should have a program for inducting new directors and provide appropriate professional development opportunities.

The Board of INOVIQ is responsible for providing new directors with an induction to the Company and a program for providing adequate professional development opportunities for directors and management.

The Company provides access to independent professional advice at the Company's expense unless the Board determines otherwise.

PRINCIPLE 3: ACT ETHICALLY AND RESPONSIBLY

ASX Recommendation 3.1: A listed entity should articulate and disclose its values.

The Company has established a Code of Conduct which requires all business affairs to be conducted legally, ethically and with integrity. The Code of Conduct documents all the practices necessary to maintain confidence in the Company's integrity and these practices are in line with the Council's guidelines on good corporate governance. The Board receives the assurance required by ASX Recommendation 4.2 in respect of the financial statements from the CEO and CFO & Company Secretary as required under section 295A of the *Corporations Act 2001*.

ASX Recommendation 4.3: A listed entity should disclose its process to verify the integrity of any periodic corporate report it releases to the market that is not audited or reviewed by an external auditor.

To verify the integrity of periodic corporate reports to the market which are not audited or reviewed by an external auditor, all reports incorporating financial information are prepared by the CFO and reviewed by the Audit Committee Chair, CEO and each member of the Board. All other corporate reports are reviewed by members of the senior management team who are not the original author of the report before board members review and approve the document for release.

PRINCIPLE 5: MAKE TIMELY AND BALANCED DISCLOSURE

The Company Continuous Disclosure Policy complies with the Council's continuous disclosure requirements. The Company ensures that all Directors, senior executives, and employees of the Company understand their responsibilities under the policy. INOVIQ's announcements are made in a timely manner, are factual, do not omit material information and are expressed in a clear and objective manner that allows investors to assess the impact of the information when making investment decisions.

ASX Recommendation 5.2: A listed entity should ensure that its board receives copies of all material market announcements promptly after they have been made.

Material ASX announcements are drafted by Senior Executives before being circulated to the Board for comment, review, and approval. ASX announcements are then only released when Board approval has been received.

ASX Recommendation 5.3: A listed entity that gives a new and substantive investor or analyst presentation should release a copy of the presentation materials on the ASX Market Announcements Platform ahead of the presentation.

Investor/analyst presentations that have been substantially updated and contain new material information are lodged with the ASX before a presentation to an investor/analyst is made.

PRINCIPLE 6: RESPECT THE RIGHTS OF SHAREHOLDERS

ASX Recommendation 6.1: A listed entity should provide information about itself and its governance to investors via its website.

INOVIQ keeps investors informed of its corporate governance practices, policies and announcements made to the market including investor presentations, annual and half yearly financial results by publication on the Company's website as soon as they have been released by the ASX.

ASX Recommendation 6.2: A listed entity should design and implement an investor relations program to facilitate effective two-way communication with investors.

INOVIQ's Chairman, CEO and Company Secretary are the Company's main contacts for investors and potential investors and are available to discuss the Company's activities when requested, together with Directors as required. All ASX announcements contain contact details for investors to allow them to contact the company to discuss the announcement in particular and company progress in general.

ASX Recommendation 6.3: A listed entity should disclose how it facilitates and encourages participation at meetings of security holders.

Shareholders are encouraged to ask questions at the Company's AGM via the Notice of Meeting. The Chairman also invites security holders to ask questions at each meeting of members.

ASX Recommendation 6.4: A listed entity should ensure that all substantive resolutions at a meeting of security holders are decided by a poll rather than by a show of hands.

To reflect the true intent of shareholders, and their respective holdings, substantive resolutions at meetings of members are conducted via a poll.

ASX Recommendation 6.5: A listed entity should give security holders the option to receive communications from, and send communications to, the entity and its security registry electronically.

All shareholders are provided with a choice regarding how they would prefer to receive communications from the company.

PRINCIPLE 7: RECOGNISE AND MANAGE RISK

ASX Recommendation 7.1: The Board of a listed entity should have a committee to oversee risk:

- with at least three members, all of whom are Non-Executive Directors and a majority of which are independent directors;

ASX Recommendation 7.2: The Board or a committee of the Board, of a listed entity should review the entity's risk management framework at least annually to satisfy itself that it continues to be sound and disclose in relation to each reporting period whether such a review was undertaken.

The Company's risk register, documenting INOVIQ's material risks, was reviewed during the 2026 financial year. Importantly managing risks documented within the risk management register is a topic of discussion at each Board meeting.

ASX Recommendation 7.3: A listed entity should disclose if it has an internal audit function and if it does not have an internal audit function that fact and the processes it employs for evaluating and continually improving the effectiveness of risk management and internal control processes.

The Company does not have an internal audit function due to the size of the Company. The Audit & Risk Committee along with the Board as a whole are responsible for risk management and internal control processes.

ASX Recommendation 7.4: A listed entity should disclose whether it has any material exposure to economic, environmental and social sustainability risks and if it does how it manages or intends to manage those risks.

The Company has exposure to economic risks, including general economy-wide economic risks and risks associated with the economic cycle. The Company has in place risk management procedures and processes to identify, manage, and minimise its exposure to these economic risks where appropriate.

The Board considers that the Company does not have any material exposure to environmental risk.

PRINCIPLE 8: REMUNERATE FAIRLY AND RESPONSIBLY

ASX Recommendation 8.1: The board of a listed entity should establish a remuneration committee:

- with at least three members the majority of which are independent directors;
- chaired by an independent Director; and
- disclose the charter of the committee, the members of the committee and the number of times the committee met throughout the period and member attendance at those meetings.

The Remuneration Committee is made up of three independent Non-Executive Directors: Mr Peter Gunzburg, Mr Robert (Max) Johnston and Dr Geoffrey Cumming. The Remuneration Committee is responsible for determining, recommending, and reviewing compensation arrangements for the Chairman, Directors and Senior Executives consistent with ASX Principle 8.

Directors are paid a fixed annual fee for their service to the Company as Non-Executive Directors. Non-Executive Directors may, subject to shareholder approval, be granted equity-based remuneration.

Executives of the Company typically receive remuneration comprising a base salary component and other fixed benefits based on the terms of their employment agreements. They may be eligible to participate in bonus arrangements and may be granted equity-based remuneration, subject to shareholder approval if required.
