The Board of Directors of Spacetalk Ltd. ('**Spacetalk**' or '**Company**') is responsible for the corporate governance of the Company. The Board guides and monitors the business and affairs of Spacetalk on behalf of the shareholders by whom they are elected and to whom they are accountable. This statement reports on Spacetalk's key governance principles and practices for the period ended 30 June 2026.

This Corporate Governance Statement is current as of 28 September 2026 and has been approved by the Board of the Company on that date.

Spacetalk, as a listed entity, must comply with the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth) ('**Corporations Act**') and the ASX Limited ('**ASX**') Listing Rules.
