CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Dear Shareholders,

The Company and its joint venture partner, Mineral Resources Limited ("MinRes") (together the "Marillana JV") has completed all site-based confirmatory technical activities for the Marillana Project ("Marillana"). The Marillana JV is currently further improving the process plant designs to minimise capital and operating costs while maintaining product yield and quality. In parallel, Marillana JV continues to update the approvals of the environmental and social surroundings aspects.

Pursuant to the Marillana JV agreement, the proposed infrastructure solution is to be developed and arranged by MinRes or its subsidiaries. At present, the infrastructure solution has not yet been implemented. A joint venture between MinRes and Hancock Prospecting Pty Ltd ("HanMin JV") is still working on obtaining relevant approvals and consents for their intended infrastructure corridor.

In addition, the Marillana JV continuously reviews alternative solutions and options to ensure the Marillana product can reach export markets in the most efficient manner. Although the progress is not as expected, we remain confident that these matters will be successfully resolved and lead to the commencement of construction and production at Marillana.

I would like to extend my gratitude to the Brockman team for their tireless dedication, and to our shareholders for their steadfast support. I am confident that the Brockman team will ultimately be able to achieve the transformation of the Company.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

FINANCIAL REVIEW

For the year ended 30 June 2026, the Group recorded a loss after income tax from continuing operations of approximately HK\$28.8 million, (2025: HK\$34.6 million). The loss after tax was partially due to the exploration and evaluation expenses incurred, including recognition of the Group's share of the Joint Operation expenditure of HK\$4.3 million (2025: HK\$4.3 million) within the exploration and evaluation expense of HK\$9.0 million (2025: HK\$6.5 million), and interest on loans and other payables of HK\$20.8 million (2025: HK\$16.1 million), was partially offset by a HK\$14.6 million gain on the remeasurement of current and non-current payables (2025: HK\$9.8 million). Also, there was an income tax benefit of HK\$2.7 million (2025: HK\$7.7 million income tax expense), mainly as a result of the recognition of a deferred tax asset in respect of the Group's Australian tax losses for the current period.

The operating loss of HK\$24.9 million (2025: HK\$20.5 million) was higher than the previous year, due to an increase in exploration and evaluation expenditure expensed which includes the Group's share of Joint Operation expenditure.

For the year ended 30 June 2026, the Group's basic loss per share was HK\$0.31 cents (2025: HK\$0.37 cents) and the cash outflows from operating activities were HK\$19.6 million (2025: HK\$18.6 million).

As at 30 June 2026, the Group's net asset value amounted to HK\$454.0 million (2025: HK\$456.4 million) and cash at bank was HK\$3.9 million (2025: HK\$5.3 million).

NATURE OF OPERATIONS AND PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Group comprises Brockman Mining Limited ("Brockman" or "Company"), the parent entity, and its subsidiaries (together referred to as the "Group"). Brockman Mining Limited is incorporated in Bermuda as an exempted company with limited liability and its shares are listed on the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "SEHK") and Australian Securities Exchange (the "ASX").

The principal activities of the Group comprise the 50% owned Marillana Iron Ore Project (Marillana), the 100% owned Ophthalmia Iron Ore Project (Ophthalmia) (from 1 July 2026, refer to announcement published on the SEHK and ASX platforms on 20 August 2026) and other 100% owned regional exploration projects. There have been no significant changes in those activities during the year.

BUSINESS REVIEW

During the year, the Brockman and Polaris Joint Operation has completed all on ground technical studies at Marillana, which continues to demonstrate improved outcomes for the project. Ongoing activities are mainly the refreshment of environmental approvals and hydrological modelling. The Joint Operation between MinRes and Hancock Prospecting Pty Ltd ("Hancock") continues to progress studies and approvals for the new port development at Stanley Point 3 at the port of Port Hedland.

Outside of the Marillana project, the Company continues to advance the exploration activities for the Punda Springs project.



IRON ORE OPERATIONS – WESTERN AUSTRALIA

The segment result was HK\$10 million (2025: HK\$8.0 million). Total expenditure associated with mineral exploration for the year ended 30 June 2026 amounted to HK\$9.0 million (2025: HK\$6.5 million).

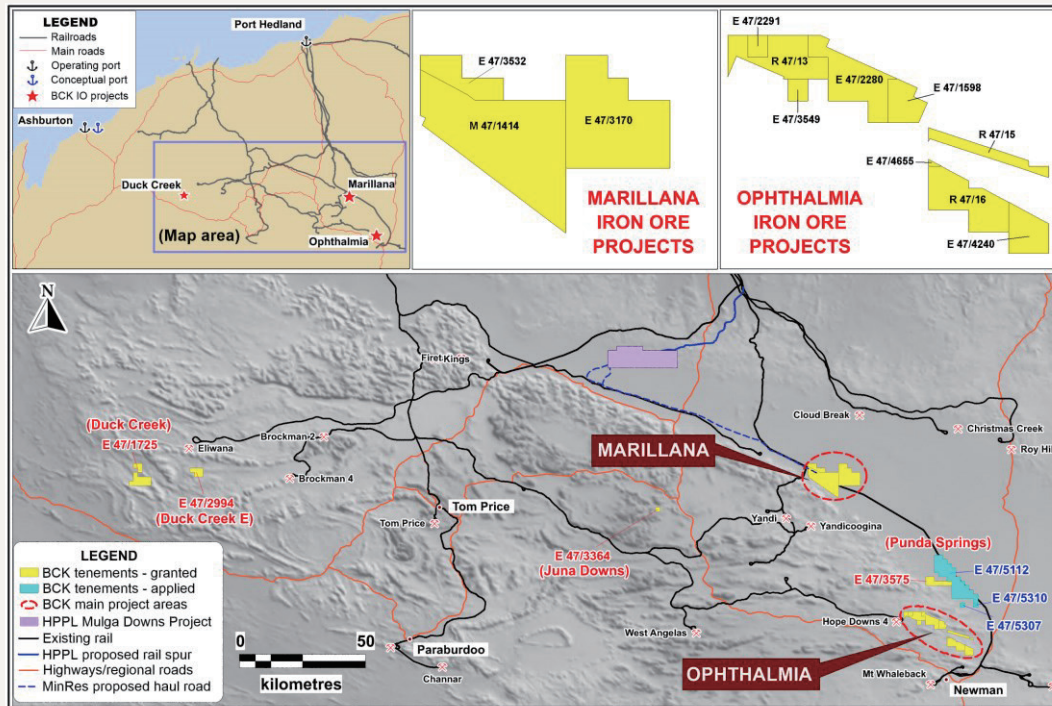

Figure 1: Project location map – Brockman tenements



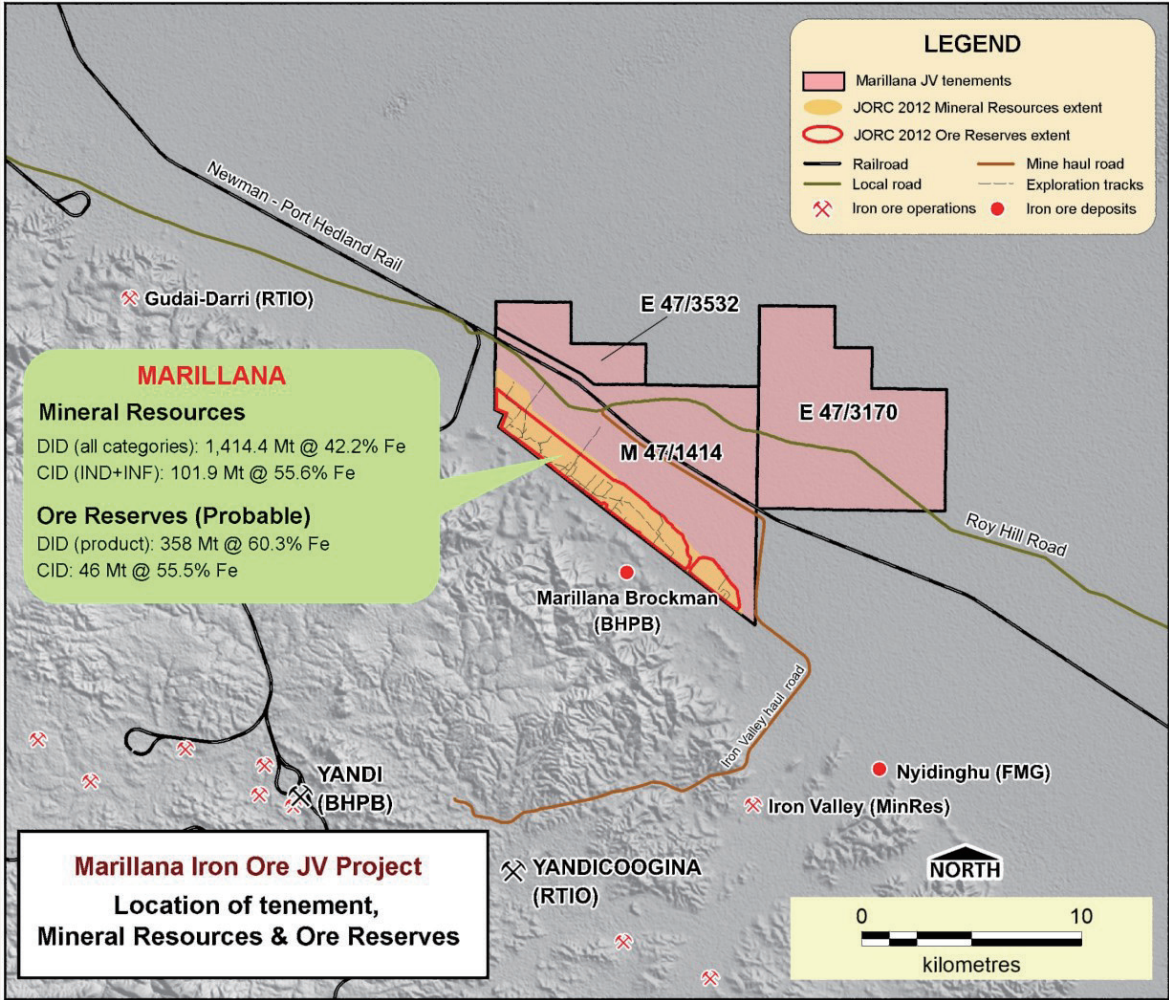
MARILLANA PROJECT OVERVIEW

The 50% owned Marillana is Brockman's flagship project located within mining lease M47/1414 in the Hamersley Iron Province within the Pilbara region of Western Australia. It is located approximately 100 km north-west of the township of Newman (Figures 1 and 2).

The project area covers 82 square km bordering the Hamersley Range, where extensive areas of supergene iron ore mineralisation, the source of hematite detrital mineralisation at Marillana, have developed within the dissected Brockman Iron Formation that caps the Range.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Marillana Development Joint Operation

Formation and scope

In April 2021, the Marillana project became a joint operation between Brockman Iron and Polaris. The terms of the Joint Operation agreement have been detailed in previous annual reports published on the SEHK and ASX platforms.

Initial development works

The initial development works per the Indicative Development Proposal from MinRes (as described in the 2021 Annual Report) are progressing.

Confirmatory technical and due diligence studies by Polaris have been completed. A critical aspect of these studies was the confirmatory metallurgical testwork on the modified process flow sheet. Polaris drilled a total of 18 Bauer drill holes with a 750mm diameter for 695m, producing approximately 622 tonnes of mineralised sample for the metallurgical testwork program. These samples were composited into 3 bulk samples based on geometallurgical parameters and processed through a pilot plant set up at Nagrom Laboratories in Perth, Western Australia. The results from the three pilot plant test runs were positive and consistently demonstrated that the modified process flow sheet could provide enhanced yields of over 45% whilst maintaining product quality above 60.5% Fe. Further review and adjustment to the processing plant flow sheet and design has resulted in a further improvement to the yield, achieving a rate of slightly over 50%.

Sinter testwork on the resulting product has shown that Marillana Fines can substitute for other Australian fines products in a typical Chinese coastal steel mill blend whilst maintaining good physical and metallurgical properties and sinter performance. Materials handling testwork for ore, product, waste and immediate process streams has been completed and the results indicate no materials handling issues.

Pump testing of new bores was carried out and a passive seismic survey comprising of 216 stations on an 800m by 200m grid was completed over the main Marillana deposit. The objective of the survey was to map basement topography and overlying thickness of alluvial, detrital, gravel and other cover units throughout the project area to assist hydrological studies and improved ground water modelling.

Since the Ministerial Approval in 2011 and subsequent renewal, the Environmental Authority ("EPA") have requested additional information for the further environmental approval renewal due to the changes to the assessment criteria since 2011. This review will include any environmental changes to the Marillana project. The new requirements include:

- (i) Updated flora and fauna reporting has certain flora and fauna species have been added or removed from the priority species register, that requires surveys and mitigation measures to monitor and protect these species. The Joint Operation has completed the updated flora and fauna report.
- (ii) A Greenhouse Gas Management Report which includes the projected greenhouse gas emissions from the Marillana project and a plan to mitigate those emissions. The Joint Operation continues to model emissions data in order to complete the report including mitigation measures.
- (iii) Social Surrounds Consultation to assess and engage with the social and cultural context of the community or environment. These consultations aim to better understand and address the social impacts of the project, including the protection of cultural heritage and improvements in community well-being. A Letter of Consent from the Traditional Owner Groups, following completion of the Social Surrounds Consultation, is required to be provided to the EPA.

During the year, an extensive Social Surrounds consultation with the Banjima and Nyiyaparli Traditional Owners continued. The engagement covered the key aspects of the project, including existing approvals, and provided information on changes made since the Ministerial Approval was granted in 2011. The consultation demonstrated that these changes are not expected to have a significant adverse impact on Banjima's social, cultural, aesthetic, or economic values.

This consultation is an important component of the EPA approval process, which includes consideration of Social Surrounds. The Traditional Owners' report has been received and reviewed by the project team, which is working to address any concerns raised during the consultation process.



Feedback received from the Nyiyaparli and Banjima Traditional Owners will help guide the project's environmental approval and monitoring plans, as well as identify key focus areas for the project team to address during CY2026 as further detailed planning and development activities progress.

Social Surrounds Consultation is a requirement arising from the amendments to the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 1972 (WA)* ("ACH Act"), which came into effect in November 2023. Banjima and Nyiyaparli are the two Traditional Owner Groups with whom the Marillana Joint Operation is required to undertake these consultations. This represents a new requirement for environmental approvals under the amended ACH Act.

Consequently, demand for Traditional Owners services has increased. Due to the limited capacity to accommodate this increased demand, delays have been experienced in certain instances.

Work also continues on the development of updated environmental management and monitoring plans to support the project. Water management, greenhouse gas modelling and management plans are being revised, alongside ongoing monitoring of ecological communities, weeds, and regional hydrological baseline data. This work ensures ongoing compliance with all existing approvals.

Infrastructure

On 29 November 2021, MinRes entered into an agreement with Hancock and Roy Hill in which MinRes and Hancock will jointly investigate the development of a new iron ore export facility at the port of Port Hedland's Stanley Point Berth 3 ("SP3") in South West Creek. Under the agreement, Roy Hill will provide services to both MinRes and Hancock for development and operation of their projects (which includes Marillana), including rail haulage.

The development of the South West Creek port will be subject to:

- (a) A grant by the Pilbara Ports Authority ("PPA") of a capacity allocation for the Project, and all necessary approvals and agreements to develop and operate SP3 in South West Creek and the other associated supporting port infrastructure; and

- (b) MinRes and Hancock each electing to make a positive final investment decision to proceed with the Project following the completion of a satisfactory feasibility study.

On 1 February 2022, the Government of Western Australia announced that it had granted a port capacity allocation to the MinRes-Hancock Joint Venture ("HanMin JV"), at SP3 in South West Creek. MinRes has advised that based on this allocation, Marillana has available port capacity to meet the Joint Operation production requirements. The new iron ore export facility at SP3 remains subject to various approvals and agreements to develop and operate, along with the positive final investment decision by MinRes and Hancock. The MinRes-Hancock Joint Venture continues to advance the consents, approvals and engineering studies required to support the final investment decision.

The key access agreements and approvals required for the infrastructure solution are:

- (i) Access and heritage agreements with the respective Native Title parties;
- (ii) Approval from other affected land holders, including pastoral lease holders and interests of other third-party holders; and
- (iii) Finalisation of the State and Federal Government ("Government") environmental and operating approvals.

The finalisation of Government approvals is subject to agreement with the Native Title parties. The timing of these approvals will influence the Final Investment Decision (FID) for the infrastructure solution.

Upon the formation of the HanMin JV, Hancock and MinRes also entered into an agreement with Roy Hill, in which Roy Hill will provide rail and port services to the HanMin JV. The Marillana ore will be transported via road trains to a hub, then via rail on a new rail spur connecting from the hub to the Roy Hill railway. MinRes is advancing studies and pre-development work for a haul road to transport ore to the proposed train loading hub.

Under the FJV Agreement, MinRes is responsible for providing the infrastructure solution to transport the ore from the Marillana project to a port stockyard at Port Hedland and for loading the ore onto ships for export. The HanMin JV will facilitate the delivery of this solution for the Marillana Project.

Final investment decision ("FID")

HanMin JV FID

It is anticipated that FID will be made when the key access agreements and approvals are completed.

The key access agreements and approvals required for the infrastructure solution are:

- (i) Access and heritage agreements with the respective Native Title parties,
- (ii) Approval from other affected land holders, including pastoral lease holders and interests of other third-party holders,
- (iii) Finalisation of the State and the Commonwealth Government environmental and operating approvals.

The HanMin JV continues to work on the studies and approvals for SP3 including agreements with PPA. Such agreements with PPA requires the HanMin JV to make a positive FID.

The Marillana JV continuously reviews alternative solutions and options to ensure its product can reach export markets in the most efficient manner.

Marillana FID

The studies, including engineering design and evaluation, have been completed. A FID on the Marillana project will be made once the following approvals have been obtained:

- (i) Renewal of heritage and environmental approvals, that are subject to the Western Australian Environmental Protection Authority ("EPA") and the Commonwealth Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water ("DCCEE").
- (ii) Approval of the mining proposal from the Department of Mines, Petroleum and Exploration ("DMPE").
- (iii) The HanMin JV FID.

Construction of the infrastructure for the Marillana project is expected to take 26 months from FID.

MINERAL RESOURCES AND ORE RESERVES

Brockman reports its Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves on an annual basis, in accordance with the Australasian Code for Reporting of Exploration Results, Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves 2012 Edition (the "JORC Code 2012"), unless otherwise noted. Mineral Resources are quoted inclusive of Ore Reserves.

In 2018, Brockman updated its Marillana Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves to the JORC 2012 Code (refer to announcement dated 25 May 2018). Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves were previously reported under the JORC 2004 Code and released to the market on 9 February 2010 and 9 September 2010 respectively by Brockman Resources Limited, now a wholly owned subsidiary of Brockman Mining Limited.

Marillana has a Mineral Resource estimate of 1.51 billion tonnes (Bt) of Hematite Detrital Iron (DID) and Channel Iron (CID) mineralisation, comprising 169.5 million tonnes (Mt) of Measured Mineral Resources (DID), 1,046 Mt of Indicated Mineral Resources (DID and CID) and 291 Mt of Inferred Mineral Resources (DID and CID) (see Tables 1 and 2).

The JORC 2012 Ore Reserve estimate is based on the revised JORC 2012 Mineral Resource model, and incorporates a number of factors and assumptions as outlined in the announcement of 25 May 2018.

The base case optimisation was determined with cut-off grades of 38% Fe for DID and 52% Fe for CID within the final pit and tenement boundary limits.

Metallurgical testwork results were used to estimate the recoverable fraction from the DID ore component. Recoveries of final product and grades (of iron, silica, alumina and LOI) were estimated in the block model. Based upon dense media separation (DMS) completed in 2010 by Brockman, the Ore Reserve estimate (as

reported in May 2018) utilised an average expected final product grade of at least 60% Fe at a mass recovery of 37.3%. The latest metallurgical testwork conducted in 2022-23 by Polaris (see section Initial Development Works) has demonstrated that a modified process flow sheet can provide yields of over 45%, providing some potential upside.

The Marillana project has total estimated Probable Ore Reserves of 967 Mt of DID plus 46 Mt of direct shipping CID (Table 3). The total saleable product from the processed detrital iron ore feed (DID) is estimated at 404 Mt averaging 59.8% Fe, 6.1% SiO₂, and 3.1% Al₂O₃ (Table 4). Life of mine strip ratio is 1.0:1 (tonnes of Waste versus tonnes of Ore).

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The Marillana Ore Reserves are based solely on the Measured and Indicated Mineral Resources. The Mineral Resources also include some 273Mt of Inferred Mineral Resources (DID), comprising 201 Mt based on wide-spaced drilling to the north of the Indicated Mineral Resource boundary and 72 Mt of previously Indicated Mineral Resources that was downgraded to Inferred classification during the Projection Pursuit Multi-variate Transform (PPMT) process. Based on historical conversion of Inferred to Indicated Mineral Resources, it is anticipated that additional drilling may enable some of the Inferred material to be upgraded to Indicated classification.

Marillana represents one of the largest published hematite Ore Reserve positions in the Pilbara, outside the three major producers (BHP, Rio and FMG). The Detrital Ore is upgraded to a high-quality, sinter feed product via simple beneficiation, which is supported by

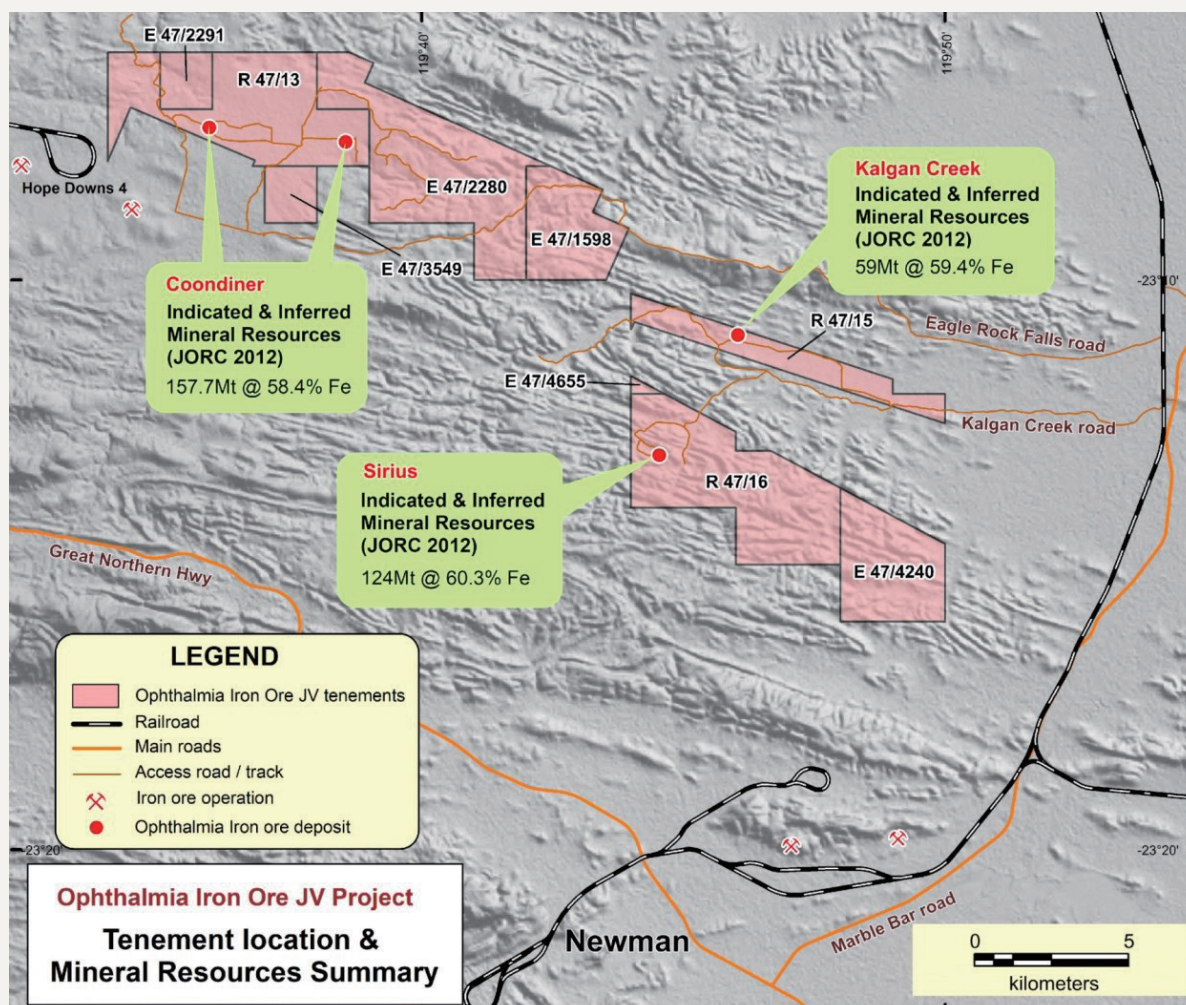
low-cost mining, low waste ratios and large continuous ore zones.

The Mineral Resource and Reserve estimation (refer to Tables 1 to 4) was prepared by Golder Associates Pty Ltd and has been classified in accordance with the Australasian Code for Reporting of Exploration results, Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves (JORC Code, 2012 Edition).

OPHTHALMIA PROJECT OVERVIEW

The 100% owned Ophthalmia iron ore project, located north of Newman in the East Pilbara region of Western Australia (refer to Figures 1 and 3), is the most significant iron ore project for the Company outside of its flagship Marillana project. The total Mineral Resource at Ophthalmia is 341 Mt grading 59.3% Fe (refer to Table 5) (refer to the announcement dated 1 December 2014 on the ASX platforms).

Development

As announced to the ASX and SEHK on 20 August 2026, Brockman East Pty Ltd ("Brockman East"), a subsidiary of the Company and Polaris, mutually agreed that effective 1 July 2026, Polaris surrendered its interest in the Ophthalmia Project. From 1 July 2026, the Ophthalmia Project no longer forms part of the FJV Agreement, and the Company will hold 100% ownership of the Project, allowing it to explore development alternatives.

Brockman plans to continue the exploration, heritage and environmental studies required at Ophthalmia and pursue alternative development options for Ophthalmia.

From the effective date of 1 July 2026, the Company will no longer account for Ophthalmia as a Joint Operation. The Company has also considered the impact of the termination of the joint venture on the carrying value and classification of its Ophthalmia project.

Mineral Resources

Ophthalmia has a Mineral Resource estimate of 340.9 million tonnes of hematite mineralisation, comprising 280 million tonnes of Indicated Resources and 61 million tonnes classified as Inferred Resources (refer to Table 5).

The resource estimate was classified in accordance with guidelines provided in the JORC Code 2012. Refer to ASX Announcement dated 1 December 2014.

PUNDA SPRINGS IRON ORE PROJECT

The 100% owned Punda Springs Iron Ore Project ("Punda Springs"), is located north of Newman in the East Pilbara of Western Australia's Pilbara region. Punda Springs is approximately midway between Marillana and Ophthalmia, which provides for the possible future utilisation of the Marillana and Ophthalmia infrastructure solution for transport of the Punda Springs ore to Port Hedland.

Exploration activities

Initial exploration activities at Punda Springs identified three areas of surface iron enrichment within the predominantly soil covered tenement. Two of these zones were initially tested in 2023 by a drilling programme comprising of 11 reverse circulation drill holes for a total of 582m. Bedded iron ore mineralisation was intersected in 6 holes and on each of the sections drilled.

During CY2025, Brockman completed a follow-up drilling programme comprising 33 reverse circulation drill holes for a total of 2,199m. Drilling was concentrated on

infill and step out drilling at the Eastern Zone at 400m x 200m and 400m x 100m spacing. All holes were drilled vertically, and individual hole depths ranged from 36m to 90m. Drilling has confirmed the grade and thickness of mineralisation and demonstrated that there are at least two separate zones of mineralisation hosted by gently folded and shallow dipping to sub-horizontal Boolgeeda Iron Formation (refer to Figures 4 to 6).

Outside the Eastern Zone, four holes were drilled as an initial test of the Western Zone, that was not tested during the initial 2023 drilling programme. Hole PRC0033 returned an intersection of 22m at 58.7% Fe from 40m (Figure 6), the highest grade mineralisation recorded to date at Punda Springs. This mineralisation remains open along strike mainly to the east and at depth and will be a priority for further drilling.

These results confirm the prospectivity of the Punda Springs project to host significant iron ore mineralisation in multiple zones across the tenement area. Full details of the drilling results are provided in an ASX/SEHK release dated 27 January 2026.

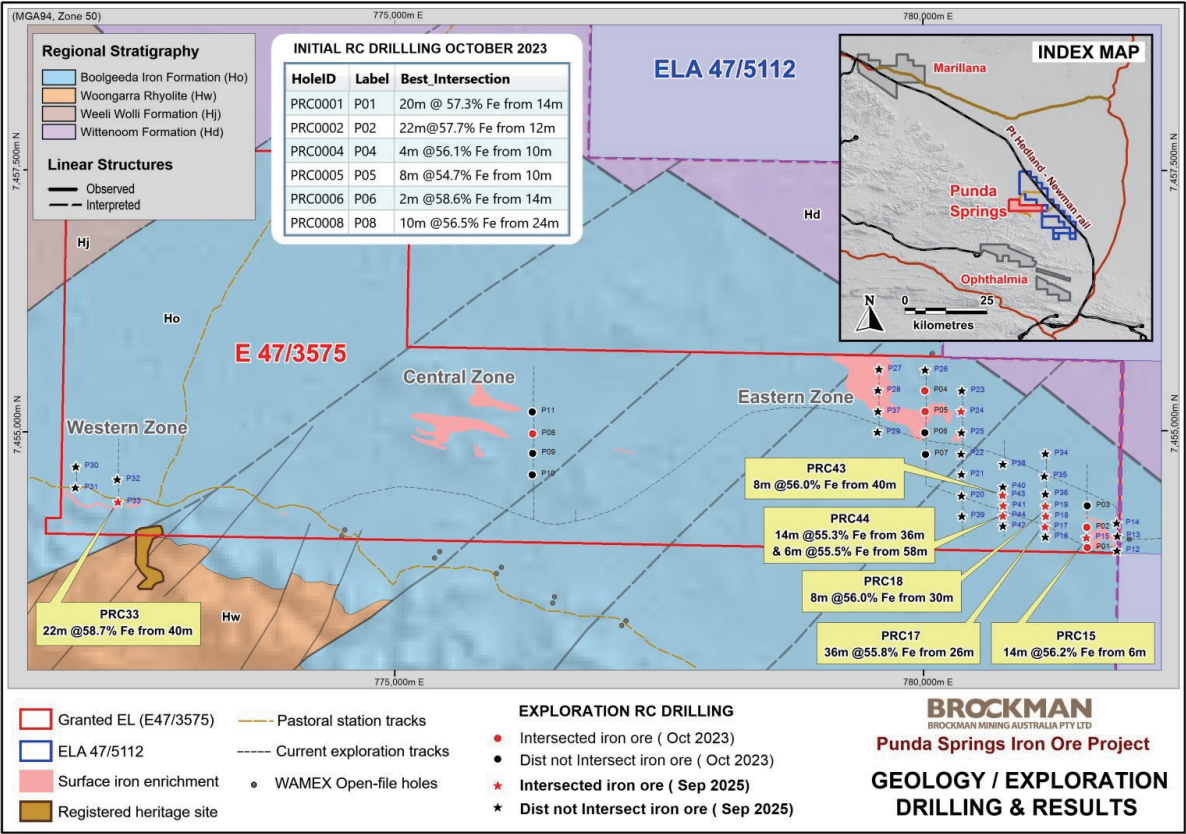
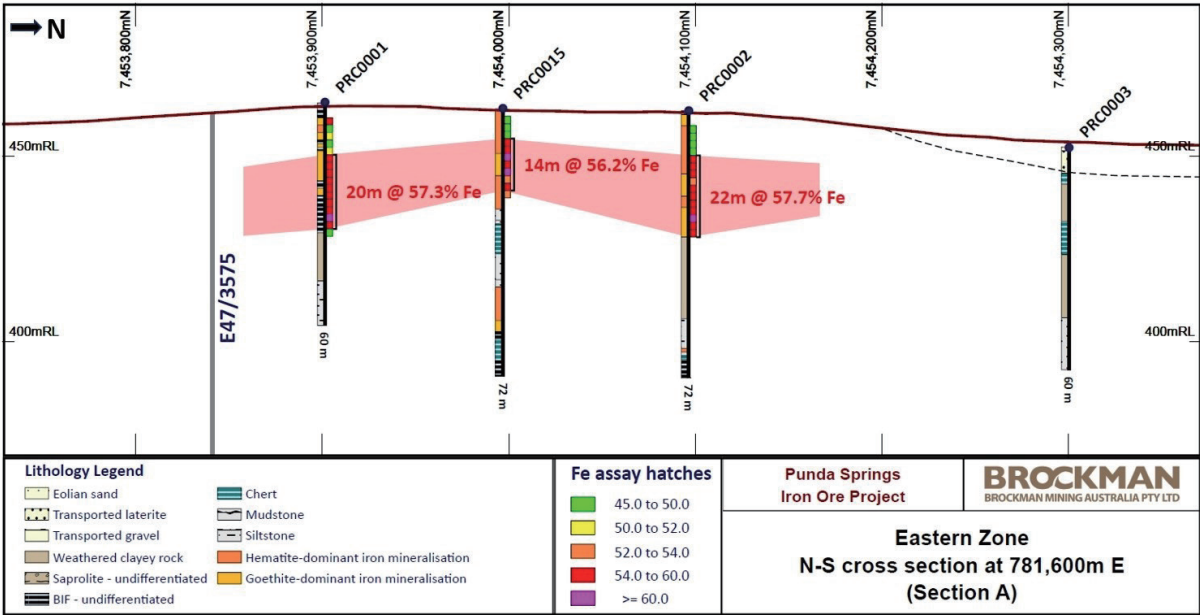
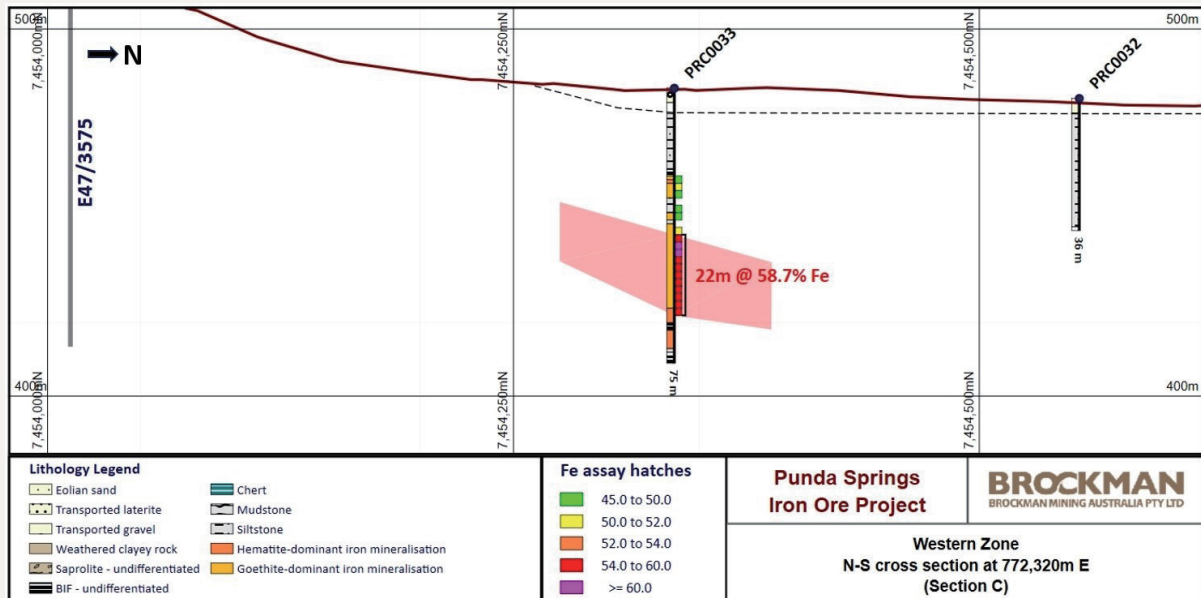


Figure 5 – Geology and drilling cross section 781600mE (Section A)

Mr. Zhang, who is a member of the Australasian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy and a full-time employee of Brockman Mining Australia Pty Ltd, has sufficient experience that is relevant to the style of mineralisation, type of deposit under consideration and to the activity being undertaking to qualify as a Competent Person as defined in the 2012 Edition of the “Australasian Code for Reporting of Exploration, Results, Mineral Resource and Ore Reserves”. Mr Zhang consents to the inclusion in this report of the matters based on this information in the form and context that the information appears.

WEST PILBARA PROJECT

Overview

The West Pilbara project comprises two tenements centred around Duck Creek, located about 100 -130 km WNW of Paraburdoo in the West Pilbara region. (Refer to Figure 1).

Brockman has completed an Inferred Mineral Resource estimate of 21.6 Mt grading 55.9% Fe, for the channel iron deposit (“CID”) mineralisation at Duck Creek within E47/1725 (as detailed in Table 7) (refer to the announcement 25 May 2018 on the ASX platforms). The Mineral Resource estimate has been classified in accordance with the guidelines of the 2012 Edition of the Australasian Code for Reporting of Exploration Results, Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves (JORC Code 2012).

Further work on Duck Creek has been suspended pending resolution of an export solution for the identified mineralisation. A number of port proposals (by third parties) have been investigated, and Brockman continues to monitor for feasible infrastructure solutions for Duck Creek. Based on this, Brockman has been granted retention status by DMPE for the licence.

During the year, Brockman completed the ethnographic and archaeological heritage survey at Duck Creek East. Completion of the heritage survey will support the continued planning of a drill programme at Duck Creek East within E47/2994, located approximately 30km east, to test the conceptual targets identified.

MINERAL RESOURCES AND ORE RESERVES

The information in this report that relates to the Mineral Reserve and Mineral Resource estimates of the Marillana project was declared as part of a market announcement issued on 25 May 2018.

The information in this report that relates to the Mineral Resource of the Ophthalmia project was declared as part of a market announcement issued on 1 December 2014.

The information in this report that relates to the Inferred Mineral Resource of the West Pilbara Project was declared as part of a market announcement issued on 31 August 2020.

The Company confirms that it is not aware of any new information or data that materially affects the information included in the original announcements referred to above. All material assumptions and technical parameters underpinning the estimates in the relevant market announcement continue to apply and have not materially changed. The Company confirms that the form and context in which the Competent Person's findings are presented have not been materially modified from the original market announcements.

MINERAL RESOURCES AND ORE RESERVES GOVERNANCE OF INTERNAL CONTROLS

Brockman ensures that the Mineral Resources and Ore Reserve estimates quoted are subject to governance arrangements and internal controls activated at site and corporate levels. Internal and external review of Marillana Resources and Ore Reserves estimation procedures and results are carried out through a technical review team which is comprised of highly competent and qualified professionals. These reviews have not identified any material issues.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

The Company is very clear on the need to earn the respect and support of the community by operating in a socially responsible manner, and by demonstrating a tangible commitment to environmental sustainability. The Company's projects are subject to environmental regulations under statutory legislation in relation to its exploration and evaluation activities. The Company believes that it has adequate systems in place for the management of its requirements under those regulations and is not aware of any breach of such requirements as they apply to the Company.

LIQUIDITY, FINANCIAL RESOURCES, AND GEARING RATIOS

At 30 June 2026, the Group had net assets of HK\$454,012,000 (2025: HK\$456,414,000), and a closing market capitalisation of HK\$584,655,000 (2025: HK\$853,781,000). The Group assessed whether any indicators of impairment exist and concluded there were no indicators of impairment present, refer to note 17 of the consolidated financial statements.

As at 30 June 2026, the Group had HK\$3,922,000 in cash and cash equivalents (2025: HK\$5,274,000). The Group also had net current liabilities of HK\$4,136,000 (2025: net current assets of HK\$4,084,000). As disclosed in Note 22 to the consolidated financial statements, this balance relates to a payable to Polaris. Pursuant to a mutual agreement entered into by the parties on the 1 July 2026, Polaris surrendered its interest in the Ophthalmia project. Accordingly, the payable is no longer due. At the date of this report, the Group has a loan facility provided by the substantial shareholder with an undrawn balance of US\$2,636,000 (approximately HK\$20,672,000) (2025: US\$3,220,000 (approximately HK\$25,276,000)).

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The Group generally finances its short-term funding requirements with equity funding and borrowings (refer to note 5(ii)) of the consolidated financial statements). The Group's ability to advance its iron ore project development is reliant, among other things, on access to appropriate and timely funding.

The current ratio as at 30 June 2026 is 0.54 (2025: 2.96). The gearing ratio of the Group (long-term debt over equity and long-term debt) is measured at 0.21 (2025: 0.16).

During the year, the Group did not engage in the use of any financial instruments for hedging purposes, and there was no hedging instrument outstanding as at 30 June 2026 (2025: Nil).

CAPITAL STRUCTURE

At the end of the reporting period, the Company had 9,280,232,000 (2025: 9,280,232,000) shares on issue.

PLEDGE OF ASSETS AND CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

As at 30 June 2026 and 2025, the Group has a Deed of Cross Security for the loans advanced by Polaris to Brockman Iron pursuant to the terms of the Marillana Farm-in Joint Venture Agreement, (refer to note 28(a) of the consolidated financial statements) and the right-of-use assets which are subject to lease (refer to note 19 of the consolidated financial statements). As at 30 June 2026, the Company did not have any material contingent liabilities or financial guarantees (note 27(d)) of the consolidated financial statements) (2025: Nil).

SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENTS HELD, MATERIAL ACQUISITIONS AND DISPOSAL OF SUBSIDIARIES, ASSOCIATES OR JOINT VENTURES AND FUTURE PLANS FOR MATERIAL INVESTMENTS OR CAPITAL ASSETS

Save for those disclosed in the consolidated financial statements, there were no other significant investments, held, nor were there material acquisitions or disposal of subsidiaries, associates or joint ventures and future plans for material investments or capital assets during the year, and there was no plans authorised by the Board for other material investments or additions of capital assets at the date of this report.

PURCHASE, SALE AND REDEMPTION OF SHARES

During the year ended 30 June 2026, neither the Company nor any of its subsidiaries had purchased, sold or redeemed any of the listed securities of the Company (2025: Nil).

RISK DISCLOSURE

The Group is exposed to various types of risks on a continuing basis. The Group has adopted policies and procedures designed to manage and mitigate those risks wherever possible. However, it is not possible to avoid or even manage all possible risks. Some of the risks are outlined below but the total risk profile, both known and unknown, is more extensive.

(a) Commodity price

The fair value of the Group's mining exploration properties in Australia is exposed to fluctuations in expected future iron ore price.

We have not used any commodity derivative instruments or futures for speculation or hedging. Management will review market conditions from time to time and determine the best strategy to deal with the fluctuations of iron ore price as required.

(b) Liquidity and funding

The Group is exposed to liquidity risk through its financial liabilities and its obligations to make payment on its financial liabilities as and when they fall due. The Group maintains a balance in its approach to funding using debt and/or equity raisings.

The commencement of exploration and potential development of the iron ore projects will depend on whether the Group can secure the necessary funding.

(c) Risk that the project will not be developed

This risk is largely driven by various factors such as commodity prices, government regulations, regulation related to prices, taxes, royalties, land tenure, viable infrastructure solutions, capital raising ability. The Group may encounter difficulties in obtaining all approvals necessary for its exploration and evaluation activities. It may also be subject to ongoing obligations to comply with approval requirements, which can incur additional time and costs. The Board will closely monitor the development of the project.

**(d) Exchange rate**

During the year, no financial instrument was used for hedging purposes. As at 30 June 2026 and 2025, the Group was not exposed to any significant exchange rate risk.

(e) Social and political

The Group is exposed to other risks that include, but are not limited to, cyber-attack and natural disasters, that could have varying degrees of impact on the Group and its activities. Where available and appropriate to do so, the Board will seek to minimise exposure using insurance, while actively monitoring the Group's ongoing exposure. In addition, the Group's awareness of the risks from political and economic instability have been heightened by ongoing and recent geo-political events.

(f) Interest rate

Fair value interest rate risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. Cash flow interest rate risk is the risk that the future cash flow from a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Group's policy is to manage its exposure to interest rate risk by holding cash in short term, fixed and variable rate deposits with creditworthy banks with no recent history of default. The Group analyses its interest rate exposure and consideration is given to potential renewals of existing positions, alternative financing and or the mix of fixed or variable interest rates.

(g) Credit

Credit risk represents the loss that would be recognised if counterparties failed to perform as contracted. The Group's maximum exposure to credit risk at reporting date in relation to each class of financial asset is the carrying amount of those assets as indicated in the consolidated statement of financial position. Credit risk is managed on a group basis and predominantly arises from cash and cash equivalents deposited with banks and financial institutions.

(h) Safety

Lost time injuries, serious workplace accidents may lead to harm to the Group's employees and other persons; with material adverse impact on the business. The Group continues to work closely with all stakeholders to promote continuous safety improvements and occupational, health and safety ("OHS") with due consideration to management practices and community expectations. The Group ensures it maintains compliance with the applicable laws, regulations and standards by:

- (i) training and ensuring its employees and contractors understand their obligation and are held accountable for their responsibilities;
- (ii) communicating and openly consulting with employees, contractors, government, and community on OHS issues; and
- (iii) developing risk management systems to appropriately identify, access, monitor and control hazards in the workplace.

STAFF AND REMUNERATION

As at 30 June 2026, the Group employed 14 full time employees (2025: 14), of which 5 were in Australia (2025: 5) and 9 in Hong Kong (2025: 9). Total remuneration costs including directors' emoluments amounted to HK\$12,373,000 (2025: HK\$12,613,000). The remuneration policy and packages including share options for the employees, senior management and directors are maintained at market levels and are reviewed by Remuneration and Performance Committee, refer to Note 9 of the consolidated financial statements and directors report on pages 89 to 97.

Remuneration Policy

The Group's compensation strategy is to promote a pay-for-performance culture to reward employee performance that will maximise shareholder value in the long term. The Group periodically reviews remuneration packages provided to its employees to ensure that the total compensation is internally equitable, externally competitive and supports the Group's strategy.

We provide training to our employees to improve the skills and professional knowledge they need for our activities and their personal development, including an initial training induction on work safety and environmental protection upon appointment, and prior to each exploration activity.

The Company has applied the principles of, and complied with, the applicable code provisions of the Corporate Governance Code ("Code") (including the section headed "Part 2 – Principles of Good Corporate Governance, Code Provisions and Recommended Best Practices") as set out in Appendix C1 of the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on the SEHK ("the SEHK Listing Rules") and the ASX Corporate Governance Council's Corporate Governance Principles and Recommendations 4th Edition ("the CGPR 4th Edition"), ("the ASX Principles" or "the ASX Listing Rules") during the year ended 30 June 2026. The Board will review the current practices at least annually and make appropriate changes if considered necessary.

THE BOARD

During the year ended 30 June 2026, the directors provided the Company and its subsidiaries (collectively the "Group") with a wide range of skills, expertise, varied backgrounds and qualifications. Their active participation in the Board and Committee meetings brought independent, constructive and informed judgement on issues relating to the Group's strategy, policies, performance and management process, taking into account the interests of all shareholders of the Company.

The Board has reserved for its decision or consideration matters covers mainly the Group's overall strategy, annual operating budget, annual and interim results, approval of directors' appointment or re-appointment (based on the recommendations made by the Nomination Committee), material contracts and transactions, corporate governance, and other significant policy and financial matters. The Board has delegated the day-to-day management responsibility to the Executive Committee. The functions reserved for the Board of Directors are set out in the Board Charter, a copy of which is available on the website of the Company. The Board Charter is reviewed and updated periodically to ensure it is consistent with the existing rules and regulations.

BOARD PROCESS

Board membership

The Board has been structured for an effective composition, with a balance of skills, experience and commitment to adequately discharge its responsibilities and duties. During the year ended 30 June 2026, three of the seven directors were independent. Whilst this is not a majority of Independent non-executive directors, it is believed to be a suitable balance between the composition of executive and non-executive directors with a wide range of expertise and experience. Their active participation in the Board and committee meetings brought independent judgement on issues relating to the Group's strategy, performance and management process, taking into account the interests of all shareholders of the Company. Each of the independent non-executive directors has made an annual confirmation stating compliance with the independence criteria set out in Rule 3.13 of the SEHK Listing Rules and Principle 2.4 of the ASX Principles. At least one of the independent non-executive directors has the appropriate professional qualification or accounting or related financial management expertise under Rule 3.10 of the SEHK Listing Rules and Principle 2.3 of the ASX Principles. The directors consider all of the independent non-executive directors to be independent under the independence criteria and all are capable of effectively exercising independent judgment.

Mechanisms for independent views and input

The Company has established mechanisms to ensure that independent views and input are available to the Board. These mechanisms include the appointment of an appropriate number of independent non-executive directors, open and constructive participation at Board and committee meetings, unrestricted access to management and the Company Secretary, and the ability of directors to obtain independent professional advice at the Company's expense were appropriate.

During the year, the Board reviewed the implementation and effectiveness of these mechanisms and considered them to be effective.

Board meetings

The Board meets regularly to discuss the overall strategy as well as the operation and financial performance of the Group, and review and approve the Group's annual and interim results and other ad-hoc matters. The Bye-Laws of the Company allow Board meetings to be conducted by way of telephone or video-conference. Any resolutions can be passed by way of written resolution circulated to and signed by all directors from time to time when necessary except for matters in which a substantial shareholder or a director or their respective associates has a conflict of interest. The Board held 6 meetings during the year ended 30 June 2026.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE REPORT

Regular board meetings each year are scheduled in advance to facilitate maximum attendance of directors. The Company provides all directors reasonable notice period (at least 14 days' notice) of each Board meeting to allow sufficient time for the submission of agenda items for discussion. The Company Secretary assists the Chairman of the Board in preparing meeting agendas and ensuring compliance with all applicable rules and regulations. The agenda and the board papers are normally sent to all directors at least 3 days before the intended date of the board meeting. Draft minutes of each board meeting are circulated to all directors for their comment and then approval. All minutes are kept by the Company Secretary and are open for inspection at a reasonable time with reasonable notice by any director.

Every director is entitled to have access to adequate board papers and related materials that are complete and reliable in a timely manner. Also, these papers and related materials are in a form and quality sufficient to enable the Board to make informed decisions. The Board and each director also have separate and independent access to the Company's management and to the advice and services of the Company Secretary. Directors will continuously be updated on

major developments in the Listing Rules of SEHK and ASX and other applicable regulatory requirements to ensure compliance and upkeep of good corporate governance practices. In addition, as part of the mechanism to encourage independent views and input from directors, a written procedure has been established and reviewed annually to enable directors, in discharge of their duties, to seek external independent professional advice in appropriate circumstances at a reasonable cost to be borne by the Company.

According to current board practice, if a substantial shareholder or a director has a conflict of interest in a matter to be considered by the Board which the Board has determined to be material, the matter will be dealt with by the Board at the duly convened Board meeting and independent non-executive directors who, and along with their close associates, have no material interest in the transaction shall be present at the Board meeting. The Bye-Laws of the Company also stipulate that save for the exceptions as provided therein, a director shall abstain from voting on any Board resolution and not be counted in the quorum at meetings for approving any contract or arrangement in which such director or any of their close associates has a material interest.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE REPORT

During the year, the Board reviewed its collective skills, experience, knowledge and diversity with reference to the Group's current activities and objectives. The review considered, among other matters, the directors' industry and commercial experience, leadership and financial literacy, risk management and internal control experience, corporate governance, regulatory and compliance knowledge, ESG and sustainability knowledge, international exposure, and diversity of background, gender, age, tenure and professional qualifications. Based on the review, the Board considers that its current skills mix is appropriate for the Group's existing activities and objectives. However, the Board has identified the following areas for further enhancement:

1. ESG, climate-related risks and sustainability reporting: the Board will continue to deepen its knowledge of ESG governance, climate-related risks and opportunities, sustainability reporting standards, and stakeholder expectations.
2. Digital transformation, data analytics and cybersecurity: the Board will continue to enhance its understanding of emerging technologies, data governance, cybersecurity risks and the opportunities.

To acquire and strengthen these skills, the Board intends to take the following steps:

1. Arrange targeted director training and briefings on technology, cybersecurity, ESG, climate-related disclosure, regulatory developments and industry trends.
2. Consider the identified skills and experience gaps when evaluating candidates for future Board appointments.
3. Encourage directors to participate in continuous professional development relevant to their roles and the Group's activities.

CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Mr. Kwai Sze Hoi, the Chairman of the Board is primary responsible for the leadership of the Board, ensuring that (i) all significant policy issues are discussed by the Board in a timely and constructive manner, (ii) all directors are properly briefed on issues arising at Board meetings, (iii) the directors receive in a timely manner, adequate information, which must be accurate, clear, complete and reliable, and (iv) responsibility for ensuring good corporate governance practices and procedures are established.

The Chairman has interests in the shares of the Company and is not independent as he is a substantial shareholder of the Company. The Board has determined that the Chairman's commercial experience is more beneficial to shareholders at this stage of the Company's development than the independence requirement outlined in the ASX Principles and the SEHK Listing Rules.

The position of Chief Executive Officer ("CEO") at the Group level has been vacant during the year. Mr. Colin Paterson, an executive director of the Company, also serves as the Chief Executive Officer of Brockman Mining Australia Pty Ltd (a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company), and is responsible for the oversight of the core iron ore business activities that includes implementing strategic objectives, plans and budgets approved by the Board, and other responsibilities delegated to him by the Board from time to time.

The roles of Chairman and CEO, held by separate individuals are clearly distinct to ensure an appropriate balance of decision making power and authority, and to prevent the concentration in any one member of the Board. There is a clear division of responsibilities between the Chairman and CEO.



APPOINTMENT AND RE-ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

The terms of reference of the Nomination Committee include the nomination procedure specifying the process and criteria for the selection and recommendation of candidates for directorship of the Company. Upon appointment, each director and executive has a written agreement outlining the terms of their appointment. No directors' service contract contains a provision requiring greater than one year's notice or requires compensation greater than one year's emoluments. Every newly appointed director will receive an induction package from the Company Secretary on their appointment. The induction package is a comprehensive, formal and tailored induction on the responsibilities and on-going obligations to be observed by a director pursuant to the Australian Corporations Act 2001, Hong Kong Companies Ordinance, the Listing Rules and Securities and Futures Ordinance. In addition, this induction package includes materials briefly describing the activities of the Company, the latest published financial reports of the Company and documentation for the corporate governance practices adopted by the Board. Directors will be continuously updated on any major developments of the Listing Rules and other applicable regulatory requirements to ensure compliance and upkeeping of good corporate governance practices.

In accordance with the Bye-Laws of the Company and to comply with relevant SEHK and ASX Listing Rules, every director should be subject to retirement by rotation at least once every three years. Non-executive directors are appointed for a fixed term of 3 years. Shareholder approval is required for the appointment of directors and directors appointed to fill a casual vacancy should be subject to re-election at the first annual general meeting ("AGM") after their appointment and not less than one-third of the directors should be subject to retirement and re-election every year. The Company provides shareholders with all material information in its possession, relating to directors standing for election or re-election. This information is in the Notice of Meeting issued prior to the AGM and includes details of each directors' expertise and qualifications, other directorships held, and any additional information that the Board considers relevant to shareholders' decision making.

In considering the appointment or re-appointment of directors, in addition to the diversity criteria set out in the paragraphs "Board Diversity", the Board, with the assistance and recommendation from the Nomination Committee, will also take into account a number of factors, including, but not limited to, the structure, size and composition of the Board, the candidate's qualifications and their ability to devote sufficient time as and when required to discharge their responsibilities as a director and to make positive contribution to the development of the Company's strategy, policies and performance.

DIRECTORS' CONTINUOUS PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Company is committed to ensuring that directors continually update their knowledge and skills to fulfil their responsibilities effectively and to contribute to the long-term success of the Group. During the year ended 30 June 2026, all directors participated in continuous professional development (CPD) programmes covering topics prescribed under the Listing Rules, including directors' duties and responsibilities, listing rules and regulatory updates, corporate governance and ESG matters, risk management and internal controls and industry-specific developments.

The directors received training through the following modes:

- Attendance at external professional seminars, conferences and training courses,
- Reading regulatory updates, legal and professional publications and other self-study materials relevant to the directors' duties and the Group's activities.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE REPORT

The Company has maintained training records for all directors and has obtained confirmations from each director regarding their participation in CPD activities during the reporting period. The Board is satisfied that all directors have complied with the applicable CPD requirements under the Listing Rules throughout the year ended 30 June 2026. The Board is responsible for performing corporate governance duties and has adopted the written terms of reference on its corporate governance functions. The duties of the Board in respect of the corporate governance functions include:

- (i) developing and reviewing the Company's policies and practices on corporate governance;
- (ii) reviewing and monitoring the training and continuous professional development of Directors and senior management;
- (iii) reviewing and monitoring the Company's policies and practices on compliance with legal and regulatory requirements;
- (iv) developing, reviewing and monitoring the Code of Conduct; and
- (v) reviewing the Company's compliance with the Code, CGPR 4th Edition and disclosure in the Corporate Governance Report.

During the year ended 30 June 2026 and up to the date of this report, the Board has performed these Corporate Governance duties in accordance with its terms of reference of the Board Charter.

COMPANY SECRETARY

During the year, Mr Chan Kam Kwan Jason was an employee of the Company and acted as its Company Secretary. Mr Chan possesses the relevant experience of a Company Secretary as required under Rule 3.28 of the SEHK Listing Rules. The Company Secretary is responsible and accountable directly to the Chairman of the Board and all directors have access to the services and advice of the Company Secretary. The Company Secretary is responsible for ensuring that board procedures are followed and facilitating communications with directors, shareholders and management and compliance with the continuing obligations of the SEHK and ASX Listing Rules, and The Code on Takeovers and Mergers and Share Repurchases, including publication and dissemination of Company information.

Mr Chan has undertaken no less than 15 hours of professional training to update his skills and knowledge and hence has complied with the relevant training requirement under Rule 3.29 of the SEHK Listing Rules and 2.6 of the ASX Principles during the year ended 30 June 2026. The biographical details of Mr. Chan Kam Kwan, Jason is set out in the biographies of Directors and Senior Management on page 22.

Language of meetings

All key corporate and shareholder documents are prepared in both English and Chinese. All Board meetings are conducted in English and all directors are capable of communicating in English and are able to contribute to discussions and can discharge their obligations accordingly. Shareholder meetings are conducted bi-lingually, in English and Cantonese.

BOARD COMMITTEES

The Board has established various committees, including a Nomination, Remuneration and Performance, Audit, Risk Management and a Health, Safety, Environment and Sustainability Committees in accordance with the Listing Rules and ASX Principles, each of which has its specific written terms of reference. Copies of minutes of all meetings and resolutions of the committees, which are kept by the Company Secretary, are circulated to all Board members. Committees are required to report back to the Board on their decisions and recommendations where appropriate. The procedures and arrangements for Board meetings, as outlined in the section "Board Meetings" of this report, have been adopted for Committee meetings as far as practicable.

NOMINATION COMMITTEE

The Board has a Nomination Committee which carries out its duties in accordance with the Terms of Reference and Nomination Policy, a copy of which is available on the Company's website.

The Nomination Committee's primary roles and functions are:

- Identify suitably qualified candidates to become board members and select or make recommendations to the Board on the selection of individuals nominated for directorships;
- Succession planning for the Board and senior management;
- The appointment and re-election of directors;
- Review the skills and experience, structure, size and composition of the Board to enable it to discharge its duties as directors and actively participate in the Group's strategy, policies and performance;
- Assess the independence of the independent non-executive directors; and
- Provide assistance and support to the Board in relation to the Board evaluation process, including coordinating evaluation activities and reviewing outcomes.

The Nomination Committee is provided with sufficient resources to discharge its duties and, where considered necessary access to independent professional advice at the Company's expense in accordance with the Company's policy.

Nomination policy

The Nomination Committee has formulated and set out the Nomination Policy in its terms of reference. The objectives of the Nomination Policy are to ensure that the board maintains a balanced mix of skills, experience and diverse of perspectives appropriate to the Company's business needs and that directors are able to devote sufficient time and make contributions in line with their role and board responsibilities. The Board shall comprise a balanced mix of executive and non-executive directors (including independent non-executive directors) to ensure a strong independent element that can effectively exercise independent judgement.

Any candidate who is proposed as an independent non executive director, must satisfy all the independence requirements as set out in Rule 3.13 of the SEHK Listing Rules and appointment of independent non-executive directors are for specific terms. All terms of appointment of non-executive directors and the independent non-executive directors of the Company are subject to the relevant provisions of the Bye-Laws or any other applicable laws.

To ensure changes to the Board composition can be managed without undue disruption, a formal, considered and transparent procedure is in place for the selection, appointment and reappointment of directors, as well as plans are in place for orderly succession (if considered necessary), including

periodical review of such plans. The appointment of a new director (to be an additional director or fill a casual vacancy as and when it arises) or any re-appointment of directors is a matter for decision by the Board upon the recommendation of the proposed candidate by the Nomination Committee.

Nomination procedures

The procedure for the nomination of a candidate as a new director is subject to the provisions in the Company's Bye-Laws. The procedure for nomination is as follows:

- The Board determines the required skilled set, relevant expertise and experience, having regard to the current board composition and size and shareholder structure of the Company;
- The committee is provided with a list of the proposed candidate(s) including biographical details such as their relationship with the Company and/or directors, current directorships, relevant skills and experience, other positions involving a significant time commitment and any other particulars required by law;
- The appointment of an additional independent non-executive director requires that the board obtains all information in relation to the proposed appointment which will allow the Board to adequately address the independence of the director; and
- The Chairman of the committee, Chairman of the Board and Company Secretary agree on the preferred candidate and the letter of appointment is approved by the Board.



Measures for selection

The criteria for determining whether a candidate is qualified shall include their ability to devote sufficient time and attention to the affairs of the Company contribute to the diversity of the Board (including gender diversity) and the effectively carrying out the responsibilities of the Board. By adopting such criteria, the Company is able to develop a pipeline of candidates for the Board to achieve its strategic objectives. Further details of the measures, selection and the procedures are set out in the terms of reference of the Nomination Committee, which are available on the Company's website.

Assessment of directors' time commitment and contribution

During the year ended 30 June 2026, the Committee conducted an annual assessment of each Director's time commitment and contribution to the Board. The assessment was conducted in accordance with the Company's nomination policy, the terms of reference of the Nomination Committee.

Assessment process

The Committee adopted the following process in conducting the assessment:

1. Collection of information: Each director was requested to provide or confirm information relating to their board and committee attendance,

time spent on Board and committee matters, other directorships, major external appointments, training and continuing professional development, and any other significant commitments during the year.

2. Review of participation and contribution: The Committee reviewed each director's participation in Board and committee meetings, including attendance, preparation, and quality of contribution.
3. Review of external commitments: The Committee considered each director's other directorships, other board appointments, executive roles, advisory positions and other significant external commitments, including whether any such commitments could affect the director's ability to devote sufficient time and attention to the Company.
4. Assessment against consistent criteria: consistent set of assessment criteria was applied to all directors.
5. Committee discussion and conclusion: The Committee considered the results of the assessment collectively and reported its findings to the Board.

- Directors participated in training and continuing professional development relevant to their duties, and
- No matter came to the attention of the committee indicating that any director was unable to devote sufficient time and attention to the Company's affairs.

Accordingly, the committee is satisfied that, for the year ended 30 June 2026, the time commitment and contribution of the directors to the Board, both individually and collectively, were adequate and appropriate for the effective discharge of the Board's responsibilities.

The nomination committee will meet as and when necessary, in accordance with its terms of reference and may also deal with matters by way of circular resolution. During the year ended 30 June 2026 and up to date of this report, the Nomination Committee performed the following work:

- (i) Reviewed and recommended for the Board's approval the proposed resolution for re-election of each retiring Director at the 2025 AGM;
- (ii) Acknowledged the retirement of Mr. Ross Stewart Norgard as a non-executive director by rotation at the 2025 AGM and not offering himself for re-election;

- (iii) Reviewed the structure, size, composition and diversity of the Board and assessed the qualifications, time commitments, contribution and independence of each independent non-executive director;
- (iv) Reviewed, updated and recommended for the Board's approval the revised terms of reference of Nomination Committee;
- (v) Reviewed and recommended for Board's approval the time commitment and contribution of the directors; and
- (vi) Reviewed the board Diversity Policy.

DIVERSITY

Board diversity

The Company has adopted a Board Diversity Policy which sets out the objectives and principles for promoting diversity on the Board with the aim of supporting the Company's strategic objectives of achieving balanced representation as far as practicable. The Company considers that diversity of Board members can be achieved through consideration of a number of aspects, including but not limited to, gender, age, cultural and educational background, professional experience, skills, knowledge and length of service. The ultimate decision will be based on merit and the contribution that the selected candidates may bring to the board. Board appointments will be based on merit, and candidates will be considered against measurable objectives, taking into account the Company's business activities.

The proportion of female board representation is a measurable objective of the Company in assessing the implementation of the diversity policy. The board currently has one female director out of seven directors, achieving the gender diversity of the Board at 14% (2025: 13%). The board targets to maintain at least the current level of female representation, with the ultimate goal of increasing the proportion of female members over time as and when suitable candidates are identified. The seven directors are from diverse and complementary backgrounds, including management, exploration, mergers and acquisitions, accounting and finance management. The valuable experience and expertise they bring to our business is critical for the long term growth of the Group.



During the year, the Board conducted an annual review of the implementation and effectiveness of the Board Diversity Policy and is satisfied that the Board Diversity Policy has been properly implemented and is effective.

Workplace diversity

The Company and its subsidiaries are committed to workplace diversity and recognise the benefits arising from employee diversity, including having a broader pool of quality and talented employees, improving employee retention, and being able to access different perspectives. Diversity includes, without limitation, different gender, age, ethnicity and cultural backgrounds.

As of 30 June 2026 the ratio of the number of male to female employees is approximately 79% to 21% (2025: 79% to 21%). The Group recognises, and endeavours to protect the rights of its employees and is committed to providing equal opportunities. The Group engages in transparent and fair recruitment practices, and fair

remuneration and disciplinary decisions without regard to gender, age, family position or ethnic background.

During the year, the Board conducted an annual review of the implementation and effectiveness of the Workplace Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Policy.

The Remuneration and Performance Committee is provided with sufficient resources to discharge its duties and has access to independent professional advice at the cost of the Company according to the Company's policy if considered necessary.

Performance review of the Board and Committees

The Remuneration and Performance Committee oversees the periodic an evaluation process for the Board, its committees and each director.

The Board

Periodically, a review is conducted of the Board's structure and operation, the skills and characteristics required to maximise its effectiveness and whether the mix of skills, experience and expertise, as well as the Board's practices and procedures remain appropriate to meet the Company's current and future needs. As set out, in the Board Charter, this review forms part of the Board performance evaluation process.

Board committees

Directors provide periodically written feedback on the performance of the Board, its committees, and individual directors against a predetermined set of evaluation criteria. At same time, each committee will be required to conduct a review of its own performance and provide feedback accordingly. The Board will discuss the feedback and consider whether any improvements are required. Where appropriate, assistance from an independent third party advisors maybe obtained to facilitate the review process.

Directors

Directors are evaluated on, amongst other things, their alignment with the values of the Company, their commitment to their duties. Periodically a performance review is conducted by the Chairman for each director.

During the year, the Board conducted an informal evaluation of its performance, together with assessment of the committees, and individual directors. The evaluation covered Board composition, governance effectiveness, strategic oversight and risk management, and ESG governance. The evaluation concluded that the Board and its committees operated effectively and fulfilled their responsibilities in accordance with the Company's governance and the SEHK Corporate Governance Code. Areas identified for enhancement have been considered and incorporated.

Performance Review – Executives

Th executives' performance is reviewed on a periodic basis and evaluated by the Committee. This evaluation is undertaken by each executive completing a questionnaire on their performance or each executive having a one-to-one interview with the Chairman of the Committee.

Remuneration of non-executive directors

The Board is determined to attract and retain high calibre non-executive directors to the Company, whilst at the same time preserving cash flow. Accordingly, the structure of the non-executive directors' remuneration allows for remuneration in the form of share options, granted under the share scheme. Whilst this represents a departure from the Code and Principles, the Committee believes it is appropriate for the size of the Company, and is satisfied that all director participation in the share scheme is approved by Shareholders and the grant aligns with the long term performance of the Company. The Company's Bye-laws provide that the directors' remuneration shall be determined by the Company in a general meeting. The Company has fixed a maximum sum of A\$1 million in aggregate for non-executive directors per annum, unless otherwise and approved by the Shareholders.

Remuneration of Executive Directors

The Remuneration and Performance Committee is responsible for reviewing compensation arrangements for the executive directors, including the chief executive officer and the executives. The Company has adopted model (ii) as set out in code provision E1.2.(c) of the Corporate Governance Code, under which the Remuneration and Performance Committee makes recommendations to the Board on the remuneration packages of individual executive directors and executives. The committee periodically assesses the appropriateness of the nature and amount of remuneration for directors and executives by reference to relevant employment market conditions. The overall objective is to ensure that the Company maximises stakeholder value through the retention and motivation of a high quality Board members and executives.



Executive compensation framework

The Company aims to reward executives with a level and mix of compensation commensurate with their position and responsibilities within the Company. The Remuneration and Performance Committee is assisted in the process by the use of independent salary data, if applicable. The executive pay and reward framework has two components: base pay and long-term incentives through participation in the 2023 Share Scheme. However, there remains material uncertainty as to whether the Group can raise sufficient funds (refer to Note 2(a) of the consolidated financial statements), which may cast significant doubt about the Group's ability to continue as a going concern. The consolidated financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2026 have been prepared in accordance with the

International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB") and the disclosure requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. The directors believe that they have selected suitable accounting policies and applied them consistently and made judgments and estimates that are prudent and reasonable and have ensured that the consolidated financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis. The reporting responsibilities of the Company's external auditor, Ernst and Young, are set out in the Independent Auditor's report on pages 98 to 102.

Confirmation of compliance

Although the Company is not required to comply with Section 295A of the Australian Corporations Act 2001 (being a company incorporated in Bermuda), the Board requires an executive director to state in writing to the Board that:

"The financial records of the Company have been properly maintained and the financial statements comply with the appropriate accounting standards and give a true and fair view of the Company's financial position and performance, and that the opinion has been based on a sound system of risk management and internal control which is operating effectively".

AUDITORS' REMUNERATION

The remuneration paid to the Group's external auditors during the year ended 30 June 2026 is set out in the Directors' Report on page 97 and note 34 of the consolidated financial statements.

Ernst and Young Australia, the auditor of the Company, is a non-Hong Kong audit firm which has obtained approval from the Accounting and Financial Reporting Council as a recognised public interest entity ("PIE") auditor to conduct the PIE audit engagement of the Company.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Board has established the Executive Committee and delegated the responsibility for the day-to-day management of the Group. The committee is empowered to implement policies and strategies, relating to the Group's activities and administration. It exercises the general powers of management and control as delegated by the Board, save for those matters that are reserved for the Board's decision and approval. The committee comprises of executive directors and executives appointed by the Board and convenes as required to discharge its responsibilities.

Whilst the risk management committee was not chaired by an independent director, but it is comprised of majority of independent directors, who do not participate in the daily activities of the Group. The Company considers that objectivity can still be maintained with such arrangements.

Risk management and internal control

The Board acknowledges its responsibility for the Group's risk management and internal control systems and for reviewing their effectiveness. It oversees management in the design, implementation and monitoring of these systems, which encompass all material controls, including financial, compliance and ESG related controls. The Board is also responsible for evaluating and determining the nature and extent of the risks that the Group is willing to undertake in achieving its objectives.

The Group's risk management and internal control systems are designed to provide reasonable, but not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss. These systems are intended to manage, rather than eliminate, the risk of failure to achieve the Group's objectives and goals. Accordingly, they can only provide reasonable assurance against material misstatement, loss, fraud or non-compliance.

These systems also support the maintenance of proper accounting records, the reliability of financial reporting and compliance with relevant laws and regulations.

Risk identification, evaluation and monitoring

The Group has established systems and procedures to identify, assess and monitor risks arising from its activities. Management is responsible for identifying and assessing risks on an ongoing basis, and the reporting of significant risk matters and control issues to the Risk Management Committee.

As part of the risk management process, the Group considers changes in its activities, regulatory requirements, financial reporting obligations, compliance requirements and ESG-related risks. The results of the risk assessment are reviewed by management and reported to the Risk Management Committee, which evaluates the adequacy of the corresponding risk responses, the effectiveness of key controls and the progress of remediation actions where control enhancements are required.

Annual review process

During the year ended 30 June 2026, the Company conducted an annual assessment of the effectiveness of the Group's risk management and internal control systems. The review covered the Group's activities, material controls including financial, compliance, and considered the following areas:

- Changes in the nature and extent of significant risks faced by the Group since the previous annual review, and
- The adequacy of the Group's accounting staff in terms of resources, qualifications, experience, training programmes and budget.



Review findings

The findings of the annual assessment were presented to the Risk Management Committee for review. The Committee discussed the assessment results, reviewed the key findings and recommendations and reported its conclusions and recommendations to the Board for consideration.

Based on the review conducted for the year, the Risk Management Committee and the Board noted that the Group's risk management and internal control systems operated as intended and remained effective and adequate for the Group's activities. No material internal control deficiencies or control failures were identified that had, or could reasonably be expected to have, a material adverse effect on the Group's financial performance and financial position.

The Board is satisfied that the Group's risk management and internal control systems were effective and adequate for the year ended 30 June 2026. The Board will continue to oversee the Group's risk management and internal control systems and ensure that they are reviewed on an annual basis.

A discussion of the policies and procedures on the management of each of the major types of risk which the Group manages is included in Note 5 to the consolidated financial statements and in the Management Discussion and Analysis on pages 4 to 21. The Group has a Whistleblower and Anti-bribery and corruption policies available on the Company's website.

Internal audit function

The Company maintains an internal audit function by outsourcing it to an independent management consultancy. Having regard to the size, scale and activities, the Board considers this arrangement appropriate and effective. During the year, the outsourced internal audit function conducted an annual review of the Group's internal control systems. The review included, among other matters:

- (i) The matrix of delegated authority that defines the level of authority,
- (ii) Budgets are prepared and approved by the Board.

The Company's internal control function was reviewed in 2026. This will be reviewed again in 2027, and periodically thereafter.

MODEL CODE FOR SECURITIES TRANSACTIONS BY DIRECTORS AND RELEVANT EMPLOYEES

The Company has adopted a Securities Trading Policy which applies, inter alia, to all directors. The policy sets out guidelines and procedures to the directors of the Company and executives of the Group to ensure inside information of the Group is to be disseminated to the public on an equal basis and in a timely manner. Directors and executives who possess potential inside information or actual inside information, are required to take reasonable measures to ensure that appropriate safeguards are in place to maintain strict confidentiality. They must also ensure that its recipients of such information their obligations to preserve confidentiality. The policy shall be updated and revised as necessary in light of changes in circumstances in the Listing Rules, the Securities and Futures Ordinance, and other relevant statutory and regulatory requirements from time to time. Further, the directors have observed the disclosure requirements of the ASX and SEHK Listing Rules.

Details of the Company's policy for Communication Strategy and Continuous Disclosure Policy is available on the Company's website.

SHAREHOLDERS' ENGAGEMENT

The Board recognises the importance of good communication with shareholders. Information in relation to the Group is disseminated to shareholders in a timely manner through a number of formal channels, which include interim and annual reports, announcements and circulars. Such published documents, together with the latest corporate information and news, are also made available on the website of the Company.

The Company's Annual General Meeting ("AGM") is a valuable forum for the Board to communicate directly with shareholders. The Chairman of the Board actively participates at the AGM to answer any questions from shareholders. The Chairperson of each of the Audit, Risk Management, Remuneration and Performance, Nomination, and Health, Safety, Environment and Sustainability Committees or in their absence, another member of the respective committees or failing that their respective duly appointed delegate, are also available to answer questions at the AGM. The Chairman of any independent board committee formed as necessary or pursuant to the Listing Rules (or if no such Chairman is appointed, at least a member of the independent board committee) is also available to answer questions at any general meeting of shareholders to approve a connected transaction or any other transaction that is subject to independent shareholders' approval. The external auditor is also in attendance and available to answer questions from shareholders relevant to the conduct of the audit, the preparation and content of the auditors' report, the accounting policies and auditor's independence.

The notification of general meeting to shareholders is to be sent at least 21 days before the meeting for all general meetings of the Company including any AGM. An explanation of the detailed procedures of conducting a poll is provided to the shareholders at the commencement of the meeting. The poll results are published in the manner prescribed under the requirements of the Listing Rules.

Shareholder(s) representing not less than 5% of the total voting rights of the Company on the date of the requisition or not less than 100 shareholders of the Company are entitled to put forward a proposal for consideration at a general meeting of the Company. Shareholders should follow the procedures as set out in Section 79 of the Companies Act 1981 of Bermuda (the "Act") for the putting forward of such proposals.



During the year, the 2025 AGM of the Company was held on 27 November 2025. The attendance records of the directors at the general meeting are set out in the section headed "Board Meetings" of this report. Separate resolutions are proposed at general meetings for each substantial issue, including the re-election of retiring directors.

How shareholders can convene a special general meeting

In accordance with the Bye-Laws of the Company, a minimum of 14 days' notice is required for every shareholder meeting and all shareholders shall have statutory rights to call for special general meetings and put forward agenda items for consideration in the general meetings. Subject to Section 74 of the Act and the Bye-Law 58 of the Company, the Board may, whenever it thinks fit, call special general meetings. Members holding at the date of deposit of the requisition not less than one-tenth of the paid up capital of the Company and carrying the right to vote at general meetings of the Company shall at all times have the right, by written requisition to the Board or the Company Secretary of the Company, to require a special general meeting to be called by the Board for the transaction of any business specified in such requisition; and such meeting shall be held within two months after the deposit of such requisition. If within 21 days of such deposit the Board fails to proceed to convene such meeting the requisitioner may do so in accordance with the provisions of Section 74(3) of the Act.

Investor relations

Shareholder communication

The board established a shareholders' communication strategy policy which sets out the channels of communication with the shareholders. A shareholder may serve an enquiry to the Board at the registered office in Hong Kong for the attention of the Board or the Company Secretary in written form and state the nature of the enquiry and the reason for making the enquiry. In addition, shareholders can contact Tricor Investor Services Limited, the share registry of the Company in Hong Kong and Computershare Australia Investor Services Pty Ltd, the share registry of the Company in Australia, for any questions about their shareholdings. These contact details are available in the Corporate Information of the Annual Report on page 2.

Shareholder and stakeholder engagement

During the year ended 30 June 2026, the Company maintained regular dialogue with shareholders, employees, suppliers, regulators and key stakeholders through a variety of communication channels. Representatives of the Group including Executive Directors and management, actively participated in these engagement activities. Key engagement activities included:

- Timely dissemination of corporate information through announcements, circulars, interim and annual reports, and other disclosures published on the Company's website.
- Maintenance of the Company's website as a channel for providing shareholders with access to corporate information, financial reports, governance documents and investor relations material.

For the year ended 30 June 2026, the Company reviewed the effectiveness of its Communication Strategy and Continuous Disclosure Policy. Having considered the multiple communication and engagement channels in place, the Board is satisfied that, as detailed above and in the Communication Strategy and Continuous Disclosure Policy, that the strategy and policy have been properly implemented and remained effective.

Constitutional documents

The Company has not made any changes to the Amended and Restated Bye-Laws during the year ended 30 June 2026. The Amended and Restated Bye-Laws are available on the website of the Company.

DIVIDEND POLICY

The Board has adopted a dividend policy, pursuant to which the Company may distribute dividends to the shareholders of the Company by way of cash or shares. Any distribution of dividends shall be in accordance with the Hong Kong Laws, the bye-laws of the Company, the Bermuda Companies Act 1981 (as amended from time to time) and any other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE REPORT

The recommendation of payment of any dividend is subject to the absolute discretion of the Board, and any declaration of dividend will be subject to the approval of shareholders. In proposing any dividend payout, the Board shall also take into account, inter alia:

- The Group's actual and expected financial performance;
- Shareholders' interests;
- Retained earnings, distributable reserves and contributed surplus of the Company and each of the other members of the Group;
- The level of the Group's debt to equity ratio, return on equity and financial covenants to which the Group is subject to;
- Possible effects on the Group's credit worthiness;
- Any restrictions on payment of dividends or other covenants on the Group's financial ratios that may be imposed by the Group's financial creditors;
- The Group's expected working capital requirements and future expansion plans;
- Liquidity position and future commitments at the time of declaration of dividend;
- Taxation considerations;
- Statutory and regulatory restrictions;
- General business conditions and strategies;
- General economic conditions, business cycle of the Group's business and other internal or external factors that may have an impact on the business or financial performance and position of the Company; and
- Other factors that the Board deems appropriate.

The dividend policy will be reviewed from time to time and there is no assurance that a dividend will be proposed or declared in any specific periods.

BASIS OF PREPARATION

Brockman Mining Limited ("Brockman", or "Company") and its subsidiaries (collectively, the "Group") is pleased to present its Environmental, Social and Governance Report ("ESG", or "Report") for the year ended 30 June 2026 (the "Reporting Period"), in compliance with applicable code provision of the Environmental, Social and Governance Reporting Code as set out in Appendix C2 of the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong ("SEHK") and with reference to the IFRS Sustainability Disclosure Standards as issued by the International Sustainability Standards Board ("ISSB").

This Report has been prepared in accordance with the principles of materiality, quantitative approach, balance and consistency, and complies with the mandatory disclosure requirement and the "comply or explain" provisions recommended by the SEHK. The Group's performance is reviewed bi-annually by the Board, Health, Safety, Environmental and Sustainability, and Risk Management Committees, details of which are outlined in our "Risk Management and Internal Control" section in the Corporate Governance Statement of the Company's published 2026 Annual Report. The Company has a robust and comprehensive system of governance that is essential to the ongoing sound operation of the Company, and to balancing the interests of the Company's shareholders, suppliers, governments, and the various communities (collectively the "stakeholders") in which the Group operates.

CONNECTIVITY

This report contains the climate-related financial information of the Group for the financial year ended 30 June 2026 (the "Reporting Entity"). It aligns with the reporting period of the Group's consolidated financial statements (refer to Note 1 Basis of consolidation in the consolidated financial statements).

SOURCES OF GUIDANCE

In preparing its sustainability-related financial information, the Group has referred to, and considered, the applicability of disclosure topics and metrics in the SASB Standards.

With reference to the SEHK ESG Reporting Code, Industry-based Guidance on Implementing IFRS S2 — Climate-related disclosures, and taking into account the Company's strategic objectives, the Company identified material issues and determined the scope and boundaries of their impacts.

SCOPE AND PERFORMANCE

Due to the continued delay in the development of the Group's Marillana Project and no mining activities during the year, the scope of this report encompasses the Group's activities primarily comprise the assessment and advancement of exploration and evaluation activities, supported by corporate and administration functions with no boundary change from the financial year 30 June 2025. In conducting these activities, the Group procures goods and services from local or international suppliers. Key expenditure categories include exploration and evaluation activities, property and employee costs, the other significant expenses are electricity usage, cloud computing and data storage services, regulatory compliance, stakeholder engagement, and activity base business travel.

STATEMENT FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board has overall responsibility for the Group's ESG governance and oversees the integration of ESG considerations in the Group's strategy, risk management, decision-making. The Board is committed to operating in a manner that contributes to the sustainable development of mineral resources through efficient, balanced, long-term management while demonstrating due consideration for the wellbeing of our people and protection of the environment.

The Board provides strategic direction on ESG matters and is supported by management in implementing the Group's ESG initiatives, policies and objectives. Through regular reporting and review processes, the Board monitors ESG related risks and opportunities that may affect the Group's activities, stakeholders and long term sustainability.

The Group has established a process for identifying, assessing and prioritising material ESG issues. The review process also considers key outcomes, emerging ESG risks, and changes in regulatory requirements. Where appropriate, the Board updates ESG objectives and initiatives to support the Group's long-term sustainability and continuous improvement in ESG, including initiatives aimed at reducing the Group's environmental footprint and enhancing social and governance outcomes.

IMPLEMENTATION RELIEFS

The Company has prepared the climate disclosures related content of its ESG report in accordance with the climate-related disclosure requirements set in Appendix C2 Part D of the SEHK's Environmental, Social and Governance Reporting Code. During the preparation of the report, due to the current stage of internal system development and data collection and calculation capabilities, the Company is temporarily unable to complete the disclosure of certain provisions.

In preparing this report, the Group has applied implementation reliefs to the following in the annual reporting period:

- Climate-scenario analysis (reasonable information relief and capabilities relief) — a scaling approach is applied to climate resilience and scenario analysis disclosures. The Company will progress to a quantitative analysis overtime as capabilities mature.
- Scope 3 emissions (reasonable information relief) — Scope 3 emissions data is dependent on information obtained from suppliers and other third parties across the value chain. At this stage, processes, systems and controls required to collect complete and reliable Scope 3 data are still being developed and enhanced.
- Current and anticipated financial effects (reasonable information relief, capabilities relief and financial effects relief) — the Company has not provided all quantitative information relating to the current and anticipated financial effects of climate-related risks and opportunities on its financial position, financial performance and cashflows for this reporting period. The Company continues to enhance its processes, methodologies, data collection capabilities and internal controls to support the assessment and measurement of climate-related risks and opportunities and expects to expand the scope and granularity of these disclosures in future reporting periods as information becomes available and reporting capabilities mature.
- Cross-industry metrics (reasonable information relief) — The Company currently finds it difficult to isolate from its financial statements the specific financial impact amounts solely attributable to climate-related risks and opportunities, without undue cost or efforts, thus is unable to make the required quantitative disclosures in this regard. We will continue to enhance our tracking and allocation methodologies to enable fuller disclosure in future reporting cycles.
- As this is the Company's first year of climate-related reporting under SEHK Part D, the Company is unable to provide the prior-year comparative data at this stage, and the Company will work towards including these elements as our reporting maturity develops.

A. ENVIRONMENTAL

A.1 EMISSIONS

Governance

Applying reduction, resource recovery, and sound management measures to the emissions is not only a core requirement for the Company to fulfill its environmental responsibilities, but also an important way for us to improve resource-use efficiency.

Compliance with the environmental protection standards

The Group operates according to specific Environmental Management Plans ("EMP") approved by the environmental authorities in Western Australia, Australia. The EMP determines the frequency of monitoring and measuring of our various activities.

Annual performance

During the reporting year, the Group has complied in all material respects with the environmental standards, laws, regulations and permit conditions that have a significant impact on our activities including those relating to air emissions, discharges into water and land, waste management, and the handling and disposal of hazardous and non-hazardous waste. The Group is not aware of material breaches of applicable environmental laws and regulations during the reporting period.

The foundation for the Group's emission policies, controls, procedures and reporting are derived from the respective environmental approval for each of the Group's exploration activities. Relevant legislation applicable to the Group's activities includes, where relevant, Mining Act 1978, and other relevant environmental regulations such as the Environmental Protection Act 1986, the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999, the Environmental Protection (Clearing of Native Vegetation) Regulations 2004, the Rights in Water and Irrigation Act 1914, the Native Title Act 1993 and the Aboriginal Heritage Act 1972.

The approvals are activity specific and prescribe the relevant operating parameters as defined by the environmental authorities. The Group monitors compliance with these requirements through ongoing environmental management and reporting processes and seeks to minimise the environmental impact of its activities through the implementation controls, environmental protection measures and rehabilitation practices.

Emission statistics

Greenhouse Gas emissions (GHG Emissions) for the reporting period are mainly generated from the consumption of purchased electricity for exploration activities and office running costs. Emissions for Nitrogen Oxides (NOx), Sulphur Oxides (SOx) and Respirable suspended particulates (RSP) are not disclosed as the amount is insignificant.

The methodology adopted for reporting on GHG emissions set out above was based on the Environmental, Social and Governance Reporting Code and the GHG Protocol Corporate Accounting and Reporting Standard (refer to section "Methodology for the calculation of GHG emissions").

Scope 1 emissions — Direct emissions from operations that are owned or controlled by the Company.

Scope 2 emissions — Energy indirect emissions resulting from the generation of purchased or acquired electricity consumed within the Company.

Scope 3 emissions — All other indirect emissions that occur outside the company, including both upstream and downstream emissions such as emissions from business travel of employees and paper waste disposed of at landfill etc.

While it has decided not to disclose its Scope 3 greenhouse gas emissions, detailed financial effects or other cross-metrics for this reporting period due to the immature data collection methodology, the Group is committed to continuously improving the accuracy of these metrics.

The scope during the reporting period covered a gross floor area of 249.10m²

GHG intensity by floor area amounts to 41.99 kg CO₂e/m² (2025: 28.76 kg CO₂e/m²).

Purchased electricity consumption increased by 32% compared with the prior year, resulting in the Group not achieving its planned objective of reducing electricity consumption. Despite this outcome, the Group remains committed to improving energy performance and will continue to implement measures at reducing electricity consumption overtime to its activities that consider:

- Unnecessary business trips and board meetings have been reduced through the use of electronic communications.
- Encouraged employees to switch off lights and air conditioning.
- Procure only electrical appliances with "Grade1" or equivalent energy labels if needed to increase energy efficiency.

During the reporting period, the Company incurred no unnecessary business trips (domestic or overseas), and all board meetings were conducted via electronic communications.

During the reporting period, no material hazardous or non-hazardous waste was generated as our exploration activities do not generate hazardous or non-hazardous materials. Waste generated comprises printer toner cartridges, batteries and obsolete computer and printing equipment. All hazardous waste is disposed of at appropriate facilities licensed for the receipt and treatment of such waste. Non-hazardous waste such as general domestic refuse and printing paper from office activities were considered minimal.

ENVIRONMENTAL, SOCIAL AND GOVERNANCE REPORT

A.2 USE OF RESOURCES

Governance

The Group is committed to promoting an environmentally conscious work environment and has focused on measures to minimise waste and electricity consumption, initiate paper and cartridge recycling and promote electronic communications and storage. We promote recycling of office equipment and reduce domestic waste as much as possible. To reduce consumption of paper, the Group prefers using electronic means to disseminate information via electronic devices and electronic communication systems.

Strategy

We encourage our office employees to switch off idle lights, air conditioners and other office equipment we also remind them to print and photocopy on both sides of paper if printing is unavoidable. Additionally, we also encourage our employees to bring their own lunch and reduce purchase of takeaway and beverages, thereby minimising the use of plastic disposable utensils. The Group promotes the use of public transportation and carpooling to reduce car usage and its environmental impact.

Our offices are required to maintain in-door temperature at 24 degree Celsius to ensure efficient use of air conditioning.

As stated above, the Group remains committed to achieving a net reduction in emissions in the upcoming year. Given that purchased electricity is the primary contributor to the Group's emissions, reducing annual energy consumption continues to be a key objective. With these directional objectives, the Group will review progress periodically with a view to establishing quantitative targets once sufficient data and experience have been accumulated.

The Group promotes initiatives to mitigate environmental impacts by choosing energy-efficient products by comparing Energy Labels issued by the Electrical and Mechanical Services Department (EMSD)/ Energy Rating Labels issued by the Australian Federal Government. As waste electrical and electronic equipment (WEEE) poses severe harm to the environment, the Group encourages all employees to use the WEEE donation or recycling programs. All employees are responsible and accountable for operating in an environmentally responsible manner.

Indicators and targets

The total purchased electricity for the year ended amounted to 19,640 kWh (2025: 14,815 kWh) and the electricity usage intensity by floor area amounted to approximately 78.85 kWh/m² (2025: 59.47 kWh/m²).

Water resource management

Governance

Water resource management and protection, the Group complies with the laws and regulations on water resource management for our exploration activities, and no issue in sourcing water that is fit for purpose has been reported.

The Group's existing activities do not require any significant water consumption, water usage and any consumption relates to drinking water (including bottled water).

The Joint Operation with Polaris has developed a water borefield at the Marillana iron ore project, comprising production bores and an array of monitoring bores were established. Pump and infiltration testing will be incorporated into the groundwater model. The purpose of the water borefield is to improve the knowledge of the water balance and the data from the water monitoring bores will become more detailed in coming years.



Indicators and targets

There is no data of water consumption because it is not feasible to obtain water withdrawal and discharge data as an individual occupant of commercial office leases in Hong Kong and Australia where water supply and discharge are not billed separately by the respective building management. Consequently, in the absence of reliable baseline data, the Group has not established a quantitative water efficiency target for the reporting period. Although data on water usage was not quantifiable, the Group maintains best endeavours to conserve the environment by requiring our employees to report immediately damage to any water facilities, thereby mitigating unnecessary water loss where practicable.

Raw materials and packaging materials

Due to the nature of the activities, there is no applicable data on packaging material as our activities does not involve their use.

A.3 THE ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES

Governance

The Company is committed to the principles of being a good corporate and environmental citizen, and takes careful consideration of environmental, social responsibility and sustainability issues. The Group aims to minimise its environmental footprint and its disturbance to natural resources.

The system of environmental management under the guidance of the Board, the HSES Committee formulates objectives and defines the direction of environmental management and guidance on the management of the environment.

As the activities of the Group change as the Marillana project advances to development, fines residue storage and waste rock management, water use and discharge, and continued land management and rehabilitation are the most important areas of concern to the Group and will closely monitor these aspects, in compliance with its regulatory approvals obtained with key State and Commonwealth Governments.

Waste rock and tailings that is created during the mining and ore refining process can release toxins into the environment if not stored or disposed of properly. In many cases, waste rock and tailings are left out in the open where they are exposed, and toxins can be washed into water systems by rainfall, or can leach into the soil. To mitigate such risk, a detailed mine plan with enhanced tailings and erosion control structure will serve as part of the mine's water management plan. The most likely source of impact to the surface water environment from discharge is from unplanned flooding or spillages. However, safeguards are in place to minimise this risk that includes alarms and flashing beacons to warn of failure of mechanical components (pump and blower). In addition, flood protection will be implemented, to ensure floodwaters do not adversely impact water ways.

The Company is proposing to clear up to 3,785 ha of vegetation to mine and transport ore to Port Hedland by a land infrastructure solution. After mine closure and the subsequent rehabilitation of the cleared area, the long-term cleared footprint will be around 60 ha which represents the final open pit void. All other disturbances will be rehabilitated to the satisfaction of the Western Australian Environmental Protection Authority (EPA), Department of Environment and Water (DEW) and Department of Mines, Petroleum and Exploration (DMPE). Most key environmental approvals are secured. We will adhere to our proposed plan in the event of early works commence and we will endeavour to mitigate any environmental disturbance and implement our monitoring schedule.

The principal environmental incidents that could potentially occur at the Group's exploration sites include hydrocarbon spills; the destruction of local wildlife habitats; water substance levels exceeding permits limits; and other incidents that negatively impact the environment. Any environment incidents are reported, investigated, remedied and monitored by the Group and, where appropriate, reported to the responsible authorities.

ENVIRONMENTAL, SOCIAL AND GOVERNANCE REPORT

Strategy

Central to the Company's ESG approach is our commitment to creating sustained value for all our stakeholders, shareholders, investors and employees. Environmental monitoring and reporting forms part of the Group's proactive approach and includes:

- Contribute to the conservation of biodiversity in the Pilbara region of Western Australia, and
- Ensuring contractors support the Company's environmental sustainability policy.

We fully recognise the tangible impacts our activities have on the environment and natural resources and firmly believe that responsible companies should not only mitigate those impacts, but also work to restore ecosystems and create shared value. As the project activities advance the Company will continue to incorporate its environmental strategy, incorporating mine closure, land reclamation, and biodiversity conservation into the planning from pre to post development of the activities, with the aim of turning the impact of resource extraction on natural capital into opportunities to rebuild and enhance ecology.

Indicators and targets

Prior to the commencement of exploration activities, certain approvals are required in accordance with the Mining Act 1978 from DMPE:

1. Programme of work submission — to include details of mechanised equipment and potential disruption to the ground during exploration for minerals.
2. Mining proposals — details of the proposed mining operation.
3. Mine closure plans — such plan must be included together with any submission on mining proposals, covering all aspects of mine decommissioning and rehabilitation.

Environmental compliance

Ensuring environmental compliance is integral to the Group's activities. The Group implements environmental management systems and practices, from which we assess and identify potential environmental risks; conduct monitoring; and report the performance results to mitigate the impact of our activities on the environment. The Group strives to promote the efficient use of resources and reduction and prevention of pollution. As a responsible Company we seek to meet, and where possible exceed, the regulatory requirements governing our environmental performance.

The Group complies with all applicable environmental laws, regulations, and standards as set out in the Mining Act 1978 and other relevant environmental regulations such as the Environmental Protection Act 1986, the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999, the Environmental Protection (Clearing of Native Vegetation) Regulations 2004, the Rights in Water and Irrigation Act 1914, the Native Title Act 1993 and the Aboriginal Heritage Act 1972.

During the year ended 30 June 2026, there were no environmental approval breaches. All approval and permit levels were complied.

Biodiversity

Governance

Project activities may cause a certain degree of surface damage and as such the Company considers biodiversity as an important issue in ESG management. Before activities commence biodiversity surveys and assessments are conducted and no exploration activities in sensitive areas such as nature reserves and ecological conservation areas.



Strategy

Before activities begin the Company will conduct detailed ecological surveys using field investigations and other methods, covering flora and fauna resources and other aspects, to ensure a comprehensive understanding of biodiversity in the project area. By comprehensively assessing the distribution of flora and fauna in the project area and surrounding areas, potential ecological risks can be identified. A clear ecological restoration plan could be developed, including measures such as soil and vegetation restoration, to ensure that the land can recover its ecological functions after the project activities have been completed.

For the exploration activities undertaken during the year, biodiversity analysis and assessment was conducted. No protected flora or fauna was found within the assessment area. Based on field surveys, there are relevant nature reserves or wildlife mitigation corridors in the assessment area or its surroundings. On this basis, the Company incorporated biodiversity protection requirements into planning and environmental management plans and, through baseline surveys, risks assessments, and necessary mitigation measures, sought to minimise the impact of project activities on local ecosystems.

B. SOCIAL

B.1 EMPLOYMENT AND LABOUR PRACTICES

Employment

The Group's employment policies are documented in its Code of Conduct ("Code"), which provides clear guidance on the conduct and behaviour of all employees, including the Board and senior management. The Code is designed to encourage and foster a culture of integrity and responsibility with the focus on strengthening the Group's reputation as a valued employer, joint operator, and good corporate citizen. Specifically, the Code provides guidance on the following aspects:

- Compliance with laws, rules and regulations,
- Conflicts,
- Knowledge and information security (including handling of confidential information and disclosure and securities trading),
- Health, safety and environment,
- Employment practices, and
- Whistleblowing and misconduct reporting.

The Code of Conduct is available on the Company's website.

The Group is committed to responsible corporate governance, including the implementation of measures that encourage employees and representatives of the Group to identify and report in good faith any concerns relating to serious misconduct, or could potentially be:

- A criminal offence (including theft, drug use/sale, violence or threatened violence and criminal damage to property),
- A breach of a legal obligation,
- Dishonest, fraudulent, or corrupt behaviour,
- A serious risk to the health of an individual, the public, or the environment,
- In breach of any of the Group policies, or
- Designed to conceal business records or other evidence related to any of the factors above.

ENVIRONMENTAL, SOCIAL AND GOVERNANCE REPORT

Recruitment and promotion

The Group recognises, and endeavours to protect, the rights of its employees and is committed to providing equal opportunities. The Group engages in transparent and fair recruitment practices, and fair remuneration and disciplinary decisions without regard to gender, age, family position, or ethnic background. The remuneration package provided to our employees include a basic salary component and other long-term incentives (where appropriate). The Group determines employee remuneration based on qualifications and experience. The Group provides employees with retirement benefits and healthcare benefits (where appropriate) and in accordance with statutory requirements. We motivate employees by promotion and salary increments based on results of regular performance appraisals. Apart from offering employees' competitive salary packages, the Group also provides the grant of share options to eligible participants.

Working hours, rest periods, benefits, compensation and dismissal

A five-day work week arrangement is adopted to facilitate work-life balance. In addition to all rest days and statutory holidays as specified in local laws and regulations, employees are entitled to paid annual, maternity, paternity, marriage and compassionate leave. Employees are also entitled to benefits such as medical benefits, post-employment benefits subject to the Group's human resources management policy. In Hong Kong and Australia an employee dismissal is based on relevant local laws and regulations, as well as the requirements in the employee contracts.

Equal opportunity, diversity and anti-discrimination

The Group invests time and resources to fulfil its obligations under the respective laws of Hong Kong and Australia. The Group has a whistleblower policy that enables an employee to raise concerns about practices and procedures in their workplace. It enables employees to report concerns of fraud, corruption, illegal or immoral misconduct, illegitimate practices or malpractice in a way that will not be seen as being disloyal to colleagues.

Workplace diversity

The Company's recognition of the benefits of diversity where individuals from different gender, age, ethnicities and cultural backgrounds bring fresh ideas and perspectives that enhance the workplace efficiency is reflected in the Diversity and the Workplace Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Policies, which are available in the corporate governance section of the Company's website. These policies outline specific diversity initiatives designed to facilitate equal employment opportunities and requires the Company to set targets with the aim of reporting the progress towards the metrics in the annual report.

These key metrics include:

The Committee reports regularly to the Board, enabling the Board to monitor the effectiveness of the Group's occupational health and safety measures and overall safety performance.

We will implement systems and ensure that resources are allocated to implement and monitor these commitments and our legal obligations. Our employees and stakeholders will be updated on the Company's progress towards these goals. The policy and the system that support it will be routinely measured to ensure the delivery of our commitments.

The Group's Operational Health and Safety (OHS) Policy and objectives that applies to our activities are summarised as follows:

B.4 LABOUR STANDARDS

Preventing and addressing the Group's involvement in child or forced labour in any of its activities is central to our sustainability efforts and our commitment to operating a safe and responsible business. The Group strictly prohibits the use of child and forced labour and complies with all relevant laws and regulations.

To prevent such practices, the Group implements recruitment and employment procedures designed to verify the identity and age of prospective employees before engagement. As part of the on boarding of new employees, employees are required to provide valid identification and supporting documentation to confirm that they meet the legal age of employment requirements.

If any instance of child labour or forced labour were identified, the Group would take immediate corrective action, including removing the individual from the inappropriate work situation, conducting an investigation into the circumstances, addressing any deficiencies in recruitment or labour management processes, and implementing measures to prevent recurrence. Where appropriate, the Group would also report the matter to the relevant authorities and provide support to the affected individuals in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

During the year, the Group has not employed any person under the age of 18 and incurrance of child labour. Based on the nature of the Group's activities, the risk of child labour and forced labour occurring is not a significant risk factor.

B.5 RESPONSIBLE SUPPLY CHAIN MANAGEMENT

The Group is committed to upholding human rights and respect cultures, customs, and values in all individuals, communities and organisations involved in our activities. The Group strives to implement environmentally and socially responsible supply chain practices by working closely with all stakeholders including suppliers, local community and authorities. To assist in maintaining a transparent supply chain, the Group only procures goods and services from suppliers and contractors whose trade, employment practices and company values are aligned with the Group's expectations regarding ethical conduct, environmental and social responsibility.

A system is in place to ensure that procurement practices identify, assess and manage environmental and social risks that may arise throughout its supply chain. This includes considering factors such as compliance with applicable laws and regulations, workplace health and safety standards, labour practices, human rights considerations and environmental performance. As part of our internal control on procurement procedures, at least 2 quotations will be obtained for each procurement engagement. Sustainable, fair-trade and environmental products where commercially practical, taking into account factors such as resource efficiency, waste reduction, and environmental impact over the good or service cycle.

The Group engages external parties in its day-to-day activities including environment and process consultants, laboratory services, drilling services and professional services.

During the reporting period, such practices were applied across the Group's active supplier base of 61 suppliers operating in Hong Kong and Australia. Responsibility for implementing these practices rests with management and employees involved in procurement and contractor engagement activities. To monitor compliance, the Group undertakes where appropriate, evaluates supplier performance and considers ESG factors as part of supplier selection. Management reports significant supply chain risks and compliance matters to the Executive Committee and, where relevant, the Board to support ongoing oversight and continuous improvement of supply chain practices. Independent internal control consultants are engaged yearly to perform reviews on whether internal control processes are being observed.

B.6 PRODUCT RESPONSIBILITY AND STEWARDSHIP

We value responsible environmental management, seek continued improvement of our environmental performance, and aspire to be effective environmental stewards.

The Company will ensure all required documentation will be implemented prior to shipment of iron ore. Sinter testwork conducted has provided positive results and confirmation of our product quality and the Group will strive to maintain the product's quality upon future delivery of ore.

Given that production has yet to commence, no complaints from customers nor product recalls have been received for the reporting period. Quality assurance and recall procedures will be duly implemented upon future delivery of iron ore product.

The Company upholds the confidentiality of information relating to customers', prospective customers' or business counterparts' information by implementing confidentiality agreements. These agreements outlines the Group's position on data security, privacy an intellectual property rights, including:

- Work related documents are the property of the Company unless otherwise specifically agreed, and
- Destruction of documents containing confidential information must be carried out reliably.

As the Group's activities are focused primarily on exploration and evaluation activities, and corporate and administration functions, it does not collect or process significant volumes of consumer personal data. Nevertheless, the Group manages data protection and privacy through its information technology systems, internal controls and policies governing information security. Responsibility for implementing and monitoring these controls rests with management and supported by external IT service provider engaged to assist with system administration, cybersecurity and data protection measures.



During the year, the Group was not aware of any breaches of the relevant laws and regulations relating to the Group health and safety, advertising, labelling and privacy matters relating to its products and services. Given the Group's business nature, products sold or shipped subject to recalls for safety and health reasons are not relevant, thus not reported in this Report.

B.7 ANTI-CORRUPTION

The Company is committed to responsible Corporate Governance, including the implementation of measures to encourage employees and stakeholders of the Company to identify and report in good faith any concerns relating to serious misconduct which is, or potentially could be, a criminal offence, a breach of legal obligation, dishonest, fraudulent, or corrupt, a breach of the Company's policies (collectively, Inappropriate Conduct). Brockman takes a zero tolerance approach to corruption and bribery and is committed to acting professionally, fairly and with integrity in all our business dealings. Accordingly, the Board have endorsed an anti-corruption and bribery, and whistleblower policies to encourage and foster a culture of integrity and responsibility within the Group. These policies provide the protected disclosure, how to report Inappropriate Conduct, confidentiality and whistleblower protections.

The Company's whistleblower policy encourages employees, suppliers and other representatives known as Eligible Whistleblowers to report Inappropriate Conduct. Where an Eligible Whistleblower is concerned about Inappropriate Conduct observed within the Group, the Eligible Whistleblower can discuss it with the manager or supervisor. Alternatively, they can raise the matter with the Compliance Officer. The Compliance Officer will report and communicate Inappropriate Conduct directly to the Audit Committee. All disclosures made under the whistleblower policy are treated seriously and may be the subject of an investigation. Such investigations will be facilitated in accordance with the steps and processes detailed in Appendix A of the Whistleblower

Policy. The Audit Committee is informed at each meeting of all whistleblower matters and incidents, including information on the number and nature of disclosures made, the status of investigations underway and outcomes of any investigations completed, and actions taken as a result of these investigations. Material whistleblower matters and incidents are also reported to the Board.

The Company's anti-corruption and bribery, and whistleblower policies are periodically reviewed by the Board.

In 2026, the Group was in compliance with relevant laws and regulations that have a significant impact on the Group relating to bribery, extortion, fraud and money laundering. There were no concluded legal cases regarding corruption practice matters relating to Inappropriate Conduct or corrupt practices brought against the Group or its employees during the year (2025: Nil).

The Company has adopted a Securities Trading Policy which applies, inter-alia, to all Directors and executives. The Securities Trading Policy complies with ASX Listing Principles and the Model Code for Securities Transactions by Directors of Listed Issuers (the "Model Code") as set out in Appendix C3 of the SEHK Listing Rules. All directors have confirmed, following a specific enquiry by the Company, that they have complied with the required standard as set out in the Model Code throughout the year ended 30 June 2026.

The Company has adopted the same Securities Trading Policy for Relevant Employees to regulate dealings in securities of the Company by certain employees of the Company or any of its subsidiaries who are considered to be likely in possession of inside information in relation to the Company or its securities.

During the year ended 30 June 2026, reading material regarding "Update on Listing Rules and Corporate Governance Code, review of the Group's anti-corruption and bribery policy and guidance on implementation of climate reporting" was circulated to all directors of the Company.

B.8 COMMUNITY INVESTMENT

The Company is transparent on the need to earn the respect and support of the communities in which it is located and by demonstrating a tangible level of commitment to environmental sustainability.

The Group operates in two regulatory environments (Hong Kong and Australia). While compliance with these regulatory environments is the basis of the Group's environmental management. The Group is committed to the principle of developing and implementing appropriate practices and will actively work to:

- Protect the environment surrounding its activities,
- Give environmental aspects due consideration in all phases of our activities, from exploration and evaluation, development and final closure,
- Act systemically to improve the planning, execution and monitoring of its environmental performance, and
- Respect the rights of the traditional owners and value the indigenous culture heritage.

The Group is committed to operating in a way which contributes to the sustainable development of mineral resources through efficient, balanced and long-term management, while showing due consideration for the wellbeing of people, protection of the environment and the development of local economies.

The Group's Sustainability Policy seeks to ensure it is a constructive partner to advance the social, economic and institutional development of the communities in which it operates. The Group fully acknowledges the rights, cultures, customs, and values of people affected by the development and exploitation of mineral resources.

Brockman maintains its community focus on health and sports, and has sponsored charity runs/marathons for employees, for the purpose of raising employees' awareness on health while giving back to the community. During the reporting period, the Group sponsored employee participation in charity runs and marathon events, promoting health and wellbeing. Employee participation time formed the primary resources contribution to these activities and the related time contribution was not separately tracked during the year and the Group will consider enhancing data collection processes for future reporting periods to facilitate quantitative disclosure of Community Investment activities.



CLIMATE CHANGE GOVERNANCE

Business governance

The Company incorporate climate-related risks into the ESG governance system, clearly defining the oversight responsibilities of the Board and management responsibilities in climate related risks and opportunities.

The Board has ultimate responsibility for overseeing the climate-related risks and opportunities as part of its governance strategy, risk management and financial planning. Detailed governance arrangements are described below.

The Board's Charter specifies that the Board's oversight of climate-related risks and opportunities will be supported by several established functions throughout the organisation.

Roles and responsibilities for Governance

Board oversight

The Board brings a wealth of experience across diverse sectors and geographic regions, bringing effective guidance for climate-related matters. The Board receives bi-annually updates through business risk reporting on all climate-related issues, including areas of progress, emerging trends, and updates on climate-related risks and opportunities that could reasonably be expected to affect the Group's prospects in terms of its impact on cash flows, and access to finance over the short, medium or long term. The structured information flow arranges that the Board is informed about climate-related risks and opportunities to monitor and assess implications for the Group's strategy.

During the year, the Board met bi-annually with climate-related updates and discussions including progress towards the incorporation of climate-related risks and opportunities into the strategy.

Committees in place to support Board oversight

Three committees support the Board in fulfilling its responsibility of overseeing climate-related matters, each with a distinct role and mandate. The committees help prepare the Board for decision-making on sustainability-related matters. Although the committees play an important role, the Board retains overall responsibility for their activities. The terms of reference for the committees are available on the Company's website at www.brockmanmining.com.

The three committees convene bi-annually on sustainability-related matters. During these meetings, they review the sustainability strategy, programs, action plans, policies and internal controls. They are provided with an update on CROs.

Health, Safety, Environment and Sustainability Committee

The primary function of the Health, Safety, Environment and Sustainability Committee ("HSES") supports the Board in its sustainability mandate and focuses on its responsibilities in relation to health, safety, environmental protection and community matters arising from Group's project activities, and risk management in relation to such matters and adopting ESG-related policies and monitoring their compliance and evaluating compliance with ESG-related laws and regulations.

Risk Management Committee

The Risk Management Committee ('RM') oversees and reviews emerging and strategic risks, including climate-related risks, risk management and internal controls over climate-related data.

The Risk Management Committee plays an important role in overall risk management. The Committee uses a risk matrix to determine risk exposures and appetite, considering both likelihood and impact of climate-related risks. The Committee performs a bi-annual review of the Group's risks and related mitigation and adaption plans. Each of the Group's risks are reviewed by the Board, Audit Committee, HSES Committee throughout the year, considering the detailed risk description, the controls and mitigating actions in place, and the resultant residual risk exposure.

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Audit Committee

The Audit Committee is responsible for assessing the effectiveness, objectivity and independence of the Company's statutory auditor. This responsibility is discharged by the Committee throughout the year at formal committee meetings, during private meetings with audit engagement partner and through discussions with key management.

The Committee oversees the accuracy of sustainability-related financial information in the annual report. The Committee also receives reports from other Board Committees on the financial statement implications of CROs, including their impact on forecasts and budgets, supporting consistent and informed financial planning and reporting.

Management responsibilities

The Board delegates day-to-day responsibility of executing the sustainability strategy and reporting, risk management framework, to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee is a management committee comprising of the CEO and other senior executives that the Board resolves from time to time. Management prepares submissions to the Executive Committee on sustainability-related matters that may impact the Group and its key stakeholders.

Controls and procedures used by management to support oversight of climate-related risks and opportunities

The Board has ultimate responsibility for the overall setting and monitoring of the process that management has in place to identify and manage business risks and opportunities including ESG and CRO's. This also involves approving, reviewing and monitoring the Company's risk management framework. The Board is supported by Board Committees to whom authority maybe delegated. The Company recognises that it is not possible or necessarily desirable to eliminate all risks, with some being inherent to core business and development opportunities.

Execution of the management of CROs is delegated to the HSES and the Executive Committee, with input from management. This includes the process of identifying and assessing risks and opportunities, including those related to climate change.

Governance of climate strategy

The Board provides strategic oversight of the Company's strategy, which includes management of CROs. It approves the Company's strategy ensuring that it aligns with the Company's purpose, values and long-term goals. The Company Secretary keeps a skills matrix up to date, and the Board reviews periodically to verify it has the appropriate skills to oversee these matters. External specialists are engaged to provide additional guidance or training as required.

Consistent with its terms of reference, the HSES committee assists the Board by overseeing climate related risks and opportunities (including emerging) and monitoring progress against sustainability objectives and development in the regulatory environment. Supported by the CEO, who also is a member of the Executive and HSES Committees.

In overseeing the Group's strategy, risk management and major transactions, the Board considers the potential impacts, risks, opportunities and associated trade-offs arising from climate-related matters, including how these may affect the Group's objectives and resilience. Where relevant, the Board consults the HSES Committee to support its consideration of climate-related matters in decision making and significant business transactions.

The Group has not established any voluntary climate-related commitments or emission targets during the reporting period. In addition, there are currently no laws or regulations applicable to the Group that require the adoption of mandatory climate-related targets or emissions reduction commitments.

**Climate-related skills and experience**

The Board represents a balance of skills, experience and diversity of perspectives appropriate to the requirements of the Company's business. Biographies of the Board directors are included in the 'Directors and Management' section of the 2026 Annual Report.

Board skills and training

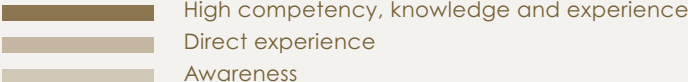
Together, the Company's directors contribute a wide-ranging set of skills and experience that enhance decision-making and oversight. The directors attend annual training on identifying, assessing and reporting sustainability and climate-related risks and opportunities, including on topics sustainability reporting and climate change.

Frequent consideration is given to experience, qualifications, background and skills. Each year, Directors including the Chair self-assess their individual skills and experience. The self-assessment ratings inform the Board's Skills and Experience matrix, which is developed and maintained by the Nomination Committee. The Skills and Experience Matrix identifies the skills and experience that Board either has or aims to acquire from new appointments or to develop through continued education and training.

The Board's skill matrix confirms that the Board collectively possesses skills and experience in strategy, risk management, governance and climate-related matters. Annual training and periodic skill assessments support the ongoing development of climate-related competencies.

Remuneration linked to sustainability performance metrics

The annual remuneration of the members of the Board and its committees is approved by the shareholders at the Annual General Meeting. The Group does not currently link remuneration outcomes for directors and senior management to climate-related performance measures. The Board considers that the existing remuneration framework remains appropriate having regard to the Group's size, activities and stage of development. The Board will keep this position under review as the Climate-related governance, strategy and risk management practices continue to evolve.



STRATEGY

Business strategy

The Company integrates climate strategy into planning, identifies the short, medium, long term impacts of climate related risks and opportunities on the activities and formulates responses measures.

The Group's view of the world

There is a high degree of uncertainty in the level of and time horizons for action the world will take to reduce GHG emissions. The effects predictions consist of warming levels, timing, and climate events. There is also an almost infinite number of pathways for reducing GHG emissions as geographies around the world are unlikely to act to the same extent and in similar timeframes whilst industry sectors will also take different trajectories to net zero.

Value chain estimation

In the assessment of climate-related risks and opportunities, the upstream and downstream value chain was considered using all reasonable and supportable information available without undue cost or effort for a comprehensive understanding of the climate-related risks and opportunities.

The Group's value chain is comprising of the exploration, evaluation and advancement of iron ore projects, in Western Australia. Key activities include geological studies, exploration drilling, resource evaluation, environmental and heritage assessments, stakeholder and community engagement, regulatory approvals. To support these activities, the Group engages or procures a range of goods and services from contractors, consultants, including drilling services, geological and technical consulting, environmental and heritage specialists, laboratory testing, as well as transport and accommodation services.

The Group's corporate offices provide administrative support to these projects through the procurement of office facilities, electricity, cloud computing and data storage services, and business travel.

While it has decided not to disclose its Scope 3 greenhouse gas emissions, detailed financial effects or other cross-industry metrics for this reporting due to the immature data collection methodology, the Group is committed to continuously improving the accuracy of these metrics. It is investing in improving data collection and engaging with clients to obtain more precise data. Additionally, the Group is enhancing its financial risk models to better capture the potential impacts of climate change on its activities, with the aim of providing more accurate estimations of anticipated financial effects in future sustainability reports.

Climate risks and opportunities impacting the business

The physical impacts of climate change and the transition towards a net zero emissions economy are likely to impact areas of our business and parts of the value chain to varying degrees. Climate change presents both discrete risks and opportunities as well as acting as a threat multiplier as it impacts other strategic and operational business risks such as regulatory risk, access to capital, cost of inputs, health and safety. It is recognized that the Group also has an impact on the climate, and the Group seeks to minimize its environmental footprint to manage climate-related.

The Group has conducted an assessment to identify and subsequently determine the current and anticipated effects of climate-related risks and opportunities on its activities and value chain. In this assessment, the Group identified specific areas within its activities and value chain where the identified climate-related risks and opportunities are concentrated, such as physical risks from extreme weather events and opportunities such as expanding renewable energy offerings.

The table 2 summarises the relevant CROs that could affect the business over the short, medium and long term.

ENVIRONMENTAL, SOCIAL AND GOVERNANCE REPORT

Effects of identified risks on its business model and concentration of those risks

For each of the identified risks, the Group has determined the potential effects on the Group's strategy and business model. By integrating these insights into strategic planning, the Group aims to manage the financial, operational and reputational implications of climate change.

Please see the table 2 for the identified risks and their impact on the business model as well as mitigation activities in place to manage those risks.

Overview of current and anticipated financial effects

The Group undertakes a bi-annual climate related risk assessment as part of its risk management process. CRO's are identified, assessed and prioritised based on their potential impact on the Group's exploration and evaluation activities, financial performance and cash flows. Risks are evaluated by management using qualitative criteria, including the likelihood of occurrence, potential financial consequences, relevance to the Group's activities, time horizon of potential impacts, and the extent to which the risk could affect the achievement of the Group's objectives.

Based on this assessment, the following four climate-related risks were identified as the most relevant and potentially financially material risks to the Group at the reporting date. No climate-related opportunities were identified as financially material.

During the reporting period, management assessed the financial effects of the materially CRO's described in the table above and determined that none had a material impact on the Group's financial position, financial performance and cashflows. The assessment also concluded that none of these CRO's creates a significant risk of a material adjustment within the next annual reporting period 2027 to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities.

As the Group is currently in the exploration and evaluation phase of its activities, all exploration and evaluation expenditure is expensed as incurred. Consequently, potential future climate-related financial effects are expected within changes in operating expenses and cashflows rather than through significant impacts on recognised non-current assets. As the reporting date, management was unable to quantify the anticipated financial effects of these risks with reasonable certainty because the effects are not separately identifiable and remain subject to uncertainties relating to the timing, frequency, severity and regulatory outcomes associated with future climate-related developments. Nevertheless, management continues to monitor these risks through its climate-related risk assessment process and will update its assessment as additional information becomes available.



Financial resources to respond to climate effects

The Company maintains cash and liquid resources in accordance with the Board's risk management policy. Management considers the Group to be appropriately positioned to support its current activities and address foreseeable climate-related impacts on existing activities. Notwithstanding this, the costs associated with future low-carbon transition pathways, decarbonisation initiatives, and evolving regulatory requirements remain subject to uncertainty and could require additional investment as the Group's projects progress and climate-related obligations develop.

Overview of the Climate Transition Plan

Based on the extent of the climate-related risks and opportunities and the subsequent potential financial impacts, the Board has yet to develop a Climate Transition Plan ('CTP') but continues to endeavour the completion of such plan in due course. This will support the business strategy of achieving a resilient long-term portfolio of resource assets that will support transition to a net-zero world. As this is the Company's first Part D reporting period, there are no previously disclosed Part D response plans requiring progress reporting.

The development of the CTP will be utilising the expected global GHG emissions pathway, which has been modelled based on a range of assumptions as set out in IPCC scenario SS1-2.6, analysis of the Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) in the jurisdictions in which the Group has activities.

For a hypothetical pathway where the Group may seek to achieve net-zero emissions over the long term, it would likely need to work collaboratively with its suppliers to improve the measurement, management and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions across the value chain. Potential initiatives could include supplier education programs to support more reliable emissions measurement and reporting, as well as engagement programs aimed at identifying opportunities to reduce emissions over time. Any future pathway would likely require the establishment of agreed goals, targets and timeframes with suppliers, together with appropriate monitoring and reporting mechanisms.

As the Group has not developed a formal transition plan, the following should be regarded as preliminary considerations rather than assumptions underpinning an adopted strategy. These considerations may include technological advancements in clean technologies, alignment with international climate commitments (such as NDCs submitted under the Paris Agreement), and the ability of the resource sector to transition lower-emissions models. The feasibility of any future pathway would also be influenced by factors outside of the Group's direct control, including collaboration with customers, regulatory support, and ongoing progress in global climate policy.

Decarbonisation strategy

The Company monitors climate-related risks and opportunities that may affect its activities, strategy, and financial performance over the short, medium, and long term. As at the reporting date, the Company has not developed a formal climate transition plan, decarbonisation strategy, or greenhouse gas emissions reduction targets.

Management and the Board periodically assess the potential impacts of climate-related risks and opportunities, taking into consideration the Company's activities, regulatory developments, customer expectations, and industry trends. The Company continues to evaluate its greenhouse gas emissions profile and opportunities to improve its efficiency in its activities and reduce environmental impacts where commercially appropriate.

Given the nature, scale, and current emissions profile of the Company's activities, the Board has determined that a formal decarbonisation strategy has not yet been established. The Company will continue to monitor evolving stakeholder expectations, climate-related regulations, and business impacts and will reassess the need for a formal transition plan, emissions reduction targets, or other climate-related initiatives as part of its ongoing planning processes.

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Climate risk and opportunity integration into business strategy

Climate-related risks as detailed above fall into two categories: physical and transition risks. Both have the potential to affect activities, either directly or indirectly via the value chain. The Group's Risk Management Framework (RMF) is designed to address these identified risks and enhance our overall business resilience. Our climate risk and opportunity process identified and assessed the physical and transition risks and opportunities that the Group is facing from climate change.

How climate-related risks and opportunities are integrated into our capital allocation

The Group has not yet established a formal capital allocation policy that specifically addresses climate-related risks and opportunities. Given the Group's current stage of activities and the nature of its activities, no material capital expenditure, financing arrangements or investments were deployed during the reporting period for climate-related risks or opportunities. Capital allocation decisions continue to be assessed as part of the Group's overall budgeting and investment review processes. As the Group further develops its climate-related risk management and frameworks, it will continue to evaluate whether a formal climate-related capital allocation policy is appropriate and necessary.

At 30 June 2026, the Group did not apply an internal carbon price in decision making but as activities advance it may be considered.

Building resilience through scenario analysis ***Scenario development***

Climate scenario analysis (CSA) is a tool used to systematically assess material climate opportunities and risks that impact our activities and to assess the financial risks from climate change. Climate scenarios help us explore, assess and understand climate-related issues that may impact business-as-usual assumptions and form an integral part of our climate strategy. By understanding the key risks and opportunities, CSA helps us assess organisational impact and resilience under future climate scenarios. Consequently, it helps us enhance resilience by mitigating risks, take advantage of opportunities and assess/inform the financial impact of climate change on financial projections.

Scenario sources

The scenario analysis evaluated the potential impacts of climate-related physical and transition risks on the Group's exploration and evaluation activities in the Pilbara region of Western Australia and its corporate office administration activities. The assessment considered material value chain components directly relevant to exploration and evaluation activities, including the availability of drilling and field service providers, transport and logistics services, information technology and cloud-based services. The Group also holds interests in assets that are owned as a joint venture but not operated by the Group. Joint venture assets are not included in the assessment. The following three scenario sources were used for the assessment.

Based on reference scenarios from IPCC, NGFS and IEA, the Group developed a number of future scenario narratives to explore how difference climate futures may affect its exploration and evaluation activities, and corporate administration activities. The scenarios were selected to reflect a range of relevant transition and physical climate outcomes relevant to the Group's activities.

The Group undertook a qualitative climate scenario analysis during the reporting period to assess the potential resilience of its exploration and evaluation activities, corporate and administration functions under a range of plausible climate futures. The assessment considered climate-related risks and opportunities over short, medium and long-term time horizons, and evaluated how different transition pathways and physical climate outcomes may affect the Group's activities and objectives.

The analysis covered the Group's exploration and evaluation activities in the Pilbara region of Western Australia and its supporting corporate administration functions. The selected scenarios were considered relevant given the long-term nature of mineral exploration and project development activities, the potential for future regulatory and stakeholder expectations to influence project advancement, and the exposure of exploration activities to changing climatic conditions, including extreme weather events and water availability.

For transition risk assessment, the Group considered a Paris-aligned 1.5 degree scenario and a below 2 degree scenario to evaluate how differing levels of global carbonisation may influence regulatory requirements, stakeholder expectations, costs and future development decisions. The assessment also considered the potential impact on corporate and administration functions, including sustainability reporting obligations, compliance requirements, and information technology services.

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For physical risk assessment, the Group considered a below 2 degree scenario and a higher emissions scenario to evaluate the potential implications of changing climatic conditions on exploration and evaluation activities, corporate, and administration functions. Factors considered included the frequency and severity of extreme weather events, changing rainfall patterns, water availability, disruption to exploration programs, transportation and logistics challenges, and impacts on workforce productivity and site accessibility.

As the assessment was qualitative in nature, it focused on identifying the nature, likelihood and relative significance of climate-related risks and opportunities rather than quantifying financial impacts.

The Group considered these scenarios to assess the resilience of its exploration activities and supporting corporate and administration functions under differing climate futures, including a Paris-aligned 1.5 degree transition pathway and higher-emissions climate outcomes. The analysis assisted management in understanding how climate-related risks and opportunities may evolve over time and informed the Group's ongoing climate risk management and disclosure processes.

Transition and physical climate risks

Brockman conducted a CSA to assess both the potential impact of climate-related risks and opportunities on its exploration and evaluation activities, as well as the resilience to those risks and opportunities. The assessment considered transitional and physical climate risks relevant to the Pilbara region of Western Australia, where the Group's principal exploration and activities are located.

The CSA identified that Brockman's primary climate-related exposures arise from weather and climate conditions that may affect field-based exploration programs, access to exploration ground, contractor availability, workforce safety and regional infrastructure. The table below shows our climate-related physical risk exposure in the region, classified by the level of exposure that they represent.

Increased exposure to extreme heat, bushfires conditions, and drought and intense rainfall events may result in temporary disruptions to exploration activities, reduced access to exploration ground, increased health and safety risks for employees and contractors, and interruptions to regional transport. Compared with the Group's corporate office activities, the exploration projects are expected to experience a higher degree of exposure to physical climate-related risks.

Extreme rain frequency and severity

Increased frequency and severity of rainfall may increase downtime, overwhelm water management systems, affect workforce mobility. These impacts can result in for example, safety hazards, supply chain interruption and increased costs. Water management infrastructure is tailored to activity requirements.

Increased frequency of drought

Increased frequency of drought may impact activities and communities. Prolonged drought conditions may also degrade rehabilitation resources which may inhibit the ability to meet closure criteria.

As at the reporting date, the Group's climate resilience assessment concluded that its main activities of exploration and evaluation remain reasonably resilient under the scenarios assessed. The analysis did not identify any climate-related risks, that are expected to fundamentally alter the Group's strategy or materially impair its ability to undertake exploration and evaluation activities over the short, medium or long term. However, climate-related physical risks may influence the timing, cost and execution of exploration programs, requiring increased consideration of weather conditions, workforce safety, logistical planning and site accessibility.

The assessment also identified a number of uncertainties, including the future severity and frequency of climate hazards, the pace of climate change, technological developments, and changes in regulatory and stakeholder expectations. As the Group's assets remain at the exploration and evaluation stage, the nature, scale and location of any future development activities are also uncertain and may influence the extent of climate-related impacts in future periods.

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The Group considers that it has the capacity to adapt to the physical climate risks identified through established risk management processes and the inherent flexibility of its exploration activities. Potential adaption measures include adjusting exploration schedules to avoid periods extreme weather, implementing appropriate heat and bushfire management procedures and incorporating climate-related considerations into future project planning and development decisions. The ability to modify exploration programs, deployment schedules and field activities provides the Group with flexibility to respond to changing climate conditions.

The Group undertook a qualitative climate scenario analysis using reasonable and supportable information available without undue cost or effort. The assessment is in an early stage of maturity and will continue to be enhanced in future reporting periods. We are committed to refining our methodology of assessing climate-related risks and opportunities on a quantitative basis in the future.

RISK MANAGEMENT

Risk management

The Group's identification and management of all risks is performed in accordance with our risk management framework (RMF). Climate-related risks are integrated within our broader RMF, aligning with other principal risks and providing a holistic approach to identifying, assessing and managing risks. Potential climate-related risks are identified by gathering and analysing entity-specific evidence (such as specific risks or uncertainties that are factored into budgets) and external evidence (as such industry peer disclosures, industry-specific or jurisdiction-specific business commentaries, topics identified in disclosure standards).

This process supports the identification, assessment and ongoing monitoring of climate-related risks and opportunities across the Group. As part of this process, management undertakes a bi-annual review of key climate-related matters that could reasonably be expected to affect the Group's cashflows over the short, medium or long term. Both climate-related risks and opportunities are evaluated for their potential financial impacts, with opportunities assessed in terms of their ability to improve efficiency and reduce costs. The outcomes of these reviews are considered as part of the Group's broader risk management processes.

Risk governance

The RMF integrates risk governance, strategy and processes into business decision making. By adopting a three-line defence model, the Group establishes accountability and effectiveness in managing risk while enhancing compliance with regulation. An outline of the three-line defence model has been noted below:

Risk processes

Processes for identifying, prioritising, assessing and monitoring climate risks

The Group's approach to identify, assess, prioritise and monitor climate-related risks is guided by the Group's RMF. This process supported by a set of policies designed to arrange transparency, stakeholder engagement, and ongoing improvement. As 2026 is the Group's first Part D reporting year, the formal climate-risk process was established and enhanced during the reporting period and therefore there is no prior-year process baseline for comparison.

The Group uses qualitative climate scenario analysis to support the identification and assessment of climate related risks and opportunities across the short, medium, and longer-term time horizons. The scenarios incorporate a consistent set of assumptions and parameters relevant to its exploration and evaluation activities, including potential changes in climate conditions and weather patterns, environmental and climate-related regulatory requirements, approval expectations, access to land and infrastructure, technological developments, and broader market and economic trends.

1. Risk and opportunity — Identification

The Company conducts a process to identify the impacts and dependencies across the value chain and to determine which of these give rise to potentially relevant CROs. This includes:

- Determining the Company's time horizons for the purposes of assessment;
- A scan of the regulatory horizon to understand changes to relevant legislation, regulations, standards and frameworks;
- Scenario analysis to identify climate, related risks and opportunities. The Group applies qualitative climate scenario analysis to support the identification and assessment of climate-related risks and opportunities that could affect its activities and long term prospects. The analysis considers a range of scenarios characterised by increasing regulatory requirements, technological advancements and changing stakeholder expectations and more frequent or severe

weather-related events. Through this assessment, management evaluates how different climate conditions may influence the Group's exploration activities and its overall operating environment. The analysis assists in identifying climate-related physical and transition risks, including changes in regulation, market conditions, stakeholder expectations and potential disruptions arising from extreme weather events. The Group assesses opportunities to improve efficiency, enhance environmental performance, respond to evolving stakeholder expectations and support the long-term sustainability of its activities.

For climate-related risk identification, the Group considers how these factors may adversely affect its exploration activities and project development opportunities. This includes assessing the potential for increased disruption to field activities from extreme weather events, changes in regulatory requirements and environmental approval processes, increased costs, impact on access to resources, and changing stakeholder expectations that could influence the availability of funding for exploration and project development.

For climate-related opportunity identification, the Group considers how these same factors may create benefits to the Group's activities. Qualitative insights obtained from the scenario analysis assist the Group in identifying opportunities to enhance stakeholder engagement, and improve planning processes.

2. *Risk and opportunity — Assessment*

The insights derived from the scenario analysis are incorporated into the Group's risk management processes. CRO's are assessed based on their potential significance, timing and relevance to the Group's activities.

For more information on the scenario assumptions and why the Group considers this as a meaningful prediction of the future, please refer to the Strategy section of this report. The Group has analysed its exposure to climate-related risks and opportunities and identified all climate-related risks and opportunities that could reasonably be expected to affect the Group's cash flows.

The likelihood of each CRO's is assessed using a qualitative rating scale ranging from unlikely to almost certain. Ratings are informed by historical data, management experience, industry trends, and the anticipated impacts of climate change on the Group's activities. Likelihood assessments are aligned with the Group's risk matrix, under which events with a probability of less than 10% are classified as unlikely, events with a probability between 10% and 60% are classified as possible, and events with a probability greater than 60% are classified as likely or almost certain. The significance of identified risks and opportunities is then evaluated by considering both the likelihood of occurrence and the potential financial and reputational impacts in accordance with the Group's risk management framework.

The Group undertook a climate-related risk assessment covering its exploration and evaluation activities, together with supporting corporate management and administrative functions. The assessment considered climate physical and transition related risks and opportunities through an analysis of current and projected climate conditions, relevant regulatory developments, market trends and sentiments, and stakeholder expectations.

Separate from this risk assessment, the climate scenario analysis was undertaken and focused on climate-related impacts to exploration and evaluation activities, including field access, extreme weather events, water availability and regulatory requirements. The analysis did not extend to non-material corporate activities or value-chain components that were not considered significant to the Group's exploration and evaluation activities.

3. Risk and opportunity — Prioritisation

Using information collected in the identify and assess steps, the Company prioritises the CROs through the processes of structured evaluation of time horizons, magnitude and likelihood. The Group's risk matrix incorporates probability and severity.

- 3.1 Risk matrix: identified risks are categorised using a risk matrix that considers both likelihood and impact, enabling prioritisation of climate-related risk alongside traditional operational and financial risks.
- 3.2 Scenario analysis: the Company conducts climate-related scenario analyses based on qualitative assumptions.
- 3.3 Assessment criteria: The Group re-evaluates risks using qualitative factors (e.g., stakeholder sentiment, regulatory landscape). Opportunities are prioritised based on their potential impact, feasibility and alignment with the strategy. Opportunities are evaluated based on their relevance to the Group's project activities and stakeholder interest

4. Risk and opportunity — Manage and monitor

The climate-related risks that are added to the Group's risk register are reviewed bi-annually by the HSES Committee. The review considers whether any updates are required to the risk assessment and considers the progress of activities to mitigate or adapt to the climate-related risk. If targets relating to the risk are set, the progress towards meeting those targets is also reviewed. A summary of the review is presented to the Board bi-annually. Ongoing monitoring of climate-related risks and opportunities are integrated into business activities, e.g., through the RMF. This includes:

- 4.1 Bi-annual review of all risk exposure and emerging trends in climate science: This monitoring arranges that emerging risks and opportunities are promptly identified and addressed.
- 4.2 Engagement: Continuous engagement with stakeholders, including local communities and regulatory bodies, to stay informed about changes in climate policy and environmental conditions.

5. Risk and Opportunity — Communication

The outcomes of the risk and opportunity assessment are communicated to the HSES Committee and the Board for discussion, validation and Board sign-off. The Company is in its second year of its sustainability reporting journey. The Company first incorporated climate related disclosures in FY26 and started to incorporate the management of other sustainability-related topics into the strategy in FY25. As the risk management processes mature, the Company will be able to conduct more detailed assessments of relevant CROs.

METRICS AND TARGETS

Calculation standard

The Company measures GHG emissions using the Greenhouse Gas Protocol Corporate Accounting and Reporting Standard (2004), applying the operational control approach. This approach was selected because it enables the Company to distinguish between emissions from activities it controls (through the authority to introduce and implement operating policies) and emissions from activities in the value chain, which it does not directly control, but may be able to influence.

Emissions are disclosed on a gross basis, without offsets, in metric tonnes of CO₂ equivalent (tCO₂e).

Methodology for the calculation of GHG emissions

Scope 2 calculation methodologies

Scope 2 emissions were calculated using the location-based method covering indirect emissions from purchased electricity. Emissions were calculated using supplier invoices multiplied by the respective emission factor from refer to table 8 — Application of methodology. No contractual instruments — such as energy attributable certificates or power purchase agreements — were used. Where supplier invoices do not align exactly with reporting year, the usage has been prorated.

The table below summarises the methodology applied for the Group's reporting of Scope 2 emissions, including key inputs and assumptions. Electricity invoices are the source records for the Group's Scope 2 emissions.

Energy-efficiency optimization

The Company's commercial lease property is upgrading with smart energy systems, such as automated heating, ventilation and air conditioning controls. The leased property is also making lighting improvements through LED lighting and smart sensors for occupancy and daylight control. These allow it to reduce energy usage and help to manage physical risks, such as increased cooling demand due to rising temperatures, and transition risks such as stricter energy efficiency regulations. These measures also lower operating costs.

Climate-related targets

The Group has established a qualitative, directional climate-related goal to reduce its annual electricity consumption on a year-on-year basis, with the objective of achieving a corresponding net reduction in its Scope 2 greenhouse gas emissions.

While the Group does not currently have a sufficiently mature historical data baseline to support the formulation of a quantitative reduction target, this directional goal was determined by the management team, based on an assessment of operational capabilities, with regular review on a bi-annual basis. Metrics used to monitor progress include total annual electricity consumption (in kWh) and the corresponding Scope 2 emission (in tCo₂e). Performance and trends are detailed in section "Emission Statistics".

As a directional goal, the Group does not currently plan to use carbon credits to achieve this target. The target is a gross emissions target, not a net target, as no offsetting is planned. The target is derived from internal operational analysis rather than a sector-specific decarbonisation pathway.

REGISTRATION AND LISTING

The Company was registered in Bermuda in accordance with Section 14 of the *Companies Act 1981* on 1 February 2002. The Company's shares were listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange Hong Kong Limited ("SEHK") on 5 July 1985 and the Australian Securities Exchange Limited ("ASX") on 11 January 2011.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND GEOGRAPHICAL ANALYSIS OF OPERATIONS

The Company is an investment holding company. The principal activities of the Group are exploration and development of iron ore mining projects in Western Australia. An analysis of the performance of the Group for the year by operating segments and detailed activities of each of the Company's subsidiaries are set out in Notes 7 and 33 to the consolidated financial statements. There were no significant changes in the nature of the Group's principal activities during the year.

RESULTS AND BUSINESS REVIEW

The results of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2026 are set out in the consolidated financial statements on pages 103 to 106 of the Annual Report.

FINAL DIVIDEND

The Board does not recommend the payment of a dividend.

DIVIDEND POLICY

The Company has adopted a dividend policy, pursuant to which the Company may distribute dividends to the shareholders of the Company by way of cash or shares. Any distribution of dividends shall be in accordance with the Hong Kong Laws, the Bye-laws of the Company, the Bermuda Companies Act 1981 (as amended from time to time) and any other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

The recommendation of payment of any dividend is subject to the absolute discretion of the Board, and any declaration of dividend will be subject to the approval of shareholders. In proposing any dividend payout, the Board shall also take into account, inter alia:

- The Group's actual and expected financial performance;
- Shareholders' interests;
- Retained earnings, distributable reserves and contributed surplus of the Company and each of the other members of the Group;
- The level of the Group's debt to equity ratio, return on equity and financial covenants to which the Group is subject to;
- Possible effects on the Group's credit worthiness;
- Any restrictions on payment of dividends or other covenants on the Group's financial ratios that may be imposed by the Group's financial creditors;
- The Group's expected working capital requirements and future expansion plans;
- Liquidity position and future commitments at the time of declaration of dividend;

- Taxation considerations;
- Statutory and regulatory restrictions;
- General business conditions and strategies;

Pursuant to code provision B.2.2 of the Corporate Governance Code contained in Appendix C1 to the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on the SEHK (the "SEHK Listing Rules"), every director, including those appointed for a specific term, should be subject to retirement by rotation at least once every three years. In accordance with clause 84(1) of the Company's Bye-laws require that one-third of the directors shall retire annually and, are eligible for re-appointment, it was determined by the Board that Messrs. No director proposed for re-election at the forthcoming annual general meeting has a service contract with the Company which is not determinable by the Company within one year without payment of compensation, other than statutory compensation.

CONFIRMATION OF INDEPENDENCE

All the independent non-executive directors are appointed for a specific term and will be subject to retirement by rotation and re-election in accordance with the SEHK Listing Rules and the Bye-Laws of the Company. The Company has received from each of the Independent Non-executive Directors, an annual confirmation of their independence pursuant to Rule 3.13 of the SEHK Listing Rules. As at the date of this Annual Report, the Company still considers them to be independent.

SHARE SCHEME

The Share Scheme currently has a remaining life of seven years and is scheduled to expire in December 2033.

The total number of shares available for issue under the Share Scheme is 928,023,213, representing 10% of the issued shares as at the date of this annual report. The maximum number of shares issued and to be issued under the Share Scheme to each eligible participant within any 12-month period was limited to 1% of the shares on issue at any time. Any further grant of share options and awards in excess of this limit is subject to shareholders' approval in a general meeting.



Share options or awards granted to a director, chief executive or substantial shareholder of the Company, or to any of their associates, are subject to approval in advance by the independent non-executive directors (excluding any independent non-executive director who is the grantee of the options or awards). In addition, any grant of awards to the chief executive or a director (other than an independent non-executive director) of the Company or any of their associates would result in the shares issued and to be issued in respect of all awards granted to such person in the 12-month period up to and including the date of such grant, representing in aggregate over 0.1% of the shares on issue, such further grant of awards is subject to shareholders' approval in advance in a general meeting. Where any grant of options or awards to an independent non-executive director or a substantial shareholder of the Company, or any of their respective associates, would result in the shares issued or to be issued in respect of all options and awards granted to such person in the 12-month period in aggregate to be over 0.1% of the shares on issue, such further grant of options or awards must be approved by shareholders in a general meeting.

The period within which the share option may be exercised by the grantee under the Share Scheme is a period to be determined by the Board in its absolute discretion provided that such period shall end not later than 10 years after the date of the grant of the share option. The vesting period of share options or awards granted under the Share Scheme shall not be less than 12 months except for such circumstances as set out in the rules of the Share Scheme which the Board considers appropriate and such grants align with the purposes of the Share Scheme to shorten the vesting period.

The offer of a grant of share options or awards may be accepted within 28 days from the date of offer, upon payment of a consideration of HK\$1.00 by the grantee (or in the case of the Australian participant, a nil consideration or such other amount of consideration as the Board may determine).

The exercise price of an option is determinable by the directors and shall be at least the highest of: (i) the closing price of the shares as stated in the SEHK's daily quotations sheet on offer date, which must be a business day; (ii) the average closing price of the shares as stated in the SEHK's daily quotation sheets for the five business days immediately preceding the offer date; (iii) the nominal value of the shares.

The Board may in its absolute discretion determine whether the eligible participant is required to pay any purchase price for the acquisition of the award shares and, if so required, the amount of the purchase price will take into account the practices of comparable companies and the effectiveness of the Share Scheme in attracting and motivating the participant to contribute to the long term development of the Group. Share options do not confer rights on the holders to dividends or to vote at shareholders' meetings.

No share options were outstanding, granted, exercised, cancelled, lapsed or forfeited during the year (2025: 3,000,000 share options were cancelled at an exercise price of HK\$0.213 and 83,000,000 share options lapsed with an exercise price of HK\$0.213) and there were no issuance of ordinary shares of the Company (2025: Nil) and no new share capital (before issued expenses) was issued (2025: Nil).

The number of options and awards available for grant under the Share Scheme at the beginning and the end of the year was 928,023,213. There were no outstanding options or unvested awards under the Share Scheme at the beginning of the financial year. No options and awards were granted under the Share Scheme during the year ended 30 June 2026 or at the date of approval of these consolidated financial statements. Accordingly, there were no outstanding options or unvested awards under the Share Scheme at the end of 30 June 2026.

Saved as disclosed above, at no time during the year were rights to acquire benefits by means of acquisition of shares in of the Company granted to any of the directors or respective spouses or minor children or where any such rights exercised by them; or was the Company, its holding company, or any of its subsidiaries or fellow subsidiaries a party to any arrangement to enable the directors to acquire such rights in any other body corporate.

The directors have not included details of the nature of the liabilities covered or the amount of the premium paid in respect of this insurance, as such disclosure is prohibited under the terms of the contract.

MAJOR CUSTOMERS AND SUPPLIERS

The aggregate operating and administrative expenses attributable to the Group's five largest suppliers were less than 17% of total operating and administrative expenses (including exploration and evaluation expenses and excluding share of joint operation expenditure) for the year. At no time during the year did any director, or associate of a director, or any shareholder of the Company, (which, to the best knowledge of the directors owned more than 5% of the Company's share capital), have any beneficial interest in the Group's five largest suppliers.

PENSION SCHEME ARRANGEMENTS

Employers in Hong Kong are obliged under the Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme Ordinance to contribute for its employees 5% of the employees' relevant income to a maximum of HK\$1,500 per month. Employers in Australia are obligated to make superannuation contributions for eligible employee's superannuation at a rate of 12% on gross earnings to a maximum quarterly superannuation payment of A\$7,500 (approximately HK\$39,800) per quarter. Effective from 1 July 2026, the Australian Government's "Payday Super" regime requires Superannuation Guarantee ("SG") contributions to be paid at the same time as employee salary and wages are paid, replacing the previous quarterly contribution framework. For FY27

the SG rate is 12% of qualifying earnings. The maximum contribution base has transitioned from a quarterly limited to an annual limit of A\$270,800, (approximately HK\$1,437,000) resulting in a maximum compulsory employer superannuation contribution of approximately A\$32,500 (approximately HK\$172,400) per employee per annum. The Company has processes in place to comply with its superannuation obligations under the new requirements. No forfeited contribution is available to reduce the contribution payable in the future. The contributions charged to the statement of profit and loss represent the contribution payable to employees' funds during the year.

No contracts of significance in relation to the Group's business in which the Company, any of its subsidiaries or fellow subsidiaries, or its parent company was a party and in which a director of the Company had a material interest, whether directly or indirectly, subsisted during or at the end of the year.

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of Brockman Mining Limited (the "Company") and its subsidiaries (together the "Group") set out on pages 103 to 140, which comprise the consolidated balance sheet as at 30 June 2026, and the consolidated statement of comprehensive income, the consolidated statement of changes in equity and the consolidated statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including material accounting policy information.

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position of the Group as at 30 June 2026, and of its consolidated financial performance and its consolidated cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB") and have been properly prepared in compliance with the disclosure requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

BASIS FOR OPINION

Under IFRS, DTAs for available carry forward tax losses are only recognised when their recovery is considered probable. NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL INFORMATION

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Brockman Mining Limited (the "Company") and its subsidiaries (collectively, the "Group") principally engage in the acquisition, exploration and development of iron ore projects in Australia.

The Company is a public company incorporated and domiciled in Bermuda as an exempted company with limited liability and its shares are listed on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "SEHK") and Australian Securities Exchange (the "ASX"). The address of its registered office is Richmond House, 12 Par-la-Ville Road, Hamilton HM 08, Bermuda.

These consolidated financial statements are presented in Hong Kong dollars (HK\$), and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand (HK\$'000), except where otherwise indicated.

The Company's announcement of the results for the year ended 30 June 2026 was authorised for issue at the meeting of the Board of Directors held on 16 September 2026 and the Company's Annual Report for the year ended 30 June 2026 was authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the directors on 16 September 2026.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The consolidated financial statements of Brockman Mining Limited for the year ended 30 June 2026 have been prepared in accordance with all applicable International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS"), International Accounting Standards ("IAS"), and Interpretations as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board. The consolidated financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Group's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the consolidated financial statements are disclosed in Note 4.

These consolidated financial statements also comply with the applicable disclosure provisions of the Rules Governing the Listing of Securities on The Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Limited (the "SEHK Listing Rules").

(a) Going concern basis

For the year ended 30 June 2026, the Group recorded a net loss before tax of HK\$31,445,000 (2025: HK\$26,928,000) and had operating cash outflows of HK\$19,605,000 (2025: HK\$18,576,000). The Group also had net current liabilities of HK\$4,136,000 (2025: net current assets of HK\$4,084,000 refer to Note 22). The Group did not record any revenue during the year and the loss before tax for the period was primarily attributable to the exploration and evaluation (including the Group's share of the joint operation expenses) of the Group's iron ore exploration projects and corporate overhead costs. As at 30 June 2026, the Group's cash and cash equivalents amounted to HK\$3,922,000 (2025: HK\$5,274,000).

On 22 April 2021, Brockman Iron Pty Ltd (a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company) ("Brockman Iron") and Polaris Metals Pty Ltd ("Polaris") established the Joint Operation. Following the establishment of the Joint Operation, Polaris (or its related party) agreed to provide the Joint Operation with funding by way of a project loan sufficient to allow the Joint Operation to fund the initial development costs and forecast capital costs for development. The Joint Operators have agreed to initial development works that will be funded by Polaris with the cost estimated to be circa A\$36,000,000 (approximately HK\$194,400,000).

The A\$10,000,000 loans from Polaris were released from the escrow account in prior years pursuant to the Farm-In and Joint Venture ("FJV") Agreement. Under the terms of the FJV Agreement these loans are to be repaid from net revenue received by Brockman Iron from the sale of its share of product produced and sold from the Joint Operation. The repayment of these loans to Polaris must be in priority to all other payments from Net Revenue received by Brockman Iron from the sale of its percentage share of product sold from the project.

The Group has taken a number of measures to improve its liquidity position, including, but not limited to, the following:

- (i) Extending the repayment date of the existing loan from the substantial shareholder amounting to HK\$91,884,000 to 31 December 2027. This loan bears interest at 17% per annum.
- (ii) On 31 December 2025, the substantial shareholder undertook to increase the existing loan facility of US\$6,800,000 (approximately HK\$52,924,000) to US\$8,700,000 (approximately HK\$67,712,000) to satisfy the Group's future working capital requirements. Once drawn down it will be unsecured, bear interest at 17% per annum and will be repayable on 31 December 2027.
- (iii) The Group drew down \$580,000 (approximately HK\$4,521,000) on 12 January 2026, US\$670,000 (approximately HK\$5,249,000) on 8 April 2026 and a further US\$650,000 (approximately HK\$5,090,000) on 8 July 2026, of the revised loan facility of US\$8,700,000 (approximately HK\$67,712,000) from the substantial shareholder. These loans are unsecured, bear interest at a rate of 17% per annum and are repayable on 31 December 2027. At the date of this report the undrawn balance of the substantial shareholder loan facility is US\$2,636,000 (approximately HK\$20,672,000).

(a) Going concern basis (Continued)

- (iv) On 19 August 2026, Polaris and Brockman agreed that, with effect from 1 July 2026, Polaris had surrendered its interest in the Ophthalmia project and, from that date, the Ophthalmia project ceased to form part of the joint venture. As part of the agreement, the Group will not be required to repay the project loan from Polaris for the Ophthalmia project, which as at 30 June 2026 has been recognised as a current payable of \$6,101,000, (refer to Note 37).

The directors have reviewed the Group's cash flow projections which cover a period of not less than twelve months from the date of approval of the consolidated financial statements. They are of the opinion that, taking into account the above-mentioned measures, the Group will have sufficient financial resources to satisfy its future working capital requirements and to meet its financial obligations as and when they fall due within the next twelve months from the date of approval of these consolidated financial statements.

The directors believe that the Group can continue to access debt and equity funding to meet medium term working capital requirements and has a history of securing such funding as required in the past to support their belief. In the event that funding of an amount necessary to meet the future budgeted operational and investing activities. Accordingly, the directors of the Company consider that it is appropriate to prepare the Group's consolidated financial statements as a going concern basis.

Notwithstanding the above, there remains material uncertainty as to whether the Group can raise sufficient funds as outlined above, which may cast significant doubt about the Group's ability to continue as a going concern and, therefore whether it will realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities in the normal course of business and at the amounts stated in the consolidated financial statements.

These consolidated financial statements do not include any adjustments relating to the recoverability and classification of the Group's assets or to the amount and classification of liabilities which might be necessary should the Group not continue as a going concern.

3. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The material accounting policies applied in the preparation of these consolidated financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Changes in accounting policy and disclosures

New standards, interpretations and amendments adopted by the Group

The Group applied for the first-time certain standards and amendments, which are effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 July 2025. The Group has not early adopted any other standard, interpretation or amendment that has been issued but is not yet effective.

Several amendments and interpretations apply for the first time in 2026, but do not have a significant impact on the consolidated financial statements of the Group and, hence, have not been disclosed.

The nature and effect of these changes as a result of the adoption of the standards that have an immaterial impact on the consolidated financial statements are described below.

Lack of exchangeability — Amendments to IAS 21

For annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2025, *Lack of Exchangeability — Amendments to IAS 21 The Effects of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates* specifies how an entity should assess whether a currency is exchangeable and how it should determine a spot exchange rate when exchangeability is lacking. The amendments also require disclosure of information that enables users of its financial statements to understand how the currency not being exchangeable into the other currency affects, or is expected to affect, the entity's financial performance, financial position and cash flows.

The amendments did not have a material impact on the Group's consolidated financial statements.

Standards issued but not yet effective

The new and amended standards and interpretations that are issued, but not yet effective, up to the date of issuance of the Group's financial statements are disclosed below. The Group intends to adopt these new and amended standards and interpretations, if applicable, when they become effective.

There are no other standards that are not yet effective and that would be expected to have a material impact on the entity in the current or future reporting periods and on foreseeable future transactions.

IFRS 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements

In April 2024, the IASB issued IFRS 18, which replaces *IAS 1 Presentation of Financial Statements*. IFRS 18 introduces new requirements for presentation within the statement of profit or loss, including specified totals and subtotals. Furthermore, entities are required to classify all income and expenses within the statement of profit or loss into one of five categories: operating, investing, financing, income taxes and discontinued operations, whereof the first three are new.

The standard requires disclosure of newly defined management-defined performance measures, subtotals of income and expenses, and includes new requirements for aggregation and disaggregation of financial information based on the identified "roles" of the primary financial statements ("PFS") and the notes.

In addition, narrow-scope amendments have been made to *IAS 7 Statement of Cash Flows*, which include changing the starting point for determining cash flows from operations under the indirect method, from "profit or loss" to "operating profit or loss" and removing the optionality around classification of cash flows from dividends and interest. In addition, there are consequential amendments to several other standards.

IFRS 18, and the amendments to the other standards, are effective for reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027, but earlier application is permitted and must be disclosed. IFRS 18 will apply retrospectively.

The Group is currently working to identify all impact the amendments will have on the primary financial statements and notes to the consolidated financial statements.

Annual improvements to IFRS Accounting Standards — Volume 11

In July 2024, the IASB issued nine narrow scope amendments as part of its periodic maintenance of IFRS accounting standards. The amendments include clarifications, simplifications, corrections or changes to improve consistency in *IFRS 1 First-time Adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards*, *IFRS 7 Financial Instruments: Disclosure and its accompanying guidance on implementing IFRS 7*, *IFRS 9 Financial Instruments*, *IFRS 10 Consolidated Financial Statements* and *IAS 7 Statement of Cashflows*.

The amendments will be effective for reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2026. Earlier application is permitted and must be disclosed. The amendments are not expected to have a material impact on the Group's consolidated financial statements.

Amendments to the Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments — Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7

In May 2024, the IASB issued *Amendments to the Classification and Measure of Financial Instruments — Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7* (the Amendments). The Amendments include:

- A clarification that a financial liability is derecognised on the "settlement date" and the introduction of an accounting policy (if specific conditions are met) to derecognise financial liabilities settled using an electronic payment system before the settlement date.
- Additional guidance on how the contractual cash flows for financial assets with environmental, social and corporate governance ("ESG") and similar features should be assessed.
- Clarifications on what constitute "non-recourse features" and what are the characteristics of contractually linked instruments.
- The introduction of disclosures for financial instruments with contingent features and additional disclosure requirements for equity instruments classified at fair value through other comprehensive income ("OCI").

The Amendments are effective for annual periods starting on or after 1 January 2026 with early adoption permitted for classification of financial assets and related disclosures only. The Group does not anticipate that the amendments will have a material effect on the Group's consolidated financial statements.

There are no other standards that are not yet effective and that would be expected to have a material impact on the entity in the current or future reporting periods and on foreseeable future transactions.

(b) Subsidiaries

Subsidiaries are all entities (including structured entities) over which the Group has control. The Group controls an entity when the Group is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity. Subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group. They are deconsolidated from the date that control ceases.

Intra-group transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between group companies are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the transferred asset. When necessary, amounts reported by subsidiaries have been adjusted to conform with the Group's accounting policies.

(i) *Changes in ownership interests in subsidiaries without change of control*

Transactions with non-controlling interests that do not result in loss of control are accounted for as equity transactions with equity holders of the Group. The difference between fair value of any consideration paid and the relevant share acquired of the carrying amount of net assets of the subsidiary is recorded in equity. Gains or losses on disposal of non-controlling interests are also recorded in equity.

(ii) *Disposal of subsidiaries*

If the Group loses control over a subsidiary, it derecognises (i) the assets and liabilities of the subsidiary, (ii) the carrying amount of any non-controlling interest and (iii) the cumulative translation differences recorded in equity; and recognises (i) the fair value of the consideration received, (ii) the fair value of any investment retained and (iii) any resulting surplus or deficit in profit or loss. It means the amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss or transferred to another category of equity or specified/permitted by applicable IFRS.

(c) Joint arrangements

The Group undertakes a number of business activities through joint arrangements. A joint arrangement is an arrangement over which two or more parties have joint control. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control over an arrangement which exists only when the decisions about the relevant activities (being those that significantly affect the returns of the arrangement) require the unanimous consent of the parties sharing control. The Group's joint arrangements are of two types:

(i) *Joint operations*

A joint operation is a type of joint arrangement in which the parties with joint control of the arrangement have rights to the assets and obligations for the liabilities relating to the arrangement. Joint control is the contractually agreed sharing of control of an arrangement, which exists only when decisions about the relevant activities require the unanimous consent of the parties sharing control.

In relation to its interests in joint operations, the financial statements of the Group include:

- Assets, including its share of any assets owned jointly;
- Liabilities, including its share of any liabilities incurred jointly;
- Revenue from the sale of its share of the output arising from the joint operation; and
- Expenses, including its share of any expenses incurred jointly.

The assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses relating to the Group's interest in a joint operation are accounted for in accordance with the IFRSs applicable to the particular assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses.

All such amounts are measured in accordance with the terms of each arrangement which are in proportion to the Group's interest in each asset and liability, income and expense of the relevant joint operation.

(ii) *Joint ventures*

A joint venture is a type of joint arrangement in which the parties with joint control of the arrangement have rights to the net assets of the arrangement. A separate vehicle (not the parties) will have the rights to the assets and obligations for the liabilities, relating to the arrangement. Joint ventures are accounted for using the equity method.

Under the equity method of accounting, interests in joint ventures are initially recognised at cost and adjusted thereafter to recognise the Group's share of the post-acquisition profits or losses and movements in other comprehensive income. When the Group's share of losses in joint ventures equals or exceeds its interests in the joint ventures (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the Group's net investment in the joint ventures), the Group does not recognise further losses, unless it has incurred obligations or made payments on behalf of the joint ventures.

(ii) Joint ventures (Continued)

Unrealised gains on transactions between the Group and its joint ventures are eliminated to the extent of the Group's interest in the joint ventures. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of the joint ventures have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the Group.

(d) Foreign currency translation

(i) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of each of the Group's entities are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates (the "functional currency"). The consolidated financial statements are presented in Hong Kong dollars, which is the Company's functional and the Group's presentation currency.

(ii) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where items are re-measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the profit and loss.

Differences arising on settlement or translation of monetary items are recognised in the statement of profit or loss with the exception of monetary items that are designed as part of the hedge of the Group's net investment of a foreign operation. These are recognised in other comprehensive income until the net investment is disposed of, at which time the cumulative amount is reclassified to the statement of profit or loss.

(iii) Group companies

The results and financial position of all the Group entities (none of which has the currency of a hyperinflationary economy) that have a functional currency different from the presentation currency are translated into the presentation currency as follows:

- assets and liabilities for each balance sheet presented are translated at the closing rate at the date of that balance sheet;
- income and expenses for each statement of comprehensive income are translated at average exchange rate (unless this average is not a reasonable approximation of the cumulative effect of the rates prevailing on the transaction dates, in which case income and expenses are translated at the rates on the dates of the transactions);
- all resulting currency translation differences are recognised in other comprehensive income; and
- for the purpose of the consolidated statements of cash flows, the cash flows of overseas subsidiaries are translated into Hong Kong dollars at the exchange rates ruling at the dates of the cash flows. Frequently recurring cash flows of overseas subsidiaries which arise throughout the year are translated into Hong Kong dollars at the weighted average exchange rates for the year.

(iv) Disposal of foreign operation and partial disposal

On the disposal of a foreign operation (that is, a disposal of the Group's entire interest in a foreign operation, a disposal involving loss of control over a subsidiary that includes a foreign operation), all of the currency translation differences accumulated in equity in respect of that operation attributable to the owners of the Company are reclassified to profit or loss.

In the case of a partial disposal that does not result in the Group losing control over a subsidiary that includes a foreign operation, the proportionate share of accumulated currency translation differences is re-attributed to non-controlling interests and is not recognised in profit and loss. For all other partial disposals (that is, reductions in the Group's ownership interest in joint ventures that do not result in the Group losing joint control) the proportionate share of the accumulated exchange difference is reclassified to profit and loss.

(e) Mining exploration properties

Mining exploration properties are stated in the balance sheet at cost less subsequent accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses. Mining exploration properties are amortised using the units of production method based on the proven and probable mineral reserves and starts when commercial production commences.

Mining exploration properties acquired in a business combination are identified and recognised as intangible assets separately from goodwill where they satisfy the definition of an intangible asset and their fair values can be measured reliably. The cost of such intangible assets is their fair value at the acquisition date.

Impairment reviews of mining exploration properties are undertaken if events or changes in circumstances indicate a potential impairment. The carrying value of mining exploration properties is compared to the recoverable amount, which is the higher of value-in-use and the fair value less costs of disposal. For the purpose of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash flows (cash-generating units). Mining exploration properties that suffered impairment are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at each reporting date.

(f) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price and any directly attributable costs of bringing the asset to its working condition and location for its intended use.

Expenditure incurred after items of property, plant and equipment have been put into operation, such as repairs and maintenance, is normally charged to profit or loss in the period in which it is incurred. In situations where the recognition criteria are satisfied, the expenditure for a major inspection is capitalised in the carrying amount of the asset as a replacement. Where significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Company recognises such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly.

Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line basis to write off the cost of each item of property, plant and equipment to its residual value over its estimated useful life. The principal annual rates used for this purpose are as follows:

Plant, furniture, fixtures and equipment	12.5% – 25% per annum
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Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, the cost of that item is allocated on a reasonable basis among the parts and each part is depreciated separately. Residual values, useful lives and the depreciation method are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at least at each financial year end.

An item of property, plant and equipment including any significant part initially recognised is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss on disposal or retirement is recognised in the profit and loss in the year the asset is derecognised and determined as is the difference between the net sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the relevant asset.

(g) Financial assets

i) Classification and measurement

Financial assets are classified, at initial recognition, as subsequently measured at amortised cost or at fair value through profit or loss.

The classification of financial assets at initial recognition depends on the financial asset's contractual cash flow characteristics and the Group's business model for managing them. With the exception of trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group has applied the practical expedient, the Group initially measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs. Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group has applied the practical expedient are measured at the transaction price determined under IFRS 15.

In order for a financial asset to be classified and measured at amortised cost, it needs to give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding. Financial assets with cash flows that are not SPPI are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss, irrespective of the business model.

The Group's business model for managing financial assets refers to how it manages its financial assets in order to generate cash flows. The business model determines whether cash flows will result from collecting contractual cash flows, selling the financial assets, or both. Financial assets classified and measured at amortised cost are held within a business model with the objective to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows, while financial assets classified and measured at fair value through other comprehensive income are held within a business model with the objective of both holding to collect contractual cash flows and selling. Financial assets which are not held within the aforementioned business models are classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss.

At 30 June 2026, the group does not have any financial assets classified and measured at fair value through other comprehensive income (2025: Nil).

(g) Financial assets (Continued)

ii) Subsequent measurement

Financial assets at amortised cost are subsequently measured using the effective interest (EIR) method and are subject to impairment. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised, modified or impaired.

iii) Offsetting financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the balance sheet when there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

iv) Impairment of financial assets

Simplified approach

For trade receivables and contract assets that do not contain a significant financing component or when the Group applies the practical expedient of not adjusting the effect of a significant financing component, the Group applies the simplified approach in calculating ECLs. Under the simplified approach, the Group does not track changes in credit risk, but instead recognises a loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date.

h) Financial liabilities

i) Initial recognition and measurement

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings, and payables, net of directly attributable transactions costs. The Group's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, and other borrowings.

The subsequent measurement of financial liabilities depends on their classification as follows:

ii) Financial liabilities at amortised cost (payables, loans and borrowings)

After initial recognition, interest-bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the EIR method. Gains and losses are recognised in the statement of profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised as well as through the effective interest rate amortisation process.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. The effective interest rate amortisation is included in finance costs in the statement of profit or loss.

Remeasurement of financial liabilities

However, if a financial liability is modified and the modification does not result in derecognition, the carrying amount of the liability is remeasured to reflect the revised contractual cashflows, discounted using the original effective interest rate. Any resulting gain or loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss within finance income or finance cost.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled, or expires.

When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as a derecognition of the original liability and a recognition of a new liability, and the difference between the respective carrying amounts is recognised in the statement of profit or loss.

(i) Impairment of non-financial assets

Where an indication of impairment exists, or when annual impairment testing for an asset is required (other than inventories, deferred tax assets and financial assets), the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of the asset's or cash generating unit's value in use and its fair value less costs of disposal, and is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or group of assets, in which the recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. An impairment loss is recognised only if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. An impairment loss is charged to the statement of profit or loss in the period in which it arises in those expense categories consistent with the function of the impaired asset. An assessment is made at the end of each reporting period as to whether there is an indication that previously recognised impairment losses may no longer exist or may have decreased. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount is estimated. A previously recognised impairment loss of an asset other than goodwill is reversed only if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount of that asset, but not to an amount higher than the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of any depreciation/amortisation) had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of such an impairment loss is credited to the statement of profit or loss in the period in which it arises.

(j) Fair value measurement

The Group measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value upon initial recognition. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either in the principal market for the asset or liability, or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Group. The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest.

A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use.

The Group uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the consolidated financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

Level 1 — based on quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 — based on valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is observable, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 — based on valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

(k) Other receivables

Other receivables are amounts due from transactions outside the ordinary course of business. If collection of other receivables is expected in one year or less (or in the normal operating cycle of the business if longer), they are classified as current assets. If not, they are presented as non-current assets.

Other receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the EIR method, less provision for impairment.

(l) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and deposits and have a short maturity of generally within three months when acquired. Restricted cash is not available for use by the Company and is therefore not considered highly liquid.

For the purpose of the balance sheet, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and at banks, including term deposits with a maturity of three months or less, which are not restricted as to use.

(m) Related parties

A party is considered to be related to the Group if:

(a) *The party is a person or a close member of that person's family and that person*

- i. Has control or joint control over the Group;
- ii. Has significant influence over the Group; or
- iii. Is a member of the key management personnel of the Group or of a parent of the Group;

(m) Related parties (Continued)

(b) The party is an entity where any of the following conditions applies:

- i. The entity and the Group are members of the same group;
- ii. One entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or of a parent, subsidiary or fellow subsidiary of the other entity);
- iii. The entity and the Group are joint ventures of the same third party;
- iv. One entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity;
- v. The entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (a);
- vi. A person identified in (a)(i) has significant influence over the entity or is a member of the key management personnel of the entity (or of a parent of the entity); and
- vii. The entity, or any member of a group of which it is a part, provides key management personnel services to the Group or to the parent of the Group.

(n) Trade and other payables

Trade payables are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Trade payables are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less (or in the normal operating cycle of the business if longer). If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Other payables include the Group's share of the joint operation expenditure of HK\$61,750,000 carried at amortised cost presented as a non-current liability as the repayment date is deferred to 30 September 2027 (2025: HK\$67,643,000), and HK\$6,101,000 carried at cost presented as a current liability (2025: HK\$4,238,000 carried at amortised cost presented as a non-current liability), payable to Mineral Resources Limited, refer to note 22 and 28(a).

(o) Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share ("EPS") is calculated as net profit/loss attributable to members of the parent divided by the weighted average number of ordinary shares, adjusted for any bonus element. Diluted EPS is calculated as net profit/loss attributable to members of the parent, adjusted for:

- Costs of servicing equity (other than dividends);
- The after tax effect of dividends and interest associated with dilutive potential ordinary shares that have been recognised as expenses; and
- Other non-discretionary changes in revenues or expenses during the period that would result from the dilution of potential ordinary shares.

The result is then divided by the weighted average number of ordinary shares and dilutive potential ordinary shares adjusted for any bonus element.

(p) Borrowings

Borrowings are recognised initially at fair value, net of transaction costs incurred. Borrowings are subsequently carried at amortised cost; and difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption value is recognised in the profit and loss over the period of the borrowing using the EIR method.

Fees paid on the settlement of loan facilities are recognised as transaction costs of the loan to the extent that it is probable that some or all of the facility will be drawn down. In this case, the fee is deferred until the draw-down occurs. To the extent there is no evidence that it is probable that some or all of the facility will be drawn down, the fee is capitalised as a prepayment for liquidity services and amortised over the period of the facility to which it relates.

Borrowings are classified as non-current liabilities as the Group has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liabilities for at least 12 months after the end of the reporting period.

(q) Issued capital

Issued and paid up capital is recognised at the fair value of the consideration received by the Company.

(r) **Current and deferred income tax**

Income tax comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax relating to items recognised outside profit or loss is recognised outside profit or loss, either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

All wholly-owned Australian subsidiaries of the Company form a tax consolidated group under Australian tax law and are taxed as a single entity. Brockman Mining Holdings (Australia) Pty Ltd ("BMHA"), a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Company, is the head entity of the Australian tax consolidated group.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of the tax laws enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date in the countries where the Group operates and generates taxable income. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulation is subject to interpretation. It establishes provisions where appropriate on the basis of amounts expected to be paid to the tax authorities.

Deferred tax is recognised, using the liability method, on temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the consolidated financial statements. However, the deferred income tax is not accounted for if it arises from initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction other than a business combination that at the time of the transaction affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss. The initial recognition exception is not applied to deferred tax related to assets and liabilities arising from a single transaction (i.e. leases).

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary difference can be utilised and carry forward of any unused tax losses. The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets and current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority on either the same taxable entity or different taxable entities which intend either to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously, in each future period in which significant amounts of deferred tax liabilities or assets are expected to be settled or recovered.

(s) **Employee benefits**

(i) **Short-term obligations**

Salaries, annual bonuses, annual leave entitlement and the cost of non-monetary benefits expected to be settled within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service are recognised in respect of employees' services up to the end of the reporting period and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled. The liability for annual leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits. All other short-term employee benefit obligations are presented as payables.

(ii) **Other long term employee benefit obligations**

The liability for long service leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits and measured as the present value of the expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting period. Consideration is given to expected future wages and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of services. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the end of the reporting period on high quality corporate bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

The obligations are presented as current liabilities in the balance sheet if the entity does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, regardless of when the actual settlement is expected to occur.

(iii) **Pension obligations**

The Company operates a defined contribution Mandatory Provident Fund Retirement Benefit Scheme (the "MPF Scheme") under the Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme Ordinance for all its employees. Contributions are made based on a percentage of the employees' basic salaries and are charged to the statement of profit and loss as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the MPF Scheme. The assets of the MPF Scheme are held separately from those of the Group in an independently administered fund. The Group's employer contributions vest fully with the employees when contributed to the MPF Scheme.

For the overseas subsidiaries obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are expensed as the related services are provided.

(t) Share-based payments

(i) *Equity-settled share-based payment transactions*

The Group operates equity-settled, share-based compensation plans, under which the entity receives services from directors and employees as consideration for equity instruments (share options) of the Group. The fair value of the employee services received in exchange for the grant of the options is recognised as an expense. The fair value is determined by an external valuer using a binomial model.

The cost of equity settled transactions is recognised in employee benefit expense, together with a corresponding increase in equity, over the period in which the performance and/or service conditions are fulfilled. The cumulative expense recognised for equity-settled transactions at the end of each reporting period until the vesting date reflects the extent to which the vesting period has expired and the Group's best estimate of the number of equity instruments that will ultimately vest. The charge or credit to the statement of profit or loss for a period represents the movement in the cumulative expense recognised as at the beginning and end of that period.

Where the terms of an equity-settled award are modified, as a minimum an expense is recognised as if the terms had not been modified, if the original terms of the award are met. In addition, an expense is recognised for any modification that increases the total fair value of the share-based payments, or is otherwise beneficial to the employee as measured at the date of modification. Where an equity-settled award is cancelled, it is treated as if it had vested on the date of cancellation, and any expense not yet recognised for the award is recognised immediately.

The dilutive effect of outstanding share options is reflected as additional share dilution in the computation of earnings per share unless they are antidilutive.

(ii) *Share-based payment transactions among group entities*

The grant by the Company of options over its equity instruments to the employees of subsidiary undertakings in the Group is treated as a capital contribution. The fair value of employee services received, measured by reference to the grant date fair value, is recognised over the vesting period as an increase to investment in subsidiary undertakings, with a corresponding credit to equity in the parent entity accounts.

(u) Provisions

A provision is recognised when a present obligation (legal and constructive) has arisen as a result of a past event and it is probable that a future outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, provided that a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

When the Group expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, the reimbursement is recognised as a separate asset, but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the statement of profit or loss net of any reimbursement.

When the effect of discounting is material, the amount recognised for a provision is the present value at the end of the reporting period of the future expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation. The increase in the discounted present value amount arising from the passage of time is included in finance costs in profit and loss.

(v) Interest income

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis using the EIR method by applying the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash receipts over the expected life of the financial instrument or a shorter period, when appropriate, to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

(w) Exploration and evaluation costs

Exploration and evaluation expenditure is expensed to the consolidated statement of profit or loss as and when it is incurred and included as part of cashflows from operating activities in the consolidated statement of cashflows. Exploration and evaluation expenditure is only capitalised to the consolidated balance sheet if they result from an acquisition.

(x) Consumption tax (goods and services tax and value-added tax)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of consumption tax except:

- where the consumption tax incurred on a purchase of goods and services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case the consumption tax is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item as applicable; and
- receivables and payables are stated with the amount of consumption tax included.

(x) Consumption tax (goods and services tax and value-added tax) (Continued)

The net amount of consumption tax recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of the receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

Cash flows are included in the consolidated statement of cash flows on a gross basis and the consumption tax component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority, are classified as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of consumption tax recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority.

(y) Leases

The Group assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Group as a lessee

The Group applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets. The Group recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets. At inception or on reassessment of a contract that contains a lease component and non-lease components, the Group adopts the practical expedient not to separate non-lease components and to account for the lease component and the associated non-lease components (e.g., property management services for leases of properties) as a single lease component.

Right-of-use assets

The Group recognises right-of-use assets at the commencement date of the lease (i.e., the date the underlying asset is available for use). Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of the right-of-use asset includes the amount lease liabilities recognised, lease payments made at or before the commencement date, less any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred by the lessee, restoring the site on which it is located or restoring the underlying asset to the condition required by the terms and conditions of the lease. Unless the Group is reasonably certain to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of lease term, the recognised right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of its estimated useful life and the lease term. Right-of-use assets are subject to impairment.

Lease liabilities

At the commencement date of the lease, the Group recognises lease liabilities measured at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments include fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date, and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees. The lease payments also include the exercise price of a purchase option reasonably certain to be exercised by the Group and payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the Group exercising the option to terminate. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are recognised as an expense in the period on which the event or condition that triggers that payment occurs.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Group uses the incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date if the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of the lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in the lease payments or a change in the assessment to purchase the underlying asset (e.g., a change to future lease payment resulting from a change in an index rate).

Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

When the Group enters into a lease in respect of a low-value asset, the Group decides whether to capitalise the lease on a lease-by-lease basis. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(z) Events after reporting period

If the Group receives information after the reporting period, but prior to the date of authorisation for issue, about conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period, it will assess whether the information affects the amounts that it recognises in its financial statements. The Group will adjust the amounts recognised in its financial statements to reflect any adjusting events after the reporting period and update the disclosures that relate to those conditions in light of the new information. For non-adjusting events after the reporting period, the Group will not change the amounts recognised in its financial statements, but will disclose the nature of the non-adjusting events and as estimate of their financial effects, or a statement that such an estimate cannot be made, if applicable.



4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The preparation of the Group's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and their accompanying disclosures and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of the assets or liabilities affected in the future.

Judgements

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, management has made the following judgements, apart from those involving estimations, which have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the consolidated financial statements:

(a) *Impairment of mining exploration properties in Australia*

Mining exploration properties are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that an impairment may exist. The Group performs an assessment of impairment indicators to determine when facts and circumstances suggest that the carrying amount of mining exploration properties may exceed its recoverable amount.

The assessment of whether there are any impairment indicators in respect of a mining exploration property involves a number of judgments. These include whether the Group has the right to explore in the specific area of interest, whether ongoing expenditure is planned or budgeted and whether there is sufficient information for a decision to be made that the area of interest is not commercially viable.

As at 30 June 2026, the carrying amount of the mining exploration properties is HK\$733,524,000 (2025: HK\$697,691,000). There is no impairment loss recognised for the year ended 30 June 2026 (2025: Nil) as no facts and circumstances indicate that the mining exploration properties may be impaired. See Note 17 for further consideration by the Group.

Estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below:

(a) *Measurement of Polaris loans and non-current payables*

Estimating the market interest rate

The Polaris loans were initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using a market interest rate of 12%, which the directors believe best reflects the Group's market interest rate for borrowings of these amounts and terms.

The other payables that are presented as a non-current liability were initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using a market interest rate of 12.1%, which the directors believe best reflects the Group's market interest rate for payables of these amounts and terms.

Estimating the repayment dates and amounts

The date of repayment for the Polaris loans will depend on the date of commencement of operations and it is expected that full repayment will be made within two — three months of this date.

As at 30 June 2026, the carrying amount of these borrowings is HK\$34,869,000 (2025: HK\$29,535,000).

(b) *Income taxes*

Deferred tax assets are recognised for unused tax losses and other deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the losses can be utilised. Significant management judgement is required to determine the tax base for mining exploration properties as well as the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and the level of future taxable profits, together with future tax planning strategies and changes in factors which provide confirmation of the existence and ability to utilise tax losses.

At 30 June 2026, certain mining exploration properties with a carrying value of HK\$733,524,000 (2025: HK\$697,691,000) have been determined as having a tax base of nil. This judgement will be re-assessed as the related projects develop.

At 30 June 2026, the Group's total carried forward tax losses were HK\$1,303,063,000 (2025: HK\$1,218,222,000). The Group did not recognise a deferred income tax asset in respect of tax losses amounting to approximately HK\$918,933,000 (2025: HK\$857,162,000) as the utilisation of these tax losses is subject to the satisfaction of the loss recoupment rules in the relevant tax jurisdiction as well as other uncertainties which mean that their realisation is not considered probable.

The unrecognised tax losses arising in Hong Kong of HK\$360,554,000 (2025: HK\$326,060,000) are available indefinitely for offsetting against future taxable profits of the companies in which the losses arose. Deferred tax assets have not been recognised in respect of these losses as it is not considered probable that taxable profits will be available against which these losses can be utilised.

The unrecognised tax losses of HK\$558,379,000 (2025: HK\$531,102,000) relate to Australian subsidiaries that have a history of losses. These losses do not expire and may not be used to offset taxable or other income elsewhere in the Group. The Group has determined that these losses are not expected to be available for utilisation when taxable temporary differences are expected to reverse. On this basis, the Group has determined that it cannot recognise deferred tax assets on these unrecognised tax losses carried forward. Further work continues in respect of assessing whether these unrecognised tax losses may become available.

5. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

Financial risk factors

The Group's principal financial instruments comprise cash and short term deposits. The Group has various other financial assets and liabilities such as other receivables and payables. The Group's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including exchange rate risk), credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate risk. The Group's overall risk management program focuses on the unpredictability of the financial markets. The Group uses different methods to measure and manage different types of risks to which it is exposed. Risk management is carried out by the Executive Committee with guidance from the Risk Management Committee under policies approved by the Board. The Board also provides regular guidance for the overall risk management, including guidance on specific areas, such as foreign exchange and interest rate risks.

Primary responsibility for identification and control of financial risks rests with the Board. The Board reviews and agrees policies for managing each of the risks identified below including the future cash flow forecast projections and financial instruments if considered necessary. It is and has been throughout the year under review, the Group's policy that no trading in financial instruments shall be undertaken.

i) Capital risk management

The Group manages its capital to ensure that entities in the Group will be able to continue as going concern while maximising the return to shareholders through the optimisation of the debt and equity balances. The directors of the Company consider that the capital structure of the Group consists of long-term debt and lease liabilities (excluding non-current liability other payables), and equity attributable to equity holders of the Company comprising issued capital and reserves.

The directors of the Company review the capital structure by considering the cost of capital and the risks associated with each class of capital. Based on recommendations of the directors, the Group will balance its overall capital structure through new share issues as well as the issue of the new debt or the repayment of existing debt. Neither the Company nor any of its subsidiaries are subject to externally imposed capital requirements. No changes were made in the objectives, policies or processes for managing capital during the years ended 30 June 2026 and 2025.

The Group monitors capital using a gearing ratio, which is long-term debt (excluding non-current liability other payables) over equity and long-term debt. The gearing ratios at 30 June 2026 and 2025 were as follows:

(v) Credit risk

The Group's maximum exposure to credit risk which could cause a financial loss to the Group due to failure to discharge an obligation by the counterparties arises from the carrying amount of the trade receivables, other receivables and deposits, amount due from a related party, cash and cash equivalents and restricted cash as stated in the consolidated balance sheet.

Management reviews the recoverable amount of each individual trade debt at each balance sheet date to ensure that adequate impairment losses are made for expected credit losses by assessing the credit quality of the counterparties by taking into account its financial position, past experience and other factors. The Group trades only recognised and creditworthy third parties. It is the Group's policy that all customers who wish to trade on credit terms are subject to credit verification on an ongoing basis and the Group's exposure to bad debts is not significant. For transactions that are not denominated in the functional currency of the relevant operating unit, the Group does not offer credit terms without the specific approval of management. In this regard, the directors of the Company consider that the credit risk of the Group is reduced.

The credit risk on cash and cash equivalents is limited for both the Group and the Company because counterparties are mainly the banks with high credit-rating assigned by international credit-rating agencies.

The Group and the Company have no concentration of credit risk, with exposure spread over a number of counterparties.

(vi) Interest rate risk

Fair value interest rate risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. Cash flow interest rate risk that the future cash flow from a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Company's policy is to manage its exposure to interest rate risk by holding cash in short term, fixed and variable rate deposits with reputable high credit quality financial institutions. The Company analyses its interest rate exposure and consideration is given to potential renewals of existing positions, alternative financing and or the mix of fixed or variable interest rates.

As at 30 June 2026 and 2025, the Group was not exposed to any significant interest rate risk.

29. RETIREMENT BENEFIT SCHEMES

The Group operates a defined contribution plan (the "MPF Scheme") under the Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme Ordinance for its employees in Hong Kong. The Group contributes 5% (2025: 5%) of the employees' relevant income to a maximum of HK\$1,500 per month to the MPF scheme. The assets of the MPF scheme are held separately from those of the Group in an independently administered fund. No forfeited contribution is available to reduce the contribution payable in the future.

The employees of the Group subsidiaries in Australia are entitled to superannuation contributions that is a defined contribution plan under which the subsidiaries in Australia contributes 12.0% (2025: 11.5%) of the employees' base salary to a maximum quarterly superannuation payment of A\$7,500 (approximately HK\$39,800) per quarter. Effective from 1 July 2026, the Australian Government's "Payday Super" regime requires Superannuation Guarantee ("SG") contributions to be paid at the same time as employee salary and wages are paid, replacing the previous quarterly contribution framework. For FY27 the SG rate is 12% of qualifying earnings. The maximum contribution base has transitioned from a quarterly limited to an annual limit of A\$270,800, (approximately HK\$1,437,000) resulting in a maximum compulsory employer superannuation contribution of approximately A\$32,500 (approximately HK\$172,400) per employee per annum. The Company has processes in place to comply with its superannuation obligations under the new requirements.

The total cost is charged to administration expense of approximately HK\$692,000 (2025: HK\$644,000) and represents contributions to these schemes by the Group in respect of the current year.

37. EVENTS OCCURRING AFTER BALANCE SHEET DATE

1. On 8 July 2026, the Group drew down US\$650,000 (approximately HK\$5,090,000) of the revised loan facility of US\$8,700,000 (approximately HK\$67,711,000) from the substantial shareholder. The loan is unsecured, bears interest at a rate of 17% per annum and is repayable on 31 December 2027.
2. On 19 August 2026, Polaris and Brockman mutually agreed that effective from 1 July 2026 Polaris surrendered its interest in the Ophthalmia project and from that date Ophthalmia is no longer part of the joint venture.

As part of the agreement, the Group will not be required to repay the project loan from Polaris for the Ophthalmia project, which as at 30 June 2026 has been recognised as a current payable of \$6,101,000.

From the effective date of 1 July 2026, the Company will no longer account for Ophthalmia as a joint operation. The Company has also considered the impact of the termination of the joint venture on the carrying value and classification of its Ophthalmia project.
