Corporate Governance Statement

The Board of Flynn Gold Limited (the **Company**) is responsible for the overall corporate governance of the Group. The Board believes that good corporate governance helps ensure the future success of the Company, adds value to stakeholders and enhances investor confidence.

The Board is responsible for establishing Flynn Gold Limited's corporate governance framework, the key features of which are set out below. In establishing its corporate governance framework, the Board has referred to the 4th edition of the ASX Corporate Governance Councils' Corporate Governance Principles and Recommendations (**ASX Recommendations**).

The Board has created a framework for managing the Company including adopting relevant internal controls, risk management processes and corporate governance policies and practices which it believes are appropriate for the Company's business and which are designed to promote the responsible management and conduct of the Company. In establishing its corporate governance framework, the Board has referred to the 4th edition of the ASX Corporate Governance Councils' Corporate Governance Principles and Recommendations (**ASX Recommendations**).

The ASX Listing Rules require listed companies to prepare a statement disclosing the extent to which they have complied with the Recommendations during the reporting period. The Recommendations are not prescriptive, such that if a company considers a recommendation to be inappropriate having regard to its own circumstances, it has the flexibility not to follow it. Where a company has not followed all the Recommendations, it must identify which Recommendations have not been followed and provide reasons for not following them.

This statement is current as at 24 September 2026 and has been approved by the Board of the Company.

PRINCIPLE 1: LAY SOLID FOUNDATIONS FOR MANAGEMENT AND OVERSIGHT

Recommendation 1.1 - Role of the Board and Management

The Company has established the respective roles and responsibilities of its Board and management, and those matters expressly reserved for the Board and those delegated to management, and has documented these roles and responsibilities in its Board Charter.

The role of the Board is to approve the strategic direction of the Group, guide and monitor the management of the Company and its businesses and oversee the implementation of appropriate corporate governance with respect to the Group's affairs. The Board aims to protect and enhance the interests of its shareholders, while taking into account the interests of other stakeholders, including employees, customers, suppliers and the wider community.

The copy of Board Charter which is available on our website at <https://flynnngold.com.au/corporate/corporate-governance-2/> that clearly sets out those matters expressly reserved for the Board's determination and those matters delegated to management.

The Board delegates responsibility for the day-to-day management of the Company and its businesses to the Managing Director & CEO. Technical Director and senior management team, who delegates authority to appropriate senior executives for specific activities and transactions. The Board maintains ultimate responsibility for strategy, control and risk profile of the Group.

Recommendation 1.2: Appointment of Directors and Senior Executives

The Company has guidelines for the appointment and selection of the Board and senior executives which require the Company to undertake appropriate checks before appointing a person or putting forward to security holders a candidate for election, as a Director.

We provide our shareholders with all material information relevant to a decision on whether or not to elect or re-elect a Director will be provided to security holders in a Notice of Meeting, Annual Report and other channels pursuant to which the resolution to elect or re-elect a Director will be voted on.

Recommendation 1.3: Appointment Terms

Upon appointment, each Director receives a letter of appointment which sets out the formal terms of their appointment. Directors and certain senior executive enter into a deed of indemnity, insurance and access.

Each senior executive is party to a written agreement with the Company which sets out the terms of that senior executive's appointment. Details of executive contracts in place are detailed in the Company's Remuneration Report in the Annual Report.

The terms and conditions of the appointment are consistent with the processes in the Constitution, the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth) and the ASX Listing Rules, including, without limitation, the requirement to disclose Directors' interests and any matters which may affect the Director's independence and the requirement to comply with the Company's policies.

Recommendation 1.4: Company Secretary

The Board is supported by its Company Secretary, whose role includes supporting the Board on governance matters, assisting the Board with meetings and directors' duties, and acting as an interface between the Board and senior executives across the Group. The Board and individual Directors have access to its Company Secretary.

The Company Secretary is appointed by the Board by resolution. The Company Secretary is accountable directly to the Board, through the Chair, on all matters regarding the proper functioning of the Board.

The role of the Company Secretary is responsible for the following matters:

- Advising the Board on governance matters.
- Monitoring adherence of Board to policies and procedures.
- Coordinating timely completion and despatch of Board papers.
- Ensuring business during Board meetings is accurately captured in the minutes.
- Helping to organise and facilitate induction and professional development of Directors.

Details regarding our Company Secretary, including experience and qualifications, are set out in the Directors' Report in the Company's Annual Report.

Recommendation 1.5: Diversity Policy

The Company has adopted a Diversity Policy which provides a framework for the Company to establish and achieve measurable diversity objectives, including in respect of diversity. The Diversity Policy allows the Board

to set measurable gender diversity objectives, if considered appropriate, and to assess annually both the objectives (if any have been set) and the Company's progress in achieving them.

The Diversity Policy is available on the Company's website at <https://flynngold.com.au/corporate/corporate-governance-2/>.

The Company's policy has meritocracy as a guiding principle and seeks to align the Company's management systems with its commitment to continue to develop a culture that values and achieves diversity in its workforce and on its Board. The Company is also of the view that inclusion should be driven by culture (i.e. 'we want to') rather than by policy ('we have to').

The Board and management consider building a diverse and inclusive workforce is paramount to gaining the best insight into the needs of our customers and stakeholders. A diversity of perspectives and backgrounds also strengthens creativity and innovation in teams.

The proportion of women on the Board, in senior executive positions and women across the entire organisation as at current is as follows:

- Women on the Board – 0%
- Women in senior executive positions – 33%
- Women across the entire organisation – 33%

"Senior Executives" means those individuals who hold senior management or executive roles supporting the Managing Director in the management of the business and the delivery of the Company's strategic objectives, including any Director who also holds such an executive or senior management role.

The Company's workforce is relatively small and as such the Board does not believe it is appropriate to establish formal diversity objectives at this stage and therefore, we do not comply with Recommendation 1.5 in its entirety.

The Company is not considered a "relevant employer" under the Workplace General Equality Act 2012, as it is not a non-public sector employer with 100 or more employees in Australia for any six months or more of a reporting period.

Recommendation 1.6: Board, Committee and Individual Directors Performance Assessment

The Board is committed to formally evaluating its performance, the performance of its committees (if applicable) and individual Directors, as well as the governance processes supporting the Board. The Company does not currently have separate Audit & Risk or Nomination & Remuneration Committees and as such the Board fulfils the role of these committees.

A Board performance assessment took place during the reporting period in relation to the 2026 financial year. An analysis of the data collected indicated that the Board is functioning effectively against the majority of its criteria.

The review process involved:

- Completion of a questionnaire/survey by each director, and which is facilitated by the Company Secretary
- Preparation by the Company Secretary and provision of a report to the Board which outlines the feedback received on the Board's and individual Director performance; and

- Discussion by the Board of any areas and actions for improvement. Individual Directors' performance is also assessed through open and frank discussions between the Chair of Board. Similarly, evaluation results for the Chair are provided to the Board for discussion.

The Board does not currently have any separate committees due to the size and nature of the Company and thus Committee performance assessments were not applicable.

Recommendation 1.7: Senior Executive Performance Assessment

The Senior Executives are appointed by the Board and their Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) contain specific financial and non-financial objectives.

The performance of the Executive Directors against their KPIs and other performance criteria was assessed during the reporting period in relation to the 2026 financial year by way of a performance questionnaire, followed by discussions with the Board.

The performance of the other Senior Executives was reviewed through discussions with the Managing Director, having regard to their performance against their KPIs and other relevant performance criteria. The outcomes of these reviews were considered by the Board.

PRINCIPLE 2 – BOARD STRUCTURE

Recommendation 2.1: Nomination Committee

The Company is of the view that given the current size and operations, the Board fulfils the roles and responsibilities in relation to nominations. The Board will be responsible for the duties that would ordinarily be carried out by a Nomination Committee, including reviewing processes for succession planning and ensuring the Board has the appropriate balance of skills, experience, independence and knowledge to discharge its duties and responsibilities effectively.

The Company has adopted a Nomination & Remuneration Committee Charter and is available on the Company's website at <https://flynngold.com.au/corporate/corporate-governance-2/>.

In accordance with the Company's Nomination Committee Charter the primary function of the Committee is to assist the Board to carry out the following:

- review Director competence standards;
- review Board succession plans;
- evaluate the Board's performance;
- make recommendations for the appointment and removal of Directors to the Board; and
- make recommendations to the Board on recruitment, retention and termination policies for senior management.

The Company does not meet this Recommendation in its entirety.

Recommendation 2.2: Board Skills Matrix

Our objective is to have an appropriate mix of expertise and experience on our Board so that it can effectively discharge its corporate governance and oversight responsibilities. It is the Board's view that the current Directors

possess an appropriate mix of relevant skills, experience, expertise and diversity to enable the Board to discharge its responsibilities and deliver the Company's strategic objectives.

The Board undertook a review of the current skills and expertise of the Board of Directors during the prior period and updated the Board Skills Matrix.

The Board considers the independence of Directors having regard to the relationships listed in Box 2.3 of the ASX Recommendations.

The Board regularly assesses the independence of each Non-Executive Director in light of the information which each Director is required to disclose in relation to any material contract or other relationship with the Company in accordance with the Director's terms of appointment, the Corporations Act 2001, the Board Charter and Related Party Policy.

Currently two Board members are independent Directors and two Directors are considered by the Board as not independent.

The Board considers that Clive Duncan and John Forwood are independent directors and free from any business or any other relationship that could materially interfere with, or reasonably be perceived to interfere with, the exercise of their unfettered and independent judgement and is able to fulfil the role of independent director for the purpose of the Recommendations.

Neil Marston and Samuel Garrett are both Executive Directors and therefore not considered to be independent.

Notwithstanding the above, the Board believes that Neil Marston and Samuel Garrett are able to objectively analyse the issues before them in the best interests of all Shareholders and in accordance with his duties as Director.

The Board has considered the holdings of securities in the Company by the Non-Executive Directors and is of the opinion that their respective interests in shares would not materially interfere with, or could be reasonably perceived to interfere with, the independent exercise of their judgement in their position as a Director. The Board also considers that they are otherwise free from any business or other relationship that could materially interfere with, or reasonably be perceived to interfere with, the independent exercise of their judgement, and that each of these Directors is able to fulfil the role of independent Director for the purposes of the ASX Recommendations.

Recommendation 2.4: Majority Independence

As at the date of this Statement, there are two directors who are deemed independent and two of them are deemed non-independent.

The Board recognises that it is desirable for the majority of the Board to be Independent Directors, the current Board composition reflects an appropriate balance of skills, expertise and experience to fulfil its obligations to act in the best interests of the Company and all stakeholders. The Board also considers that there are appropriate safeguards in place including policies and protocols to ensure independent thought and decision making.

It is noted that the composition of the Board will be reassessed in the future in line with changes in the Group's operations and will be adjusted as deemed appropriate. The Board will consider the Recommendations in assessing any future changes in board composition and note that while the Board may not meet the majority independence requirements that each Board member exercises independence in each of the Board decisions.

Further information regarding our Directors', including their experience and qualifications, is set out in the Directors' Report of our Annual Report.

The Company does not comply with this Recommendation in its entirety.

Recommendation 2.5: Board Chair

On 1 January 2021, Clive Duncan was appointed as Non-Executive Chair of the Company and is considered to be an independent Director. The Chair provides leadership to the Board in relation to all Board matters and is responsible for ensuring that the Board meets its responsibilities under the Board Charter. The role of Chair is set out in more detail in the Board Charter.

The roles of Chair and Managing Director are exercised by different individuals, being Mr. Clive Duncan and Mr. Neil Marston, respectively.

The role of the Chair is therefore separate from that of the Executive position.

Recommendation 2.6: Induction, Education and Training

New Directors are provided with copies of all relevant documents and policies governing the Company's business, operations and management, at the time of joining the Board. All Directors are provided with ongoing professional development and training opportunities to enable them to develop and maintain their skills and knowledge.

Directors are also encouraged to personally undertake appropriate training and refresher courses as appropriate to maintain the skills required to discharge their obligations to the Company.

PRINCIPLE 3 – ACT ETHICALLY AND RESPONSIBLY

Recommendation 3.1: Statement of Values

In order to reinforce the Company's values which underpin how the Company undertakes its business, it has adopted a Statement of Values. The Statement of Values is the guiding principles and norms that define what type of organisation it aspires to be and what it requires from its directors.

CORE VALUES

- To ensure a safe work environment for all people involved in the Company's operations;
- Integrity, honesty and inclusivity across all aspects of the Company's operations;
- To promote, develop and foster an enjoyable and productive work environment for all employees built upon a culture of technical excellence, teamwork and respect;
- To deliver results through intelligent, efficient and agile exploration; and
- To demonstrate corporate, social and environmental responsibility across all aspects of the business,.

The Company does not meet this Recommendation in its entirety.

Recommendation 4.2: Assurances

The Audit and Risk Committee Charter requires a declaration from the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and Chief Financial Officer (CFO) (or equivalent) to the Board that, in their opinion, the financial records of the Company have been properly maintained and that the financial statements comply with appropriate accounting standards and give a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the Company and that their opinion has been formed on the basis of a sound system of risk management and internal control which is operating effectively.

The CEO along with the Financial Accountant have provided a Declaration to the Board that, in their opinion, the financial records of the entity have been properly maintained and that the financial statements comply with the appropriate accounting standards and give a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the entity and that the opinion has been formed on the basis of a sound system of risk management and internal control which is operating effectively for the purposes of the Annual Report. The Assurances will be provided to the Board

for future Annual Reports in addition to other statutory reports including the Half Year and Appendix 5B reporting obligations.

Recommendation 4.3: Verification of integrity of periodic corporate reports

The Company's external auditor is William Buck Audit (Vic) Pty Ltd (**William Buck**). William Buck will be in attendance at each Annual General Meeting and a representative will be available to answer shareholder questions about the conduct of the audit and the preparation and content of the auditor's report.

The Audit and Risk Committee Charter provides that the Audit and Risk Committee (or in its absence the Board) will assist the Board in the implementation of the Company's processes to verify the integrity of any periodic corporate report it releases to the market that is not audited or reviewed by an external auditor.

William Buck's Australia Partners independence declaration is contained in the Directors' Report in our 2026 Annual Report. The effectiveness, performance and independence of the external auditor is reviewed annually by the Board.

Any periodic corporate report the Company releases to the market that is not audited or reviewed by an external auditor is reviewed and approved by the Board so that it is satisfied the report in question is materially correct, balanced and provides investors with appropriate information to make an informed investment decision. Following review by the Board of Directors the report is formally approved prior to release.

For any periodic reports released to the market, the processes to verify their integrity will be disclosed either in the report itself or more generally in the Company's corporate governance disclosures in its annual report, or on the Company's website.

PRINCIPLE 5 – MAKE TIMELY AND BALANCED DISCLOSURE

- Shareholders being encouraged to attend or, if unable to attend, to vote on the motions proposed by appointing a proxy or any other means included in the notice of meeting;
- general meetings will generally be held in a location and at a time which is intended to maximise participation by shareholders;
- full participation of shareholders at general meetings is encouraged to ensure a high level of accountability and identification with the Company's strategies and goals;
- Shareholders having the opportunity to submit questions prior to each annual meeting; and
- that the Managing Director & CEO, senior management and auditors will be present to assist with providing answers at annual meetings.

Recommendation 6.4: All substantive resolutions at a security holder meeting are decided by poll

In order to ascertain the true will of the Company's security holders attending and voting at its security holder meetings, whether they attend in person, electronically or by proxy or other representative, in most situations where this can be achieved the company will conduct the voting procedure by a poll.

Recommendation 6.5: Electronic Communication with Shareholders

Shareholders are encouraged to take advantage of the benefits of electronic communications by electing to receive communication from the Company and its share registry electronically. Shareholders may send their communications preference to the share registry electronically through one of its means of communication available on <https://www-au.computershare.com>.

PRINCIPLE 7 – RECOGNISE AND MANAGE RISK

Recommendation 7.1: Risk Committee

The Company's Audit and Risk Committee Charter provides for the creation of an Audit and Risk Committee, with at least three members, a majority of whom are independent Directors, and which must be chaired by an independent Director who is not the Board Chair. The Audit and Risk Committee Charter is available on our website at <https://flynngold.com.au/corporate/corporate-governance-2/>.

Due to the current size of the Company and the Board, the Board fulfils the roles and responsibilities in relation to risk. The duties of the Board in relation to risk are the same that would otherwise be fulfilled by a Risk Committee, including ensuring that the Company has an appropriate risk management framework and associated internal compliance and control procedures.

The Company does not meet this Recommendation in its entirety.

Recommendation 7.2: Risk Management Framework

The Company's risk management framework is supported by the Board of Directors, management and the Audit and Risk Committee (or in its absence the Board). The Board is responsible for approving and reviewing the Company's risk management strategy and policy. Management is responsible for monitoring that appropriate processes and controls are in place to effectively and efficiently manage risk. Management is responsible for monitoring compliance with and the effectiveness of risk management systems and controls at a divisional level

including financial and non-financial risks. Senior management would regularly report to the Board on the adequacy of its risk management systems, processes and key matters for consideration. A full review of the risk management framework will be undertaken during FY2027.

Recommendation 7.3: Internal Audit

Due to the current size of the Company, and taking into account cost/benefit considerations, the Board does not currently consider it necessary to have an internal audit function. The Audit and Risk Committee Charter requires the Committee (or in its absence the Board) to oversee the evaluation and continual improvement of the effectiveness of the Company's risk management and internal control processes. The Committee (or in its absence the Board) will achieve this objective by closely monitoring these areas and will require management to review and report on risk and internal control areas. The Committee may consider the use of external resources to assist as required.

The Board considers these departures from the ASX Recommendation are justified given the maturity of the Company and the need to preserve funds as an early-stage business. If in future an internal audit function is warranted then the Board will give due regard to the ASX Recommendation and the establishment of an internal audit function.

The Company does not meet this Recommendation in its entirety.

Recommendation 7.4: Economic, Environmental and Social Sustainability Risk

The Board is responsible for the oversight and reporting of material exposure to economic, environmental and social sustainability risks. The Company has a strong focus on risk in field activities, including workplace health and safety, business risk arising through equipment use, community and environmental factors. A risk register for the Company is to be adopted and will be maintained to document the risks identified. A risk assessment and reporting procedure will be used to assess all risks. Risk is reviewed as part of the Board meetings.

The Company has environmental responsibilities as required by the holding of its exploration licences and applicable permits to conduct exploration activities on its exploration licences. The Company has a strong emphasis in supporting the local communities it operates in and active management and liaison with local landowners that the Company's tenements and exploration activities may impact. The Company respects and recognises the diversity of communities, in which it seeks to accommodate different cultures and heritages.

The Company details the associated risks in its Director's Report in the Company's 2026 Annual Report.

The Company is subject to a range of general economic risks, including macro-economic risks, government policy, general business conditions, changes in technology and many other factors.

PRINCIPLE 8 – REMUNERATE FAIRLY AND RESPONSIBILITY

Recommendation 8.1: Remuneration Committee

Due to the current size of the Company and Board, the Board will fulfil the roles and responsibilities in relation to remuneration. The duties of the Board in relation to remuneration are the same that would otherwise be fulfilled by a Remuneration Committee to address any issues and continuously review the range of skills,

knowledge, experience, independence and diversity to ensure that the Board can discharge its duties and responsibilities effectively.

In accordance with the Company's Remuneration Committee Charter the key responsibilities of the Committee in relation to remuneration matters includes assisting the Board to:

- make recommendations to the Board on:
 - executive remuneration and incentive policies;
 - the remuneration packages of senior management;
 - incentive schemes;
 - superannuation arrangements; and
 - the remuneration framework for directors.

The Company does not meet this Recommendation in its entirety.

Recommendation 8.2: Remuneration Policies and Practices

The Board is currently responsible for determining and reviewing remuneration policies for the Directors and senior executives. If necessary, it obtains independent advice on the appropriateness of remuneration packages given trends in comparable companies and in accordance with the objectives of the Company.

Details of the Company's remuneration practices for its Directors and senior executives are disclosed in the Remuneration Report in the Company's Annual Report.

Recommendation 8.3: Equity Based Remuneration Scheme

The Company's Securities Trading Policy includes a statement on the Company's policy on prohibiting restricted persons under that policy (i.e., directors, senior executives and specified employees) from entering into transactions (whether through the use of derivatives or otherwise) designed to hedge their exposure to the Company's securities.
