The Directors present their report, together with the financial statements, on InteliCare Holdings Limited (referred to hereafter as the 'Company') for the year ended 30 June 2026.

Principal activities

During the financial year the principal continuing activities of the Company consisted of:

- Production of a predictive analytics solution for care providers in the aged care, disability and healthcare sectors
- Sales and marketing
- Research and development activities

Dividends

There were no dividends paid, recommended or declared during the current or previous financial year.

Review of operations

The loss for the Company after providing for income tax amounted to \$2,097,816 (30 June 2025: loss of \$2,244,263).

The 2026 financial year was a period of material commercial progress for InteliCare Holdings Limited (InteliCare or the Company), as the business moved from pilot validation to scaled deployment of its proprietary artificial intelligence-driven care technology. The Company focused on converting successful customer pilots into long-term commercial agreements, executing deployments with leading aged care providers, growing its base of recurring software-as-a-service (SaaS) revenue and continuing to enhance the platform for larger and more efficient rollouts.

The most significant development was the execution of a five-year Master Subscription Agreement with MECWA Limited (mecwacare), InteliCare's largest commercial agreement to date. The Company also progressed its six-facility deployment with Hardi Aged Care, entered the retirement living sector through an agreement with Warrigal Care Limited and maintained its engagement with the Western Australian Country Health Service. These commercial achievements were supported by further product development, the appointment of Angus Cameron as Chief Executive Officer and two equity raisings that strengthened the Company's capacity to execute its scale-up plans.

Commercial progress

mecwacare strategic partnership and rollout

During the year, InteliCare completed the full-facility pilot of its platform at mecwacare's 60-bed Trescowthick Centre in Prahran. The deployment integrated InteliCare with the facility's existing nurse call and care management systems and was assessed against 11 jointly agreed success criteria covering system reliability, care outcomes and operational performance. All 11 criteria were rated as meeting or exceeding expectations.

The pilot demonstrated tangible clinical and operational benefits. The platform achieved 100% fall detection accuracy during the evaluation period, with no missed or false falls recorded. Real-time vital sign and bed occupancy monitoring reduced the number of residents requiring three-hourly overnight welfare checks from 55 to four, supporting improved resident rest while allowing staff to focus on higher-acuity needs. Integration of falls, vital signs, bed-exit events, staff duress and nurse call alerts into a single dashboard improved visibility and response efficiency. Automated falls reporting and live location tracking of equipment, staff and residents also reduced manual processes and supported stronger governance and asset management.

Following the successful pilot, InteliCare and mecwacare signed a five-year Master Subscription Agreement in March 2026. The agreement provides for the staged deployment of InteliCare's integrated analytics, Internet of

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Things, alerts, sensors and nurse call platform across all 22 mecwacare residential aged care facilities, which support approximately 1,600 residents. The agreement has an estimated total contract value of approximately \$8.8 million upon full deployment. Revenue comprises hardware supply, implementation services, recurring SaaS subscriptions and professional services, with each facility subject to a separate order form and deployment milestones. The rollout is scheduled across FY2026 to FY2028.

The agreement also established a broader strategic partnership focused on further innovation, new data-driven care insights and analytics, knowledge exchange and the potential future application of the platform to at-home care and emerging service models. The collaborative work undertaken during the pilot was instrumental in the development and real-world testing of new capabilities for residential aged care, including InteliCare's proprietary nurse call solution.

Deployment progressed during the June quarter, with four mecwacare facilities comprising 223 beds were implemented by 30 June 2026: Trescowthick, Allenvale, Caldwell Manor and Park Hill. At year-end, the Company remained on track with the agreed rollout plan, which targets a total of 10 live sites by the end of calendar 2026.

Hardi Aged Care

InteliCare continued the structured rollout of its platform across Hardi Aged Care's six residential aged care facilities. The fourth site, Seven Hills, was completed during the year, following the earlier deployments at Manly Vale, Blacktown and Wyoming. Monthly SaaS fees were being received from these four sites, with the final two facilities targeted for completion by the end of calendar 2026.

The initial Hardi agreement has a total contract value of approximately \$2.9 million over three years, including approximately \$1.7 million in hardware and implementation revenue and approximately \$400,000 per annum in SaaS fees following full deployment. The rollout has provided InteliCare with an important multi-site reference customer and further demonstrated the platform's ability to be embedded across a provider's operations.

Following year-end, the partnership was expanded to support an additional 84 beds at Hardi's Blacktown facility and a phased deployment of InteliCare's nurse call system across all six Hardi facilities, covering approximately 580 beds.

Warrigal Care and retirement living

During the year, InteliCare signed a three-year Master Subscription Agreement with Warrigal Care, a not-for-profit provider of retirement living, residential aged care and community services across New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory. The agreement represents InteliCare's first commercial deployment in the retirement village sector and has an estimated total contract value of approximately \$200,000, comprising hardware, implementation and recurring SaaS subscription fees. The initial three-year subscription period may be renewed annually thereafter.

The initial deployment covers 65 two-bedroom villas at a new Warrigal retirement living development. InteliCare's sensor-based monitoring solution will provide real-time insights into resident wellbeing, safety and activity patterns, supporting earlier intervention when changes in behaviour or wellbeing are detected. The agreement also creates a pathway for potential expansion across Warrigal's broader portfolio of 10 retirement villages supporting approximately 700 residents, as well as its residential aged care and community services network.

Other customer engagement

Following a successful two-year proof-of-concept project at Koolberrin Lodge in Naremburn, the Western Australian Country Health Service entered into a two-year ongoing subscription arrangement for the InteliCare solution, with three options to extend the agreement for a further year. The continuation of the engagement provided further validation of the platform's value in regional care settings and maintained a foundation for potential broader deployment.

Technology and product development

Product development during the year was guided by the operating experience and feedback generated through the mecware pilot and the Company's multi-site deployments. The development program focused on improving clinical and operational visibility, integrating existing care systems and reducing the time and cost required to deploy the platform at scale.

Key enhancements included a facility manager dashboard providing a single real-time view of resident and facility information; end-to-end falls management, including event classification, reassignment and manual event creation; and the Staff CONNECT application, which provides real-time alarm visibility, location-based search for residents, staff and equipment, and proximity-based alarm closure. Alarm analytics were also expanded to provide greater visibility into call volumes and response times by shift and over 24-hour cycles.

The Company also advanced automation and integration capabilities that support larger deployments. These included automated sensor configuration and calibration, auto-detection and zero-touch setup for newly installed sensors, enhanced nurse call integration, improved real-time location system functionality, a more configurable annunciator application and a new installer application that uses LiDAR to automate spatial data collection and optimise sensor placement. Updates to event confidence categorisation also supported more accurate generative artificial intelligence analysis and event summaries.

These developments are designed to support safer residents, earlier identification of potential changes in wellbeing, more efficient use of care staff and stronger reporting and audit readiness. They also reinforce the platform's alignment with the new Aged Care Act and Aged Care Quality Standards while improving its scalability and deployment economics.

Leadership

Daniel Pilbrow stepped down as Chief Executive Officer in October 2025. During the subsequent transition, Non-Executive Director Tim Chapman served as Interim Executive Director and worked with the executive team and Board to maintain operational continuity and progress the Company's commercial priorities.

In March 2026, InteliCare appointed Angus Cameron as Chief Executive Officer. Mr Cameron brings more than 30 years of international experience across the aged care, health and technology sectors in Australia, Asia Pacific and the United States. His previous senior roles at Philips Healthcare included responsibility for digital transformation, smart hospital strategy and long-term health system partnerships. His appointment coincided with the execution of the mecware agreement and the Company's transition to scaled commercial deployment.

Operating Context

The Company provides a predictive analytics platform to support the aged care, disability and healthcare sectors and uses artificial intelligence as well as a number of advanced software techniques in the development of its solutions. In considering the current and future performance of the Company, investors may wish to take note of the following factors when assessing the Company's strategies and changing circumstances.

Access to skilled staff

The Company invests significantly in product innovation and software development. Access to skilled staff is important to the Company and, during the reporting period, it has been able to attract and maintain staff with the appropriate skills to deliver against its strategic and operational objectives. Looking ahead, the Company expects this situation to remain as, or more, favourable than for the reporting period.

Technological changes

Changes in the development and adoption of new technologies affect the Company's ability to market new solutions to its customers. The Company observes an increasing understanding and acceptance of new technologies, in particular artificial intelligence, in the aged care, disability and healthcare sectors.

Economic developments

During the reporting period inflation emerged as an economic factor along with rising interest rates. This is reported to be affecting discretionary consumer spending in a number of economies, however the Company operates in a business-to-business environment that appears to be less affected by some of these factors.

Financial performance and funding

InteliCare's financial performance for FY2026 reflected continued investment in people, product development and commercial activities as the Company began converting its customer pipeline into contracted deployments and recurring revenue.

Across the full financial year, receipts from customers increased by 114.4% to \$2.12 million, compared with \$989,495 in FY2025. SaaS subscription revenue increased by 79.4% to \$196,799, compared with \$109,715 in the prior year. The Company recorded a total comprehensive loss of \$2.09 million for FY2026, compared with a loss of \$2.24 million in FY2025, representing a reduction of approximately \$143,447 or 6.5%.

In September 2025, InteliCare secured \$2.0 million through a two-tranche private placement supported by new and existing institutional and sophisticated investors. The raising provided funding for the Hardi rollout, continued platform enhancement and the conversion of commercial opportunities. It also enabled the Company to terminate its convertible note facility, simplifying its capital structure.

In May 2026, the Company completed a further placement of approximately \$2.05 million before costs through the issue of 93,000,000 new fully paid ordinary shares at \$0.022 per share. The additional working capital supports the continued rollout of contracted deployments and the Company's broader commercial scale-up activities.

Outlook

InteliCare enters the 2027 financial year with multiple commercial rollouts underway, a growing base of recurring SaaS revenue and a broader opportunity pipeline across residential aged care, retirement living and the wider continuum of care. The Company's immediate priorities are to continue the mecwacare rollout, complete the remaining Hardi deployments, advance the Warrigal implementation, plus sign and convert further pilot and commercial discussions into paid deployments.

The operational evidence generated through the Trescowthick pilot and subsequent multi-site rollouts has strengthened InteliCare's value proposition: improving care outcomes and resident safety, helping care providers use staff more efficiently, increasing management visibility and supporting compliance. The Company's focus is on translating this evidence and its strengthened commercial platform into further contracted growth and an expanding installed base.

Significant changes in the state of affairs

There were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Company during the financial year.

Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

No matter or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2026 that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect the Company's operations, the results of those operations, or the Company's state of affairs in future financial years.

Likely developments and expected results of operations

The Company's principal continuing activity is the commercialisation of the InteliCare product. The Company's future developments, prospects and business strategies are to continue to execute its commercialisation strategy with regards to its predictive analytics hardware and software system which is expected to improve the Company's sales revenue.

Principles used to determine the nature and amount of remuneration

The objective of the Company's executive reward framework is to ensure reward for performance is competitive and appropriate for the results delivered. The framework aligns executive reward with the achievement of strategic objectives and the creation of value for shareholders, and it is considered to conform to the market best practice for the delivery of reward. The Board of Directors ('the Board') ensures that executive reward satisfies the following key criteria for good reward governance practices:

- competitiveness and reasonableness
- acceptability to shareholders
- performance linkage / alignment of executive compensation
- transparency

Non-executive directors remuneration

Fees and payments to non-executive directors reflect the demands and responsibilities of their role. Non-executive directors' fees and payments are reviewed annually by the Board. The short-term incentives ('STI') program is designed to align the targets of the business units with the performance hurdles of executives. 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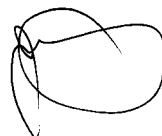

Note 1. General information

The financial statements cover InteliCare Holdings Limited (the 'Company') as an individual entity. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

InteliCare Holdings Limited is a listed public company limited by shares, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Its registered office and principal place of business are Level 1, 299 Vincent Street, Leederville WA 6007.

A description of the nature of the Company's operations and its principal activities are included in the directors' report, which is not part of the financial statements.

The financial statements were authorised for issue, in accordance with a resolution of directors, on 26 August 2026.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Company has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact on the financial performance or position of the Company.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the Company for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2026. The Company's assessment of the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations, most relevant to the Company, are set out below.

AASB 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements

This standard is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027 and early adoption is permitted. The standard replaces IAS 1 'Presentation of Financial Statements', with many of the original disclosure requirements retained and there will be no impact on the recognition and measurement of items in the financial statements. But the standard will affect presentation and disclosure in the financial statements, including introducing five categories in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income: operating, investing, financing, income taxes and discontinued operations. The standard introduces two mandatory sub-totals in the statement: 'Operating profit' and 'Profit before financing and income taxes'. There are also new disclosure requirements for 'management-defined performance measures', such as earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortisation ('EBITDA') or 'adjusted profit'. The standard provides enhanced guidance on grouping of information (aggregation and disaggregation), including whether to present this information in the primary financial statements or in the notes. The Company will adopt this standard from 1 July 2027 and it is expected that there will be a significant change to the layout of the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the Corporations Act 2001, as appropriate for for-profit oriented entities. These financial statements also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ('IASB').

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 3.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Operating segments

Operating segments are presented using the 'management approach', where the information presented is on the same basis as the internal reports provided to the Chief Operating Decision Makers ('CODM'). The CODM is responsible for the allocation of resources to operating segments and assessing their performance.

Foreign currency translation

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is InteliCare Holdings Limited's functional and presentation currency.

Foreign currency transactions

Foreign currency transactions are translated into Australian dollars using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at financial year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in profit or loss.

Revenue recognition

The Company recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the Company: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when the customer obtains control of the goods, which is generally at the time of delivery. Where the goods are not considered to be distinct, the Company combines the obligation to deliver goods with other services until it identifies a bundle of goods and services that is distinct. This typically includes hardware products with associated implementation or subscription services.

Rendering of services

Revenue from a contract to provide its software as a subscription services is recognised over time as the services are rendered based on a fixed price.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the Company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the Company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no right at the end of the reporting period to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are always classified as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. For the statement of cash flows presentation purposes, cash and cash equivalents also includes bank overdrafts, which are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

The Company has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Inventories

Raw materials, work in progress and finished goods are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value on a 'first in first out' basis. Cost comprises of direct materials and delivery costs, direct labour, import duties and other taxes, an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overhead expenditure based on normal operating capacity, and, where applicable, transfers from cash flow hedging reserves in equity. Costs of purchased inventory are determined after deducting rebates and discounts received or receivable.

Stock in transit is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises of purchase and delivery costs, net of rebates and discounts received or receivable.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Right of return assets

Right of return assets represents the right to recover inventory sold to customers and is based on an estimate of customers who may exercise their right to return the goods and claim a refund. Such rights are measured at the value at which the inventory was previously carried prior to sale, less expected recovery costs and any impairment.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the assets, whichever is shorter.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

Leasehold improvements	3-5 years
Plant and equipment	2-7 years

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the Company. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss. Any revaluation surplus reserve relating to the item disposed of is transferred directly to retained profits.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Contract liabilities

Contract liabilities represent the Company's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer and are recognised when a customer pays consideration, or when the Company recognises a receivable to reflect its unconditional right to consideration (whichever is earlier) before the Company has transferred the goods or services to the customer.

Refund liabilities

Refund liabilities are recognised where the Company receives consideration from a customer and expects to refund some, or all, of that consideration to the customer. A refund liability is measured at the amount of consideration received or receivable for which the Company does not expect to be entitled and is updated at the end of each reporting period for changes in circumstances. Historical data is used across product lines to estimate such returns at the time of sale based on an expected value methodology.

Borrowings

Loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received, net of transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Compound financial instruments issued by the Company comprise both a liability component and an equity component. On initial recognition, the liability component is measured at fair value using a market interest rate for a similar instrument that does not have an associated equity conversion feature. The equity component is determined as the residual amount after deducting the fair value of the liability component from the fair value of the compound instrument as a whole.

Finance costs

Finance costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the asset. All other finance costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Defined contribution superannuation expense

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Share-based payments

Equity-settled and cash-settled share-based compensation benefits are provided to employees.

Equity-settled transactions are awards of shares, or options over shares, that are provided to employees in exchange for the rendering of services. Cash-settled transactions are awards of cash for the exchange of services, where the amount of cash is determined by reference to the share price.

The cost of equity-settled transactions is measured at fair value on grant date. Fair value is independently determined using either the Hoadley's or Black-Scholes option pricing model that takes into account the exercise price, the term of the option, the impact of dilution, the share price at grant date and expected price volatility of the underlying share, the expected dividend yield and the risk free interest rate for the term of the option, together with non-vesting conditions that do not determine whether the Company receives the services that entitle the employees to receive payment. No account is taken of any other vesting conditions.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

The cost of equity-settled transactions are recognised as an expense with a corresponding increase in equity over the vesting period. The cumulative charge to profit or loss is calculated based on the grant date fair value of the award, the best estimate of the number of awards that are likely to vest and the expired portion of the vesting period. The amount recognised in profit or loss for the period is the cumulative amount calculated at each reporting date less amounts already recognised in previous periods.

All changes in the liability are recognised in profit or loss. The ultimate cost of cash-settled transactions is the cash paid to settle the liability.

Market conditions are taken into consideration in determining fair value. Therefore any awards subject to market conditions are considered to vest irrespective of whether or not that market condition has been met, provided all other conditions are satisfied.

If equity-settled awards are modified, as a minimum an expense is recognised as if the modification has not been made. An additional expense is recognised, over the remaining vesting period, for any modification that increases the total fair value of the share-based compensation benefit as at the date of modification.

If the non-vesting condition is within the control of the Company or employee, the failure to satisfy the condition is treated as a cancellation. If the condition is not within the control of the Company or employee and is not satisfied during the vesting period, any remaining expense for the award is recognised over the remaining vesting period, unless the award is forfeited.

If equity-settled awards are cancelled, it is treated as if it has vested on the date of cancellation, and any remaining expense is recognised immediately. If a new replacement award is substituted for the cancelled award, the cancelled and new award is treated as if they were a modification.

Issued capital

Ordinary shares are classified as equity.

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of new shares or options are shown in equity as a deduction, net of tax, from the proceeds.

Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the profit attributable to the owners of InteliCare Holdings Limited, excluding any costs of servicing equity other than ordinary shares, by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the financial year, adjusted for bonus elements in ordinary shares issued during the financial year.

Diluted earnings per share

Diluted earnings per share adjusts the figures used in the determination of basic earnings per share to take into account the after income tax effect of interest and other financing costs associated with dilutive potential ordinary shares and the weighted average number of shares assumed to have been issued for no consideration in relation to dilutive potential ordinary shares.

Note 3. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Note 3. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions (continued)

Share-based payment transactions

The Company measures the cost of equity-settled transactions with employees by reference to the fair value of the equity instruments at the date at which they are granted. The fair value is determined by using either the Hoadley's or Black-Scholes model taking into account the terms and conditions upon which the instruments were granted. The accounting estimates and assumptions relating to equity-settled share-based payments would have no impact on the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next annual reporting period but may impact profit or loss and equity.

Revenue from contracts with customers involving sale of goods

When recognising revenue in relation to the sale of goods to customers, the key performance obligation of the Company is considered to be the point of delivery of the goods to the customer, as this is deemed to be the time that the customer obtains control of the promised goods and therefore the benefits of unimpeded access.

Note 4. Operating segments

Identification of reportable operating segments

The Company has identified its operating segments based on internal reports that are reviewed and used by the board of directors (chief operating decision makers) in assessing performance and determining the allocation of resources.

The Company's principal activities are the sale of its predictive analytics hardware and software package for use in the aged care and health industries. These activities are all located in the same geographical area being Australia. Given there is only one segment being in one geographical area the financial results from this segment are equivalent to the financial statements of the Company as a whole.

Major customers

During the year ended 30 June 2026 the Company's external revenue was derived from sales to Australian aged care providers.

Note 27. Financial instruments

Financial risk management objectives

The Company's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including foreign currency risk, price risk and interest rate risk), credit risk and liquidity risk. The Company's overall risk management program focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the Company. The Company uses different methods to measure different types of risk to which it is exposed. These methods include sensitivity analysis in the case of interest rate, foreign exchange and other price risks, ageing analysis for credit risk and beta analysis in respect of investment portfolios to determine market risk.

Risk management is carried out by senior finance executives ('finance') under policies approved by the Board of Directors ('the Board'). These policies include identification and analysis of the risk exposure of the Company and appropriate procedures, controls and risk limits. Finance identifies, evaluates and hedges financial risks within the Company's operating units. Finance reports to the Board on a monthly basis.

Market risk

Foreign currency risk

The Company does not undertake any material transactions denominated in foreign currencies. Significant contracts are denominated in Australian dollars.

Price risk

The Company is not exposed to any significant price risk.

Interest rate risk

The Company is not exposed to any significant interest rate risk. The short-term borrowing held by the Company has a fixed interest rate.

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Company. The Company has a strict code of credit, including obtaining agency credit information, confirming references and setting appropriate credit limits. The Company obtains guarantees where appropriate to mitigate credit risk. The maximum exposure to credit risk at the reporting date to recognised financial assets is the carrying amount, net of any provisions for impairment of those assets, as disclosed in the statement of financial position and notes to the financial statements. The Company does not hold any collateral.

The Company has adopted a lifetime expected loss allowance in estimating expected credit losses to trade receivables through the use of a provisions matrix using fixed rates of credit loss provisioning. These provisions are considered representative across all customers of the Company based on recent sales experience, historical collection rates and forward-looking information that is available.

Generally, trade receivables are written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. Indicators of this include the failure of a debtor to engage in a repayment plan, no active enforcement activity and a failure to make contractual payments for a period greater than 1 year.

Liquidity risk

Vigilant liquidity risk management requires the Company to maintain sufficient liquid assets (mainly cash and cash equivalents) and available borrowing facilities to be able to pay debts as and when they become due and payable.

The Company manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate cash reserves and available borrowing facilities by continuously monitoring actual and forecast cash flows and matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities.

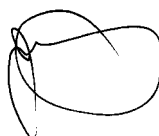
